Gov. Williams has refused to permit the legislature in special session to consider a gas and water tax for road improvement. As he sets the subjects to come up he is within his rights.

The Michigan supreme court has reinstated Gen. Louis Kuntz to his position as business manager of the Liquor Control Commission. He was fired by the board and his job abolished. The court held the Civil Service Com. had full jurisdiction.

Auto finance gouging in Mich. would be eliminated by a bill introduced by Senator Harry Hittle of Lansing. Some finance charges were as much as \$168.50. Amendments to eliminate welfare chiselers have been introduced. They would limit state funds to 50 per cent of the county total, require uniform rules for all counties, penalizing applicants who do not report all income and make them accept available work.

Gov. Williams continues to maintain that a corporation profits tax would not be a consumer tax in the form of price increases.

Increased benefits of unemployment compensation are proposed to cost \$950 million a year all to be paid by employers.

Lansing observers are wondering if the legislature can reverse a nation wide tendency of bigger government spending. If they can balance the budget without any new taxes it will be a miracle. It is easy to talk economy but difficult to vote it. There are many pressure groups. The test will come in the next few weeks.

DR. P. L. LEDWIDGE

Birmingham — The Rev. Joseph J. Kress chanted the funeral Mass Tuesday April 18 in Holy Name Church for P. L. Ledwidge who passed away April 15 after a lingering illness caused by heart trouble.

Dr. Ledwidge was born at Pinckney Michigan May 18, 1890, the son of William and Mary Ledwidge. His education was obtained at Howell High School, Michigan State Normal College, Ypsilanti and Detroit College of Medicine. He was a member of the Holy Name Society in the parish of the Holy Name at Birmingham.

His professional affiliations included membership in: The American College of Physicians, The Academy of Medicine, Wayne County Medical Society, The Detroit Medical Club, and the Michigan State Medical Society of which he was past president and which organization on Mar. 8 awarded him a special citation in "Recognition of long and distinguished service rendered to Medicine."

Dr. Ledwidge is survived by his wife, Mary Hooley Ledwidge, one daughter, Anne, and one son, Patrick, all of Birmingham; Two sisters, Sister Benedicta Marie O. P. Siena Heights College, Adrian and Mrs. Louis Stackable Pinckney and many nieces and nephews. A brother, Max, preceded him in death.

HENRY BARNARD EVERS

Henry Barnard Evers, son of the late John Wm. and Ann Voegeding Evers, was born near Hanover, Germany, Sept. 9, 1859. He was the oldest of a family of five children. All have preceded him in death except one sister, Mrs. Anna Rusman of Stockbridge, Michigan.

He came to Freedom Twp., Washtenaw Co., Mich. When he was eight years old he was confirmed from the Zion Lutheran Church, Freedom Twp. June 8, 1891 he was married to Kathryn Schill who died on July 18, 1923. To them were born six children, Mrs. W. C. Wylie, Fred A., Harry B. and Mrs. Carlton Blackmar. One daughter, Hazel, Mae died at the age of 2 mos. and one son, Paul died at the 17 years, Jan. 13, 1919. He also leaves five grandsons. Three granddaughters, five great grandsons and three great granddaughters and one niece and many other relatives and friends.

Most of his life he has been a farmer living in the vicinities of Stockbridge and Pinckney Mich., except the four years he lived near Fowlerville, Michigan.

He passed away at the home of his son Harry's on April 14, 1950 at the age of 90 years old.

The funeral services were held at the Harry Evers home Monday, April 17, 1950 at 2:30 p. m. Interment at the Pinckney Cemetery Rev. Edwin Wakstaff of St. Johns Lutheran church officiating.

School Affairs

Affairs in the Brighton school reached a boiling point last Tuesday when the school board reversed action against Supt. Johnson power to sign the teachers to contracts for another year. Mr. Johnson announced this to the teachers that morning and informed them the contracts they had signed were no good. This caused the teachers to issue an ultimatum they would resign in a body unless the contracts were validated. An emergency meeting was called with the board at 12:30. The board stated that they had no intention of nullifying the contracts with the teachers and that their action related to Coach Arrh Peterson who was ordered rehired by a 3 to 2 vote after he had been refused a contract by Supt. Johnson. This left the classroom unattended and they staged a demonstration carrying signs reading: "Down with Johnson," "Get Rid of Riddering," "Make Peterson Supt." Finally the pupils were gotten back to their rooms. The school board were told by the Dept. of Public Instruction that Peterson could be given a contract if he made up the 7 hours he needs to qualify for a physical education certificate.

The Brighton Arcus state that Supt. Johnson has tendered his resignation to take effect at the end of the semester or sooner. Supt. Johnson resigned 4 years ago when the board hired Coach Ralph Riccains against his recommendations but later reconsidered.

TELEPHONE PAY ROLLS

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company granted 42,000 individual pay increases last year under contracts with unions representing most of the employees. The increases averaged 5 per cent for employees of the company and raised the payroll to \$5,500,000.

The increases were granted under the company policy which call for raises at regular intervals until the employee has reached the top rate.

2500 employees were promoted to better jobs. The company now has 2 one-half as many employees as it did 10 years ago.

Dial service has increased from 81 to 85 per cent. Operator toll dialing for long distance calls has also been introduced. Yet despite this the number of Mich. Bell operators has increased from 2700 to 7200 the past ten years.

44 per cent of the employees have been with the company more than 5 years. Of the 22,200 employees 13,000 are women. The turnover of employees is less using industries in 1949. It was then half the average manufacturing one-half per cent but only 4 per cent for male employees. Most women leaving the company do so for marriage or family reasons.

The coaching jobs are precarious. You are supposed to turn out winning teams notwithstanding. That is except in Brighton where a coach who won 24 football games and lost but one was recently turn loose once more up setting the equilibrium of that burg which had just recovered from a parking meter war. At Kingsford, Mich. a similar experience took place where the coach fell on evil days this year and won but 2 out of 8 football games and lost 10 out of 16 basketball games. However, he was popular and 300 pupils refused to attend school and 800 persons signed petitions asking his reinstatement. The school board was forced to bow to public pressure and offered said coach a contract for next year.

The state is about to reapportion the legislative and senatorial districts and under it Livingston county, one of the orphans of Michigan, will find herself in a new census setup which counts college students. Ingham is expected to have enough population to entitle her to a senator of her own. Oakland is also expected to rate a senator. At present she is combined with Washtenaw. This would leave Livingston in combination with Washtenaw. Now it does not make much difference with whom Livingston is combined, it could just as well be Alaska or the Philippine Islands as Livingston has not had a state senator in 30 years. Since being combined with more populous Ingham that county has always dominated and so would Washtenaw. During the Roosevelt landslide Livingston counties Republican majority saved Senator Hittle, the Ingham Republican who has held the office for 20 years from defeat when Ingham voted for Roosevelt.

The Washtenaw county bd. of supervisors has approved an \$85,000 property tax levy for road improvement, also in common with many other boards of supervisors approved a 2 cent increase in gasoline tax for highway purposes. It has been many years since a property tax for road building was levied. Originally this was the way the roads were financed some 25 or 30 years ago. However, as more and more roads were built, the road tax became a crushing burden and was finally abandoned in favor of the gas and weight tax. Now on account of increased salaries and cost of equipment it is not enough. The argument for increased gas taxes are that the users of the roads should pay for them especially the big freight carrying trucks who are charged with wearing the roads out. The Washtenaw county bd. of supervisors would also go far their make the townships levy a road tax before they would be able to have money spent on their roads. Gov. Williams is against an increased tax levy and calls it a consumer tax. He favors a corporation profits tax. The result of this stalemate is that their will be no great road improvement done until 1951.

Another crisis between this country and Soviet Russia cropped up last week when it was charged that an American plane which ventured into Russia claimed territory in the Baltic was fired on and shot down by Russian planes. No traces have been found of it although American planes have searched for it for several days. Among its crew members were several Michigan boys. The Russians admit firing on a plane but claim they were fired upon first. Now in the old days such an occurrence would have precipitated war but not in the present day. Since the last war life has been one crisis after another and there has been no disposition to declare war. It has been found that in the long run neither side wins and that in all cases the winner is eventually the loser.

The Big Ten, the college football league to which the University of Michigan belongs voted that to allow any Big Ten football games to be televised this year. Although they were offered \$500,000 for television rights they turned it down, claiming the entire future of intercollegiate athletics was endangered by television. On the other hand on the Pacific coast it has been left up to the individual colleges and universities. Some have signed up with...
