The issue of the coming state campaign this fall is more public benefits vs economy.

Gov. William struck the note when he assailed the legislature for ignoring the needs of the people. The legislature turned down his proposed \$112,000,000 program and cut the budget \$15,000,000.

At the recent C. I. O. convention the governor charged the Republican party is dominated by special interests because it refused to pass his corporation income tax. His program approaches that of Pres. Truman which Senator Taft classed as socialism. Sen. Taft says the Republican party is also interested in promoting health, security and housing for the people but that the nation can only afford it when it is absolutely necessary.

The governor made a dramatic 11th hour appearance before the legislature and appealed to them not to reduce the government grants to schools, colleges, hospitals, the aged and infirm.

Republicans claim the new appropriations start July 1 and nobody will be allowed to suffer.

Aud. Gen. Aiken gave some figures on rising government costs the last ten years.

Education costs rose from \$55.6 million to \$169.7 million; Health from \$7.7 to \$12.5; Mental from \$13.7 to \$32.5; Welfare from \$44.9 to \$94.2; Highways from \$54.3 to \$106.9. These figures include federal grants.

The Democrats are confident the people want more public benefits. The Republicans are confident they do not.

This is the same attitude the Republicans took in the last 5 campaigns and it has proved to be wrong.

Paul Hickey, state conservation regional chief of Jackson has resigned to become chief of all wild life investigation on public lands for the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service with headquarters at Denver, Colo.

At the Michigan Grand Lodge session at Grand Rapids last week, Henry Ruus, mining executive of Ishpeming was elected Junior Grand Deacon on the 3rd ballot and Francis Dodge, Detroit attorney, grand marshal on the second ballot. There were two vacancies this year owing to the death of Paul Schlander of Ann Arbor. Francis Dodge is well known among local Masons and has visited Livingston Lodge a number of times.

School Notes

At an election here Thursday to vote on the two school propositions both carried by approximately 73 percent.

On Proposition No. I to increase the 15 Millage Limit, the vote was:

YES 218
NO 68
On Proposition No. II to bond for \$140,000 for a period of twenty years to erect a new school the vote was:

YES 206
NO 68

Again 4 ballots were void. The big majority surprised everybody. Also the smallness of the vote. The Pinckney Community School district made up of the Pinckney District (Putnam No. 2) and 8 rural districts has around a thousand voters and only 235 voted.

At the election to reorganize held last Oct. about 500 votes were cast. At that time there was no registration. At the election Thursday the voters had to sign affidavits their name was on the tax roll in order to vote on the bond issue and on proposition I that they had resided in the district a sufficient length of time. We believe that many voters who were opposed to reorganization have changed their opinions since then. They have become convinced that this section faced the loss of their school if this catastrophe took place. Values in Pinckney and vicinity would go down and the steady increase in the population of the district would end.

We understand work will start as soon as possible.

WINS LAST GAME

Pinckney won the last ball game on their schedule here Friday beating Brighton 2 to 0. This gives them an even break in the League O' Lakes. 4 won and 4 lost. South Lyon beat them twice and so did Dexter and they won 2 each from Brighton and Manchester. In outside competition they beat Stockbridge and lost 2 to Hartland and 1 to Chelsea. CONSERVATION NOTES

Michigan has a better forest fire record this year than last. So far 432 fires have burned over 3,860 acres compared to 939 fires which burned 16,746 acres last year at this time.

No Scotch pine seedlings for Xmas trees will be available for 2 years.

Duck hunters bagged 625,000 birds last year compared to 407,000 in 1948. Menominee county had the best record 12 ducks to a hunter. 70,700 coot were taken, 92,000 woodcock, 669,000 fox squirrel, 69,000 grey squirrel, 78,100 raccoon and 13,100 foxes.

A bill just passed by the legislature gives conservation officers the status of peace officers.

The Barbican plague has been discovered in rabbits in Mexico.

Current Comment

The Big Ten ban on televising football games next fall has caused a storm among television owners. They cited western conference records to show that television did not injure attendance at the Big Ten football games last fall. In Michigan their wrath is directed at the University of Michigan which is a member of the Big Ten. Some even go so far as to ask that money appropriations be withheld from it until it agrees to televise games. With the legislature economizing at the expense of the University and state institutions this attack comes at an unopportune time.

Another mercy killing acquitted took place in Detroit last week when Eugene Braunsdoff, musician was acquitted of murder in the shooting of his crippled daughter. Again like other mercy killing cases the verdict was not clearly drawn. Edward Burcard, the leading criminal lawyer of the state defended him and in his charge to the jury said he was not asking acquittal on the grounds of a mercy killing. The jury in its verdict stated they found him innocent by reason of insanity. The father was 52 years old. The slain girl was 23. He had married a young wife and conditions in the home had become uncongenial. He was held in jail nearly a year before the trial took place. The jury was composed of 9 women and 3 men.

Another epoch took place in the stormy career of Ethel Willetts, the Detroit evangelist last week when her \$250,000 tabernacle on Conner Ave. was sold to the Pentecostal church for \$100,000. The rise of Mrs. Willetts was meteoric. A housewife of limited education she suddenly announced she had acquired miraculous healing power and established a healing temple. Thousands attended her meetings and in short time the \$250,000 tabernacle was built from collections and donations from her followers. Those who attended told of seeing people carried to her meetings on stretchers and of being able to walk home after being healed. Critics denounced her as a religious fake and racketeer but she continued flourishing and built another tabernacle in Florida. However, she got into financial difficulties and lost the Florida building a year ago. This woman admittedly had the power to draw tremendous crowds and open the purses of her audiences. The difference of opinion is as to whether her cures were authentic.

General Ike Eisenhower has at ways tried to keep his political affiliations a secret. Of course, it was under a Democrat President Franklin Roosevelt that he was pushed ahead of senior officers and given the supreme command in World War II. However, he was in the army for years and moved around so much he seldom voted. At the present he is the chief choice of the industrialists of the nation for the Republican nomination for president.

The people do not like Gov. Dewey and do not think Senator Taft could be elected. Drew Pearson in his syndicated articles says that the only record so far of Eisenhower is in Albion, Kansas, where he was registered as a Democrat. Are the Republicans going to select an ex-Democrat for their candidate as they did in 1928 and 1940. Both Herbert Hoover and Wendell Wilkie were former Democrats.

The threatened strike of General Motors workers has been covered by a 5 year pact in which the workers get about every thing they asked for. There is a clause in the agreement which provides that the workers agree to a wage cut if the cost of living goes down. Undoubtedly the long and costly Chrysler strike in which the company and workers lost millions influenced this quick settlement. The General Motors is hog fat with profits and made hay while the Chrysler was out on strike. They can afford to meet the demands of the workers but smaller companies cannot.

The Fair Employment Agreement is the principal objective of the negroes of the north and in a greater extent the city as a whole of the colored people are rural dwellers. In Michigan, Detroit is the battle ground. There are excellent negro schools and many college graduates but unfortunately most of them have had to taken menial jobs such as running elevators, sweeping and waiting on tables. This does not satisfy them. They want equal working opportunities with the whites and social equality in churches, fraternal organizations etc. There are many negro teachers in Detroit but they are assigned to schools in negro districts. The big churches of Detroit have no negro members except the Christian Science. According to an article in last weeks Detroit News by Louis Tendler, The Michigan Bell Telephone Co. has made a start in this fair employment practice. It has placed negro girl operators side by side with white girls and also in some business offices. A survey shows that 10 per cent of the phone subscribers in Detroit are negroes. It has not extended this to all departments but it has made a start. The big leagues kept the negro players out for years but in the end were obliged to yield.

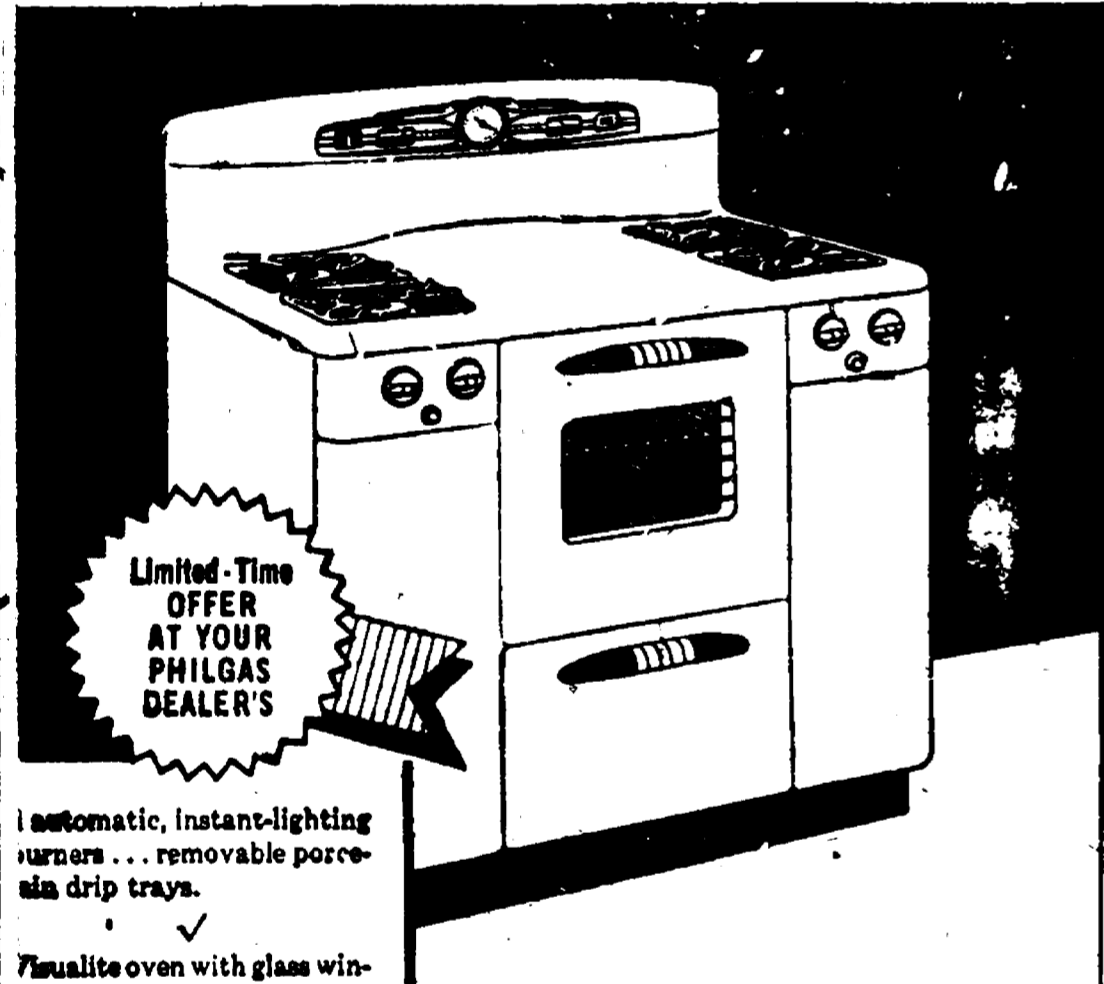

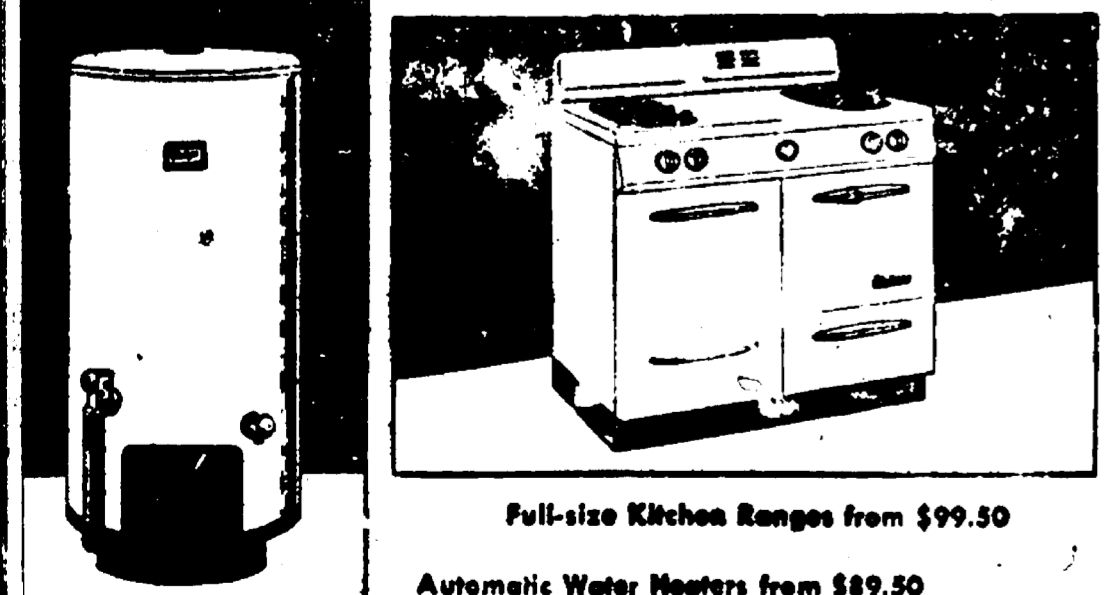

UNION DEMANDS

The Union representing 17,200 employees of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company has presented its demands for contract changes.

Walter Schaar, vice-pres. of Division 15, Communications Workers of America-CIO, presented the demands. They include shortening wage progression schedules, upward reclassification of certain towns for wage purposes upward regrading of certain jobs, and collection of dues by the company at no charge to the union.

While the Union demands do not include a general wage increase as such, the effect of the demands, if granted, would mean substantial increases to a large majority of employees and a resulting rise in Michigan Bell operating expenses, the company said.

Negotiations on the contract changes will proceed with existing contracts in full force.

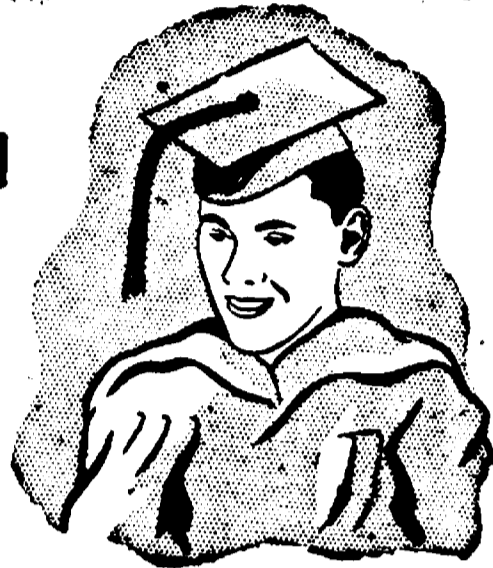

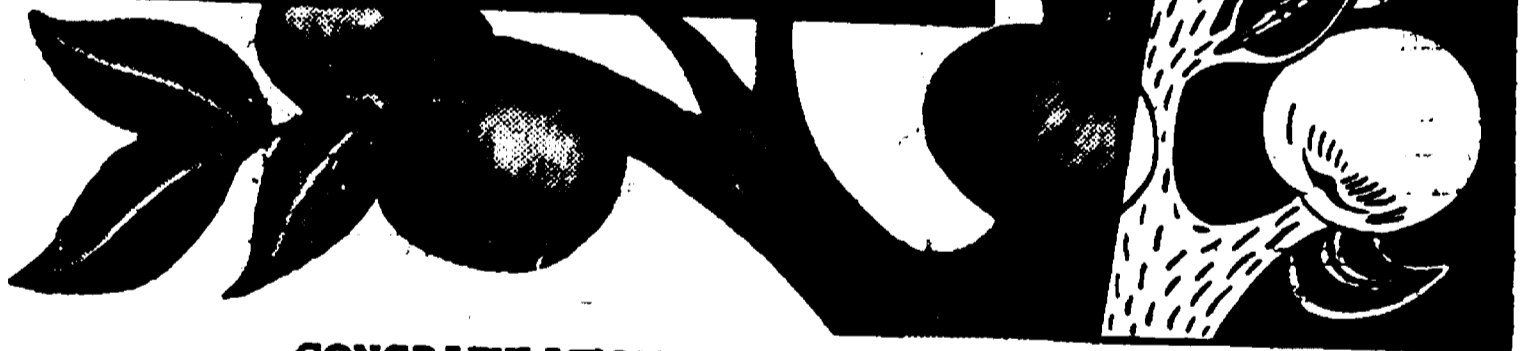
