## Michigan Mirror

The A-1 story of Michigan cov-  
ernments since Pearl Harbor is  
how your Michigan Mirror writ-  
er invested \$75 in 1940 in a \$100  
bond. That was 10 years ago.  
The value has increased 33 1/3  
per cent or 3 1/3 per cent a year.  
Our profit in terms of 1940 dol-  
lars is \$25.

But what has happened to the  
1940 dollar. In terms of money  
value it is worth but 60 cents. So  
figuring from this our \$75 bond  
bought in 1940 is worth only \$60.  
That is what inflation has done  
to Michigan in 10 years. As the  
value of the dollar goes down,  
the cost of living goes up and  
wages increased. Higher wages  
mean higher prices. It is a merry  
go round at the best.

The postwar inflation problem  
of Michigan is bound to become  
worse unless we avoid the mis-  
takes of World War II.

Bernard Baruch, Chairman of  
the 1918 war industries says we  
cannot have priorities over pro-  
duction without price and wage  
control. He added inflation is  
dangerous even if we are not  
at war. Our national debt is 257  
billions and the cost of living is  
so high serious hardships are  
felt. Everywhere cities and states  
are endeavoring to raise wages  
of teachers, police, firemen and  
nurses whose wages have been  
slashed by inflation. This has  
raised the cost of insurance and  
hospitalization beyond the ability  
of many to pay.

According to Baruch price con-  
trols are the only remedy. The  
greatest threat to our government  
is not price controls but inflation  
at home. Baruch said the price  
controls of 1942 permitted wages  
to run free and to increase 100  
to 110 of parity. This added 100  
billions to the cost of the war.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

Although whelsh led in the

Attendance at the 60 Michigan  
state parks so far this year is  
only 6,047,000. The 1949 record  
was 13,000,000.

Mechanized tree planting will  
start for the first time next  
month in the upper peninsula. This  
machine will plant from 8,000  
to 10,000 seedlings a day.

Concrete monuments to mark  
the dividing line between Michi-  
gan Wisconsin and Minnesota  
will be erected on the shores of  
Lakes Michigan and Superior.

## THE NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

On account of soaring building  
costs and growing scarcity of  
material there will be no action  
on re-advertising for bids for the  
new Pinckney school building  
for some time. Only two contrac-  
tors bid on the job. One was  
about \$20,000 over the \$120,000  
appropriation and the other was  
\$50,000 over. Building material is  
getting scarce and cement is al-  
most impossible to get. Highway  
construction is held up by strik-  
ing shortage. If the war effort increas-  
es there will probably be an  
embargo placed on steel and  
other material essential to war.  
For this reason the school board  
has decided to wait for things to  
settle. Building costs have increas-  
ed nearly 8 percent in the last  
30 days or so.

## Current Comment

A mob in New York City last  
week staged a riot when they in-  
sisted in holding a "peace meet-  
ing". A bloody riot took place in  
which police were assaulted and  
13 persons arrested. It was ever  
thus. During the civil war draft  
raids occurred in New York City  
and a regiment marching thro-  
ugh Baltimore was stoned and  
badly beaten there. Back in W.W.  
I police in Detroit and other cit-  
ies made periodic raids on  
dance halls and other places  
where teen age boys gathered  
and all boys without registration  
cards were jailed. These slacker  
raids were so frequent that dance  
hall proprietors finally refused to  
sell tickets to boys who could  
not show registration cards. This  
slacker class in the main are not  
only selfish and ignorant but  
love of country means absolutely  
nothing to them.

In the meantime inflation has  
reared its head, brought on by  
panic buying of many people  
who want to be prepared in war  
time scarcities which existed in  
the last war again develop. Auto  
dealers who had a surplus of  
cars before the Korean outbreak  
suddenly found their show rooms  
bare and themselves 6 months  
behind in their orders. The same  
thing happened to electrical ap-  
pliances, auto tires and sugar and  
many food stuffs. People who or-  
dinarily bought only 10 lbs. of  
sugar started buying 200 lbs. of  
lois etc. This, of course, disrupt-  
ed the market which was only  
geared to furnish the public with  
a normal supply. This mad buy-  
ing raised prices. Congress has  
acted to block this and has giv-  
en the president power to invoke  
price and wage controls when  
prices go 5 percent above the  
pre-Korean War levels. Some  
think price controls never should  
have been lifted. The 80th con-  
gress lifted them with the assur-  
ance that the law of supply and  
demand would level the market  
back to normal. It never did. In-  
stead prices climbed still higher.

In the meantime the draft tem-  
po has been stepped up. The  
call in this county for the August  
draft is 11 men. We understand  
5 from Pinckney have been call-  
ed. According to a war dept. dis-  
patch deferments for essential  
men within the draft age will be  
few and then only for 6 months.  
The Korean war up to date has  
proved that a war cannot be  
won by planes and tanks alone  
but that foot soldiers or infantry  
are needed and plenty of them.  
The theory that congress felt is  
that we could train illiterate Asia-  
tics and arm them to do our fight-  
ing for us, has been tossed in the  
ash can.

The war has completely over-  
shadowed the political campaign  
coming up this fall and it is get-  
ting scant attention. We see  
where Former Gov. Harry Kelly  
addressed a political meeting in  
Grand Rapids last week and only  
70 persons turned out. At that  
we consider him the leading G.  
O. P. candidate. He is a war vet-  
eran who lost a leg in World  
War I, has played ball with lab-  
or and was on the state liquor  
commission; and handled the  
sale of auto license plates. He  
has organized Kelly for Governor  
Clubs in every county and is the  
only candidate who has any orga-  
nization.

The Detroit Tigers are appar-  
ently pennant bound having dot-  
ten over their big hurdle last  
week, the 3 game series with  
New York. The Gods smiled on  
Mar. Red Rolfe in this series. W. W.  
his pitching staff all shot he start-  
ed 2 bull pen pitchers and both  
of them won outstanding victori-  
es. The Detroit hitters also came  
through and the team won all 3  
games. The entire team is rolling  
and it does not seem that they  
can be stopped. We have not  
attended a world series since  
1909 when they played Pittsburgh.  
That was on Oct. 12 and it snowed  
most of the morning. The  
games were played in wooden  
stand Bennett park and tickets  
were only \$1.25. We saw Geo.  
Mullin shut out Pittsburgh 5 to 0  
and reach the heights by strik-  
ing out Wagener, Leach and F.  
Clark in a row. Other Pinckney  
ites who were at the game were  
the late Wm. E. Murphy and  
Charles J. Teeple.
