

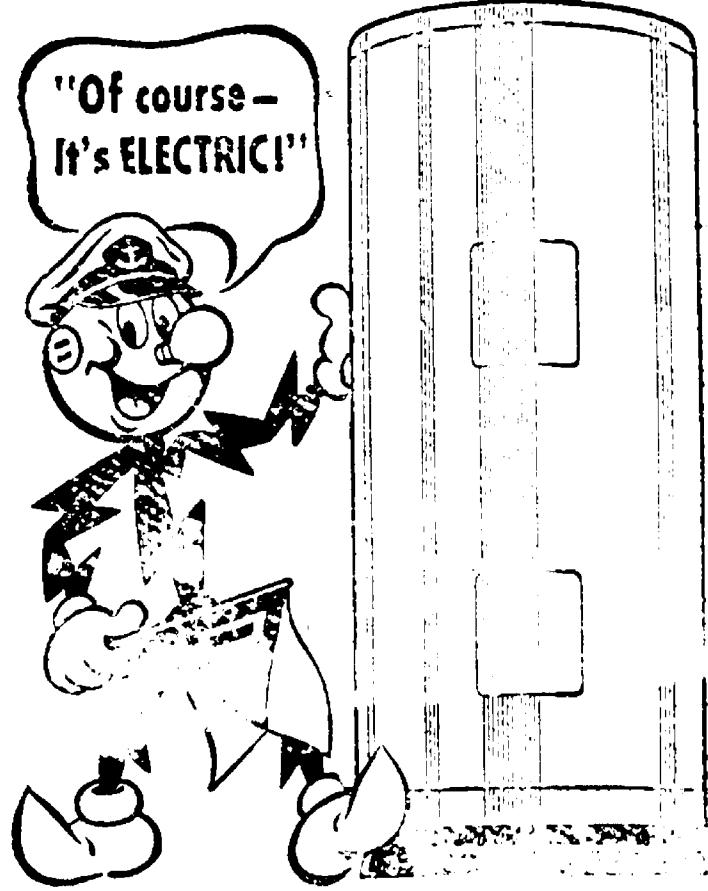

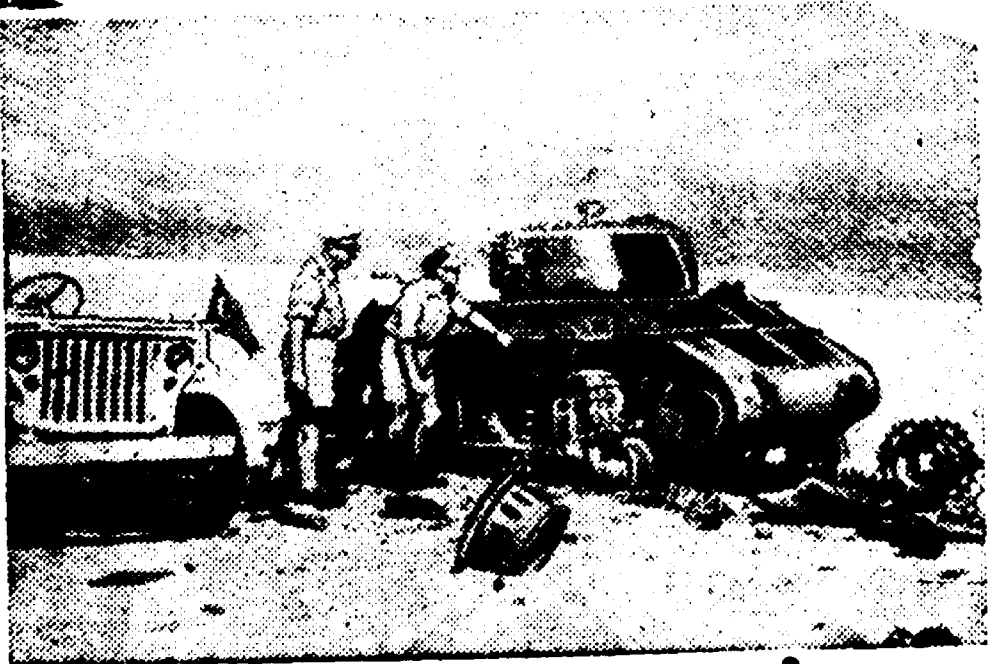

### Need Well-Balanced Nutrient Supply to Maintain High Yields

MAINTAINING high crop yields year after year depends on getting and keeping a well-balanced supply of nutrients in a soil well conditioned with organic matter, declared the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee in a recent statement.

"No one element is the sole answer to high production over extended periods," says the statement. "It is true that some soil for a time gives startling responses to one element. But the reason for this is that such soil is deficient in that one element, while well stocked with others."

"Take, for instance, a soil lacking in potash. As soon as potash is added, the crop response is tremendous. But continued additions of potash alone will soon pull down

the available supply of nitrogen, phosphate and other nutrient elements. When that happens there will be no response from potash until these other elements are added.

"All this emphasizes the fact that an adequate, well-balanced nutrient level is essential to continued high crop production. But for the top in profitable production this high mineral nutrient level must be coupled with practices that give: 1—A plentiful stock of organic matter to give the soil good condition and promote the maximum use of nutrients; 2—Good drainage to save essential moisture and draw off excess water; 3—Adequate soil ventilation to provide crop roots with all the oxygen they need.

"Farmers can condition their soil by the use of lime to provide needed calcium and overcome acidity, the use of good rotations and well-fertilized deep-rooted legumes to increase and maintain organic matter supplies."

### Organic Matter and Fertilizer Are Top Crop Building Team

CHICAGO—Organic matter gives farm soil the "get up and go" to produce bigger yields and higher quality crops, the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee points out.

As organic matter rots, it releases elements needed for feeding crops. During the decomposition process, favorable conditions are produced for making available the plant nutrients contained in soil minerals, says a statement issued by the committee.

But organic matter alone cannot do the whole job of giving you big yields and high quality crops, the statement adds. It needs to be reinforced by commercial fertilizer.

Prof. Emil Truog, University of Wisconsin agronomist, recently declared: "To say—as does the old-time school—that chemical fertilizer such as phosphate and potash should not be used—is pure bunkum. The fertilizers are needed to make up the inevitable lack of native elements and organic matter alone cannot

Prof. Truog says that on other small areas, you can maintain the fertility and organic matter supply by the use of composts and animal manures. But he emphasizes that such practices are not feasible for large farm acreages. It is impossible, he says, to prepare and apply the enormous amounts of compost that would be needed for the average farm.

On such big farm acreages, a good crop rotation will provide the needed organic matter. This can be supplied in the form of plowed-under deep-rooted legumes, crop residues, stubble, stalks and roots and barnyard-manure. Prof. Truog says all that is necessary to make the system work is the proper use of lime and fertilizer containing phosphorus and potash and sometimes nitrogen. The key to the organic matter and nitrogen problem he adds, is high lime and mineral fertility. This assures a thick, luxuriant stand of superior deep-rooted legumes such as alfalfa and the clovers.



### BUSHEL-BOOSTING BARLEY—

New stiff-strawed grain like this experimental barley variety (right) can take heavier amounts of plant food without lodging. Its "ramrod" stiff straw will support all the weight of heavy, fully-developed, bushel-building heads. Straw of variety at left is too weak to hold up heads of well-fertilized barley crop. Straw broke down and barley lodged, resulting in much lower crop yield. Clinton, Benton and Eaton oats are new varieties that "take" heavier amounts of plant food and yield more bushels per acre.

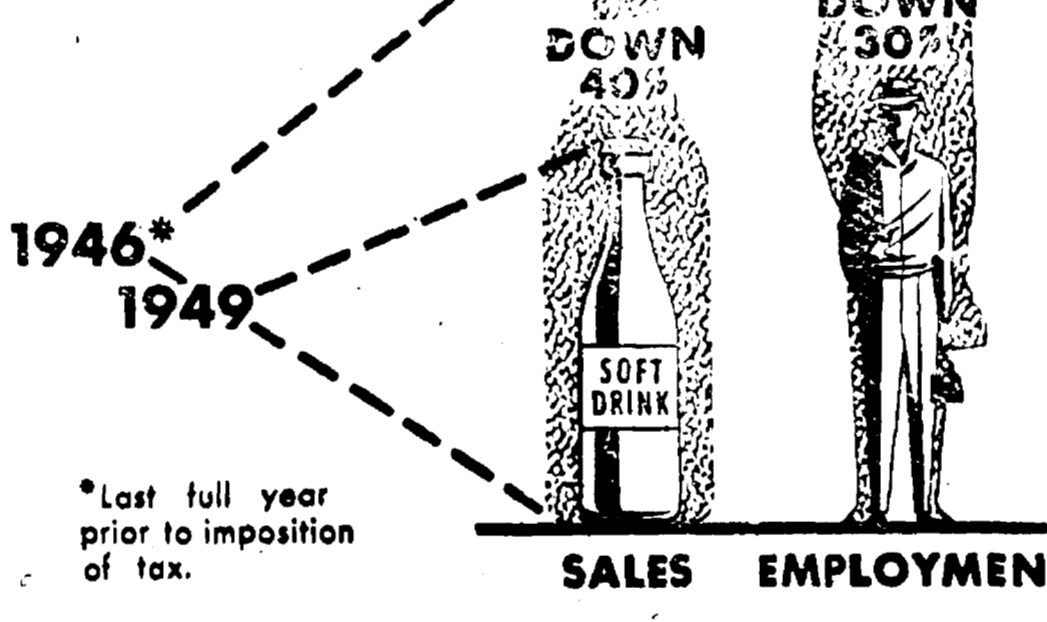

Resolution of the Pennsylvania Soft Drink Industry Law was demanded recently by the Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor which said the tax had increased unemployment and slowed the soft drink industry's business by more than 40 percent.

The industry and protesters in Pennsylvania all want to see the industry's volume of business. The resolution passed at the Federation's convention fully at the time the industry made three years ago.

The resolution said, in part: "The soft drink tax is equivalent to twenty percent of the price of a soft

which declared also that the names of members of the Pennsylvania Legislature who do or do not pledge themselves to work and vote for repeal would be recorded by representatives of the Convention.

Neutral observers termed the action of the powerful labor group new evidence of labor's interest in a healthy industrial economy, since labor itself had called for repeal of a tax which had been found harmful to labor and industry alike. Top officers of Local 249, the Teamsters Union, signed the repeal resolution. They were headed by President Thomas T. Fagan, Vice President Melvin Humphry and Secretary Treasurer Scott F. Marshall, all of Pittsburgh.

Prior to enactment of the tax measure on May 14, 1947, representatives of

drink and amounts to four times the profit on a case of twenty-four bottles. "It is economically impossible for the bottler or the merchant to absorb the tax, or to pass the same on to the consumer as an increase in the selling prices.

"The soft drink industry is built on volume of sales. The business of the industry has reduced in volume by more than 40 percent, which has resulted in a reduction of profits. A concomitant or corresponding result thereof has been the failure of bottling businesses in many cases, and the reduction in the working force in other cases. In either event, teamsters and other craftsmen in the bottling industry have lost their employment or their earnings have been materially affected or reduced."
