Michigan Mirror

The twang of the bow struck started a 36 day hunting season October 1.

Mich. Democrats are striving for harmony. They have not won an off year election since 1914 when Woodbridge N. Ferris beat Chase S. Osborn. The vote in off year elections is light.

The trances between Harry Kelly and Arthur Summerfield at the recent Republican convention appears to have subsided for the time at least.

The ranks of the unemployed are dwindling to nothing. State labor experts forecast the worst labor shortage since 1943.

Building is slowing to a standstill. Those who waited for it, er costs have given up. The war effort is expected to take much essential material.

Auto production has reached a screaming pitch. Records are being broken right and left. Wage increases are being granted so the harvest will not be disturbed. The only worry is that the war production may take enough material from them to hurt.

Marriages have increased 100 percent since the Korean affair.

War bond redemptions increased in Sept., due to inflation and decreased buying power.

Money. With military spending, pledged people are turning to goods instead of savings.

Republican legislators expect sales taxes to go high enough to pay off the deficit and do away with the demand for any new taxes.

THE DEMOCRAT CONVENTION

The Democrat state convention went off very peacefully at Grand Rapids last week in contrast to the Republican convention the week before which was marked by a struggle for control between Harry Kelly and Arthur Summerfield. Lloyd Hanson of Pinckney was at the convention Friday and Saturday.

The convention let Gov. Williams name his own ticket. The ticket is Phillip Hart of Birmingham, secretary of state, Maurice Eveland of Mayville, Treasurer, Nicholas Roth, attorney general, Margaret Price, Ann Arbor, auditor general, John Connolly of Detroit was named as governor in the primary. The Detroit Free Press calls the ticket a piped. Gov. Williams is heir to the Williams soap fortune. Hart and Connolly are nephews of Walter O. Briggs, Detroit industrialist and base ball millionaire, and Mrs. Price wife of a Kaiser-Frazier vice president. Eveland is state banking commissioner and has long been a power in banking circles. Roth is the only one who came up from the ranks being a Hungarian emigrant's son and self made.

A telegram was read from National Committeeman Fitzgerald stating he would support the Democrat ticket.

Conservation

The small game season opens in the upper peninsula Oct. 1 and the lower Oct. 15. Last year 203 people were killed during the hunting season.

Lower Michigan water levels have declined for the 5th successive month. The drop from August to Sept. was 27 of a ft.

Fall planting of 105,000 trees and shrubs in 15 southern Michigan state parks starts early on Oct. Pinckney, Brighton and Waterloo parks are included in the list. The work will be done by prison labor. 25,000 will be white cedar.

James Wilkinson has been appointed chief of conservation activities south of the Bay City-Muskegon line. He succeeds Paul Hickie who resigned to go to Denver, Colorado to direct the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Bureau. Wilkinson, 41, is a graduate of Evansville college and Michigan State College.

The conservation dept. finished a survey on 100 lakes in the lower and upper peninsula. The object is to determine potential trout lakes. Also the survival of small mouthed bass released from airplanes.

With big forest fires raging in Canada, Michigan hit the lowest figure last week with 6 acres burned over by 2 fires.

47 Williamson Plant Hunting Clubs have been approved covering 164,000 acres. 18 of these clubs are in Kent, Clinton and Shiawassee counties.

Bounty payments increased in August with 262 coyotes, 77 bob cats and 2 wolves taken.

Filling in pike spawning marshes has decreased pike production. Suit has been started at Osseo Lake against property owners who filled in marshes to increase frontage. Predatory fish consume many young pike with yellow perch being the worst offenders.

A FEW UPSETS

There were several upsets last week. The first was the unexpected defeat of Joe Louis. Of course Joe was bound to get his come day but Ezzard Charles was not considered good enough to do the job. Father Time had caught up with Louis and it was not how good Charles was but how bad Joe was.

For the first time in 15 years University of Michigan lost to Michigan State. The latter already had a game under their belt and were smoother and better organized than Michigan.

The Detroit Tigers ran out of gas and lost the American League pennant after leading most of the year. Their pitching was good enough and most of the games they lost by one run the last month. Their hitters fell down and Messrs Kell, Wirtz, Evers and Groth did not bat in enough runs to put in your eye the last month. They did not have what it takes. The present Tiger team does not rank with other Tiger championship teams.

The Philadelphia Phillies showed they had the right stuff Sunday when they beat Brooklyn for the title.

NEW GENERATING PLANT

The Detroit Edison Co. has announced plans to build a new \$400,000 H. P. electric generating plant on the St. Clair River between Marine City and St. Clair. Paul W. Thompson, vice pres. in charge of engineering, says the cost of the new plant together with lines, facilities, transmission and distribution will run to more than \$35,000,000. Construction will start in December. It will be known as the St. Clair plant. Building a new plant instead of installing new equipment will allow the company to still use the old generators in stock. The four Detroit plants are strung out from Trenton to Port Huron over a 65 mile sector. The new plant not be completed until 1953. The boilers will be fired with pulverized coal. Site of the new plant is a 453 acre tract flanking St. Clair river about 50 miles from Detroit. It has 2,000 ft. of river frontage and facilities for shipping by both water and rail.

Notes of the Game

Although Pinckney showed some improvement in the game at Brighton Friday they still lost by a good sized score. 26 to 0. Poor tackling and lack of a good ball carrier who can gain consistently is their principal weakness. In the Brighton game the Pinckney backfield made most of the tackles after Brighton had made gains.

The first Pinckney touchdown was a gift. They got the Pinckney kickoff near the 20 yd. line. On the first play Wisser ran 90 yds. for a touchdown, although at least 6 Pinckney players laid hands on him. The second Brighton touchdown was scored by Prieskorn after a series of line plays. Wisser kicked goal, 13 to 0 was the score at the half.

Brighton also got 13 points the second half, one by Wisser through the line and one by Price who caught a pass. Wisser kicked one goal and missed the other.

Pinckney got 7 first downs but were never in scoring territory. The first downs were on short passes caught by Albert Mroczka and thrown by John Paul Ware. On long ones they had no luck. Pinckney's punting was better and Ware got good distance on his kicks.

Brighton had a heavier team than Pinckney but drew numerous penalties which slowed them up.

Pinckney plays Manchester there next Friday night.

Current Comment

The war threat has boosted the marriage license business. This usually holds true in all such situations. Since August 1, 1950, there have been 2,000 marriage applications in Michigan. The average number of marriages per month have jumped from 2,000 to 6,000. The peak was June when 7,008 were issued. This is the first upward swing since 1946. There is always an unfortunate aftermath to these war marriages for invariably they are followed by a big increase in divorces. This increase has been marked since the late war and was only getting back to normal.

Michigan's celebrated state Holstein cattle herds are apparently doomed as the legislature at its last session refused to appropriate any money for them to carry on. The Caro state hospital herd has already been sold and the Pontiac state hospital and Michigan State Sanitarium herds are next to go. Pontiac has 200 head and Sanitarium 130. They will be sold at Lapere on Nov. 10. The colored gentleman in the woodpile seems to be that business interests are against state competition in any form and determined to kill it off. At a recent meeting of the Washtenaw board of supervisors a resolution was introduced to discontinue dairying and farming at the county infirmary. A committee was appointed to report. Livingston county sold the county farm some years ago and sold their dairy herd.

We read that the Washtenaw county board of supervisors has appropriated \$60,000 to repair their ancient courthouse. It is old and has been condemned but for the past 25 years all attempts to get a new one have failed. A bond issue to build one once passed but a law was found in it. Then a split developed as the township in the east part of the county wanted the new courthouse built near the county infirmary. The board tied one on a choice of a site and then approved the present site whereupon the voters defeated the bond issue to build it. Until a compromise is effected there will be no new courthouse.

Although about 50 percent of men called for army induction have been rejected it is not for physical reasons but for mental ones in filling out the questionair. This is a new angle as according to G. I. in the last war there were many recruits who could not read or write and many had never worn shoes until they got in the army. Draft officials say that as we are not technically at war they are only taking the best of the draftees.

The weirdest story of the year come from Miami, Florida, where 13 telephone girls are said to have stolen \$100,000 from the telephone company in nickels, dimes and quarters. They are called the "brassier brigade" as that is the way the money was smuggled out. The county prosecutor expects to start proceedings against the girls and the company announces suit to recover the money. All 13 girls have been released on writ of habeas corpus.

Two Michigan congressmen who were not candidates for reelection will be retired on comfortable pensions. Congressman Minchener of the Second District will receive \$6,000 a year. Congressman Engle will get between \$3,500 and \$4,000 a year. Engle is just past 62 years old, the age at which pensions are paid.

Most colleges report a decrease in enrollment. Among them are University of Michigan and Michigan State. This is due to the loss of G. I. students who have finished their courses. The decrease is welcomed by college authorities as the G. I. students crowded their facilities to the utmost.

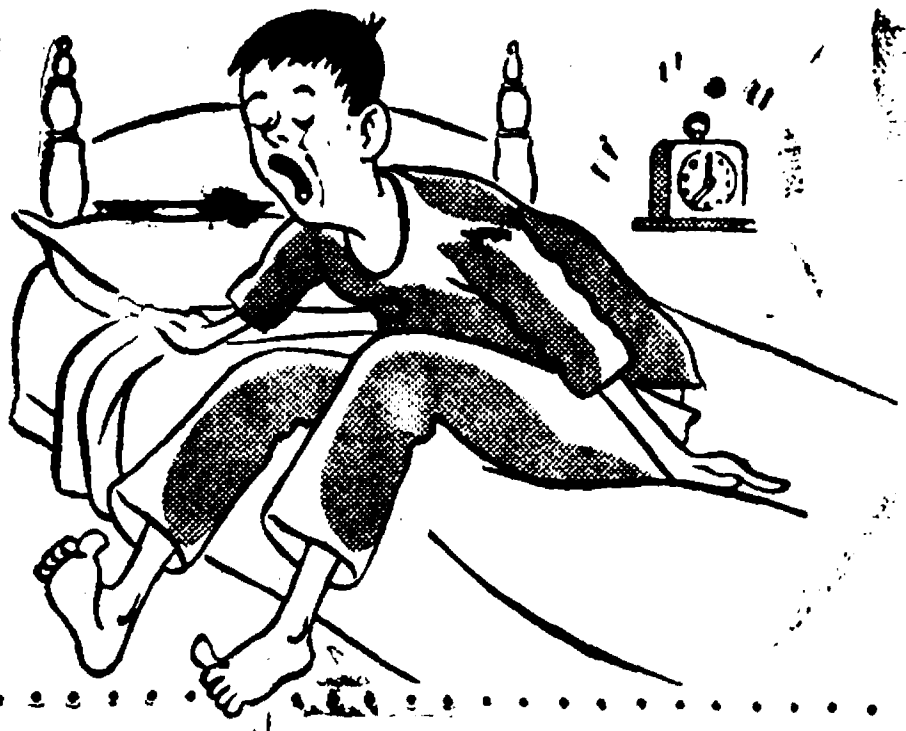

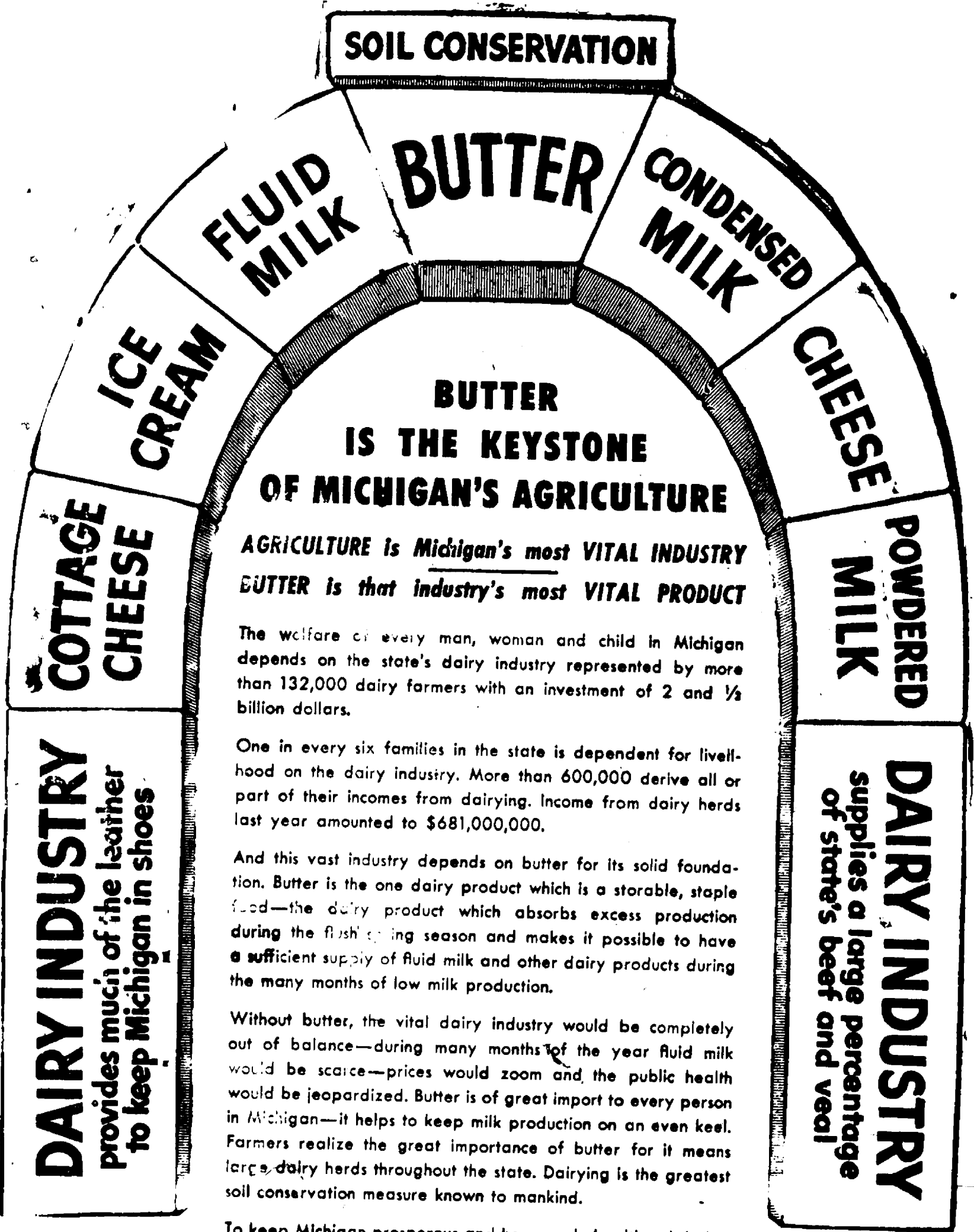

Without butter, the vital dairy industry would be completely out of balance—during many months of the year fluid milk would be scarce—prices would zoom and the public health would be jeopardized. Butter is of great import to every person in Michigan—it helps to keep milk production on an even keel. Farmers realize the great importance of butter for it means large dairy herds throughout the state. Dairying is the greatest soil conservation measure known to mankind.

To keep Michigan prosperous and her people healthy, dairying must be maintained—milk provides one-fourth of all of our food. There is little wonder that thinking people want to protect the butter market against imitators who would help destroy Michigan's greatest industry for the sake of profit to themselves. And those who seek to wreck this state's dairy business for the most part have no interest in Michigan except to take her money away. Michigan is prosperous and a wonderful state in which to live largely because of her excellent dairy herds and unsurpassed abundant supply of milk.

Michigan's dairy industry has grown up with the state—it can be given a mortal blow over night by letting selfish imitators destroy the KEystone of the industry—THE BUTTER MARKET.
