July 1, 1950 is a red letter day for Ferris Institute as on that day it becomes a state vocational training center. When the 1949 legislature voted to accept it as such it did 2 things.

First: It filled a big gap in the Mich. educational system as Ferris specializes in vocational training helping those who cannot attend college degrees. It has assets of more than \$1,000,000 and a long tradition. Thousands with no more than an eighth grade education have pursued practical studies at Ferris.

Its trades include the following: watch and clock repair, architectural and machine drafting, refrigeration, air conditioning, printing, stenography, secretarial, higher accounting, business administration, pharmacy, commercial teaching, advertising salesmanship.

The late governor and senator Woodbridge N. Ferris founded the school in 1884 as Big Rapids Industrial school. The name has been changed several times since. The pharmacy building was completed in 1902.

Ferris was elected governor in 1912 on the Democrat ticket, reelected in 1914 and in 1920 he was elected United States Senator and died in Washington in 1928. The Ferris Institute has 1200 pupils enrolled today. It has graduated over 75,000 men and women in its time. Brian Brophy is president.

PAUL HICKIE
The following relates to Paul Hickie recently transferred to Denver, Colorado.

Hickie started with the department's game division in 1934 as a mammalogist and became regional chief of the department in 1948 following his return from military service. During a six-year stretch in uniform, which also included in New Guinea and the Philippine Islands, Hickie was appointed chief forester on Governor MacArthur's staff in Japan. Hickie had charge of administering the forest resources of Japan.

The 42-year-old Caro, Mich. native graduated from Michigan State College in 1929 and received his master's degree in mammalogy from the U. of M. in 1931. Prior to joining the Michigan conservation department, he conducted a biological survey of Isle Royale and worked on mammal investigations in Louisiana. He also was curator of the E. S. George wildlife reserve at the University of Michigan.

Joining him in Denver will be his wife Naomi and two-year-old child, Valerie.

TELEPHONE SPLITTING
On June 8, The Lyndulla Telephone Company and the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. will present a joint petition to the Michigan Public Service Commission requesting authority for the Lyndulla Co. to sell certain telephone properties to Michigan Bell.

The petition will also include a request to discontinue the furnishing of "no charge" toll service between the Gregory and Pinckney exchanges.

All customers now served on Pinckney service station lines 32 and 58, and those customers by line 4 who are located between Pinckney and the western boundary of section 29, Putnam Township, will get Bell rural service if the petition is approved. Customers on line number 4 who are located west of this point and all line 3 customers will be served from Gregory only, instead of from both Gregory and Pinckney as at present.

Under the application, Gregory customers' rates would be unchanged. Business telephone subscribers served by the Pinckney exchange would pay an increase in their monthly rates.

Elimination of the free service between Gregory and Pinckney which is an irregular rate of ten, will put calls between the two points on the same toll basis as calls to other toll points.

V. F. W. NEWS

On June 12 at 8 p. m. the Phillips Livington Chapter D. A. R. of Howell will dedicate a marker on the grave of Claudius Britton, a member of the Vermont Home-ers in the Revolutionary War who is buried in the Pinckney cemetery.

The program consists of an invocation, Dedication, by Mr. Robert Squire, National A. U. M. and Taps by Martin Phillips, a salute fired by Pinckney Post V. F. W. and benediction by Rev. Potter. Mrs. Frank Peters, a great granddaughter of Claudius Britton, will unveil the marker and Mrs. Fred Read, the great great granddaughter will lay a wreath on the grave. William Gilkes of Howell, a son of Britton Gilkes, a descendant will lay a wreath on the grave of Claudius Britton jr. whose grave is next to his fathers and who served in war of 1812.

A. L. Smith of Howell of the Sons of the American Revolution will give a talk.

Claudius Britton born in Conn. on Sept. 15, 1761. Later he moved to Weymouth, Vermont where he enlisted in the Vermont Rangers at the age of 15. With his father and neighbors he was captured and taken to Quebec where he was held 4 years being exchanged in 1783. Later he lived near Batavia, N. Y. In 1824 he and his son Claudius jr. came to Ann Arbor and took up a farm which was later sold to Washenaw county for a poor farm.

In 1835 Claudius sr. applied for a pension and was refused. In 1836 they came to Putnam and took up much land. At one time they lived right in Pinckney on the site now occupied by the Thomas Murphy home.

Claudius Britton died in 1850 on Feb. 22 and his son, Claudius jr. exactly one year later, on Feb. 22, 1851.

TWO BOYS HELD

THE NEW SCHOOL
The work of starting the section of the new 7 room grade school on M-36 West of the village limits is progressing as fast as can be expected. The lawyer is now engaged in drawing up the advertisement for bids on the structure. This includes: excavating, cement brick, carpenter, electrical, painting, carpenter work and the heating plant. When this is completed, bids will be advertised for. These bids have to be approved by the state.

The new building will be built on the front of the 7 acre site which is 500 ft. wide or thereabouts. The building to be erected is about 180 ft. square, one story. As it will set some distance back from the road it will be necessary to change the present baseball diamond. This diamond now runs north and south. Under the new setup it will run east and west.

These preliminary steps will take some time but if everything works out smoothly work should be started some time in July.

As to the reports of their disloyalty there is nothing to warrant such insinuations. By taking another job local people are relieved of all responsibility. The DPs may be returned to Europe should they lose their job and means of support. Before being allowed to enter this country they were thoroughly investigated by the Allied Occupation Authority, the D.P. Com. and Church World Service.

CONCERNING SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES AND SCHOOL ELECTORS OF THE PINCKNEY COMMUNITY SCHOOLS
JULY 10th, 1950

1. Election of school officers will be by petition as provided for in Section 15, as amended by Public Acts of 1949, No. 83, Chapter 131, School Code.

2. Petitions may be obtained from Mr. Eric Rose, Secretary of the Board of Education or from Mr. John Burg, treasurer of the Board of Education.

3. Petitions shall be filed with the Secretary of the Board of Education. Mr. Eric Rose, on or before June 15th, 1950.

4. No elector shall sign the petition for more candidates for each term than are to be elected.

5. Each petition shall be signed by not less than 25 qualified electors of the district.

6. School electors must be:
a) A citizen of the United States
b) Twenty-one yrs. of age or over
c) Resident of Michigan 6 months prior to election

d) A resident of the school district at least 20 days, next preceding the election

7. Eligibility to membership on the Board of Education. Any qualified elector in the aforementioned Pinckney Community Schools, whose name appears on the assessment roll and who is the owner in his own right of the property so assessed shall be eligible to election or appointment to office in said school district; provided that where a husband or wife own property jointly, regardless of the name which appears in the assessment roll, if otherwise so qualified, each shall be eligible to election or appointment to school office.

Current Comment

"It is an ill wind that blows no good". We believe an old saying went something like that. While we all rail about high prices in the end they may bring Michigan out of the red for according to present indications sales taxes for the current year which ends July 1 will total over \$200,000,000 the highest yet. For the first 11 months the sales tax collections were \$180,408,000. The May sales tax collections were \$17,061,000 more than \$270,000 than in May, 1949. Higher prices mean higher sales tax collections and this means only one thing. Due to higher wages the public has plenty of spending money and they are spending it.

The Dixiecrats movement in the South caused by Pres. Truman's advocating civil rights in 1948 like all third party movements seems to be rapidly fading. In Alabama, the center of the fight in 1948 the Dixiecrats have just lost an election to the Democrat regulars. This was a contest for 5 congressional seats. It is pretty hard to build up a political party without patronage. The Dixiecrats who deserted Pres. Truman in 1948 lost their patronage and were ignored when appointments were made in their states. The result was their followers deserted them and went back to the Democrat regulars.

Gasoline has been hauled from bulk station to distributing stations by tank trucks for some years now. We can remember when it was hauled over the hills from Chelsea to Pinckney by a three horse team. Recently these tank trucks have figured in a number of accidents. At Chicago a street car hit a tank truck of gasoline, set fire to it and 22 people were killed. At Ypsilanti a tank load of gasoline (4,400 gallons) ignited when the rear wheels broke letting the tank down on the pavement and a blazing inferno resulted. The fact that no one was hurt was accidental. The accident was at 6:00 a. m. During the rush hour the fatalities would have been heavy. It would seem that more precautions should be taken in transporting of gasoline in huge quantities on the public highways which are invariably crowded with autoists.

The Communist movement is apparently on the gain in Europe in Berlin half a million Communist youth marched last week, stoned American soldiers and did about as they pleased. There were no overt acts as it was only intended to show their strength and impress the people. In Czechoslovakia the government there has charged the 21 diplomats who are stationed there with plotting to overthrow her government and in Japan Gen. MacArthur put down a Communist revolt and arrested 21 Japanese youth for inciting it. Korea is said to be strongly Communist. Sec. of State Acheson just back from Europe recommends continued use of the Marshall plan which is furnishing money and arms to the nations which are not Communist in order to get them to remain so. Critics will cry that this plan has not worked. They have no other plan, and it undoubtedly has slowed up the spread of Communism. If both Europe and Asia should go completely Communist this country would find itself in a very unhealthy position.

We wonder who started the first senior trip? We know who started the first one at Pinckney. It was Elwin Hulce, then supt., now at Reckoncom. Back in the old days graduating classes had but little money. They were supposed to finance their own graduation expenses and for that purpose put on a play and one or two other things but in the main seldom raised over \$100. After they received their diplomas they were through and any funds they left were turned over to the school athletic fund or to buy a memorial for the school. Not all is different. The minute they enter the 9th grade they start building up a cash reserve to finance the senior trip. This continues for 4 years and when they are seniors this amount has reached a sizable sum. These trips were an innovation at first but now practically every 12 graded school takes one.

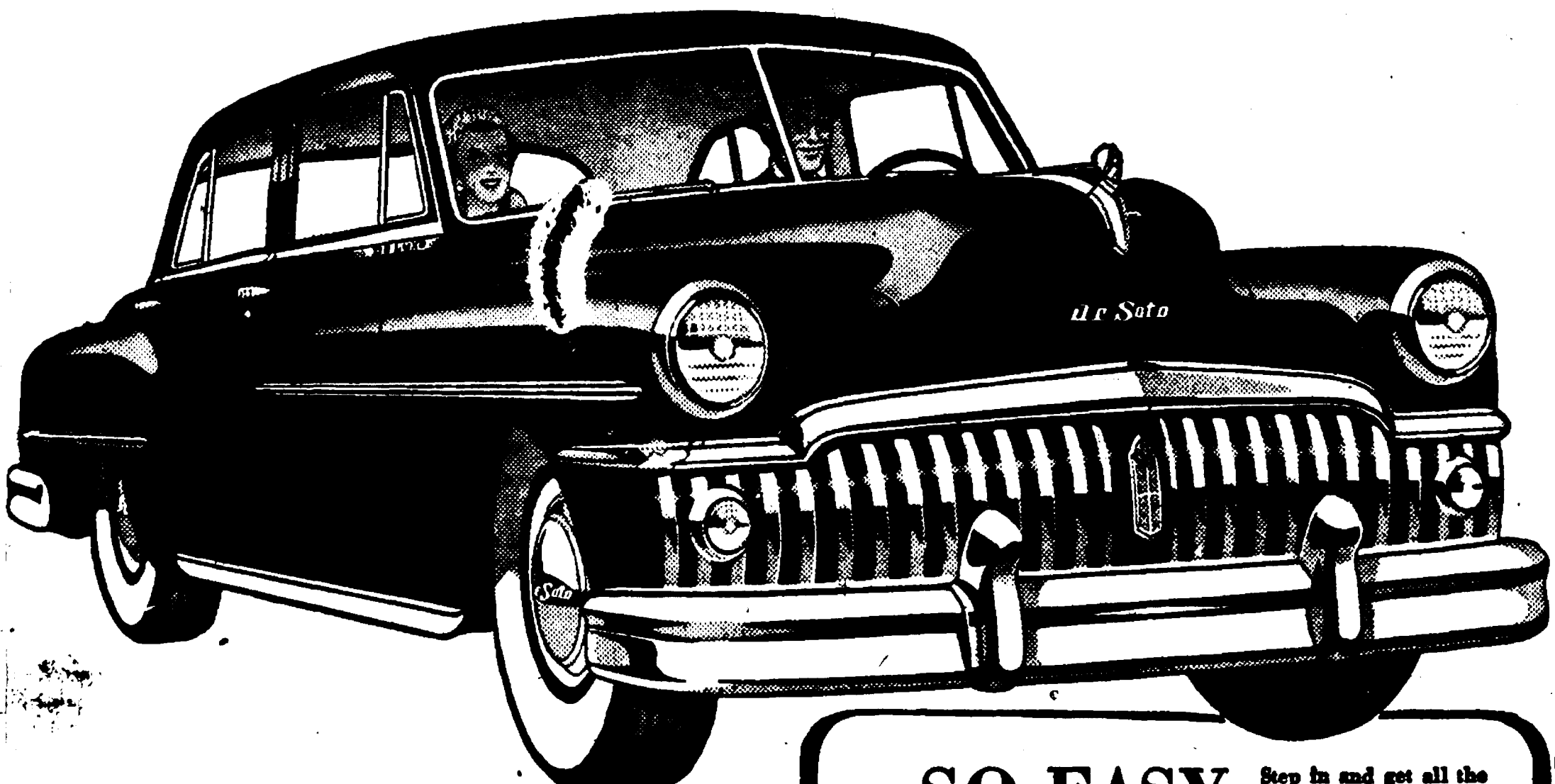

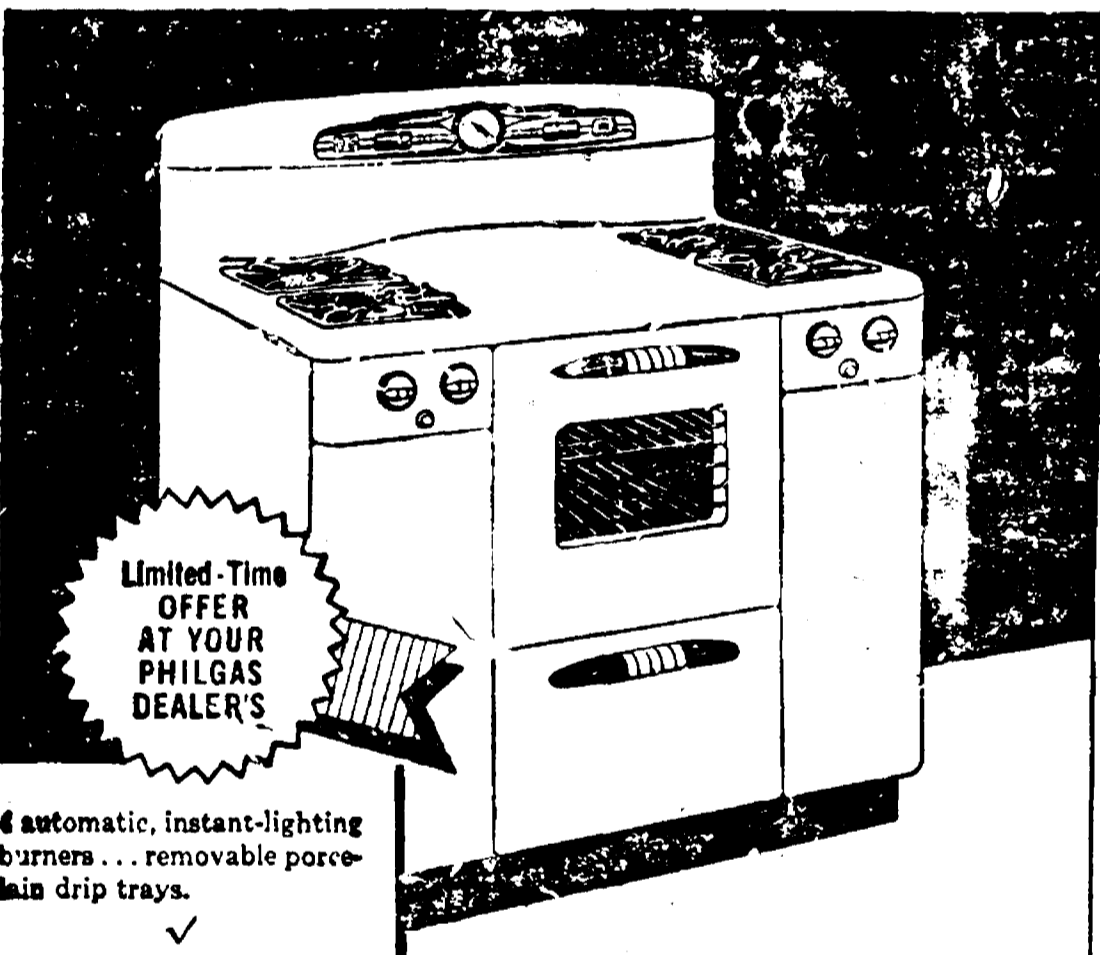

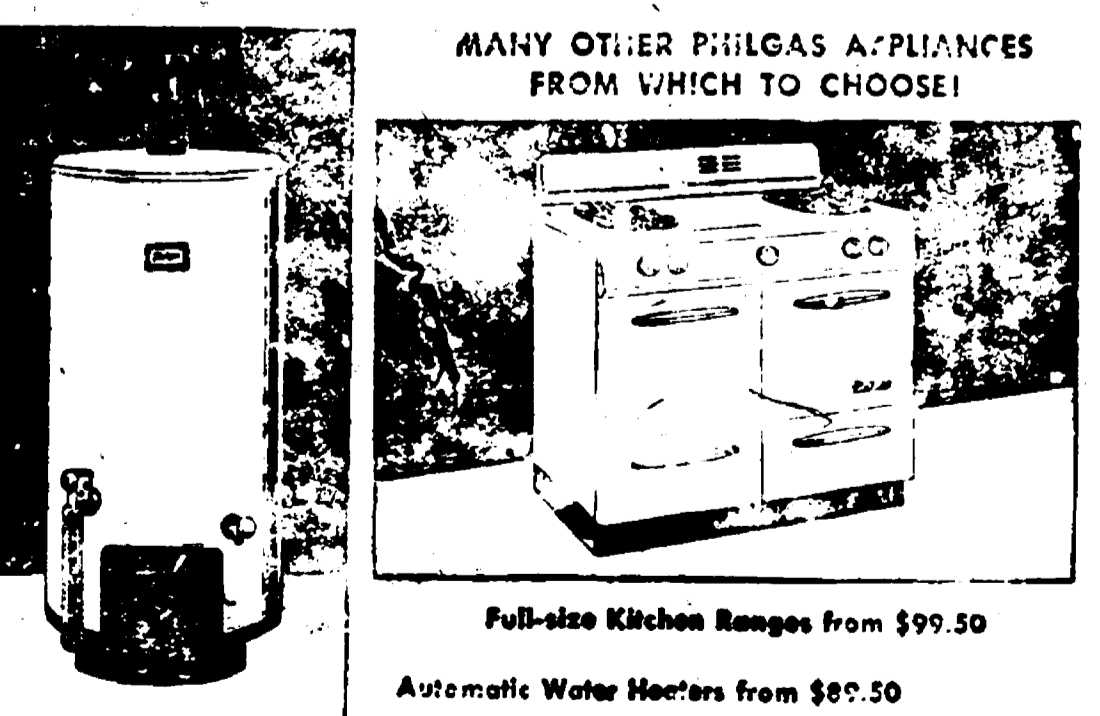

CONSERVATION NOTES

Electronics and specially charged screens will be used in the war on lampreys a few tests with electric shocking last year proved ineffective.

80 Mich. school teachers will attend the conservation school at Higgins Lake, starting June 18.

Ground water levels jumped 1.18 ft. in April but went down 7 ft. in May.

The conservation dept. has been creating trout waters by stocking lakes which have sufficient oxygen to support these fish in cold water layers.

100,000 persons visited Mich state parks over the Memorial day week end.

Yellow perch accounted for 90 percent of the fish caught in Michigan last year.

Fishermen are warned not to dump unused minnows or live fish in lakes as it is planting fish without a permit. For instance trout lakes have had certain species of fish removed. To replace them nullifies a years work.
