## Michigan Mirror

Gene Allman, Michigan Press Ass'n secretary suggests that the people of Michigan write Premier Joe Stalin of Russia, a letter. This is in line with a suggestion of Carl Saunders of the Jackson Citizen Patriot, winner of the Pulitzer prize for the best editorial in 1949.

He says American Communists and their stooges are circulating phony peace petitions. Their first objective is to outlaw the atomic bomb, although it is Russia up to the present time who has blocked all efforts to control it.

These peace petitions claim to have the backing of the United Nations and Trygve Lie, sec., although both have repudiated the invasion of South Korea by North Korea.

Quite a few people, activated by dread of war and desire for peace have signed these fake petitions. This enables Red propaganda to score.

Why not offset this? We believe in peace, we did not want to go to Korea. In fact, we got out once. We are fighting today under the direction of the United Nations. Why not say so? Tell Stalin we are fighting for peace and ask him to co-operate. Let's write him, asking him to cut out the dirty work and join up for peace.

The suggested form is: Premier Joseph Stalin, in care, Russian Embassy, Washington, D. C.

Communists in this country say you want peace. So do we—really. Fake peace petitions don't fool us. The way to peace is to call your Red friends out of South Korea. We will get out as soon as your guns do. Also we will outlaw the atomic bomb if you will permit surveillance of your factories which are producing them.

Don't let your agents mislead you. While we differ with Pres. Truman on local affairs we are 100 per cent for him on foreign affairs.

If you don't like this you may change it. But anyway write to Joe and get it off your chest. Let's show him there is no disunity in United States.

## BIGGER VETERINARY COLLEGE

We see that Michigan State College has doubled the capacity of their veterinary college at a cost of \$2,400,000. Way back 50 yrs. ago this profession was rather locked down on. A veterinary was then called a horse doctor as most of his business was doctoring horses. Michigan then had no established veterinary college and most of the old time vets were graduates of Toronto, Ont. Then the auto came and the horse doctoring business went into a decline, and horse doctors became few and far between. However as pure food and health laws began to be enacted the veterinary began to play an important part in the life of the community in assuring the public of pure-milk and dairy products and pure meats. Most of their work now is in inspecting dairy herds to see that no milk from diseased cattle is sold to the public and packing houses to keep bad meat off the market. Also most veterinaries operate pet stock hospitals where dogs and cats may be taken for treatment. This practise has grown to be a large one in many of the cities.

## Current Comment

A public utility which did its share in building up this section went out of existence Thursday when the Ann Arbor railroad ran its last passenger train from Toledo to Frankfort, Mich. This road was built by popular subscription and ran its first train in 1878 drawn by a wood burning locomotive. It enjoyed a tremendous business and between 1912 and 1916 carried over a million passengers a year. Then it ran 10 passenger trains a day. Due to it the section around Zuehlke Lake enjoyed a tremendous growth, being the only lake having a direct railroad service in this section. Then the railroad changed the name of the station from Hamburg Junction to Lake Lela. This road was then called the T. & A. and the passenger service "The Ring Pony." Later gasoline driven cars were put on. After 1916 the auto and bus began to cut into the roads passenger business and of late years they have been running but one passenger train each way per day. They still enjoy a big freight business to which they will now devote their time exclusively. We remember being at Lake Lela one 4th of July night about 1910 and seeing over 500 waiting passengers dancing on the railroad depot platform.

The Ann Arbor City Council has passed an ordinance forbidding the "Good Humor" men from ringing a bell when they sell their wares. These people sell ice cream cones from house to house we rather liked the sound of their musical bell. The council also banned the use of all whistles, horns etc. in selling merchandise. This method of attracting attention is probably a thousand years old. Before the advent of the newspaper the town crier who gave the news bulletins got attention by ringing a bell. Back in our distant youth the milkman dipped his wares out of a milk can with a long handled dopper rang a bell to call his customers. So did the driver of the meat wagon who went from home to home. The fish peddler blew a horn and so did the junk dealer while the sissies and knute grinder ran a little bell incessantly as he walked down the street with his grindsome nod on his back. We suppose this ban also extends to the organ grinder and his monkey once a familiar sight but now almost never seen on the streets.

Chicago has opened a bicycle checking station where all school children's bicycles must be checked in some manner as their father's automobiles. Bicycle riding is widespread among Chicago school children and defective bicycles have caused accidents.

India's prime minister, Nehru, has conspired himself a negotiator for Soviet Russia in the Korean dispute. His first suggestion is that the United States bring Communism into the United Nations to replace Nationalism. This was demanded some time ago by Russia and was agreed to by Great Britain and some other countries but the move was blocked by this nation. This country could hardly grant this concession without losing face and it is doubted if it would accomplish anything anyway as Russia is determined to extend her frontier by using border nations who have turned Communist as catspaws.

In the meantime this county is preparing to dig in for a long war. All resignations from the national guard and reserves have been stopped and these organizations are shortly expected to be called into service. The draft call is set for Sept. and this county is expected to send 20 men. Enlistments will be extended one year and the major industries such as Ford, the Chrysler and General Motors are expected to convert at least partially to war orders. The General Motors is said to be negotiating a tank order. The Chrysler ambulances and trucks and Ford Co. planes. All this has unsettled the domestic goods market and caused a boom on auto sales. Hoard has also started on tires, sugar and many other food stuffs.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Applications to shoot one deer of either sex in 8 Michigan counties will be available on Sept. 15. Only 22,300 permits will be issued. The season is in Dec.

The lake levels of Lakes Superior, Michigan and Huron rose in June while those of Lakes Erie Ontario and St. Clair lowered.

Six more public fishing sites have been purchased by the state. They are on Horseshoe, Nevin, Derby, Clifford, Dickerson and Montclair lakes.

Public forest fire loss, due to rain etc., has so far been low. 619 fires have burned 4,145 acres to date compared to 1,194 fires which burned 19,057 acres in the same period last year.

The following public hunting lands have been bought by the state; 40 acres at Oak Grove, Livingston; 39 acres at St. Clair Flats; 90 acres at Dansville; 40 acres at Port Huron; 100 acres at Haymarch Lake, Mecosta.

The dept is now surveying 26 selected lakes in 11 counties which may be made capable of supporting trout.

The 8th Michigan oil strike this year, a 100 barrel a day well, has been struck on the Alber farm, near Mt Pleasant. The dept. is 3200 ft.

A poplar or Balm of Gilead tree has been found near Rockland which is 8 ft. 3 in. in circumference.
