## Michigan Mirror

Base ball, War and Politics crowded the front page last week.

This year saw the biggest primary election vote since 1940... 900,000 voted.

In the meantime both sides are lining up for the November struggle with the Republicans recognizing the danger of the heavy Democrat primary vote.

When the new legislature convenes next Jan. 1 there will be 42 changes. Many were not candidates for reelection.

Housewives are getting a surprise in the climbing prices of meat and eggs. The August egg production was the highest on record.

Sugar may go down as European and Cuban sugar crops broke all records this year.

Farmers are also in the spotlight this over the tight on color ed oleo.

So far half the Michigan men called by the draft have been rejected. Of 18,384 examined so far, 9,502 were rejected.

Draftees can forget their bills while in the service. They can not even be prosecuted for income tax evasion nor can their families be evicted for nonpayment of rent.

Michiganers are saving money. Bank deposits are 5 percent higher than last year with five billion dollars on deposit.

War has come to Michigan. The Cadillac and Ford Motor Companies both have war orders.

The U. S. Labor Dept. is urging industry to use physically handicapped workers on account of the labor shortage.

A committee has been formed to push the states \$65,000,000 bond issue to build mental and TB hospitals.

## Conservation

The 20 day ruffed grouse season in the upper peninsula to open Oct. 1. It is expected to draw 40,000 hunters. Last year some 23,000 birds were bagged. The lower peninsula season opens Oct. 15. The bag limit is 6 birds.

Three forest fires last week damaged 5 acres. The bow and arrow hunters are all set for Oct. 1. In 1947 one in 20 got deer, in 1948 one in 17 and last year one in 14.

175,000 acres of state owned land is open to bow and arrow hunters.

Hunters getting 1950 licenses should get a copy of the game law digest, available at places where licenses are sold.

5,296 more acres have been purchased by the conservation dept., including 400 acres in Unadilla, Livingston county. Also 3,721 feet of lake frontage.

A 30 lb. great northern pike was caught during netting operations on Nevins Lake, Montcalm county. Largest pike on record was taken in Gratiot Lake in 1944 weighing 32 lbs. These fish were about 10 years old.

11,000 hunters have applied for licenses to hunt deer in the special season in December.

Michigan will receive \$406,216 under the Pittman-Robertson Act or wild life restoration projects.

Fishermen are asked to turn in the pocket size catch calendar they received during the trout season to the conservation dept. 85 deer were counted in one square mile in Crawford county county recently.

At least a dozen bow and arrow hunters expect to go north over the week end for deer.

Among them are L.L. Louis and Gerald Swarthout, Claude and Harold Swarthout, Hockey Swarthout, Howard Read, Merlin Lavey, Marion Shirey and Norman Miller. They go to Douglas Lake and Lovells.

## ASK ASSESSMENT DISTRICT

Marshall Guidot of Detroit, president of the Big & Little Portage Lake Ass'n. appeared before a joint meeting of representatives of the boards of supervisors of Livingston and Washtenaw counties and asked that a special assessment district be set up to raise funds to install flood controls at Portage lakes. A survey has been made and it is estimated it will cost \$17,000 to dredge out 2 miles of the Huron river where a dam will be built. Judge Beckey set the lake level but no funds has stalled the project and the water is way over the level of the present time. Flood waters at the lakes every spring do many thousands of dollars worth of damage.

Mr. Guidot promised if the district was set up to start dredging operations in Oct. The U. S. Army Engineers are making a flood survey of the lake but their report will not be ready until 1951.

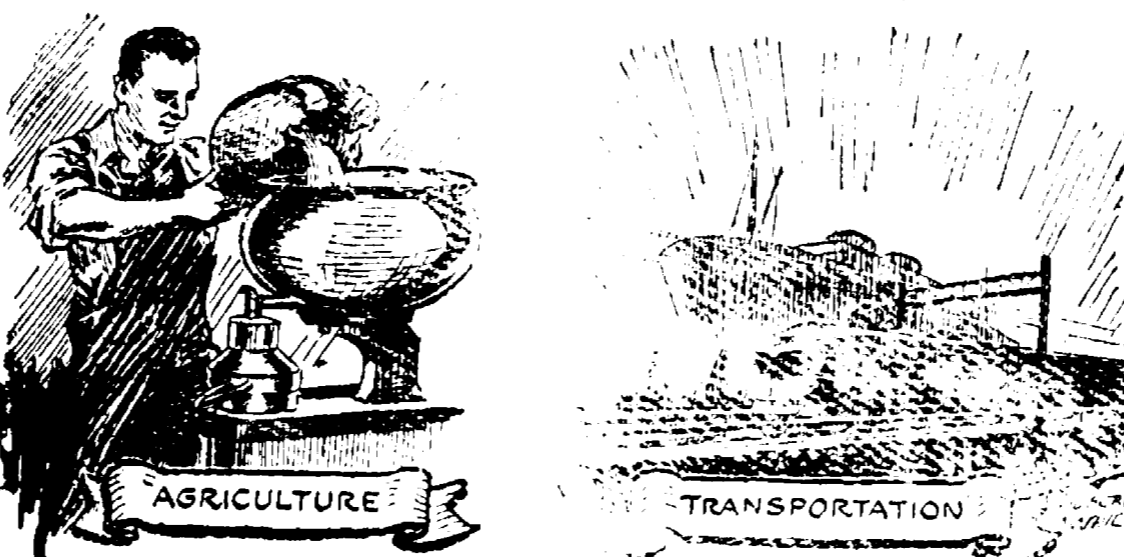

## Current Comment

Probably more Pinckney citizens have seen the Detroit Tigers play ball this year than in any other previous year. The old saying "All the World Loves a Winner" was never better exemplified. It they win the American League championship it is probable that Pinckney will be well represented at the world series. A notice went out last Tuesday from the Detroit Base Ball Co. that no more orders for world series tickets would be accepted, all seats for the three games to be played in Detroit, if they win the pennant, had been sold. As the parks seats about 56,000 and extra seats are always put up for a world series. This means about 180,000 seats sold. Quite a few Pinckneyites got their orders in before the deadline. In the past industrial firms have purchased blocks of tickets and resold them to employees and customers. We remember one series we attended we got our tickets via a wholesale drug firm. Detroit is not in yet and has suffered reverses but the whole state is pulling for them to cop.

The legislature last week in their hurry to adjourn adopted a stopgap blood bank program and instead of the million and a half asked by the civilian defense committee, appropriated \$300,000. It also defeated the centralized control part of the request where the state board of health would do the blood typing and provided it must be done by county blood banks, hospitals and the Red Cross. Our mind one vital defect in all blood banks is that the matter of obtaining a blood supply is left too much to chance. So far most of the blood comes from volunteers. In such places as Ann Arbor this works a hardship on civic and fraternal organization for the person needing blood is a member of such an organization, it is invariably applied to to give blood. It would seem that a system could be worked out whereby donors could be paid and the blood bank established on a permanent foundation.

Although Big Ten football games will not be televised into this time this fall, they will be televised into certain theatres where by buying a ticket you may see the game play by play. The system is different and cannot be received in the homes. Broadcasting machinery for it is now being installed at the Michigan stadium. The attendance at Big Ten games showed a decrease last year and rightly or wrongly television is blamed.

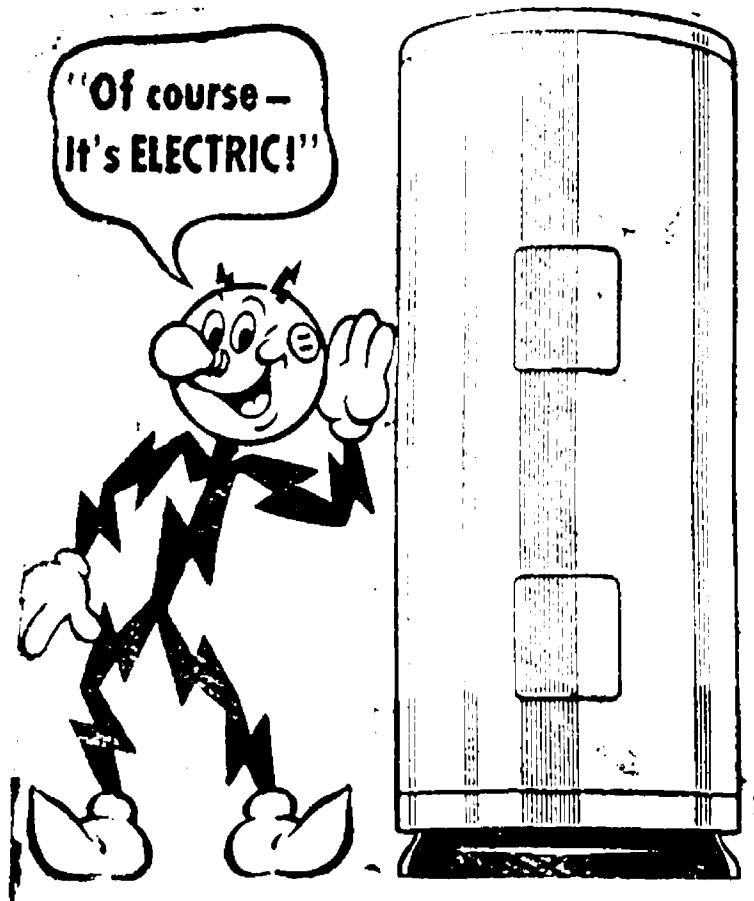
The huge marble monuments erected in parks and cemeteries after the civil war and later in honor of war veterans seems to be gone out of style and now it is the custom to dedicate parks and athletic fields in the honor of the war heroes. The most famous of these is probably Soldiers Field, the hero's of World War I. After World War II, hundreds of lighted athletic fields were installed and a great number of them were dedicated to the war veterans. In Detroit a great war memorial building was dedicated. Last Thursday a five acre park in Detroit was dedicated in honor of Pvt. John Marruso, the first Detroit boy to lose his life in the Korean affair. This was rather a method of making amends as when Marruso's body was sent back to Detroit no veteran's organization could be found to give him a military funeral. There was a flurry of misunderstanding and his funeral was on the makeshift order.

The attendance was light at the football game here last Friday night. There were almost as many Morenci fans there as there were Pinckney. This is not as it should be. The people have about \$10,000 invested in the lighted field and should make use of it. Of course Pinckney's athletic prowess is no what it was two years ago when the 4200 lb horseman Don Clark Westly, Premier, Gerry Clark and Dick Schneider performed in the line and Bob Amburcey, Bob Darrow, Tom Goode, Jerry Heath and Joe Jeffrey performed in the backfield. All teams have their up and downs. It has happened in Pinckney before but they always come back and will this time.
