The Democrats and Republicans are increasing activities in the campaign in the final two weeks.

The Democrats are presenting themselves as the liberal party and the Republicans as the reactionary party while the Republicans claim labor and the working people have taken over the Democrat party.

Another crow in the political pie is reapportionment. The census shows a big growth for the cities, they demand more senators and state representatives as the constitution provides. The Republican legislature would by pass this and reapportion according to area and not population.

There is an acute nursing shortage which will be increased by war needs. The present 300,000 nurses are not enough for peace time needs.

The doctor draft is imminent. The state medical society has asked all doctors who got their training at government expense during World War II to volunteer.

With the Korean war outlook improving, emphasis has dropped on civilian defense and little has been accomplished.

County Roads

The consensus of opinion around here is that the Livingston county road commission is shifting the southern part of the county. The entire membership of the board is from the Howell and Fowlerville section and most of the improvements are made there. There are two pieces of road which have been promised for years but on which no action has been started. They are the roads on E M-36 through Patsyville to the Chilson Rd. and the road from Hilland to Patterson Lake & game preserve. Both are much travelled and in poor shape. The road through Patsyville is a direct road to Hilland. Both should be back topped. The trouble is the southern part of the county has no representative on the county road commission. The same situation existed some years ago. At that time Elda Kuhn, a Democrat on the county road commission term supervisors was Republican.

However, the board refused to nominate a man from the southern part of the county and the supervisors of 3 townships in the southern part of the county who were Republican voted for Kuhn. This continued for a couple of years until the board finally gave in and nominated Claude Taylor of Green Oak who was elected. This section got Tom and Hiland Lake roads blacktopped. However Taylor is no longer on the board and once more the southern part of the county is forgotten.

CONSERVATION NOTES

158,802 acres of upriver state land was leased for oil and gas last week by 33 oil companies independent operators. They paid the state \$277,886. The average bid was \$1.80 per acre. The Brazos Oil Company, Texas, leased 74,800 acres and the Carter Oil Co., Grand Rapids 29,242 acres. Great Lakes water levels dropped in September except Lake Michigan which remained the same.

Wayne and Oakland counties are not closed to hunting this year. Three townships in Wayne: Dearborn, Redford and Grosse Ile and 2 in Oakland: Bloomfield and Southfield were closed by the legislature.

Current Comment

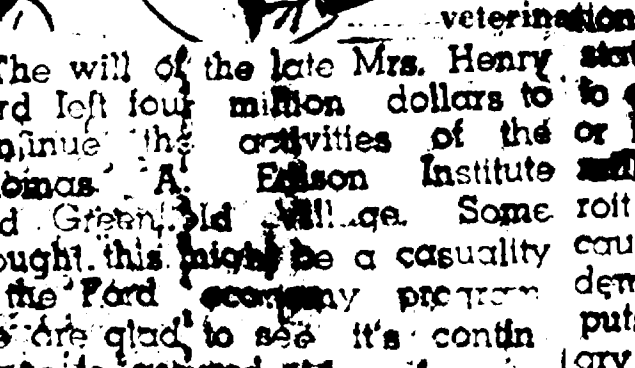

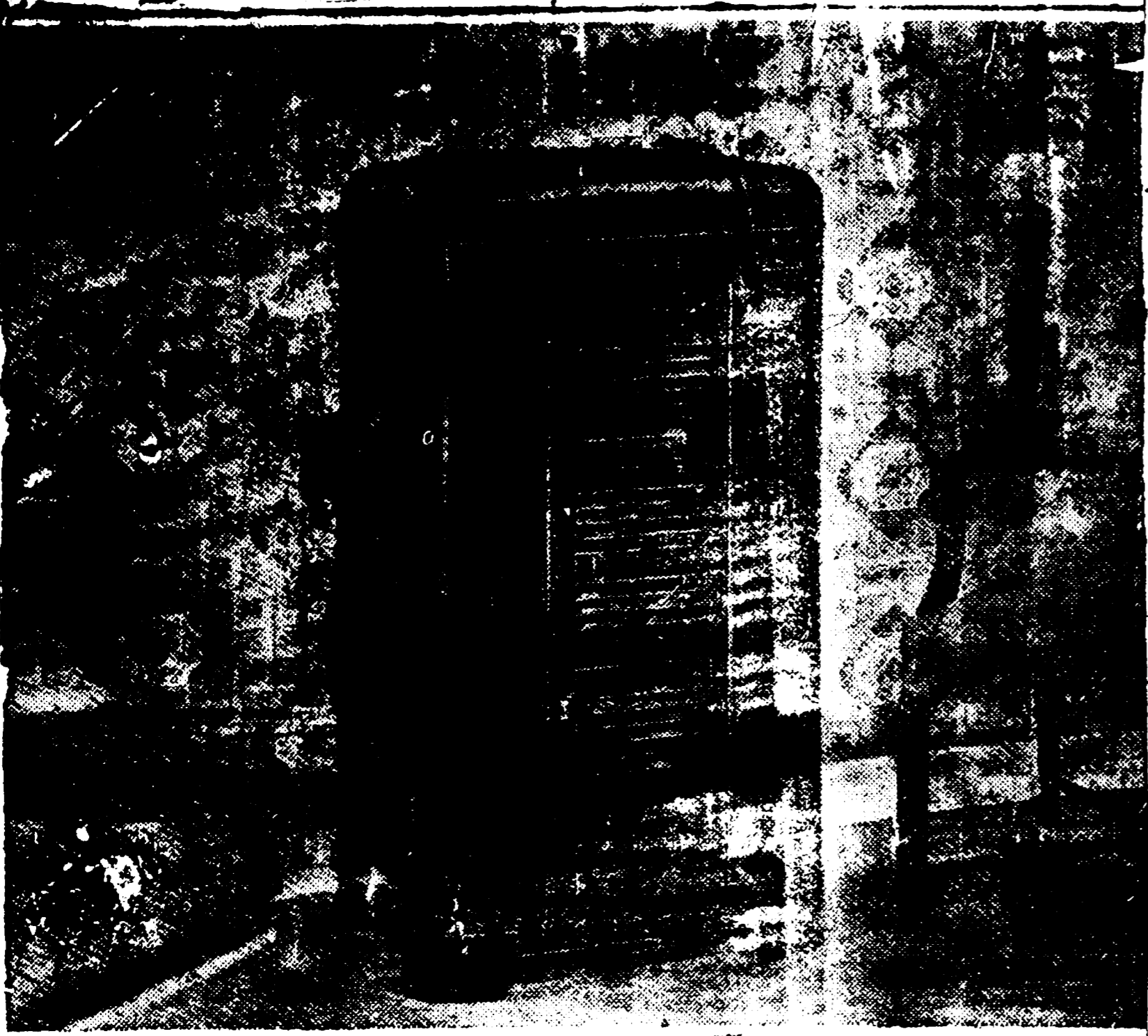
Pres. Truman spent a busy week end last week. He flew to Missouri to see his sister, installed as Grand Worthy Matron of the Missouri Grand Chapter, O. E. S. The president himself is a past grand master of the Grand Masonic Lodge of Missouri and a 33rd Degree Mason. From there he flew to the South Pacific to meet Gen. Douglas MacArthur. He has never seen the general as the latter has not been in this country since 1937. His critics decry this meeting and say the president is trying to grab off some of the glory that has fallen on MacArthur since his victory in Korea. The general is the darling of the Hearst papers and in industry in general although few G.I.s that we talked to were enthusiastic about him. We often wondered why his picture is always taken wearing those blue goggles.

We do not follow Harry Kelly's line of reasoning when he blasted the C. I. O. last week for registering voters. He claimed that the C. I. O. members were being paid so much per head for registering voters. According to our way of thinking anything which increases the number of voters should be commended and not condemned. In the recent primary in Putnam only 160 people voted. In the 1948 election over 300 did. The voting in off year election is usually very light and this year will probably be no exception. Gus Schoelle, head of the C. I. O. denied that the registration workers are being paid. He said previous to the organization of ADA only 15 percent of the factory workers voted. Through the efforts of the ADA this has been raised to 30 percent.

We are unable to get the gist of the argument over the sale of colored oleo. At the present time you can buy all the oleo served by you want to but it must be un-phones colored. We suppose the assumption is that under the present status the housewife is too lazy to color oleo. In this section little or no butter is made to sell. The milk is sold in fluid state to D. D. roit markets. Oleo is not the cause for the decline in butter demand. It is the high price that puts it out of reach of the ordinary person. 32 states have now repealed the tax on colored oleo.

This continued for a couple of years until the board finally nominated and nominated Claude Taylor of Green Oak who was elected. The section got Tom Kuhn and Hilland roads blacktopped. However, Taylor is no longer on the board and once more the southern part of the county is forgotten.

Current Comment

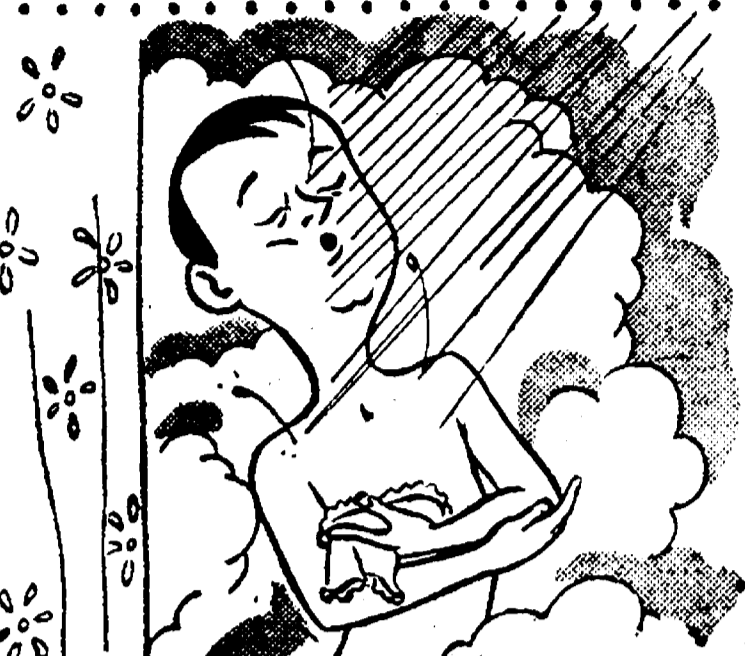

CONSERVATION NOTES

Hunters may find few deer on oak ridges this year as the acorn crop was a failure.

Hunters may have to work harder this year to flush game as there is plenty of protective cover.

A large rabbit crop is the forecast for the year. Last year 1,970,000 cotton tails were bagged and 495,000 snowshoe hares. Top rabbit counties last year were VanBuren, Allegan, Kent and Berrien.

40,000 applications have been received to hunt deer in the special season in western Michigan and no more will be considered. Commercial fish hauls in Great Lakes waters total 12,165,000 lbs. For the first 8 months of 1934 compared to 12,837,000 in the same period in 1949. Clubs led 3,081,000 being taken, trout were second with 570,000 lbs and whitefish 3rd with 527,000 lbs.

The state conservation budget next year is \$13,977,000 with \$4,015,000 for parks operation. The largest bear ever shot by a bow and arrow was killed by Dean Loveless of Hamtramack, near Newberry last week. It dressed out 500 lbs. He used a 70 lb bow at 40 ft. In 9 years of bow and arrow hunting he has shot 5 bear and 9 deer.

DAMAGE TO MAIL BOXES

Each year on and about Halloween there is a considerable increase in the number of complaints of damage to rural and country mail boxes. To a large extent children of high school age are responsible for this damage.

Depredations of this nature are of serious consequence because tearing down or damaging rural mail boxes is a violation of the postal laws and severe penalties are provided for such crimes up to 3 years in a penal institution or a maximum fine of \$1,000.

It is the desire of the postoffice department that this sort of vandalism be stopped in the future so that the penalty of this law will not be enforced on a local citizen.
