Easy Credit and welfare buying are proving to be pitfalls in public welfare relief. This is one of the principal causes bringing people on relief rolls.

This prompts many to go into debt greater than their income. It leaves nothing for living expenses and makes it necessary to apply for relief.

Howard DeSpelder, Montclair welfare director blames merchants and says a tightening of credit and installment buying would reduce welfare cost.

The cost of relief in Montclair county in 1941 was \$12,371. By 1949 it had risen to \$58,322. Since the period from 1941 to 1949 has been one of general prosperity the question is why have welfare costs increased 400 percent?

The welfare situation was investigated by the legislature who recommended the system be revised and restrictions placed on county welfare depots.

Four other bills were introduced. 1. requires approval by the state adm. board before the soc. welfare pays more than 50 pct of a county's welfare cost.

The state's total welfare program cost \$110,000,000 in the fiscal year just ended. The Social Welfare Commission wants \$114,000,000 for this year.

During World War II industry hired many workers past 70 years old and women involved in aid to dependent children.

It is hoped that Federal Old Age insurance and the growing pension plans of industry will costs.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Work will begin in 15 days on a dam at Bear Creek, 7 miles SW of Houghton which will flood 273 acres.

The Dept. has furnished seedlings for shrubs and trees for 1193 farms for pheasant cover. A 4 place Cesana plane, based at Jackson, is used for fire detection in southern Mich.

In 20 years the forest fires in Mich. have been reduced one half and the loss to one tenth.

The state is suing Dr. Bernard Godfrey and his farm tenant, Bernard Muzre for killing 50 odd deer who trespassed on the Godfrey farm.

Eighteen forest fires burned but 28.9 acres last week. 52,906 pheasant eggs have been distributed to farmers and sportsmen's organization this year by the dept.

Fishing without a license caused 493 arrests in May.

Ground water levels fell sharply in June.

The dept. claims fishing success was average the opening day, with bluegills being most plentiful.

The duck census taken from planes shows an increase in the duck population of 7.91 compared to 6.8 last year.

Arguments for shooting doves and jawns in areas where winter food is scarce appear in the last 56 page conservation bulletin.

A skunk infected with rabies attacked a child near Rogers City last week.

92,000 woodcock were bagged by Michigan hunters last year. Only 7 forest fires, week ending July 2 with 4.81 acres burned.

Current Comment

The county census figures, just released show Livingston county with 10 runs put the V. F. W. game with Howell on ice for Pinckney Saturday night 13 to 3.

This includes only those inside the village limits. Many have built just outside the limits to get away from village taxes and restrictions. The same is undoubtedly true at Howell, Brighton and Fowlerville. There is no doubt that the population is shifting country ward on account of cheaper acreage, more room and faster transportation. Apartment houses in the cities was never natural and was only endured because it was necessary. We think the country trend will continue and the next ten years will show another big gain in rural population.

Death from accidents, mostly auto accidents and drownings, broke all records over the July 4th week and apparently the apex of the press and radio for safe and sane driving over that period did not produce results. It is doubtful if the death toll might have been much larger if it had been necessary to crack down on reckless drivers during the holidays. Usually the officers of the law are leniently aware of the excesses but for a good time and hate to break up their pleasure. The same could be true for the shooting of fireworks. Although they are illegal they were shot off here and probably in other places in Michigan without hindrance. More would have been shot off but the police supply was short. Only arrest in state, that we know of was here where a woman's injured by an exploding firecracker.

21 Republican congressmen have endorsed a Republican advance movement to wrest leadership of the party from the conservative Gabrilson lot. Waery views now in control where views they favor will only assure another republican defeat. The leaders of the group are John Lodge, Republican candidate for governor of Conn., Cong. Nixon, chairman of O. S. senator of California and Gov. Duff of Pennsylvania. The group is made up of young Republicans who do not like conservative leadership.

The present Korean setto will not prove to be any pushover. The north Koreans are well trained, well armed and well led and would have been winning all preliminary skirmishes. A number of tanks have been contributed to this. The Communists are in bigger numbers. They are better armed and have plenty of light tanks, capable of maneuvering in the muddy country. The South Koreans have few tanks and these are too heavy to use in mud. It was first thought that planes alone could win the day. This belief no longer persists and it is now conceded that it will take American troops and plenty of them to win the day as the Korean morale is low and they have little stomach for fighting.

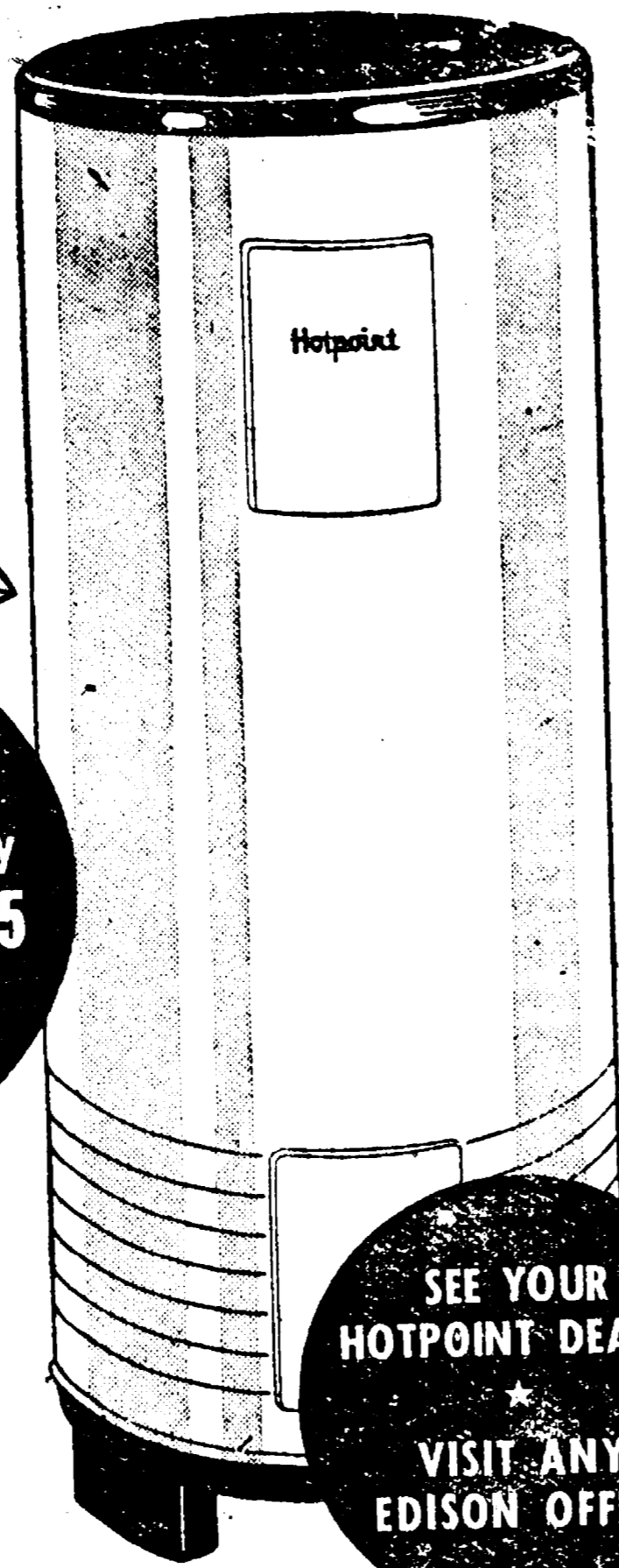

At a rally in Madison Square Garden last week, 9000 Communists demanded a "Hand Off Policy" on Korea. The Communist paper states that 400 workers at the Ford Rouge plant in Detroit signed a petition asking that this country let Korea settle her own affairs. Detroit papers have been unable to get anything on this. The head of the Goodyear Tire Company has condemned the rush to buy tires. He says there is absolutely no tire shortage in sight.

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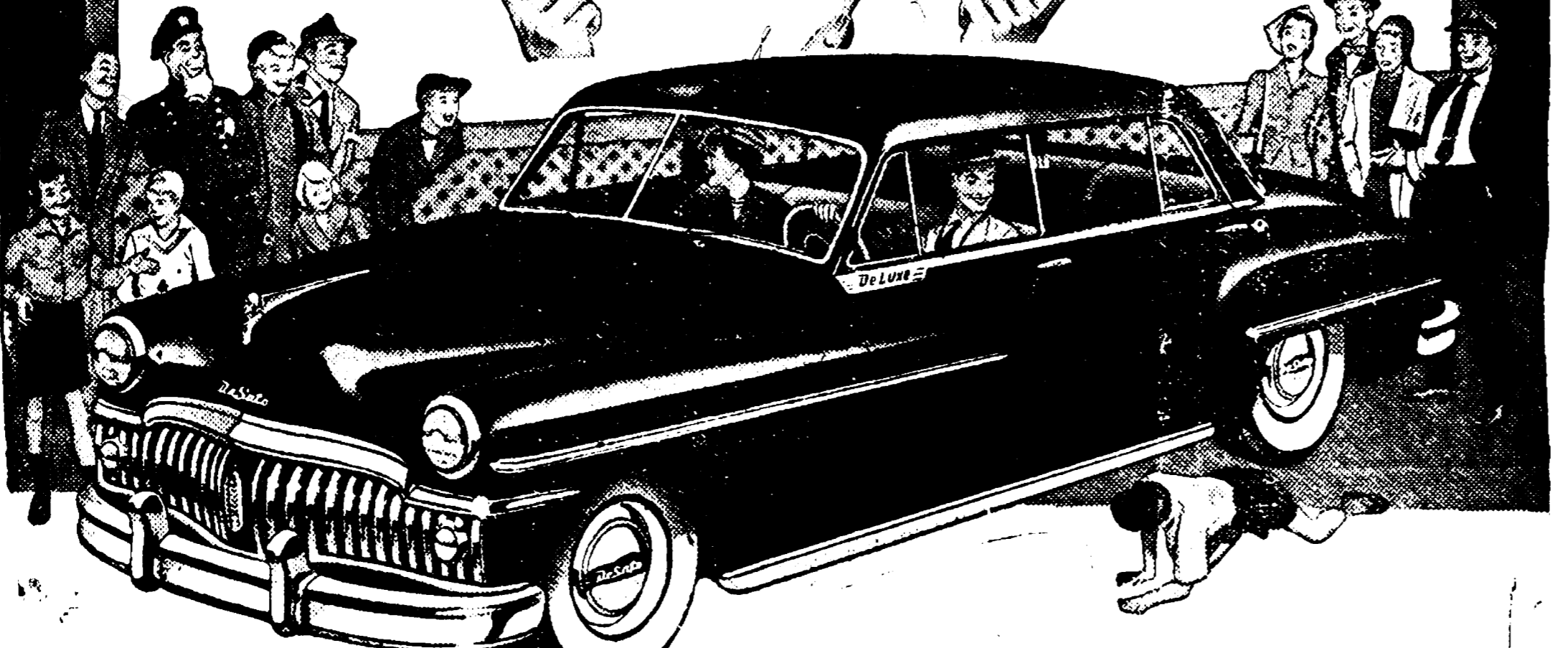

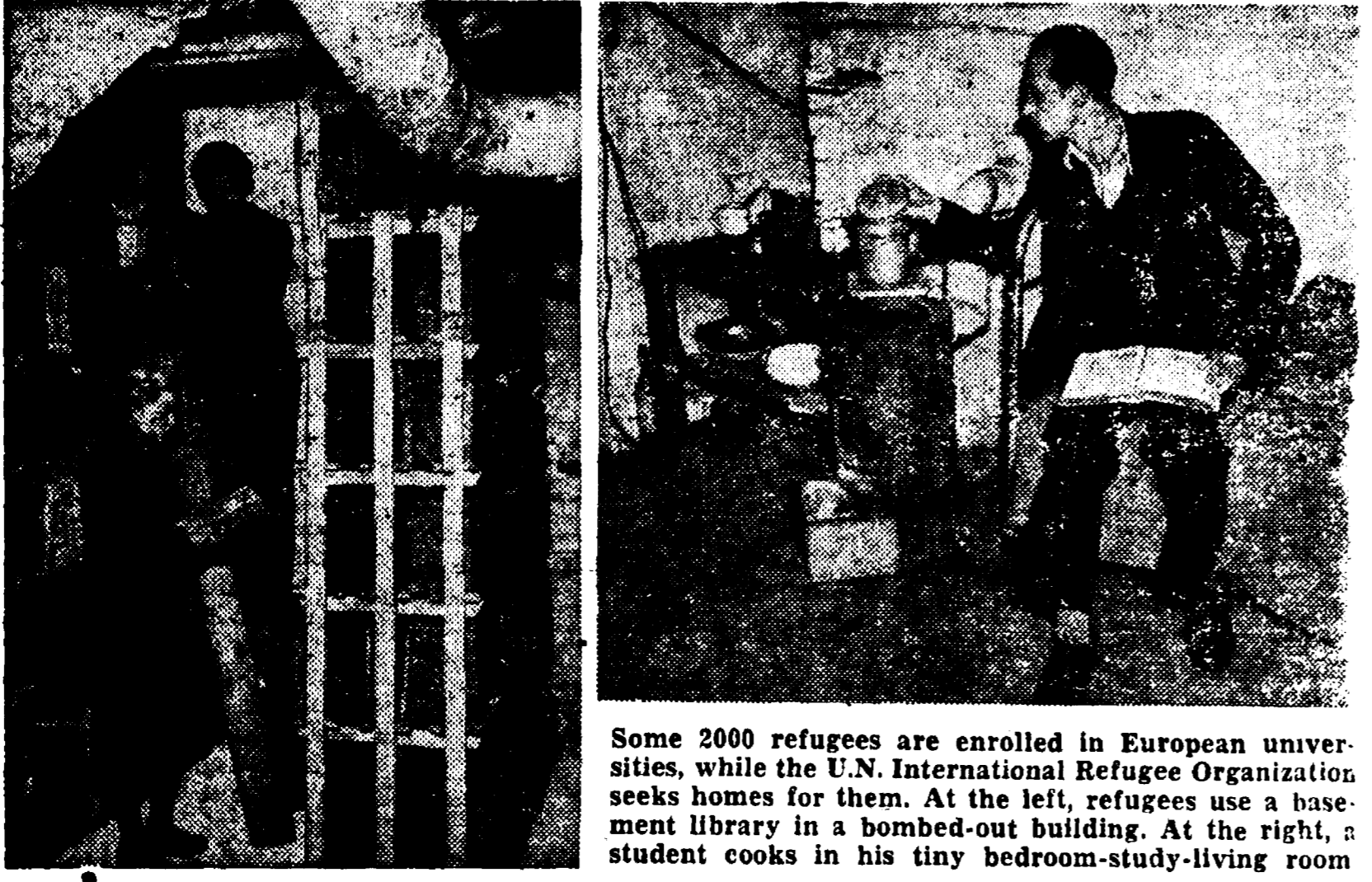

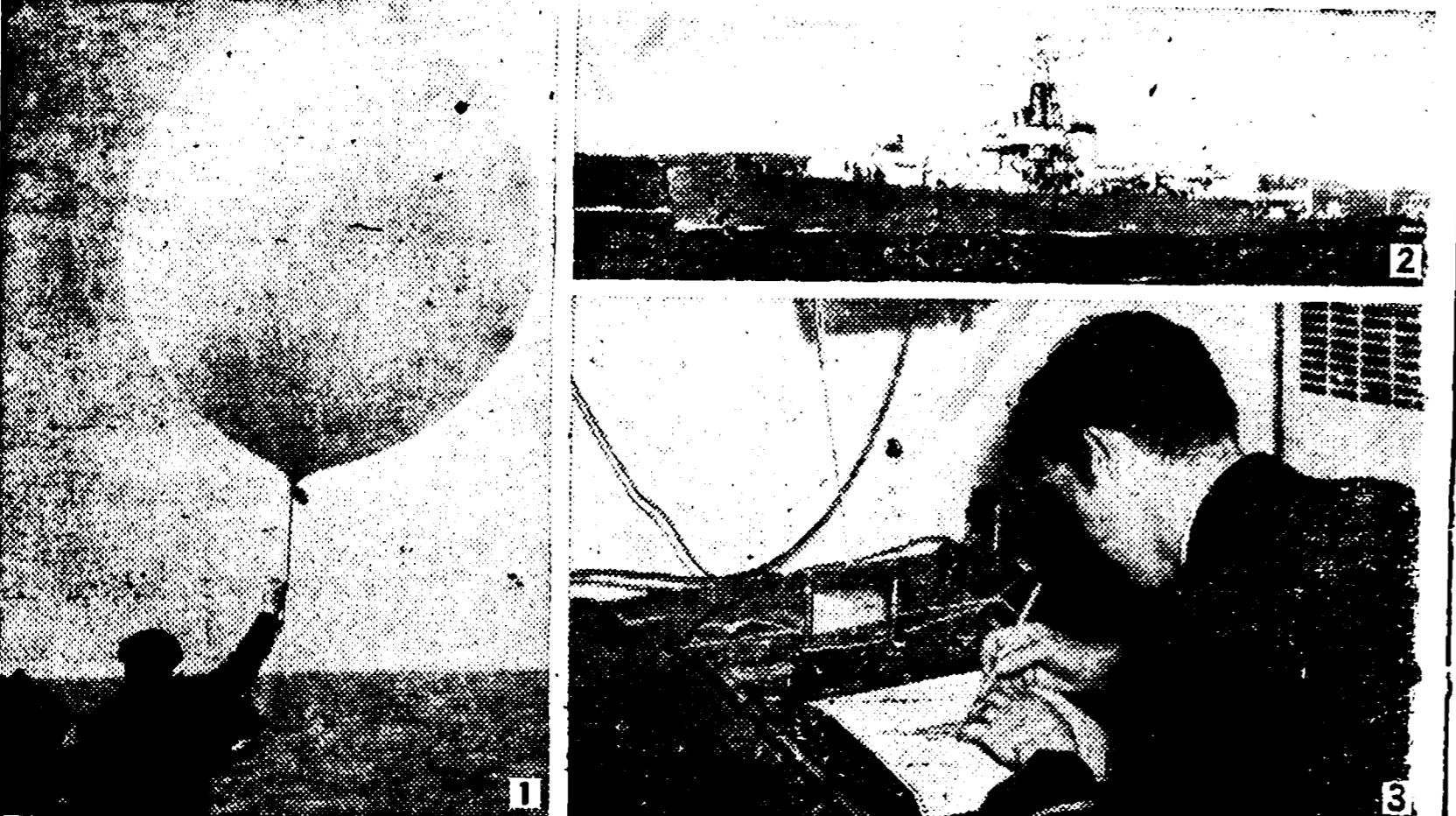

Doing Something About the Weather
