Michigan Mirror

Getting new industries to locate in small towns is not a push over affair. The theory that workers may work part time in a factory and part time on a small plot of ground is mostly an illusion.

This was brought out by a panel discussion sponsored by the Michigan Press Association for papers in rural communities.

The persons who took part in it were C. Dwight Wood of the Michigan Department of Economic Development, Prof. Whitmore, Landscape Department of the U. of Michigan.

Mr. Wood said the best way a community can get small factories is to make a survey of the services they have to offer and send these to the Michigan Economic Development Department which will forward them to industries looking for towns to migrate to.

Prof. Whitmore stressed the need for available land adjacent to railroads suitable for parking, shipping and the factory trend to one story buildings. This last has made the number of square ft. per worker jump from 150 ft. to 1600 sq. ft. He believes industry should locate within the city limits. Some cities have formed corporations to purchase lands for industry.

Dean Anthony of Michigan State said a survey showed 25,000 industrial workers in Michigan live on small farms. Most of them are making poor use of the farms. Farming is a business and it is pretty hard to operate it as a sideline.

Some small towns have grown while others have declined. Community development depends on civic spirit and a constant cooperation of all citizens to better the community.

Towns which are trying to improve themselves are the ones which are attracting industries.

DATES FOR CENSUS CREWLEADERS' SCHOOL ANNOUNCED

COAL STRIKE SETTLED

The nation-wide coal strike has been settled by a sharp bit of diplomacy by Pres. Truman. He sent a message to congress asking power to seize the mines. Also to set up two boards: One was to set up a fair wage for the miners. The other was to set a fair profit for mine owners. Neither miners or owners wanted that. Miners feared he might leave wages as they are. Owners feared he might raise wages that they could not pay. So they got together in a hurry and settled the strike. In it the miners get about everything they asked for: viz: 1. An increase in the \$14.05 basic daily wage to \$14.75.

2. An increase of 10 cents in the 20-cent a ton levy on all coal mined to finance pensions and other benefits.

3. Two Lewis people on the board of trustees which handles the spending of the welfare money. He gives up the chairmanship to Thomas Kennedy, UMW vice-president. Miss Josephine Roche, director of the fund, takes the post designed as neutral. Harry M. Moses, negotiator for United States Steel, would represent the operators in the third board post.

4. The union shop is retained. This requires that miners belong to the union.

The decision of Judge Creech, finding the miners not guilty of contempt of court was a crushing defeat for the owners and victory for John L. Lewis. A quality decision might have broken the union, by a fine big enough to bankrupt them. We still think this settlement is only temporary. John L. Lewis has too many miners and not enough work. The miners work a only 3 days a week can still mine more coal than the nation needs. This situation will become worse as this prolonged strike has started a rush by coal users to convert to oil and gas heating. John L. Lewis had to strike at a time when coal was needed badly so he could get public pressure behind a strike settlement.

We heard of no one freezing to death during the strike and wonder how much of the coal shortage was synthetic. 3 carloads of coal were on the Grand Trunk side track here all last week. We understand they were consigned to Jackson prison.

In the 4th quarter Grass Lake went to town getting 16 points to Pinckney's 7.

Copeland of Grass Lake was the star of the game he scored 20 points to lead all scorers. Joe Jeffreys was second highest scorer with 10.

Pinckney's main weakness was in free throws when they only made 2 out of 12. Grass Lake got 7 out of 21 with Copeland making 4 of them.

Current Comment

Michigan schools have joined in the move to have Congress repeal the 20 per cent admission tax now levied on athletic and other high school events. Athletics are not self supporting and only local tax money makes them possible. During the war federal admission taxes were accepted as a wartime measure when everyone was willing to do their share. At the end of the war it was understood they would be repealed. However, 5 years has now passed and no repeal action has been taken. Last year Michigan schools paid \$548,729 in federal admission taxes. Sports paid \$47,920, concerts \$56,051, dances \$47,920 and other events \$31,088.

South Lyon, Saline and other small towns have set up coal rationing programs. One would hardly work in Pinckney as there is none to ration. Our only local dealer has been out of coal for some time and does not expect to get any until after the strike ends. The school got a carload of stoker coal a week or 10 days ago and is all set for some time. In Saline the school ran out of coal and had to be closed. South Lyon was about out but were lucky in getting 2 carloads last week. In many places coal is being sold only in bushel lots at 75 cents per basket. Wood is being used to some extent and the Detroit Edison Co. reports the theft of 19 light poles from their Wayne yard, presumably for fuel. No relief is anticipated for some time as it will be a number of weeks after the miners get back before coal gets moving again. In the meantime gas and oil companies have been swamped with requests from people who wish to change over to these methods of heating. In the meantime coal bootleggers are reaping a harvest as in many cases prices have tripled.

The papers have had a lot to say about the federal potato price supports by which the government buys surplus potatoes for about \$1.50 per hundred lbs. pours dye on them and resells them for a cent a hundred for stock food. In some cases the surplus potatoes are burned after oil is poured on them. This program is held up as an evidence of Democrat failure but when Senator Scott Lucas, Illinois Dem., introduced a bill in the senate last week to repeal the potato price supports it was defeated 43 to 35 by the aid of Republican votes. Both Republican senators from Maine, Brewster and Chase, which raises the most potatoes in the nation voted to retain the subsidy. Maine raises the most potatoes 75,000,000 bu. a year and sells 58 per cent to the government. Idaho raises the next largest amount 9,460,000 bu. Her Republican senator, Dworshak and also Taylor Democrat voted to keep the price support. Michigan only dumped 2,601,000 bushels yet Senator Ferguson also voted for the price support as did all senators from the big 11 potato producing states except Magnuson of Washington and Humphreys of Minn. Apparently the farmers were the only ones heard from by the senators the consumers being mute on this subject.

The Ford \$100 a month pension plans under which all employees who have worked there 30 years and reached the age of 65 years retire, are being put into effect. The total number of employees to be affected is 5000. 200 have already retired and 3000 more are expected to follow suit. Some of those who retired have been with the company 36 years. If we editor had not decided to return to the newspaper game he might have been one of the 5000. He went to work for the company in 1918 during World War I and remained there 8 years.

Malcolm Bingray, editor of the Detroit Free Press belittles the recently adopted slogan of the Republican steering committee "Liberty vs Socialism." He says the word liberty is meaningless and there are over 100 different definitions of it. The real issue he claims is "Capitalism vs Totalitarianism." and he wonders why the Republicans are afraid of the word Capitalism, the system under which this country has grown and prospered.

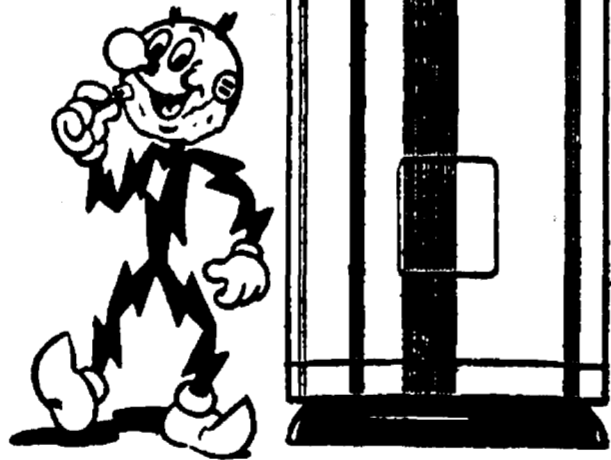

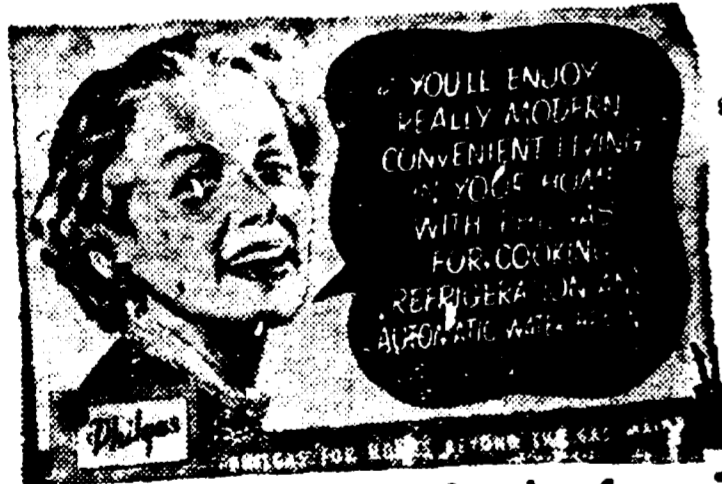
