Michigan Mirror

From now until election day in November, Michigan government will be a force in Michigan. The governor vetoed the \$10,350 salary of Gen. Luning of the liquor commission and also a 10 percent cut of \$40,500 for the civil service dept. The latter said was unconstitutional as the law requires a one percent state salary total for the commission.

He signed the legislature's \$71,000,000 appropriation bill with reluctance. It was \$70,000,000 less than he asked for and \$14,000,000 less than the current years total.

The legislature cut \$1,376,000 from the state mental hospital budget but cut \$100,000 for pay adjustments.

The bills to cut waste of public funds in welfare cases were allowed to become law without his signature.

Stewart Woodfill, head of the Grand Hotel Mackinac, offers this argument for a bridge at the Straits. At the present time the state is losing \$613,000 a year. This amount put in to bridge construction would pay for the bridge and leave the crossing toll-free.

This month is dairy month. Cash receipts of milk products in 1949 were 200 million dollars for 30 percent of the total farm income.

Slightly lower farm income is forecast. It is now down 20 percent from the 1948 peak.

The Michigan auto industry is leading the prosperity parade. Car output is forecasted at seven million this year including trucks.

Conservation Notes

\$441,000 will be spent in repairing and remodeling 21 Michigan state parks. The work will start Aug. 1, in Livingston county. Pinckney Lake will have roads built and a bathing beach.

Concrete monuments on the shores of Lake Michigan will mark the dividing line between Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Conservation officers of 13 states are meeting at Custer Park, S. D. this week.

Simple explanation of Michigan's game and fish laws in Spanish are being posted in this state's sugar beet area for migratory workers mostly from Mexico. 500 signs will be put up.

The Michigan cock pheasant population has increased 39 percent over last year according to a census taken.

21 forest fires in the week ending June 18 burned 29.3 acres.

U. of M. Observatory Dedicated

The new University of Michigan observatory at Peach Mountain at Portage Lake was dedicated Saturday. Owing to the intense heat the services were held at Lydia Mendelson auditorium, Ann Arbor, followed by a trip to the observatory. This has one of the world's largest telescopes. The U. of M. has 10 observatories including one in North Africa and one in Oregon.

Nearly Thousand Killed or Hurt in State Each Week

Nearly one thousand persons are being killed or injured on Michigan highways each week, and speed is one of the principal causes, Sgt. John Pennala, of the Brighton post of the Michigan State Police asserted today in urging motorists to cooperate in the present campaign to reduce the frequency of this most serious traffic offense.

"The slogan of the campaign 'Speeders Lose,' has been well selected, for the records prove that speeders do lose," Sgt. Pennala said. "Even when speed is not the direct cause of an accident it often contributes to its seriousness and means the difference between life and death."

Not only was speed a factor in 300 Michigan traffic deaths last year, but it also was responsible for the serious injury of many of the 41,000 persons who were hurt in the 143,000 accidents that occurred in the state.

"Motorists should take heed of the fact that accidents are on the increase in Michigan. So are injuries and deaths. Many pleasure drives and vacation trips are ending in tragedy. The answer is that every driver, for his own sake as well as for the welfare of others, should drive carefully and alertly, and remember particularly that speeders lose."

Sgt. Pennala also explained that where there is no specified speed limit, which is the case on most of the highway system, the state law provides that it is a violation to drive faster than conditions such as traffic, weather and time of day permit.

Current Comment

There seems to be much criticism of the U. S. census just completed. Especially this is true among the cities as in many cases the census failed to show the huge increase in population they expected. The city of Ann Arbor is one of the chief complainers and claims the count there is 500 or more off. A checkup failed to show any great error. The fact most of these cities ignore is that much of the expansion took place outside the city limits. For instance many new homes were built here but most of them are outside the city limits. Lots are cheaper there. There is no city tax and township restrictions are less strict than city ones. Detroit failed to pass Los Angeles as the 4th largest city in the nation and complains that Los Angeles grabbed all the outlying district and has an area of 452.6 square miles against Detroit's 140. It was ever thus New York City holds first place by including Brooklyn, Newark, Jersey City and other adjoining cities.

Years ago when the horse furnished the main source of night way travel there were noise complaints where one might take calls to have them broken to harness and get them into the city.

When these were used in places where race horses might be trained. Now it seems there are dog training schools in Ann Arbor. Dr. James Norris has been indicted into court by neighbors who complain that the 25 dogs he has in training at his school on Burton Drive keep them awake nights. Apparently their only remedy is to get the council to pass an ordinance against it as at present there is nothing on record forbidding such a school. Dr. Norris however states he expects to move his dog school further out into the country.

Next November the people of Michigan will vote again on repealing the one tax. In 1946 they passed an amendment repearing this tax but the duty interests calculated persons and got enough signatures to prevent the law from going into effect and forced another vote on it. At the present time 32 states and the District of Columbia have repealed their tax on oil. The leader at government has also removed all federal taxes. We cannot understand the efforts made to protect an industry which no longer exists. Very little milk or cream is made into butter anymore and the high prices asked for what is made has practically ruined the market for it.

W. K. Kelsey takes up the state ment of Joseph Pew, chairman of the board of the Sun Oil Co. in regard to the recent increase in the price of oil. Pew said "Two and a half years ago I took the bull by the horns and advanced prices on crude oil 50c a barrel. This stimulated new drilling to such an extent that the oil shortage was averted and soon there was plenty of oil. Kelsey adds that this influx of oil from new wells was more than the industry could handle and it was forced to limit oil production. Time and again lower limits were placed on oil output. Despite this surplus there was no reduction in price to the consumer."

Rev. John Saron, minister at Manistee has been given a years leave of absence by the M. L. conference. Two years ago he gained considerable publicity when he preached a fundamentalist sermon against racial discrimination. He was ousted by the church board for this. He was a lawyer before he became a minister and at the present time has undertaken a number of similar behalf of underprivileged persons of the conference.

FISHING SEASON OPENS

The pan fishing season opened here Sunday and the high ways were filled with fisherman and all boats at the nearby lakes out. Most of the fisherman report poor luck due to recent rains and too much fresh water. Albert Shirley says he has nothing to complain of as he went before daylight and got his limit.

New telephone rates for Michigan Bell customers

THE Michigan Public Service Commission has authorized increased local rates for Michigan Bell telephone service, beginning June 20, 1950. The increase was granted after a thorough 18 months' study of Michigan Bell's application, which was filed in December, 1948. It does not change the long distance rates now being charged.

The revised rates represent increases of from 25c to 75c a month for residence service. Increases for business customers range from 50c per month upward.

Each Michigan Bell subscriber will receive specific information about the new rates with the first telephone bill dated on or after June 20.

The reason for the new rates is a very simple one. The costs of providing telephone service have climbed much faster than revenues. And the rate increases granted have lagged far behind the increases in costs.

In the last ten years, for example, general increases in basic wage levels alone have added \$35,000,000 a year to operating costs. But during the same period, telephone rate increases, including the present one, will

have added only \$21,000,000 a year to revenues. Only recently we received demands from the telephone union for changes in its contracts which, if granted, will add still more to our expense. This, of course, is not provided for in the rate increase just granted.

Even with the present increase, the average telephone bill has risen less than half as much as the prices of things that make up the cost of living. In terms of value—in terms of the working hours needed to pay for it—telephone service is cheaper now than before the war. A telephone in the average home costs less per day than a package of cigarettes, a quart of milk or a gallon of gasoline.

New telephone rates for Michigan Bell customers

THE Michigan Public Service Commission has authorized increased local rates for Michigan Bell telephone service, beginning June 20, 1950. The increase was granted after a thorough 18 months' study of Michigan Bell's application, which was filed in December, 1948. It does not change the long distance rates now being charged.

The revised rates represent increases of from 25c to 75c a month for residence service. Increases for business customers range from 50c per month upward.

Each Michigan Bell subscriber will receive specific information about the new rates with the first telephone bill dated on or after June 20.

The reason for the new rates is a very simple one. The costs of providing telephone service have climbed much faster than revenues. And the rate increases granted have lagged far behind the increases in costs.

In the last ten years, for example, general increases in basic wage levels alone have added \$35,000,000 a year to operating costs. But during the same period, telephone rate increases, including the present one, will

have added only \$21,000,000 a year to revenues. Only recently we received demands from the telephone union for changes in its contracts which, if granted, will add still more to our expense. This, of course, is not provided for in the rate increase just granted.

Even with the present increase, the average telephone bill has risen less than half as much as the prices of things that make up the cost of living. 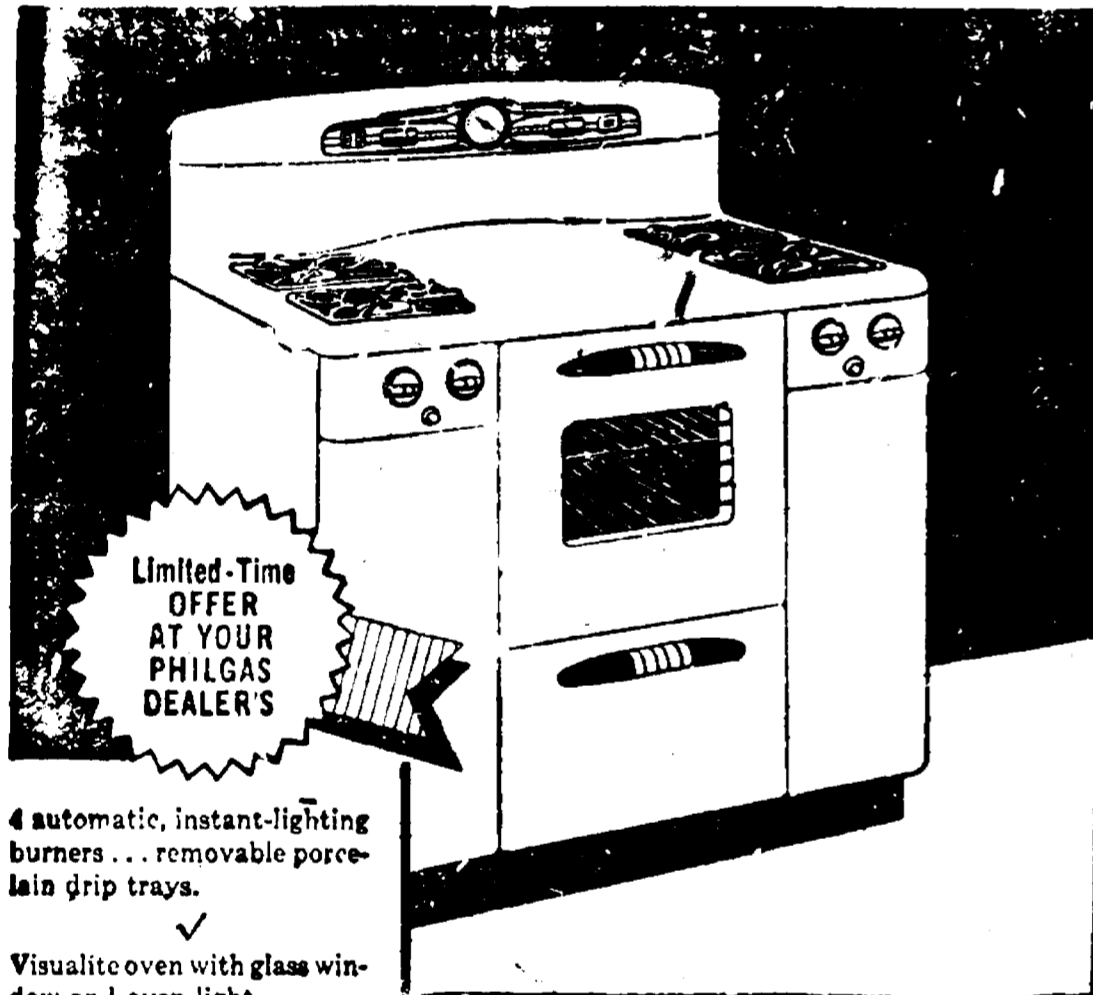

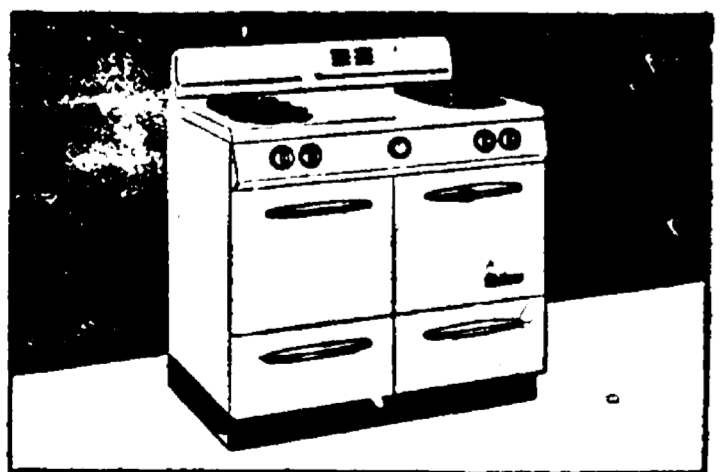

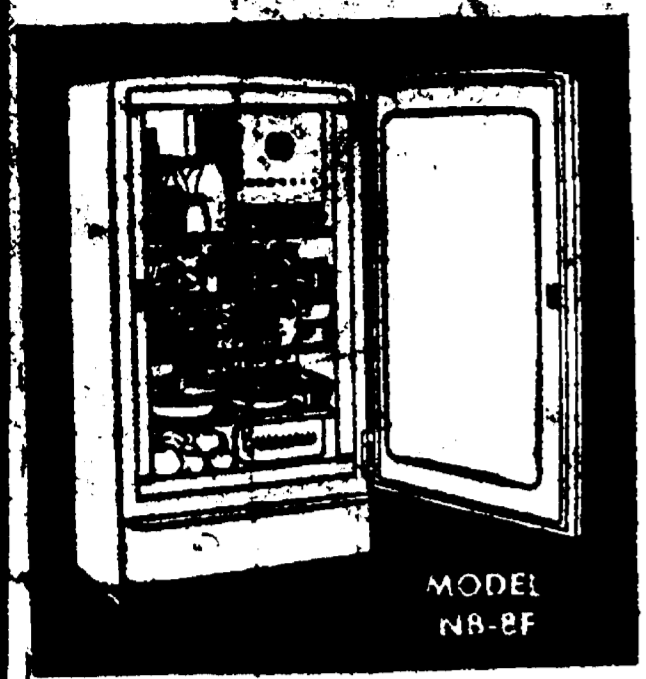
