## Michigan Editor

New war orders are arriving daily in Michigan, the acceleration since the Korean invasion has reduced Michigan jobs to less than 100,000. Labor shortages are just around the corner and many factories are complaining they cannot get enough.

The postoffice claims the \$555 million annual deficit could be reduced one half this would be done by replacing hand cranked machinery with modern, and removing free franked mail and air-mail subsidies.

Communist sabotage is regarded as a menace to the Soo. A bomb could easily wreck them. So crews on all vessels using the locks are screened.

The Treas. Brake does not believe consolidation of bureaus and commissions would reduce expenditures. Furthermore it would centralize too much power in the governor.

The proposal to bond for \$65 million for TB and mental patient will be on the ballot in Nov.

The cost of living rise since the Korean invasion has crowded other news off the front page. The Michigan Bell has increased wages \$35 million since 1940 when their rate increase was only \$21 million. The state deficit is about \$20 million.

County prosecutors want the one man grand jury system restored. The state bar wants all Michigan judges appointed from a list submitted by them. The Kellogg Foundation, Battle Creek has given \$3,000,000 to Michigan schools for school administration.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

Michigan oil fields are averaging 45,000 barrels a day production. However, the states current consumption is 250,000 barrels a day. The present United States production is 5,400,000 barrels a day. Completed Michigan wells this year total 400 compared to 454 last year.

Campers in state parks are asked not to leave their cars unlocked. Many thefts have been reported.

Sale of fishing licenses have fallen off 30 per cent this year. Specialists on Michigan natural resources will conduct a school at Higgins Lake Sept. 5-7. 400 application cards for the Michigan special deer season Dec. 1-10 are being distributed. 43 consecrated guns and rifles will be sold at the conservation dept. at Lansing Aug. 31 Sept. 1. Over 17,000,000 pine seedlings and transplants are ready to be offered to the public.

Michigan 4000 hunting license agents will have licenses on sale the second week of Sept. The dept. is offering a book for 30c which describes 34 Michigan trees and enables you to tell one from another.

### CURRENT COMMENT Cont.

On the subject, When Pvt. John Marruso, the first soldier killed in Korea was brought back to Detroit for burial last week, much difficulty was experienced in giving him a military funeral. The undertaker claims he called up 30 veterans posts and they all turned down his request. Finally 5 veterans showed up, only 4 in uniform, with 4 guns and put on a makeshift military funeral.

## Current Comment

We saw an announcement in the papers last week that was not welcome news. It was to the effect that the State of Michigan was going to sell its dairy herds at the Pontiac State Hospital, Caro State hospital and the Mich State San. at Howell. The sale is August 23 the Pontiac State Sept. 21-22 and the Howell sale not yet set. These herds are the three finest in the state and are from them are in big demand all over Michigan. Many farmers question the wisdom of dispersing such herds.

These three institutions use huge quantities of milk. There have been many instances where active animal husbandry has speed recovery of patients at these places. The decision was reached to sell the herds after a special committee headed by Senator Bruce Clothier made an extensive examination. They found the Pontiac herd showed a \$10,000 loss last year and the Caro herd went \$249.43 in the red. No figures were given for the Howell institution beyond the statement the herd was too poor for effective dairying. Bookkeeping enters into the affair as the keep of all roads and non-farming lands are charged against the farming operation. There is also another big reason. If these three institutions were put out of the dairy business some big dairy or dairies would be able to latch on to a very lucrative business.

The Better Business Bureau of Detroit and Ann Arbor are warning their members to beware of persons or companies working a turn-of-racket. These companies offer to inspect and clean your furnace and after tearing it all apart claim to find vital defects in which would make it unsafe to operate. In some case claim your family is liable to die of gas poisoning if it is used. They recommend buying a new furnace. If you fail to fail for their racket they talk of leaving your furnace scattered over the cellar floor and you have to get someone else to put it together again.

One prominent turn-of-racket company has gained a not very enviable record for this sort of thing. We had an experience with them several years ago.

The Detroit Street Railway will put a bus in operation this week powered by bottled gas, the same that is used in stoves for cooking etc. This kind of power is said to be much more economical than gasoline power engines. The aforesaid railway is coming in for much criticism in the Detroit papers for its reported inefficiency and there are demands that it be sold to private operators. These people do not know what they are talking about. The city took over the road from the D. U. R., a private company, controlled mostly by Canadian stockholders. We lived in Detroit under the old D. U. R. control and later under the D. S. and there was little comparison.

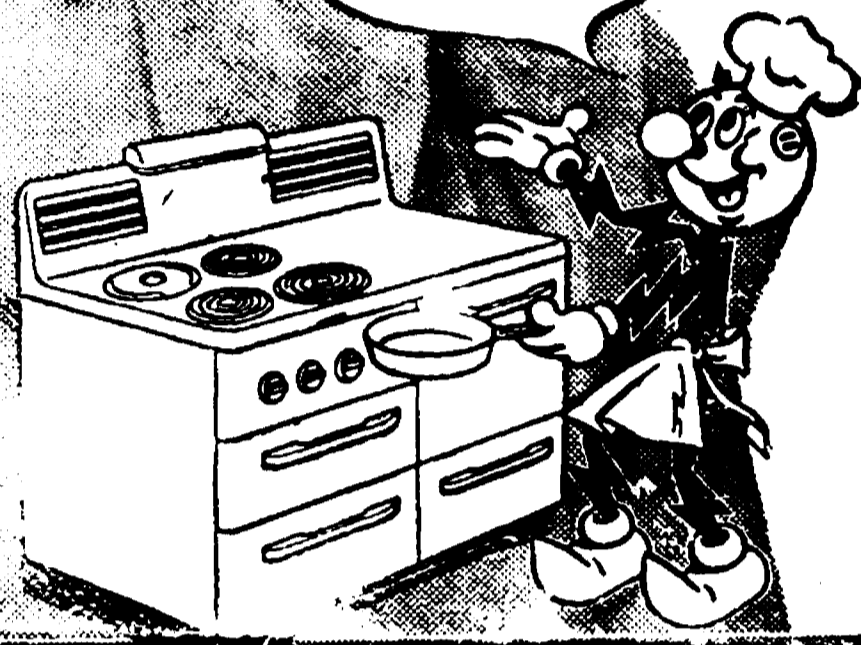
The D. U. R. did not have half the lines the city now operates, the service was poor and the equipment was outdated, they operated no buses and had twice the number of strikes the city ever had. Their biggest fault was their refusal to build lines or extensions unless they would show an immediate profit. For instance, in new subdivision territory an extension might not show a profit for a number of years until the area was built up. The D. U. R. refused to build these extensions. When the city took over they built them and took the loss until the population increased enough to show a profit. This explains why the city went in the road at times on the operation of the road. Under the D. U. R. this road extension would not have happened and the expansion of the city would have been retarded.

Gov. G. Mennen Williams is in favor of extending the Michigan Soldiers Bonus to veterans of the Korean War. There is still a balance of \$10,000,000 in the state bonus fund. Representative Potter of Michigan has introduced a bill in congress providing for a federal bonus for infantrymen fighting in Korea but for some reason the veterans organizations do not seem to favor it. At a meeting of these organizations in Michigan last week they asked that the bonus proposals be shelved for the time being. For some reason there seems to be a feel

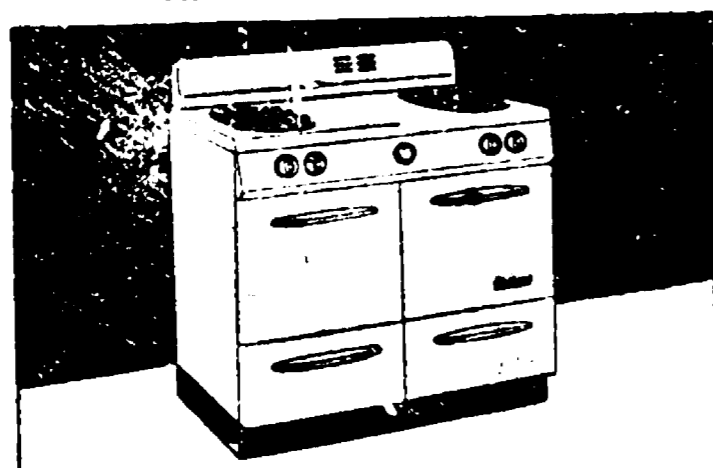
