Michigan Mirror

At the recent Mich. Press meet in Lansing a public forum took place with Schuyler Marshall acting as moderator and the state officers answering questions.

Gov. Williams was asked if the departmental economies recently effected which will save two million dollars a year would mean a levelling off in operating costs and smaller appropriations.

Gov. Williams said that wage increases, conservation programs and so on would absorb most of it. New programs, such as mental health and expansions of the two universities will call for more funds.

Gov. Williams was asked if bingo was unlawful or an allowed enterprise. He answered Former Atty. Gen. Black had ruled it illegal except in cases where the prizes were donated and everything was free. However, he added it was up to the prosecuting attorneys to enforce the law.

He said the question of a bridge across the Straits of Mackinac would not come up at the special session.

Senator Colin Smith in regard to welfare said he was against nationalizing or statizing it

but would return it to local communities. The difficulty is that the communities have different rules and some have none at all. He would have each community file their rules with the state dept. of welfare.

Sec. of State Alger said he favored permanent auto license plates to last the life of the car. It would take a lot of money to set this system up and other states who have it have many difficulties. Michigan should iron all these kinks out before adopting it.

In regard to restoring the front license plates to cars, he said the legislature has so far refused to appropriate the money to do it although the state law requires 2 plates.

When queried of reorganization of the state government as to whether a civilian committee would be better than a legislative one, Senator Milliken said he favored a legislative committee as they would be in a better position to present it and get it passed.

D. Hale Brake, state treasurer, was asked "Why does the state invest its money in F. H. A. mortgages? Has the state lost any money by doing so?"

Mr. Brake said "F. H. A. mortgages are insured by the federal government. There are 2 disadvantages in the mortgages. They have to be bought in a competitive market and you have to pay a premium. The government does not insure the premium. You might lose it."

The other disadvantage is you may have to foreclose. If you do that the government only pays half the costs. We bought 75 F. H. A. mortgages in Fla. and had to foreclose 4. On the 4 we foreclosed we had a net interest earning of 1.95 which is more than you can get anywhere else. On all 75 we had a net earning to date of 3.60.

On the El Siglo apartment mortgage in Ariz. we had a net earning of 3.30 as long as the mortgage was paid. We got our premium back. We will have to take out our interest earning and cost of foreclosure. When we turn it over to the government we get 2.50 percent debentures we can sell.

Now in the Farmers Home administration mortgages this is not true. They came into Mich. in 1947. This got farmers insures loans for veterans and tenants who wish to buy farms. We loaned \$391,000 under this setup. We got 3 percent interest.

Supt. of Public Instruction Thurston when asked in regard to the Taft bill appropriating three hundred million dollars a year for education said there were enough safeguards in the bill to ensure local and state control of education.

Atty. Gen. Roth asked about the 3 man grand jury said only time will tell whether its workable. He said the one man grand jury was not the panacea the papers claim it was. That 99 per cent of all prosecutions are started by the prosecuting attorneys. Grand jury investigations are very expensive.

State Highway Comm. Zeisler said state highway contracts are let on bids. Only complete units of work are paid for.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Since March 1948, 969 wild life habitat improvement projects have been carried out. This is a joint farm-conservation program whereby farmers plant unused corners and swales to shrubs and pine seedlings for game cover and feed.

Mild weather and an open winter have caused 130,000 ducks, geese and swans to winter in Michigan. Only 86,000 wintered here last year. 75,000 birds were counted from Port Huron to Lake Erie and 17,000 in Allegan, Van Buren, Cass, Kalamazoo and St. Joseph.

Mild weather has prevented deer yarding except in the upper peninsula.

About 60 percent of the fishermen of Michigan fish free as wives of fishermen and children under 17 years old.

No skunk, badger, mink or muskrat may be trapped in Lake Erie marshes after Jan. 31.

Current Comment

The Jaycee or Junior Chamber of Commerce has endorsed the Hoover Economy plan and in doing so has gotten into a lively debate with the American Legion whose National Commander George Craig has condemned it. In Washington D. C. last Wed. Commander Craig in blasting the Hoover plan said its adoption would only result in chaos and waste. The Hoover plan recommends substantial cuts in veterans relief all the way down the line. In a speech at Indianapolis in paying his respects to the American Legion Clifford Cooper, national commander of the Jaycee said "We realize that selfish interests fight for a continuation of a cut of government pie. He said in his organization policies start in local chapters but in the American Legion policies start at the top and are handed down. He said 85 percent of the Jaycees were veterans. Com. Craig came back with the statement that the Hoover plan represents the ignorance and bias which both the American Legion and the People of America have to stand against dismemberment of the Veterans Administration. Com. Craig is merely doing the job which he was selected. The object of the American Legion is to aid the veterans. If Com. Craig did nothing when veterans aid was threatened he would be a poor commander."

According to Washington news writers the selective service or draft law will be extended when it expires in June. Boys reaching the age of 16 must register but they will be in induction but they will be in standby law with only the president having power to proclaim state of emergency and other instructions. The reason is that there is still plenty of crises and emergencies may be only around the corner. We have the draft machinery set up and it is doubtful it would be wasteful in these unsettled times.

It is great to have a reputation. We read that Joe DiMaggio, the New York Yanks star ball player who is about done and played his last year until the end of the season has signed for \$100,000 a year Jackie Robinson, the colored boy who plays for Brooklyn and won the batting championship and most valuable player award in 1949, \$35,000. DiMaggio is a case of basking in his past laurels. Robinson who was the first negro to reach the big leagues and had a hard row to hoe now finds that performances mean little.

The entrance of Former Gov. Kelly in the Republican race for governor which was to clarify the situation and force some of the old timers out seems to have failed. Hale Brake withdrew but he took his candidacy seriously. Dr. Koyne, Sec. of State Alger and Com. Engle are still in. Sec. of State Alger recently took a poll of Mich. auto owners through his license plate sales offices. This poll showed Alger had a Harry Kelly with Keyes and Brake 4th and Engle 5th. Also in this poll Gov. Williams got more votes than all the Republican candidates combined.

Most of the propaganda directed against bureaucracy and the great cost of federal government is bunk. This only takes 3 percent of the budget. The biggest expense is past present and future wars which takes 70 percent of the budget. National defense takes 8.19. Veterans programs 7.3 interest on the debt 13.3 and foreign aid 11.1. Any economy measure to mean anything would be at the expense of the veterans and national defense.

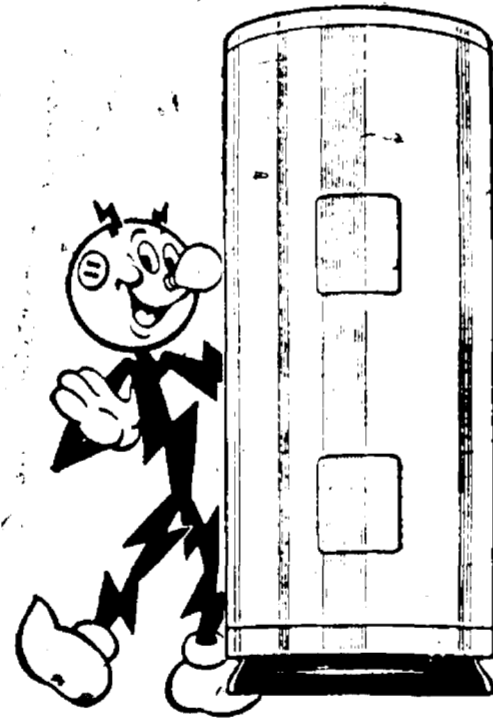

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
