Michigan Mirror

Defense needs in Mich. get top billing. At a special session last week the governor asked \$2,000,000 for civilian defense. The cost of a living blood bank is estimated at \$1,000,000. Minimum bomb destruction in Detroit would be 100,000 killed and 100,000 homeless according to Gen. Clyde Dougherty civil defense director. The Mich. National Guard needs 5 months training to be ready for combat according to Gen. Ralph Loveland, commander. With an estimated strength of 18,000 only 7,500 reported at Grayling for training.

The Dingell bill will make the state of Mich. \$100,000 richer this year and \$200,000 next year. This comes for fish research work.

Mich. police are being drafted into the army so fast many cities are asking deferment.

Any liquor licensee convicted of 3 serious charges will lose his license. A Detroit tavern was recently fined \$500 and closed for 30 days.

Auto makers are concerned about roads, with the car population at 12,000,000 the highways may not be able to handle them without more and better roads.

There is concern over the metal stock pile. Many mines are closed, abandoned or filled with water.

If the National Guard is called into service, plans are in the making to have the Home Guard step in. Former service men are preferred for this body.

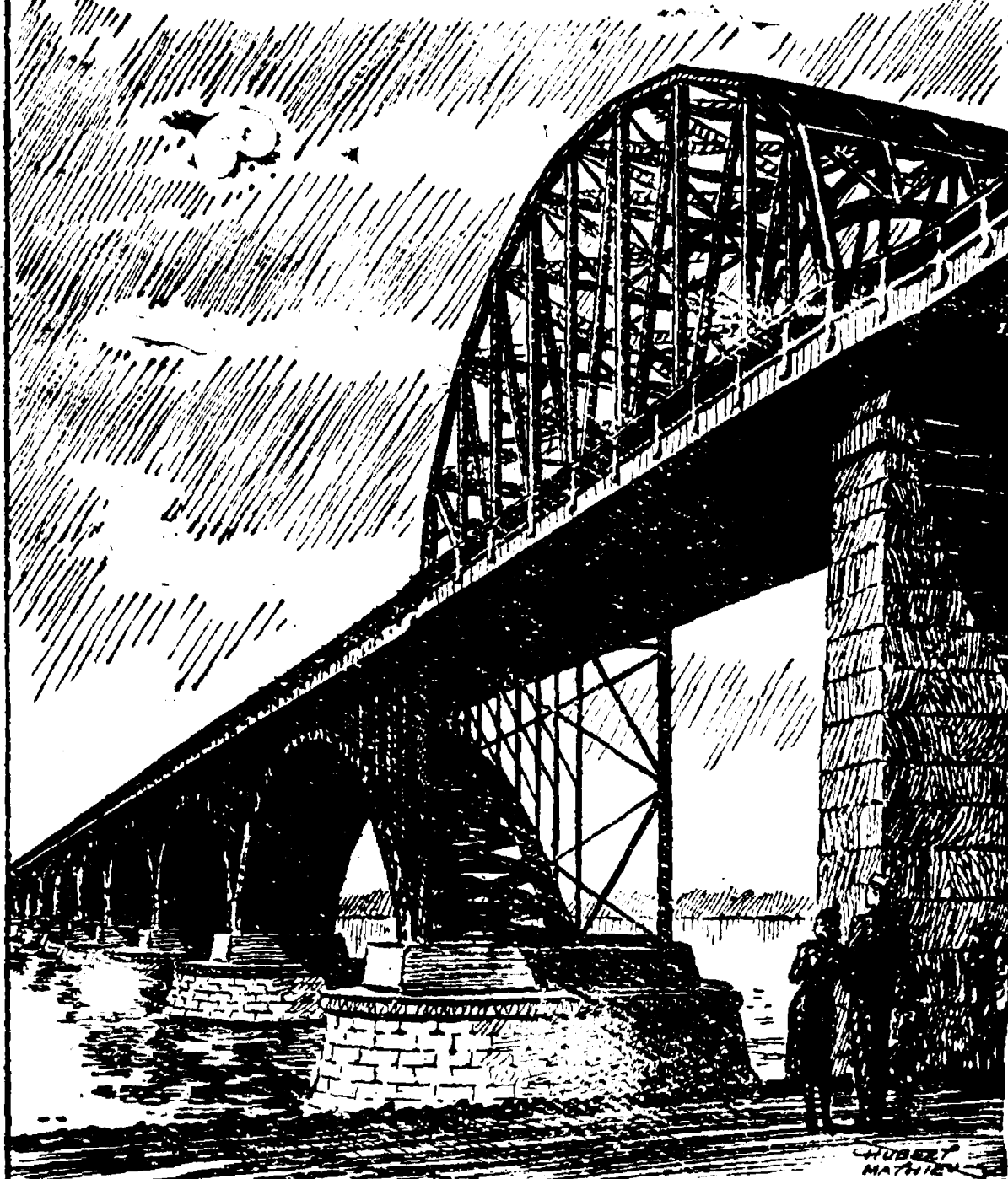

School Notes

SCHOOL REGISTRATION

Registration of Pinckney high school students in grades 9, 10, 11 and 12 will be held at the school on Friday, August 25 and Saturday, August 26 from 1:00 p. m. to 9 p. m.

All the schools in the Pinckney Community Schools system will open on Tuesday, Sept. 5, for a half day session. A teacher's meeting for all teachers in the system will be held at 1:30 on the opening day at the school in Pinckney.

The 4 school busses will start on the first day, taking the children home at 12:00.

All kindergarten children may enroll on Sept. 5. After the first day of school the kindergarten class will be divided into "morning and afternoon sessions. The children in town will attend the morning session and the children outside of town will be transported by the school for the afternoon session.

The hot-lunch program will probably start Sept. 11. Final notice will be given later.

FOOTBALL CANDIDATES

Football practice will start at 2:00 on Monday, Aug. 28. Each candidate should have his football shoes and practice jersey for the first session.

Other equipment will be given out on registration days. Physical examinations will be taken during the first week of practice and athletic insurance will be available if desired.

Pinckney will have an extremely light team this year as there is no player who weighs over 170 and the average is around 150 lbs. The backfield will be inexperienced and though some of the linemen had a little experience they will be quite small as compared to the opposition. The weight and experience of Joe Jeffreys, Richard Schmeider, Joe Clark, and Bill VanBlaricum will be greatly missed. No game has as yet been scheduled for Sept. 15 but there will be games on the next eight Fridays. The schedule will be printed later.

Current Comment

A new organization has sprung up in the 6th congressional district which has christened itself "The Fighting Republicans". Although Vern Brown, former Lt. Gov. who was retired to private life by Kim Staler in 1946, is the nominal head, the guiding genius seems to be Kit Clardy of Lansing, the vice president of the organization and candidate for congress who would retire Congressman Blackney to private life. But was held the seat since 1934, except for a 2 year intermission in 1936. A meeting was held last week on the Vern Brown farm at Mason attended by 200. Although many prominent Republicans were invited few attended. Sec. of State Fred Alger said he would come if he could be convinced the sole purpose of the organization was not to nominate Harry Kelly for governor. As he was not present apparently he was not convinced. Kelly was also absent but sent a telegram. The theme of the organization is that present Republican congressmen are too much on the "Me Too" order and should be replaced by Fighting Republicans of the Joe McCarthy order. Clardy is conducting an extensive campaign but Bill Blackney is in Washington and has done little or no work.

Several years ago a window in the Pinckney school quarter was broken and a colony of pigeons established itself there. They were unmolested for several years and increased rapidly. The state board of health ordered them removed as a health menace, claiming they were disease carriers. This was accomplished with a few rifles. The City of Detroit has its troubles with pigeons. In 1946 they became such a nuisance at the city hall they hired a man to get rid of them. This he did by trapping 1016 of them. Now they are back again and have also started to deface the new Veterans Memorial Building. The same man who did the job in 1946 is willing to do it again but wants \$1016. We wonder what these pigeons live on? Back in the horse and buggy days they were supposed to live on horse droppings but these have long since vanished to the limbo of forgotten things.

The resort business in Michigan has taken a beating this year. The sale of fishing licenses is 30 percent less than last year and state park attendance about 2000 off. There are many reasons for this. One is the weather. It has been a cool summer and the temperature was down to 30 a couple of weeks ago. Two families who went north about then told us they only stayed one night and came home as they nearly froze to death. Then work has picked up and many persons are working overtime. Building at the lakes has decreased due to the high price of material and the inability in some cases to get any.

Louis Bean, the only pollster who correctly predicted President Truman's victory in 1948 in his latest poll in Look magazine is the Republicans will make some gains this year but not enough to control either house. He says it will gain 3 senate seats and 25 to 30 house seats. He claims Sen. Bob Taft, Republican of Ohio, will lose and also Senators Scott Lucas of Illinois and Francis M. Pickens of Penn., both Democrats. Taft is the strongest conservative in the senate. He was the leading American Firster in the pre Pearl Harbor days.

The Korean war situation is unchanged and will be until enough infantry are landed there to take over and hold the conquered territory. A 100 plane assault slowed up the Communists advance last week but only for the time being as the planes go and come but hold no conquered terrain. In World War II Germany was bombed extensively for several years but the doughboys had to go in and mop up in order to win the final victory.

COMMANDER VOGEL KILLED

Commander Raymond Vogel, Jr. of Ann Arbor was killed in Korea Saturday when his plane crashed behind the Communist lines. He leaves a wife and 5 children who are in California.

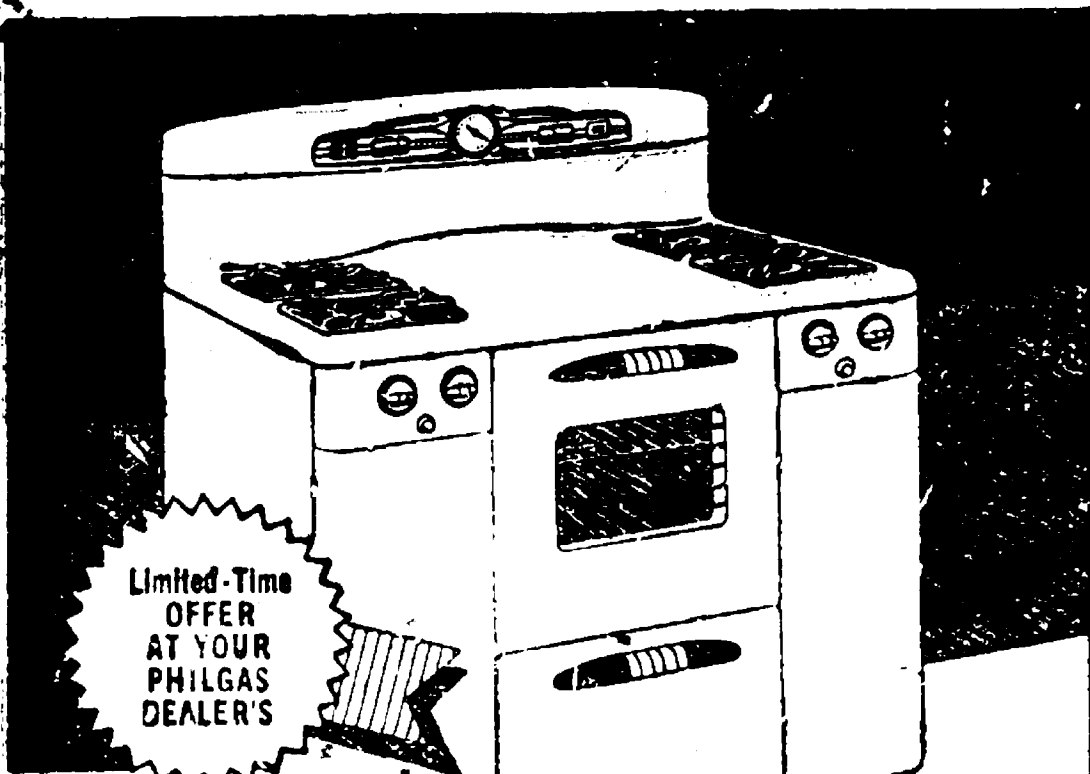

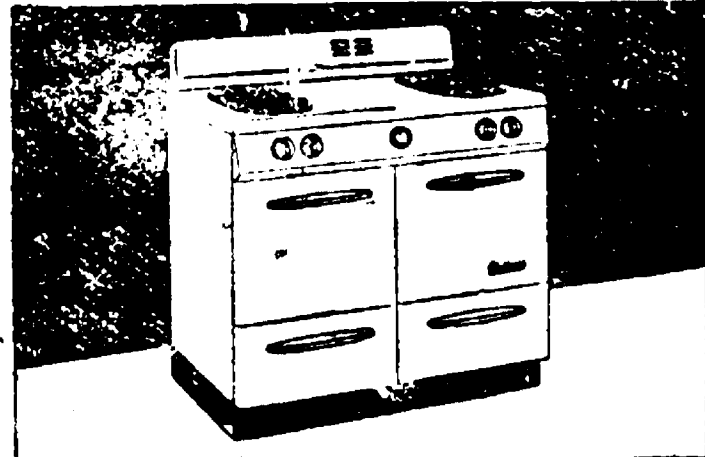

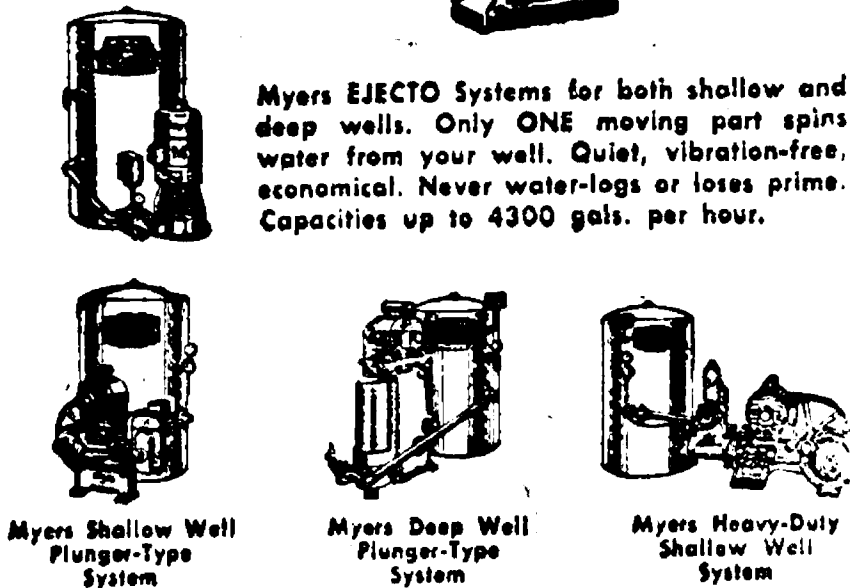

ELECTRIC POWER AVAILABLE

James W. Parker, president of the Detroit Edison Company says there is plenty of electric power available in Michigan's industrial heart to carry on the area's full share of the nation's new defense program. Limited manpower will be the chief factor. There will be as much power as can be used with every available man on the job. It will not be necessary to curb farm or residential use of electric power.
Even through new peaks of demand were reached in 1950, the company expansion has kept up with them.
Present capacity of the Detroit Edison Company is 1,500,000 kilowatts or 2,000,000 H. P. 200,000 were recently added at Trenton and 2 new generators at Conners Creek within a year will add 1,750,000. Construction will soon start on another project to add 250,000 kilowatts. Due to the Korean trouble 3 older generators slated for retirement will be retained.
The present Detroit Edison expansion program calls for 1,850,000 kilowatts in 1953, an increase of 750,000 since 1945.
A nationwide survey shows that electric power is geared to take care of the nation's needs. 80 percent of the nation's electric power is owned by investing companies whose systems were built by private capital.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Experimental rye plantings to provide food for deer have been started in 7 northern counties in the lower peninsula.
The 13th Mich. oil strike of the year has been made 10 miles east of Kalkaska at 2009 ft.
As a result of the federal Dineall bill becoming a law, Mich. will receive \$100,000 in the 1951-52 period for improving fishing.
Mich. is now using 250 prison inmates on improving Michigan state parks.
The state has purchased 2,100 more acres to add to its forest & recreation area. 187 acres are in the Waterloo area.
A headquarters and laboratory will be built at the Cuisinac game refuge, near Shingleton.
Texas has introduced conservation education in her schools.
Three new flood projects are being planned: Missaukee's Canon Creek, Higgins Lake State forest and Ewer's Lake, Dansville. 573 acres will be flooded at a cost of \$23,000.
