## Michigan Mirror

Michigan tourist industry is headed for a big season in 1950. But Robert Furlong says Michigan will have plenty of competition and urges Michigan resort owners, hotels, cottages and amusement centers to upgrade their facilities by installing running water and etc.

Frank Davis of the East Mich. Tourist Bureau recently completed a survey of 550 resort owners. He says the average cottage rents for \$35 a week, total cost for living is \$8 or \$9 a day.

A book "Care Free Days" has been issued by the West Michigan Tourist Ass'n. Prominently displayed is a calendar of events for Michigan which include: the Kalkaska Trout Festival, Holland Tulip Festival, Traverse City Cherry Festival, July 5-7; Harbor Spring Indian naming ceremony July 22, Charlevoix's Venetian Night July 30, Grand Haven Coast Guard Festival Aug 1-4 and Cedar Spring Red Flannel Festival Nov. 15 marking the opening of the deer season. The upper peninsula has also issued a "Lure Book". This offers a map of each county.

All 60 state parks will offer some form of amusement this year. Fees are 50c per day. Last year's attendance was 13,000,000. The new official Michigan highway maps give the location of all state parks.

## School Notes

### THE SCHOOL PROPOSITION

There seem to be two principal objections by opponents of the new school bond issue. They are: 1. The site selected is too far out. Now the state demands that the site must include at least 100 acres. The present site chosen is already owned by the school and the village has waived their rights in it. It is 7 acres in area. We understand that the school busses will be used to transport children from the village out to it. It is not over a quarter of a mile from the center of the village.

2. The second objection is that \$140,000 is too much money when the estimated cost is \$120,000. Now no bids have been received on the building and the experience in such matters is that the actual cost usually exceeds the estimate. To pay for it bonds must be sold and in order to protect the bond holders in case of a drop in property valuations, the bond issue ceiling must be raised enough to allow for it. Also a certain amount will be raised to repair and remodel the old school building to make it conform to state standards.

3. Another objection raised is why not send the high school out to the new building and keep the grade children in the old one. The answer is that the grade classes are the ones which are overcrowded. At the present time one teacher has 40 to 50 pupils and on account of lack of playground facilities they have to play in the street. By building a modern grade school this can be overcome.

A survey taken is that the school population in the grades is to increase for the next 7 years. Due to the fact veterans children will become of school age. This section is increasing in population. More homes are being built on the outskirts of Pinckney and at nearby lakes. Due to more efficient transportation the trend to rural centers from the city will continue. Fowlerville who recently built a \$50,000 addition now is beginning to find it was not big enough.

## Circuit Court News

In the case of Earl Chaplain vs. Walter Rybka a no cause for action verdict resulted.

According to Jack Vaj Coerver, Detroit Free Press Writer, a movement has been started to preserve the mill ponds of Michigan.

In pioneer days streams capable of operating a mill by water power were prized possessions. They were dammed up, a mill race dug, often by free volunter labor and a mill erected which not only ground feed and made flour but sawed lumber in to logs, made cider and sometimes brewed liquor.

The first thing Prof. Kirtland did after planting Pinckney in 1847 was to contract with Seth Pettys, veteran miller to build a flour mill at Pinckney. This operated profitably for many years, shipping flour to Boston and other places.

Unadilla also had a mill. So did Dover and Hudson on the Huron river between here and Dexter and Ann Arbor; Scio, Delhi, Fosters and Osbornes. However, time marches on. Electricity proved a more dependable power than water power. The mass production methods of Minneapolis and St. Paul put the flour mills out of business and today there is not a single flour in operation on the Huron River of the 30 or more which once flourished. The dams were abandoned and most of them washed out.

This is a tragedy as the mill ponds were fine fishing places and also provided public bathing beaches. The dam at Homer, Michigan is one of the abandoned ones. Recently it was purchased by 46 farmers who intended to drain the land and raise onions. This would have destroyed it as a fishing stream and trout habitat. 1000 sportsmen have gone into court to nullify the sale.

The conservation dept. has a program for purchasing water power sites and dams where they are available but action to have this done must be started by local communities.

## Current Comment

The press which played up the defeat of Senator Pepper in Florida as a repudiation of the progressive movement and a return to conservatism have little comment on the victory of Gov. Duff of Pennsylvania last week in which the governor routed the conservatives led by the arch-conservative Senator Grundy by a 2 to 1 majority. Governor Duff is one of the most progressive Republicans in the nation and was the leader of the Stassen for president movement in 1948. The platform on which he runs for office, although nominally a Republican it bears very little resemblance to those promulgated by Senator Taft of Ohio or other Republican conservatives. Although Smathers who defeated Senator Pepper in Florida is nominally a Democrat, the press regards it as more of a Republican triumph than that of Gov. Duff in Pennsylvania.

Drive-in Churches may be the answer to light church attendance in the summer months. For some time a Baptist minister, Rev. Burns of Detroit has been conducting services in a drive-in theatre in Detroit on 8 mile Rd.

Now in Ottawa, Canada another drive in theatre has been turned into a church and has been drawing large, with from 200 to 300 cars present at each service. We remember some years back Pinckney had a minister who held Sunday night services on the public square. Back in the days of our youth Rev. McIntosh, a Methodist minister held Sunday evening services in the bandstand which stood in the Dexter park. Both of these services drew good attendance and probably 50 per cent of them were people who never attended church. For some reason these services were not continued. The Salvation Army has for years had a monopoly on street and open air services.

Next Tuesday is Memorial Day which will undoubtedly be distinguished mainly by the Indianapolis Auto Races and baseball double headers. It was not always thus. When the G. A. R. was strong May 30 was their day and it was given over solely to them. The morning was spent in making bouquets of flowers brought in and the G. A. R. members made blanks to fire in their civil war muskets when they gave the military salute. In the afternoon the G. A. R. marched to the old opera house accompanied by a brass band. school children dress in white etc. where a patriotic program was put on by the children and an address was delivered by the congress man of some other dignitary. The veterans were dressed in the traditional costume of blue with broadbrimmed hat and carried a bouquet in the buttonhole of their coats. After the program the veterans band and children carrying flowers marched to the cemetery where the children decorated the graves. Then the G. A. R. program was put on and the military salute was fired. The children were treated by the veterans with candy and nuts and the observance ended. This observance passed with the G. A. R. To the veterans of the last two wars Armistice Day and V-Day and V-J Day have superseded Memorial Day in importance.

The Ann Arbor News says the budget passed by the Republican legislature is a phoney low and will leave an impossible inheritance for the next governor if he should chance to be a Republican. Despite the drastic cuts in public services made by the legislature the state will be broke in ten months. And the cuts mean little. For instance, welfare was cut \$14,300,000. This leaves much less in this fund than the legislators own estimate of welfare costs. Teachers retirement funds are cut \$9,000,000. Good roads \$18,700,000. Tuberculosis patients \$32,000,000. Veterans Homestead exemption \$1,000,000 and Eloise hospital \$200,000. In addition the mental hospitals and colleges and universities also suffered big cuts. The school aid funds have also been cut by taking the teachers retirement fund out of it. The next Republican candidate for governor will be kept busy explaining the school aid and road improvement cuts.
