Michigan Mirror

The Michigan Legislature has a hot political potage in its lap at the special session. With present revenue totalling \$230 million, the governor asks expenditures of \$340 million leaving a deficit of \$110 million. He would finance this by a corporation profits tax the same measure that was turned down in the last regular session.

The governor advocates an increase of only \$4.5 million for operating state debts. Of this \$2.5 would go to colleges while home governments would get \$2 million.

Breaking it down the \$340 million \$135 million would go to state agencies including colleges \$158.3 million to local governments \$27.9 for capital outlay and \$18.7 for new roads.

The program has something on tap for everyone. Local airports that could qualify for foreign aid would engage in a \$7 million program. Of the 36 Michigan airports 34 would qualify.

Schools would get \$5 million \$9 million would go to the public schools employees retirement fund. Old age assistance and dependent children would get \$8.7 million.

Declaring Michigan has not kept pace with social needs the governor proposes \$27.9 million to construct new buildings at Wayne University, University of Michigan, Michigan State and Western Michigan College. Also a 50 bed addition at the Gaylord TB Sanitarium.

Governor Williams takes issue with Auto Makers that 50 percent of the cost of a 1950 car consists of direct and indirect taxes and says a corporation profits tax would not be paid by the consumer.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Mich. sold more hunting and fishing licenses during 1948-49 than any other state in the union. 450 dead ducks have been picked up from the Detroit river since the first of the month. This is only about one per cent of the duck population wintering there. Only 22 of the dead duck were banded.

Beaver trapping opens March 25. It ends March 31 in the lower peninsula and April 9 in the upper peninsula. 4,126 beaver were taken last year and 157 other.

Mrs. Frank Thomas of Bannister recently caught a 4 lb. 17 inch bluegill in Houghton Lake. It is mounted and in a taxidermy shop in Ft. Wayne, Ind.

Great Lakes levels registered gains in Feb. except Lake Superior which went down .22 of a foot. Leases for cutting 40,000 ft. of lumber and 1,300 cords of aspen in Baraga forest will be sold at LAnse March 31.

There were 26 deaths and 173 injuries from hunting accidents last year. This was about one fatality for every 35,928 hunters.

Parch may be taken now with hook and line. Smelt, suckers, carp etc. may be dipp netted from April 1 to May 31. Not more than 25 perch may be taken in any one day.

Several hundred high school students will rough it this year in the several Michigan conservation camps. The following will go to the Waterloo park. Leadwood, Monroe, Ann Arbor, Dearborn, Mill Lake will accommodate Highland Park, River Rouge and Chelsea. Yankee Spring, Grand Lodge, Battle Creek and Lakeview; Island Lake, Lake Orion and Ferndale; Sleeper State Park Pontiac, Bay City and Handv.

Circuit Court News

The trial for robbery of the Graham Hotel at Brighton of James Paulin and Albert Monnet which took up about a week or more ended last Thursday when a jury in circuit last week after being out 30 minutes brought in a verdict of guilty. This hotel was robbed twice last Nov. One about \$60 was obtained. Another suspect, James Craig, was also arrested but later released. All three were from Pontiac. The defense presented witnesses to prove an alibi and that the suspects were somewhere else at the time of the robbery. They have been held in jail since their arrest and recently in the Mason jail where they expressed their displeasure by breaking out the windows.

Quite a number from here attended the hearing in probate court at Howell last Monday on the appointment of a guardian for Miss Dede Hinchey who is a patient in St. Joe hospital, Ann Arbor. Judge Hiram Smith postponed his decision for a week.

LEADING CAUSE OF DEATH

According to statistics released by the Michigan Medical Society its seven leading causes of death are as follows: Heart Disease, Cancer, Cerebral Hemorrhage, Accidents, Brights Disease, Pneumonia, Tuberculosis.
Medical science has raised the age limit for all these deaths. Heart disease went from 64.5 in 1930 to 67.6 in 1947; Cancer from 61.4 to 62.1, Cerebral from 67.5 to 69.1, Accidents from 41.3 to 45.6, Bright's from 64 to 66.8, Pneumonia from 40.1 to 46.2, TB from 37.4 to 43.7.

The infant mortality rate has dropped from 100 per thousand babies in 1915 to 32 per thousand in 1947.

During World War II United States had less men rejected in the draft than any other nation. The rejection rate was 28 percent for the 12,700,000 men examined.

RECEIVES DEGREE

To our knowledge this is the first time a high union official has been so honored. Reuther was formerly called everything under the sun by the conservative press including a Communist and traitor. Current Comment

The action of the medical society of New Hampshire in the matter of Dr. Sanders recently acquitted of murder in a so-called mercy killing amuses us. Like Pontiac, France they washed their hands of the whole affair by stating it was the responsibility of the county medical board to inflict any disciplinary measures. Then they issued a long statement of principles against mercy killings. This is similar to the action of a jury after acquitting a man of murder to issue a long tirade against murder. If the New Hampshire county medical society is like the ones that we know of the doctor is in little danger. They don't hold over one meeting a year and as a rule are not very active.

The village of Capac honored its 33 year old editor Noble Hunter, last week on his birthday. He founded the Capac Journal 33 years ago and has since conducted it. The type was all hand set at first and he did most of the work alone. Now his son aids him and modern equipment does much of the work. Mr. Hunter still does all the news writing and helps with job printing. He is in good health and on his 93rd birthday fed the first sheets of the week's edition in the press. He and his son do all the work. A graduate of the Ypsilanti Normal in 1891 he taught school for 6 years until he founded the Capac paper.

Senator McCarthy of Wisconsin reminds us of a hard boiled gambler who stakes all on one throw of the dice. He claimed that he had the names of nearly 300 Communists or sympathizers who were employed by the dept. of state at Washington D. C. and promised to name them. Then he cut the number of 150, then a 90, and so on down to 27. So far he has named only about 6 or 7 and most of them have been able to clear themselves. Some of them are college professors who were never employed by the dept. of state. This Communist hunt seems to be dropping in to a family of the old Salem witch hunt of colonial days. The results is that no one as yet has come up with a good definition of just what a Communist is.

We see where a congressman in Washington wants to investigate the morals of Hollywood and the motion picture industry. Sort of locking the barn after the horse is stolen. We suppose he wants to grab himself some of the front page publicity obtained through the publicized amours of late Hayworth and Ingrid Bergman. He is all wet. You cannot legislate morality. It has been tried time and again and always failed. For the same reason the campaign against gambling, prostitution and other vices will also fail. Some years back Judge Ferguson, now Senator Ferguson headed a vice investigation in Detroit which resulted in the conviction of the mayor or heads of the police dept., and others on charges of taking money from vice overlords. This made the judge a senator. Apparently there is still as much vice in Detroit now as there was before the senator started his cleanup. The trouble with these investigations are that they are spasmodic, and only last a short time. Things soon slide back into the old ruts and in a short time are as bad as ever.

Again the same trouble exists here. Gambling is not clearly defined. Bingo is gambling if it is operated commercially but it is not if sponsored by a lodge or church. It is gambling to play the numbers game or patronize handbooks but perfectly all right to go to a horse race and bet all you want to. It is human nature to gamble. After the crucifixion the Roman soldiers who were left to watch His body are said to have thrown dice to see who would have the clothes of Jesus.

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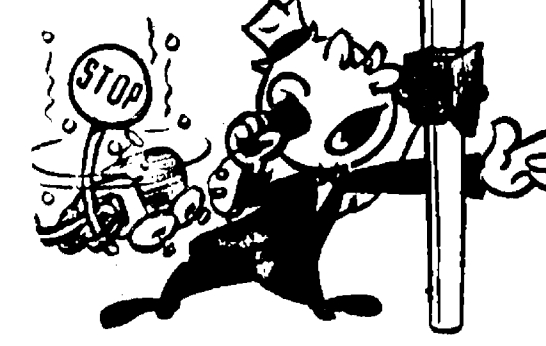

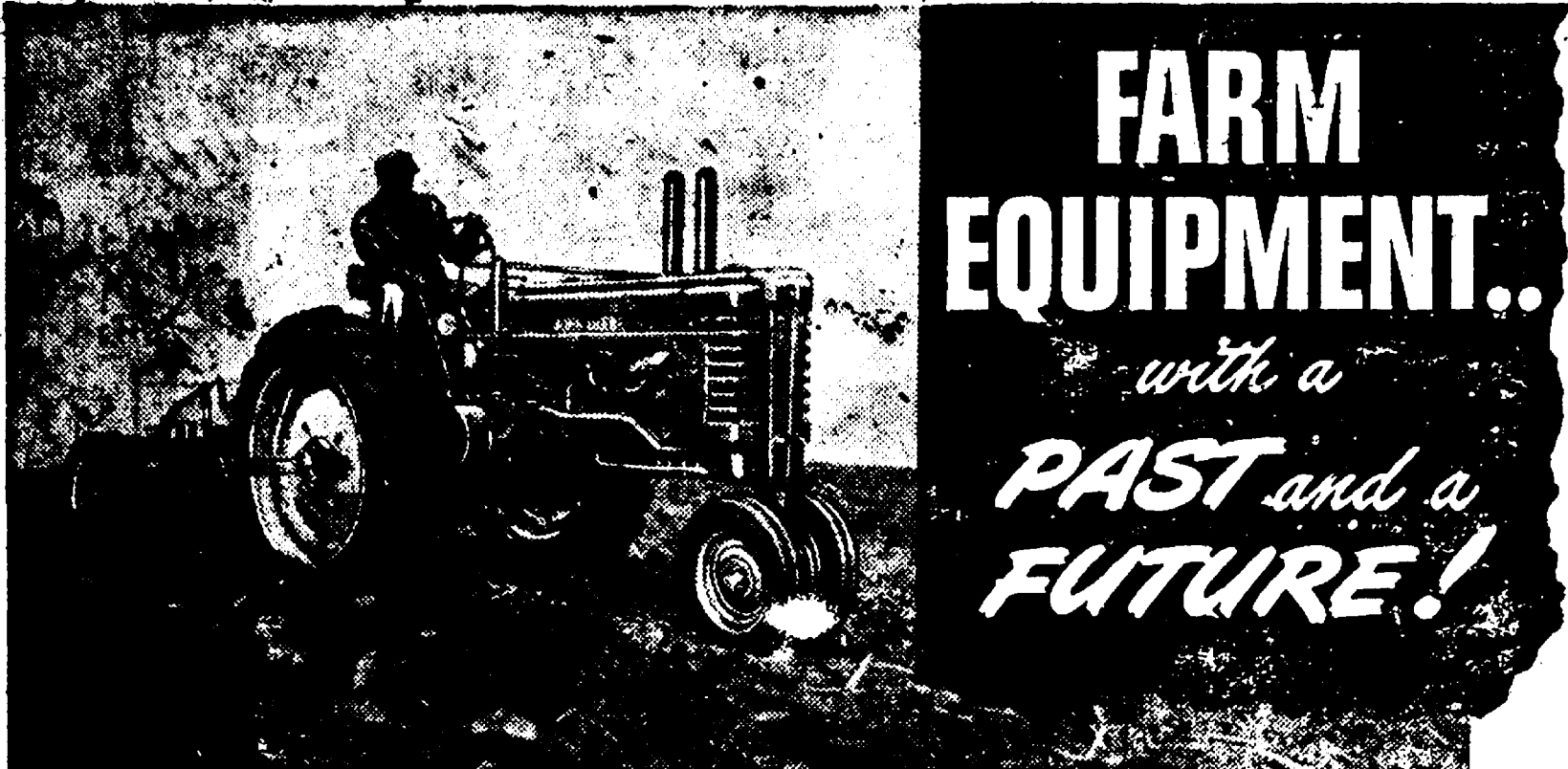
