## Michigan Mirror

The arsenal of democracy is getting ready for World War III. While hoping that Russia will not start another world war, America is taking a practical view-point. They realize that for the first time the United States is open to an aerial attack.

Gov. Williams has asked mayors of 45 cities to appoint civilian defense directors. A temporary air raid warning will be placed in operation by Com. Don Leonard of the state police. Speaker the legislature will convene if special measures are needed. They are now in recess.

The Soc looks have been closed to visitors and the state police radio network started for emergency. In Detroit where most of the munitions for world war II were made, special precautions are being taken, such as plans to evacuate industrial centers and set up first aid organizations.

At Washington draft extension was approved to increase the army, now 650,000 men short. On July 6, all civilian defense coordinators will meet at Lansing, Brig. Gen. Daugherty, Detroit's coordinator asks the people to avoid hysterics, get under cover, turn off gas and lights, leave on radio for advice and have plenty of water available.

An outbreak of war will invoke drastic restrictions on food transportation and materials, price ceilings and frozen wages.

The war threat has already caused a shortage of sugar, and may create a shortage with skyrocketing prices.

If war comes, Mich. may be caught unprepared. The Soc locks and big industrial centers present ideal targets for bombing planes and Mich. could become a miniature Pearl Harbor.

His companion, Alvira Cook, 17, of Howell was injured. Susan Witt, 7, and her brother Dale, 1 1/2 were killed when the car driven by their father, Gerald Witt, hit a milk truck, 3 miles west of Howell.

Barbara Cummings, 11, of Howell, drowned at Bishop Lake when she stepped into a deep hole. The body was recovered.

Victor Banta, 23, of Detroit was drowned at Whitmore Lake when his motor boat tipped over.

Cars driven by Gerald Musson of Howell and containing his family and sister-in-law, Mrs. Winifred Graves of Pinckney and one driven by Russell Looz of Brighton collided on Pettysville Rd. Looz was held for leaving the scene of an accident.

### CHARLES VANKEURAN

Charles VanKeuran, 57, died at Mt. Carmel Mercy hospital Detroit, Thursday. He was a native of Howell and graduated from the University of Michigan in 1902. His marriage to Miss Moea Teeple, daughter of late George Teeple of Pinckney was one of the events of the season. Elected to the state legislature from Livingston county and served one term, being defeated by the late Edwin Farmer of Unadilla township over the railroad tax issue. Later he was in the insurance business in Lansing. Of late years he has been in the oil business, drilling and producing oil in several Michigan fields. Surviving are his wife, a daughter and 2 brothers.

Services were held in the Harris Funeral Home, Detroit, with burial in White Chapel Cemetery.

### CLIFFORD TEEPLE

Clifford Teeple, 57, died at his home in Detroit Saturday of a heart attack. He was the son of the late Lloyd and Ella Sigler Teeple and was born on the farm on the Dexter Rd., now owned by Green Bros. Later the family moved to Vassar where his father died. Of late years he was employed by the P.M. R.R. in Detroit. A veteran of World War I he was commander of American Legion Post 126, the largest in Detroit. Since 1917 he has been a member of Livingston Lodge No. 76 F. & A. M. of Pinckney.

Surviving are his wife, Helen, a brother, Kenneth, of Baltimore, Maryland and 2 half brothers, Howard and Harold Hayward of Detroit.

The funeral will be held Thursday at 3 p. m. at Cooper Bros. Funeral, Mack & Garland Aves., Detroit. Burial in Elmwood cemetery.

## Current Comment

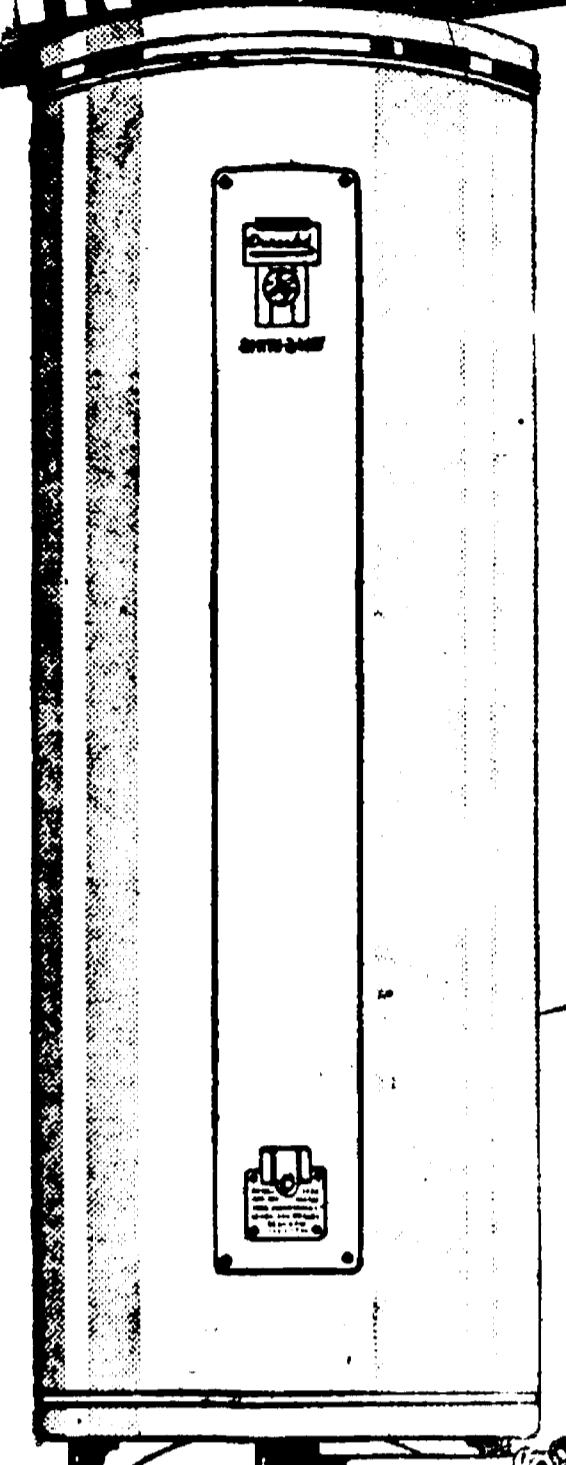
As was the case in World War I and World War II we seem to have slid into another war over night. Also as in previous conflicts we let the other side strike the first blow. Now the facts are this: Poland, Korea like Belgium and other whose invasions caused World Wars I and II is a small defenseless country whose lands have always been overrun and pillaged by invading armies. China conquered it and then Japan controlled it for years under a puppet king. At the peace conference at Yalta, United States, Great Britain and Russia were then allies. North Korea is Russian and therefore Communist. Her people attended Russian schools and fought in Russian armies. South Korea is not Communist. Two separate governments were set up in each part of Korea. Such a small country did not need two and the north arm one which was the biggest has tried to take over the south arm one. As we are sponsors for south Korea we could not allow this and have reinforced the south Koreans with planes and ships. Whether this will be enough to turn the tide in favor of our Koreans is doubtful. You cannot hold territory with planes and ships and it is pretty certain that before any victory is achieved the consensus of opinion seems to be that Russia who is furnishing planes and artillery to the North Koreans is only bluffing and that a strong show of force will make her back down. Time will show whether this is true or not. In the meantime fighting is going on. Planes have been shot down and American airmen have been killed. In Washington it has caused a revival of bi-partisanism in foreign policy as almost every congress is supporting the presidents interventionist policy. Only a few isolationist diehards have reared their heads to protest.

The Michigan State News, the student publication of Michigan State College has had its publication suspended by the college authorities due to an editorial appearing in it which condemned the Wolverine boys State sponsored by the American Legion as a fascist organization and as a fascist minded. This seems far fetched. The Wolverine state program was started by the Legion 10 years or more ago. In it the legion takes a group of boys to Lansing who take over the state government act as governor, lie gov. senators, representatives etc. The legion is in charge but usually gets local organizations to sponsor the boys and pay their expenses. Pinckney never sponsored but 2 boys there. Sponsorship costs about \$25. The Masons sponsored Bill Baughn one year and the O. E. S. Jack Hannett the next. Posters appeared on the campus grounds last week asking students to picket the home of Pres John Hanna who suspended the papers publication. Later signs appeared signed by Ron Linton editor of the paper, asking students not to picket.

With the Korean situation getting hot and Congress giving the president power to invoke the draft by a 315 to 4 vote local draft eligibles are getting uneasy. According to the press those eligible for the draft are as follows: Unmarried non-veterans aged 19 to 25, the national guard members and the reserves. They shall serve 21 months when called unless released earlier. However, the presidents power is limited as the size of the armed forces must remain within the statutory limits set by congress which is 2,005,882. The present strength of the military forces is 1,370,000. A military expert says not over 300,000 men could qualify for military service out of the 1,460,000 man power pool of 19 to 25 age group, national guardsmen and reserve men. The draft law exempts all veterans with more than 90 days of World War II service, married men, high school students and college students until the end of their terms.

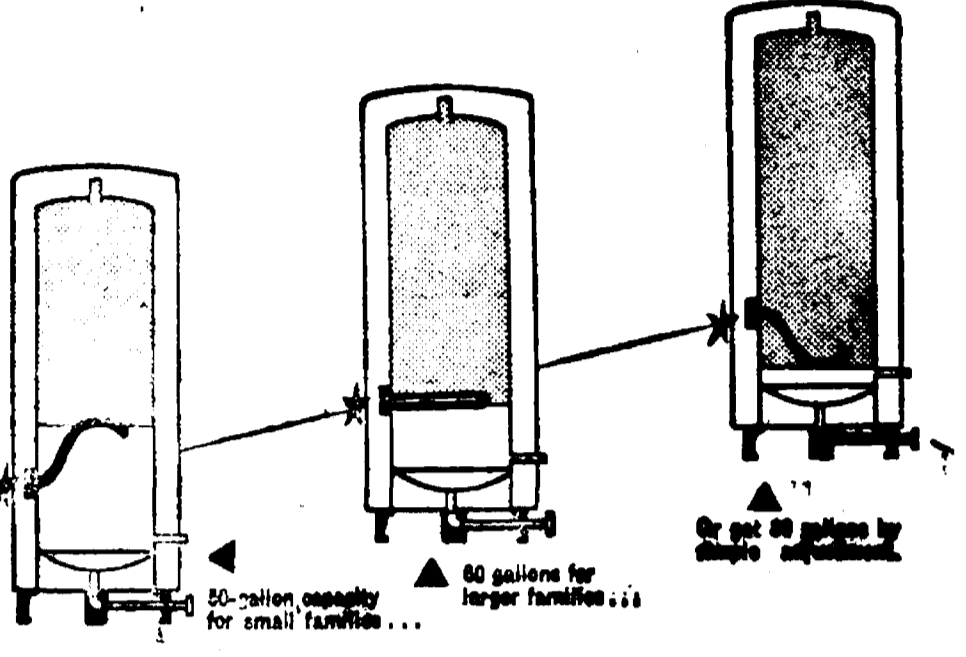

#### TELEPHONE RATE INCREASES

Rate increases ordered by the Public Service Commission for Michigan Bell Telephone Co. users will apply to just about every type of local service in every exchange in the company territory.

The \$8,200,000 increase in company revenues amounting to about \$5,500,000 annually after taxes was effective June 20 under the Commission's order.

Residence users here will pay increases ranging from .25 to .50 cents a month under the revised schedule. Increases for business customers will range from .50 to 75 cents a month.

The new rates for Howell, Brighton, and Pinckney will be: Residence service—Individual line, \$3.25 a month; two-party, \$2.75; 4-party \$2.25 a month and rural, 2.50 a month.

Business service—Private branch exchange, \$9.00 a month; individual line, \$6.00; two-party, \$5.00; and rural, \$4.00 a month.

Residence extension rates are increased to 85 cents a month and business extension to \$1.50. Long-distance rates are not changed by the order.

Thomas N. Lacy, president of Michigan Bell, said the company welcomes the much needed relief the \$8,200,000 rate order brings. "Amounting to about \$5,500,000, after taxes, the increase is definitely in the consumer interest," Lacy said, "for good telephone service should be and is the chief concern of our customers."

"While it will help to strengthen the company's financial condition and will aid us in doing the kind of job the people of Michigan want us to do, it is considerably less than the amount needed and is sufficient to insure adequate earnings and our continued ability to attract necessary capital.

"Unlike an unregulated industry where price adjustments are almost automatically geared to rising costs, under regulation considerable delays are experienced before relief is granted. We have had to wait almost 18 months for this increase.
