Tuition fees and other charges paid by students at the U. of M. and Mich. State college have doubled in recent years. Whereas students at the U. of M. paid 20 percent of the operating cost in 1929 they pay 40 percent (double) now. The legislature has been reluctant to appropriate more money for higher education and if the trend continues only the wealthy will be able to afford college education.

The state park work program whereby convict labor is used has been a success and double the number of prison inmates will be used next year.

Kim Sigler has taken himself out of the political picture next year. He said he is satisfied to practice law and fly his plane whenever and wherever he wants to.

Mich. farmers have just completed the largest harvest on record. The farm grain crop is 26 percent higher than 1948 and 21 percent higher than the previous record crop of 1942.

Eastern railroads have raised their fares 12 1/2 percent.

The Mich. apple crop is 72 percent above the average with a yield of 11,735,000 bushels.

Louis Numms, com. of internal revenue announced an increase in October 1948 of \$1,982,015.00 over Oct. 1948. The sales tax increased over \$300,000. The total tax collected was \$300,220.19 over 1948.

State dept. heads have asked appropriations in 1950 of nearly \$100,000,000 over 1949.

The Mich. State Medical Dept. at the Mich. Health Conference their own health problems and not to rely too much on the federal government.

CONSERVATION NOTES
Snow and cold weather have ended a 35 week forest fire danger period during which 21,500 acres burned over which cost \$111,356 to control.

Despite more favorable conditions there were less hunters in the woods this year and a lighter kill. In the first 8 days 6629 deer were taken across the straits compared to 6662 in the same period last year. 736 were taken through Wis. compared to 1075 in the same period last year.

1193 game law violators paid fines amounting to \$26,346 and served 252 days in jail during the small game season.

All those who shot pheasants with leg bands are urged to send them into the dept.

State bounty payments were \$22,875 in Oct. There were 2820 fox, 474 coyotes, 115 bobcats and 3 wolves.

A new ski jump in the 42,000 Porcupine Mt. park is announced. It has a 550 ft drop a 2800 run, a 1800 open slope serviced by 3 tows ropes.

The state received \$76,310 for the 698 platted lots sold in Oakland and Macomb counties at auction last week.

Thirteen percent of the bow and arrow hunters got deer this year.

Mich. has two of the largest white spruce known. One in the Copper Range is 8 ft. 9 in. in circumference and one in Schoolcraft county near Creighton is 8 ft. 4 in.

RELEASED ON PROBATION

Donald Jones of Pinckney sentenced in 1944 to 10 years to life on a robbery armed charge who was recently granted a new trial because he did not have the benefit of counsel at the time he was sentenced received his second trial in Washtenaw county last week before Judge James Beckley. The charge was reduced to robbery unarmed and he was set free as he had already served 5 years. He was also placed on probation for 5 years and ordered to pay a fine of \$250 payable the 4th and 5th year of his probation.

The man indicted was Leo Brown, 412 W. Washington St. Ann Arbor. Tom Powers a member of the merchant seamen of Grand Rapids who took part in the strike is still in prison.

Earl Grubb, chairman of the co. PMA comm. said that the deadline for returning ballots is not until Dec. 22 but if farmers vote now and return their ballots there will be less likelihood of misplacing the ballot around the house or of forgetting to vote.

The chairman said that ballots were mailed to all known eligible voters in the county. Any farmer who did not receive a ballot through the mail should call at the co. office.

Farmers may either mail their marked ballots to the co. PMA office in sealed envelopes to maintain secrecy or they may deliver them in person. The ballots will be counted on Dec. 23 by an impartial election board.




