## Michigan Mirror

Because the legislature removed the requirement of a minimum of public instruction, the sec. of an upstate board of education (Lura Cross) jumped to the wrong conclusion that the State of Michigan no longer requires newspapers publication of the proceedings of the annual school meeting and the "itemized" statement of receipts and expenditures during the preceding year. The proceedings and statement should be published in a local newspaper previous to the first Monday in August of each year, according to the office of Dr. Lee Thurston state supt., Lansing.

The Illinois Press Association, through its Board of Directors, is joining with the Michigan Press Association as co-sponsor of the mechanical conference Saturday Sept. 16, at the Hotel Sherman, Chicago. The conference is a feature of the Chicago week end, Sept. 15-17, arranged by your state association for publishers who plan to attend the national graphic arts exposition.

The Republicans are queef over a speech by former public housing director Edgewood at a Democratic rally in Grand Rapids in which he endorsed Lt. Gov. Connolly and Attorney General Roth but ignored Gov. G. Mennen Williams. He also came out against the ADA, a labor organization, highly responsible for the Democrat victory in 1948. As the launch of Detroit's new national Committee on Fitzgerald and Edgewood failed to enter any candidate in the primary against Williams, knowing if would be a waste of time to hard to see how they can gain anything by their sniping action unless they intend to support the Republican ticket.

The trouble seems to be over the fact that the governor has ignored them in making his appointments in the state and has invariably turned down the men they recommended.

Following the Edgewood speech in Grand Rapids, Wm. Carpenter, state central committee man then took the floor to reply to Edgewood. He as quoted as follows:

"I'll defend the ADA if I have to give Gov. Williams full credit. When the speaker omitted the governor's name in mentioning the breath of political fresh air he meant the governor creates a bad smell and a stench, didn't he?"

"Gov. Williams is the inheritor of the policies of Frank Murphy and is the only Democrat to trade sympathies are with Edgewood who came here instructed in what to say by George Fitzgerald, our national Committeeman."

## School Notes

### ALL BIDS REJECTED

At a meeting held at the school Monday evening for the purpose of examining the bids for the construction of an elementary school building, the following bids were received: Davis Construction Company, Ann Arbor \$170,000; Ellis Construction Company, Detroit \$139,500.

Both these bids were rejected as being too high. Consequently the building of the new school has been temporarily delayed. Eric Rose, Sec. Pinckney Community School (editor's comment) This was not entirely unexpected as in quite a few other places in Michigan where the erection of new schools has been voted the bids have had to be rejected as they were higher than the appropriation. The Pinckney bond issue was for \$140,000 but 20,000 of this must be used to remodel the present school to make it conform to state specifications.

In 1936 when the present school addition was built the bids were all rejected as being too high. Bids were re-advised but the plans were revised to make them come inside the appropriation. The original plan called for a larger gym with a balcony around it and a basement with shower and locker rooms. These were left off the second set of plans.

Dear Old Paul: I am writing to let you know that I am getting your paper. Thanks a lot. How are you and all the boys in town. This war is no good in Korea. Those d---Russians. I have a brother over there. He has been in about 17 years. He is with the tanks. It is like it was over in Italy when I was over there. They beat us at first in Sicily & Salerno and I said to my captain "What we going to do?" We all going to get killed? He said "H... No. Gen. Clark is going to lick them" and he did too. Gen. Patton was there. He was a great man too. Too bad he got killed.

I hear Friday Haines got married. I think he done right. Wish him all the luck in the world and that he makes good. I like him. He was a fine soldier.

How is Mrs. Lavey's family. Tell them I said Hello, also Mrs. Ledwidge and family, John Gervyc and family, Anna Reason family, C. Kennedy and family, L. Hendee and family, Joe Basvdo and family, Jack Reason and family, Harry Murphy's family, Bill Jeffrey family, Stanley Dinkel family, Bill Miller and family, Mr. Reader, Mrs. Singer and family, Roy Clark family, Don Swarthout family, Ed Spears family, Mark Nash family and all the rest.

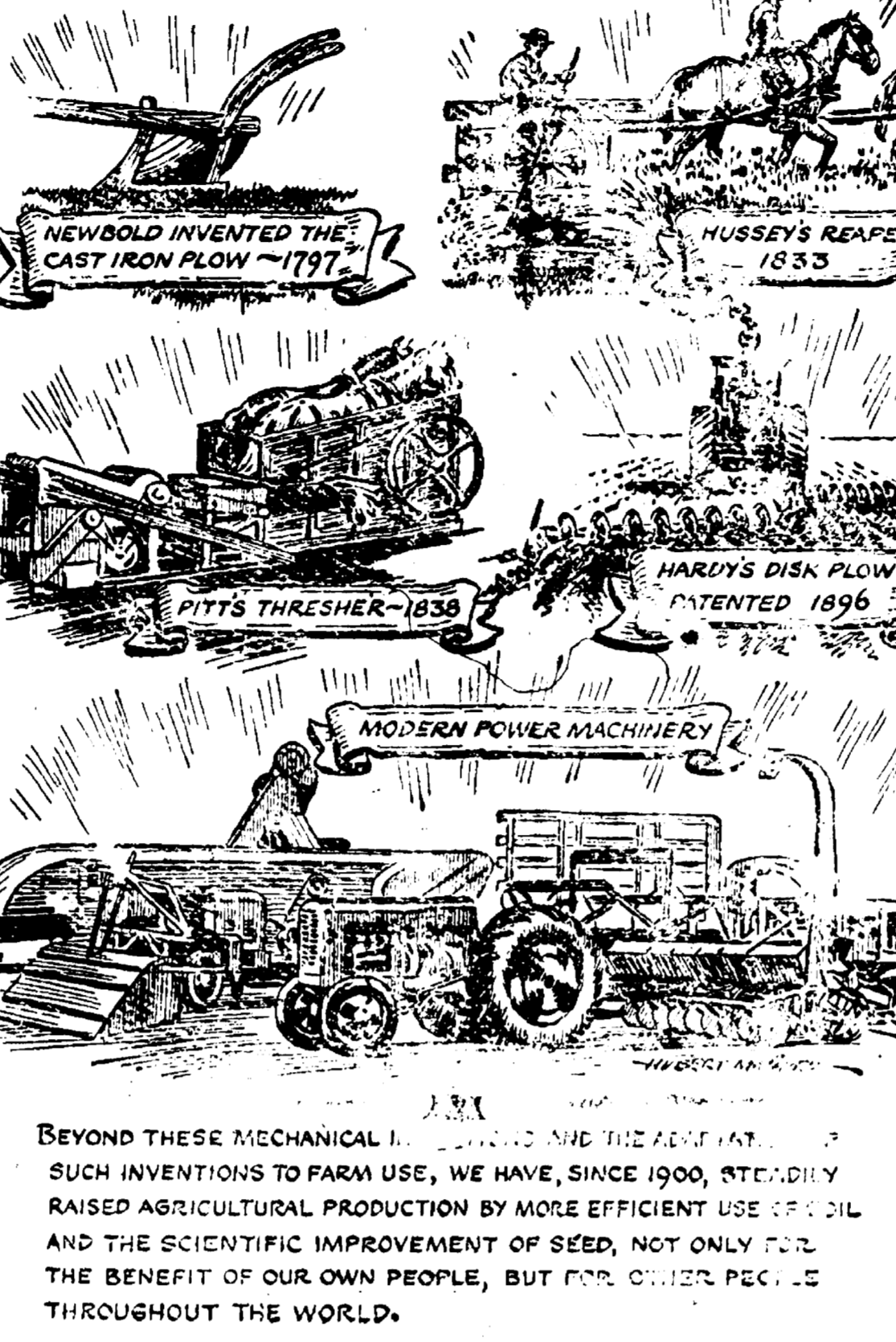

## Obituaries

### DEDE HINCHEY

A well known teacher in rural schools passed away here last Thursday when Miss Dede Hinchey, 69, died at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Haines in Pinckney.

Dede Hinchey was the daughter of the late Chester and Anna Ross Hinchey and was born on the Hinchey farm on M 36 W. on June 15, 1881. She graduated from Pinckney high school and also the Michigan State Normal, Ypsilanti. For a time she taught in St. Paul, Minn. but was called back to Pinckney by her mother's failing health. She taught one year in the Pinckney school and then for 40 years was a teacher in the rural schools of this section. In addition to this she operated a farm. Of a kindly disposition her friends were multitudes and the entire community rejoiced a year ago when she received a \$20,000 bequest from her uncle, Peter Ross, Christian Scientist Lecturer, who died in California.

At this time her health began to fail and most of the last year she has spent in hospitals where she was given numerous blood transfusions, the people of Pinckney finishing the blood. A few months ago she returned to Pinckney and has since been cared for at the home of Edmund Haines on East Main Street Pinckney.

Surviving are two brothers, Guy and Fess, both of Putnam township. Also 2 nieces and 7 nephews.

The funeral was held at the Swarthout Funeral Home Saturday afternoon. Rev. Ezra Beachy officiating. Burial was in Pinckney cemetery.

### JOHN EDWARD VANHORN

John Edward VanHorn, 52, son of the late John and Miranda Weller VanHorn, former resident of Hamburg township, died at Miami Beach, Florida, July 23. For 25 years he was a city appraiser in Detroit. He graduated from Pinckney high school and was the pitcher on the high school baseball team. He leaves his wife, Anna, a son, John Jr., and a stepson. The funeral was held Friday at St. Paul's Church, Grosse Pointe, with burial in Mt. Olivet cemetery, Detroit.

## Current Comment

President Harry Truman, enjoys the unique distinction of being the only president of the United States who has not had a bank failure since his administration. It seems but a short time ago, yet it was 18 years, during the Hoover administration, when the banks of Michigan were folding up right and left. Some closed never to reopen. Before 1932 this county had 4 banks. Now they have but 4. The bank failures were caused by a big drop in the securities in which they invested their depositors money which in turn was caused by a slump in business and over production of farm crops which crashed the market. Then followed the Bank Holiday in which the banks were told to get their houses in order. The answer was the bank depositors insurance law, a tightening up of credit and the farm price supports which made it impossible for wheat to drop to the ridiculous figure of \$.30 a bushel as it did in 1932. Wheat today at \$2.02 at the elevator.

With the induction of the national guard in to the regular army looming it is planned to organize a Home Guard or State Guard to protect Michigan. Their duties will be to repel invasion, preserve order and cooperate with the armed forces in evacuating people from population centers. The state will be divided in to 6 districts in charge of a Brigadier General. If we remember rightly the Michigan State Police had their inception in a similar organization. When the national guard went into the army in world war I Michigan was left with out adequate police protection. The state guard was then organized as a temporary protection. The first state guards wore coats with sheepskin collars and many of them were only part time members. However, they did good work, especially in enforcing prohibition laws and eventually became a permanent organization.

The woods seem to be full of self starters for congress this year. This seems to have been caused by the fact that many veteran members of congress have retired or passed to the great beyond. The self starters think they have to do something out of the ordinary to attract attention. In the second district one candidate pledged himself, if elected to congress, to demand that the other nations who belong to the U. N. send troops to help us in Korea under the threat that if they did not we would withdraw our troops. He ignores a number of facts. In the first place this country was given a protectorate over South Korea alone. When we opposed the North Koreans we did so on our own initiative without asking aid from any other country. It has proved to be a bigger job than we figured on. Anyway at last reports a number of the United Nations members were offering to send troops there to aid us in our effort to drive back the Communists.

A bill now up in congress would make it a criminal offense punishable of \$2,000 fine or a year in prison to send slot machines or any gambling equipment, from one state to another. These slot machines or one armed bandits have always been regarded as a menace but the chief difficulty in curbing them has been that the various states had no uniform laws against them. In fact in some states they are legal if they pay a license. In other states there is very little effort made to enforce the laws against them.

We think there is heard big smoke but not much fire in the charges made by a couple of finance company officials who were convicted and sentenced to prison in Kim Sjaler's big craft cleanup. They are seeking to show that Kim Sjaler, bribed Charles Hemans, his star witness to testify against them. Their charges are lurid to wit: that the state paid Hemans hotel bills bought his whiskey kept a woman for him known as Miss X at state expense and promised to prevent his being disbarred by the state bar association and to keep his commission as motor in the army reserves for him. The old guard G. O. P. never liked Sjaler. He sent too many of their number to prison. Then he cried insult to it by taking the GOP nomination for governor in 1948 in 1948 they went over to Mennen Williams in sufficient number to ensure his election.
