The theory that Mich. voter are becoming disillusioned over party promises will be tested this year.

Former Gov. Kelly and Eugene Black of Port Huron will both be candidates for governor as well as Eugene Keyes, an independent who can be depended on to take opposite sides from that of Kelly and Black. ALTHOUGH Black-the bad boy of Sigler administration is also usually on the off side.

Howard J. Rugg, Lansing writer blames the independent voter for the unsettled state of Mich. government which changes about every 2 years.

He says the average voter does not take politics seriously as his father and grandfather did. They have seen the cost of government rise administration after administration until they have concluded the party label does not mean anything.

"They have lost interest in government except insofar as their own communities may benefit from federal or state grants. As long as the state and federal governments take bigger bites each year out of their pockets they are going to do everything they can to get as much as possible for their own governmental units, thereby holding down their local taxes."

"For that reason they are not binding themselves to any one political party, but reserve the right to vote for the candidate they believe will best serve their own interests."

This quest for the so-called "knight on a white horse" who will achieve the political maximum has been responsible, according to Rugg, for the persistent switch of independent voters from Democrat to Republican parties. The 1950 political campaign will be watched with interest as affording a new test of this theory.

Current Comments

Formosa was the principal topic and the consensus of the week's editors whose papers we read is that we should let it alone, that is not worth sending a lot of American boys over there to be killed. The start of Detroit Free Press even goes so far as to say that if Pres. Truman had come out for armed intervention in Formosa, Herbert Hoover, Senator Taft and the lesser lights who are now demanding it would have been the first to oppose it. In other words they are merely using it as a campaign issue. Now lets look at the facts. Formosa was not considered of much military importance until Gen. Kiang Chi Shuck led a force of 100,000 Chinese troops to Formosa. Then he appealed to this country for aid. There are two ways we could aid him. Send arms and supplies. However we have been doing this for a number of years without any success and the opinion is that it would avail nothing now. The sole remaining thing is to send battle ships and planes. This would amount to a practical declaration of war and as Great Britain is about to recognize Communist China and the United Nations also we would be behind the 8 ball. We have had such experience before. When we intervened and helped set up a Republic in China. We had to keep troops there off and on for 25 years to prevent revolutions. After World War I this country sent an army to Archangel, Russia to fight the Communists. Hundreds of American boys were killed and we had to give it up as a bad job.

In New Hampshire Dr. A. Sanders, a county physician, has been arrested for murder. The indictment reads:

"Feloniously, wilfully and of his malice aforethought did inject 10 cubic centimeters of air four times in close succession into the veins of Mrs. Abbie Barrois, 59 (this cancer patient), well knowing the said air injections to be sufficient to cause death.

Dr. Sanders' defense is that his act was justified as the woman would have died anyway and that putting her to death was an act of mercy. This is bunk if he is acquitted his act will set a precedent. There might be no limit as to how far it could be carried. For instance all incurable inmates of insane asylums could be put out of the way for the same reason and this would also apply to those persons in the home for the feeble minded. To carry it to extremes murderers could also claim their killings were acts of mercy. Giving a doctor the power to put a person to death if it seems it advisable would undoubtedly lead to complications and besides we don't think the majority of doctors want any such power.

At McBride, Mich. last week a 15 year old school girl shot and killed her father because he upbraid her for staying out late after a basketball game. She was arrested at the home of an uncle and her excuse was that he scolded her all the while and she could not stand it any more. Now we wonder just what will be blamed for her act - the movies, the radio or the comic and crime magazines. There have been a number of crimes of similar nature in different parts of the country of late. Something must be causing them.

We see that Cong. Minchen of the 2nd district where the Waterloo area is located is in favor of letting the army establish its West Point of the Air there. Two other communities are also after it in Michigan. Set fridge field, Mt. Clemens and Battle Creek. Now we are quite familiar with the Waterloo area as the Pinckney ball team plays there every year but wonder if the terrain there is suited to landing fields. The Waterloo region is mostly hills, lakes and valleys with very little level land. However, the army can do wonders with their bulldozers, etc. etc. we are told by the boys who served in the South Atlantic during the late war and they probably know what they want.

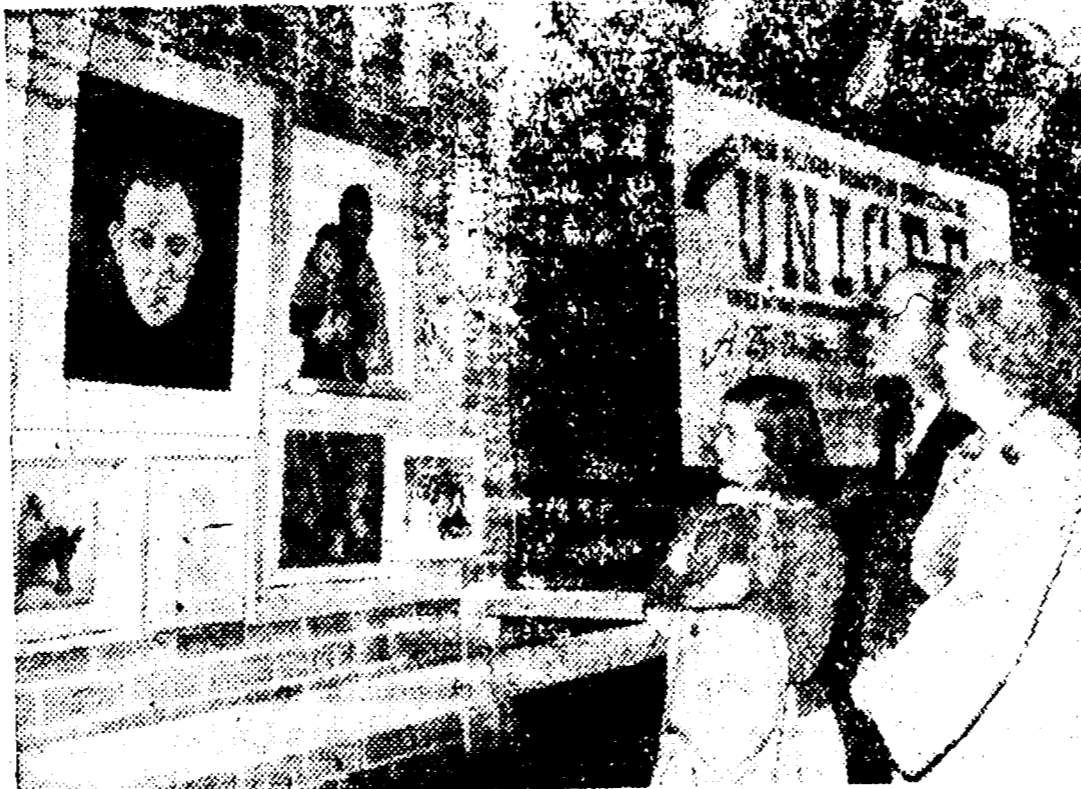

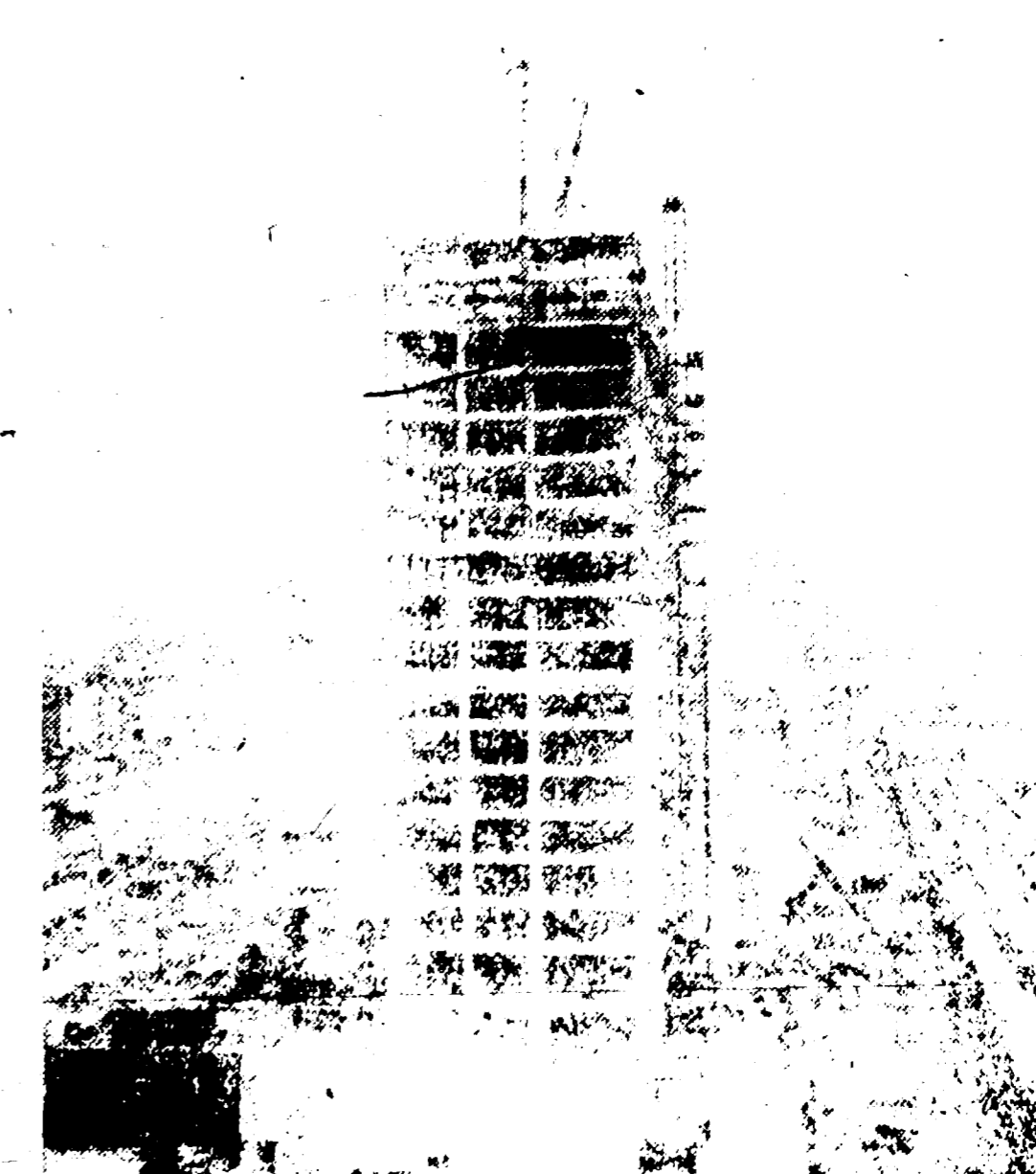

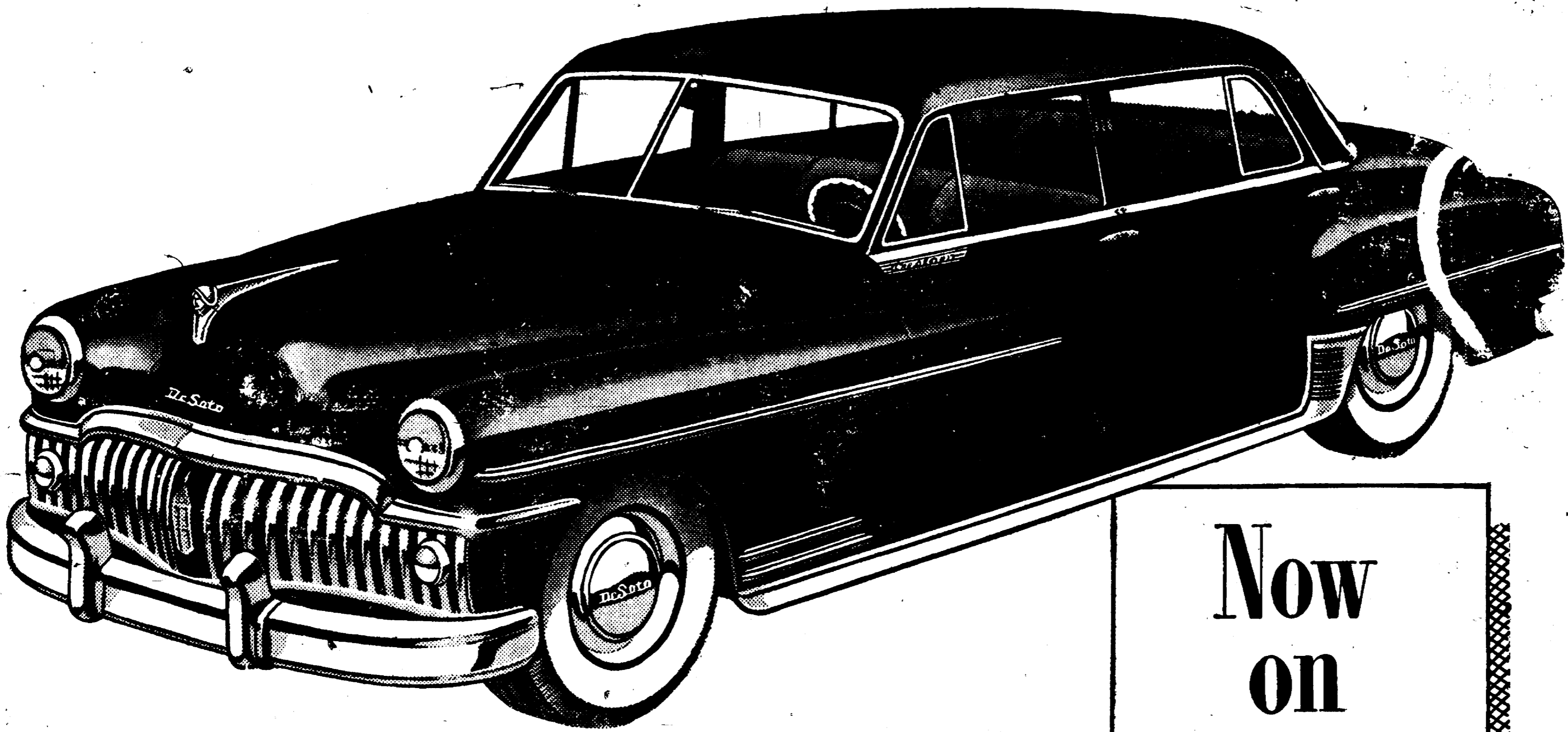
Progress of U.N. Permanent Headquarters

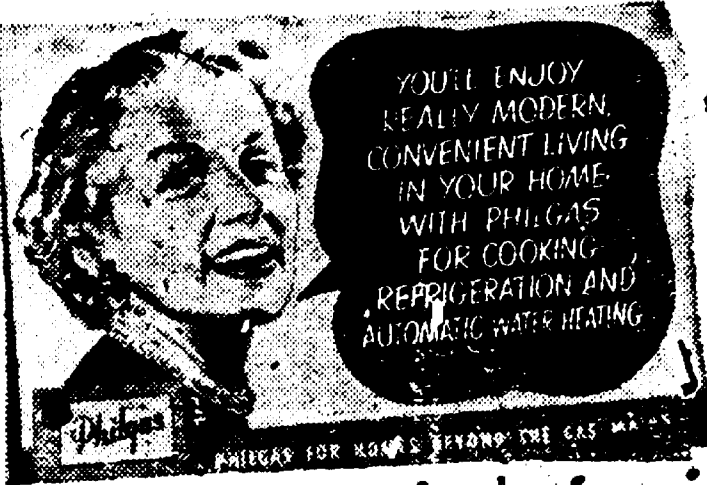
