An army of hunters clad in bright red and many hued garments invaded the upper peninsula this week as the deer hunting season opened.

The usual automobile congestion at the straits again brought into focus the demand for an immediate solution to this problem. The last legislature appropriated 4 1/2 million dollars for a new ferry boat but difficulties arose as to dockage at St. Ignace and it will probably cost a million more before it is in operation.

Invariably the agitation for a straits bridge is revived and 1950 will probably see political agitation in favor of a bridge or tunnel to be financed in part by government money or self liquidating bonds.

The upper peninsula welcomes the sportsman as recreation is the big business there. It is in measure has replaced the income from lumbering and copper mining. The forests are depleted and mining has reached depths at which it can only be carried on by means of a government subsidy.

Iron mining will continue for years to come. The Great Lakes Steel industry has an investment of four billion, four hundred million dollars here. When the high grade ore is exhausted, a way will probably be found to mine the low grade ore successfully. The late World War depleted the mines of much high grade ore. Some mines were exhausted and production has been decreasing. Business Weeks says in some 30 years most of the high grade ore will be used up.

There has been some revival of lumbering. More than 300 per cent houses from pine lumber were fabricated and sold last year. There are 20,000,000 acres in Mich only good for growing pine trees.

The tellers were: Phillip Sprout, Willard Wiltsie, Clifford VanHorn, Don Swarthout, Albert Shirley and Harold Rady.

The nominations were by acclamation. For the 3 year term Howard Thayer was nominated by Mrs. Clare Palmer, Mrs. Clare Palmer by Leo Lavey, John Burg by Chas. Hewlett and Merwin Campbell by Bradon White. For the 2 year term Nelson Miller was nominated by Mrs. Steele; Don Bowers by Nelson Miller; Merle Caird by Harold Rady; Josephine Harris by Lynn Hendage; and Marquerite Clark by John Burg.

For the one year term Eric Rose was nominated by Merwin Campbell; Wm. Clark by John Carver and John Redl by Olin Robinson.

The result of the election was: For the three year term: Howard Thayer 140, John Burg 121, Lynn Hendage 74, Merwin Campbell 78, Mrs. Clare Palmer 68. Thayer and Burg were declared elected.

EXAMINATION POSTPONED

Justice Eric Singer of Brighton started the examination of Maurice Chevalier for the murder of Frank Cline, Thurs. and then postponed it to Dec. 8 when an agreement came up between the attorneys. Pros. Erwin sought to introduce the confession of Chevalier. Attorney Lavon for Chevalier objected, claiming it was forced and Chevalier had no lawyer at the time. Lavon also sought to have the bail of Chevalier reduced from \$20,000 to 7,500 stating that the two Andrus brothers convicted of the Cline murder reduced from \$20,000 to \$7,500. Justice Singer will also rule on this Dec. 8. The hearing of Wm. English also accused of the murder has not been set.

Current Comment

The postoffice dept. recently tried out two mail trucks. One runs from Grand Rapids to Manistee and the other from Grand Rapids to Saginaw. These trucks are equipped like mail cars with mail sorting clerks etc. they were such a success that another has been added running from Grand Rapids to Ludington. These trucks are 35 ft. long and pick up mail from small towns on the route and sort it on the way. The cause of this service is due to the fact that the railroads have been cutting down the number of mail trains to the point where they could no longer give adequate service.

The Detroit Free Press a very strong conservative paper on commenting on the election last Tuesday which went strongly Democratic concludes with the statement that "You can't beat something with nothing." It adds that those opposed to the Democrats had better be looking for a leader who combines the cold logic of Senator Taft with the magnetic personality of Teddy Roosevelt. 



Mr. Palmer has discontinued his bus service and mail carrying between Jackson and Howell. The government is advertising for another mail carrier for \$300 a year.


Three men: Mooney, McDonald and Stowe are held at the Howell jail for the Gregory bank robbery.
