The Better Business Bureau urges "before you buy" classes snap around and get prices. There is no doubt many oculists are passing prices which ethical practitioners in the field of medicine are trying to stop.

Some doctors are also involved as they received a kickback from the optical supply house. If the doctor demands pay at his office, snap around or else demand a flat fee. Some are giving separate costs of examination, fitting, service fee and cost of the glasses.

The American Medical Ass'n. is making a vigorous fight against socialized medicine where the cost would not be paid by the government but by the consumer in form of a withholding tax.

The AA has organized a campaign for next November and will try to defeat any candidate favoring it. Clem Whitaker has been named director and he will lead the fight against what he terms government seizure of unwarranted power over the people. The concentration of power in the government must be stopped he says and the people aroused to their own defense.

The American doctors are rapidly becoming the greatest force in the nation second only to the American Press. They are now mobilizing all over the nation to protect their profession from socialized medicine and their right to practise medicine in a free country.

The cost of this campaign is paid for by a \$25 assessment on all members of the American Medical Association. It is planned by them to use all papers in nation this fall.

Current Comment

About ten years ago Wayne Monroe, Washtenaw, Livingston, Oakland and Macomb counties approved the Huron-Clinton Park Way Plan whereby a small tax was levied to build a scenic driveway with bathing beaches and camping sites from Lake the Clinton river and then to Lake St. Clair. At the election the plan carried. Although it is a long term project some work has been done. Kent Lake near Briar has been formed and a bathing beach formed at Lake St. Clair. Frank Martel of the AFL has been an opponent of the plan throughout. His argument is that Wayne county pays about \$1,014,000 and gets no value as there is no development in Wayne county. He seeks to withdraw Wayne from the project. Prosecutor O'Brien of Wayne county says the county cannot withdraw and the attorney general has sustained O'Brien's opinion. The project may not be in Wayne county but the great majority of people who will use the drive, camping and fishing sites will be from Wayne county.

All sorts of things are thrown on city dumps including much that is of value. We remember as a boy we used to pick up enough scrap metal on the Dexter dump to buy base ball equipment. The Grand Rapids dump was an eyesore until the city hired two men to clean it up. Now they bale enough paper and salvage enough old metal, clothing rags, broken toys etc to pay the city a profit of \$3000 a year. The prize find was a paper weight of solid gold worth \$500.

Connie Mack or Cornelius McGillicuddy, the 87 year old manager of the Philadelphia Athletics was speaker at a Detroit banquet last week. Way back in the early days of the American league his team were champions. His method was to build his team in champions and then sell the players for high prices when they began to go to pieces. He did this successfully 3 times. For the past 15 years he has been unable to come up with a winner, the Yankee check books and extensive farm system being too much for him.

Five people are being tried in Detroit for conducting a black market in used cars and cheating the state out of \$30,000 in sales tax. This could only have happened under conditions existing after world war II. As the auto factories converted to war munitions during the war there was an acute car shortage with the demand for new cars greatly exceeding the supply. New cars had a ceiling price but not old ones. Certain persons saw a chance to cash in and took it. They got people to put in orders for new cars at many dealers. These cars were driven a few miles, classed as used cars and sold for double the price of new cars to people who had to have. One Detroit clerk with a small salary bought 19 new cars in a year. Auto dealers were involved or such a thing would have been impossible. As such sales were illegal no sales tax was paid.

We read that the Republicans in the U. S. senate have agreed to give unanimous support to the pension bill which will double social security benefits to 10,000 people in the nation. There has been a great change in the weather in regard to pensions. We remember the big fight against social security by the Republicans in 1936. On election day, all day long we heard this refrain over the radio, "Vote Against Social Security Unless You Want To Be Fingerprinted Like a Criminal." This attack as a dud. Social Security is here to stay. The average pension now is about \$30. The bill will double it. After the civil war the nation was not pension minded. It was hard for the soldiers to get pensions and they seldom amounted to over \$10 or \$12 a month.
