Gov. A. A. Saylor appointed a Michigan Department of Economic Development whose purpose was to help Michigan industries in Michigan.

Other states are spending large sums of money to woo industries within their borders. To combat this \$250,000 has been raised to attract new industries to Michigan.

Don Weeks is the director of this state department and Walker C. Clater of the Detroit Edison Co. executive vice president.

During the past year or since the war some 19 Michigan industries have moved to other states. Today 21 other companies are said to be considering leaving the state.

The three reasons for this exodus of factories from Michigan are: 1. Cheaper Acquire. 2. Lower taxes. 3. Lower wages.

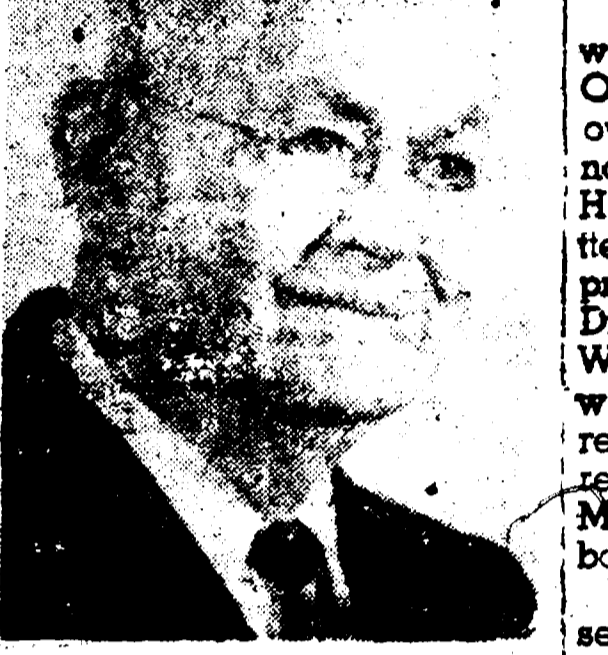

Fire Prevention

Forest Fire Prevention Week is a good time for farmer-soil conservationists to consider the fire danger in their woods and how to reduce that danger.

What is the farmer's stake in fire protection in his woods? Why worry about it here-what harm does it do to burn a few leaves. Well, here are a few reasons why perhaps we should worry.

1. Large trees are damaged by destroying the layer of live growth just under the bark, which opens the door for disease and insects. These can not get through sound, healthy bark any more than infection can get through your skin. Result of fires on trees is slow growth and defective logs.

2. Small trees are totally destroyed. Without small trees the woods gradually disappears.

3. Fire burns the organic matter (leaves, dead wood and decayed material) which is the life of the soil. Organic matter provides the right condition for manufacture of plant food and storage of water for use in growth.

4. Burning of organic matter leaves the ground wide open for erosion on sloping land. Tree roots are not enough to hold the soil. They are too deep and too scattered.

5. Erosion and run-off go hand in hand. When more water runs off, most of it goes where it is not needed - causing worse flood conditions and often spreading poor soil on top of good soil.

Fire creates particular havoc in plantations of pine and other evergreens. There are many of these now in Livingston County.

Every farmer having woodland on his farm could well afford to plan just how to prevent fires from getting into his woods and how to stop them if they do.

CONSERVATION NOTES

There were 201 gun accidents among Michigan hunters last year of which 27 were fatal. Among small-game hunters 131 accidents, 14 fatal. An average of 3,398 hunters. Of these responsible for accidents 164 are known and of these 34 were under 17 years old. There were no accidents among bow and arrow hunters.

The state sold 250 platted lots and 173 acres of tax reverted lands for \$21,739 last week.

Peck flights of geese, ducks and swans heading northward are now evidence.

The smelt have started to run in some northern Mich. streams. Ground water levels showed a further gain last month. April levels are 1.5 per cent over those of March.

Some dead deer have been found but it is thought Mich. deer herds weathered the winter with but slight loss. The average snow depth in Mich. was 1 ft. in Lake Mich. area to 3.5 in the Lake Superior area.

Mich. has now 206 tree farms covering 630,646 acres.

AUTO ACCIDENT VICTIM

Current Comment

Senator Murray of Montana has introduced a bill to revive the C. C. C. or Civilian Conservation Corps, which functioned back in the time of the depression.

He would enroll boys in it between the ages of 17 and 23 years who would receive a salary of \$60 a month in addition to food, clothing, shelter and medical care. He claims that there are over half a million youths in that age group who are unemployed, and have no prospect of immediate employment. If we remember this institution functioned very well at the time. Some of the boys from here who were in it were Arthur Hassencahl, Loren Meabon, Billie Darrow and others. There are always more men than jobs in this country, except possibly during war time. This is not a healthy situation and the C. C. C. would undoubtedly help this situation. Those from here in the C. C. C. were engaged in planting pine seedlings.

Senator McCarthy of Wisconsin not Charlie of radio fame, is still hurling charges of being communists against various public figures in Washington but has as yet submitted no proofs. He says the records in the F. B. I. files will prove all his charges and has induced congress to demand them. This has drawn the opposition of F. B. I. director Edgar Hoover who says his files are confidential and if made public would undo the entire work of the F. B. I. and place the lives of American agents in foreign countries in jeopardy. Pres. Truman is the only one with power to release these files and he has indicated he will turn down the request taking the same stand that Pres. George Washington did back in 1796 when he refused to release papers relating to treaty negotiations to congress stating that they were usurping the functions of executive dept. of the government. The whole inquiry is political and according to the Assoc. Press Republican senators say they will be satisfied if Senator McCarthy finds one Communist in the 237 he promised to name.

Mrs. O'Leary of Chicago became famous because her cow is said to have kicked over a lantern and started the great Chicago fire. Now Mrs. Lucy Smith of Lansing has made all the front pages because she states she will go to jail before she will answer the personal questions on the cream colored form which goes to every fifth home in the nation. In the 1950 census being taken. This form is for the purpose of taking a sort of Gallup's poll on the income or living conditions of the people. She claims to have an opinion from Senator Ferguson on that she need not answer the questions. The three questions she objects to are: 1. Do you have an inside or outside toilet? 2. Do you have refrigeration? 3. Do you have a kitchen sink? The penalty for failure to answer the questions is \$500 fine or a prison term. Mrs. Smith would probably welcome a jail sentence. It was a Lansing women back in prohibition times who got a life sentence for selling a pint of liquor, it being her fourth offence. She became famous over night and got her picture on all the front pages. She only served a short time before being pardoned out.

The first bank failure which has happened since the depression days took place in a little town of 350 persons at Westport in last week where a shortage of \$300,000 is said to exist. Federal state authorities and the F. B. I. are investigating. The president of the bank is in Fla. and the cashier, aged 40, was evidently the whole works. The only explanation so far is that customers were allowed to overdraw their accounts at will. The cashier says the shortage is not over \$40,000 and all will be paid back. The Portland Bank, 8 miles from there has taken over the assets and will liquidate them. The depositors will lose nothing as the bank is insured but the stockholders are liable for an assessment. We never can understand how these banks which are periodically checked by bank examiners get in such a condition which is not called for years.
