Michigan Mirror

Election news has been a busy past week with only an occasional bellow of "Socialists" from the Republicans.

Governor Williams is said to have made gains. The vote went 7 to 5 for Kelly but are now even money in Detroit betting circles.

The legislature has adjourned until Dec. as they will not be back during the deer season.

Embarrassing to the Republicans was the poor turnout at Jackson Oct. 14 to dedicate a party under the oaks. Only 100 people turned out.

Good news from Korea has lessened anxiety of an all out and may have helped the administration. From Michigan 160 were killed and 120 are missing.

So far 10,137 displaced persons Europe have been absorbed by Michigan.

Young doctors, trained in World War II are eligible for the draft. So far only 116 have volunteered. 2500 are wanted.

Opinions are divided on new building curbs. Some say they mean depression. Others that they will stabilize building.

Michigan's little Hoover commission now hopes to cut expenditures in the state highway, the state agriculture and legal counseling depts.

The pheasant season is reported the pre-war levels.

A \$13,977,000 budget for next year will be recommended by the conservation dept. This includes \$4,015,000 for state parks operation.

Conservation

\$44,100 will be spent this year on conservation in the 23 Michigan state parks.

Five forest fires burned over 20 acres last week.

Fishing licenses do not expire until Dec. 31 next.

Applications for use of state parks next year will be accepted until Nov. 1. A new camp has been added at Pickerel Lake in Highland. 25,000 people used the camp this year.

55,000 applications have been received to hunt in the special deer season starting Dec. 1.

Wild pheasant hens have outstripped men's best efforts at pheasant production.

The first week of the small game hunting season shows the rabbit kill up, grouse average the pheasant a little better than last year and the wildfowl kill light. At Pt. Mouille, Lake Erie, 375 duck and 80 coot were killed compared to 532 duck and 75 coot last year.

At Dansville 574 hunters checked in the first day compared to 185 last year.

The state will sell 13,202 acres of land and 342 lots in 39 northern counties this week and next.

James Glover, 92, of Buchanan is said to be the oldest licensed fisherman in Michigan.

Over 100 Michigan lakes and streams will be open for spearing ciscoes, whitefish, suckers and carp Nov. 1. In Livingston county they include Big and Little Portage, Base, Chemung, Hallmoon, Patterson, Little Huron, Whitewood, Strawberry, Gailagher, Crooked, Limekiln, Sandy, Bottom, Blind, Bruin. The season closes Dec. 1.

Pinckney probably lost their only chance to break into the win column Friday when they lost to South Lyon 32 to 0. South Lyon had also lost all games up to Friday and it was a battle for last place.

The game was not as one sided as the score indicates. South Lyon intercepted 3 Pinckney passes ran them back for touchdowns.

Pinckney made their best showing of the year the first quarter when they reached 10 yard line. This resulted from 2 passes Albert Mroska caught and a 15 yard penalty against South Lyon. They lost the ball on a fumble and never again threatened.

The line is Pinckney's weak spot. It gives the backs no protection at all. Several times they had punts blocked and twice Ware, quarter was tackled before he could get rid of the ball. So far Pinckney has not found a ball carrier.

Sweet scored the first touchdown for South Lyon after they had reached the one yard line on line plays. Ed Hock also got one on line plays. Dick Comiskey scored 3 after intercepting Pinckney passes. Pinckney looked bad in this game and showed no fighting spirit at all. Their fumbles were numerous and their tackling high and ineffective. It is the only team Pinckney ever had which did not improve with each game. They were just as heavy as South Lyon but their all similarity ended.

Pinckney plays Dexter here on Friday night in what is usually the big game of the season. Dexter is having an off year having only won one game that from South Lyon 25 to 0. They have tied Ann Arbor high reserves and lost to Brighton, Chelsea, Northville and an Illinois team.

Following this game Pinckney plays Hartland and Stockbridge both at Pinckney.

Current Comment

The political pot is boiling in New York state over a letter Joe Hanley, Republican candidate for U. S. senator wrote Comg. Macy, Republican & Dewey foe. Tom Dewey, it will be remembered early in the year said he was done with politics and would not run for a third term as governor whereupon Lt. Gov. Hanley threw his hat in the ring. Then Dewey changed his mind and Hanley was moved over to run against Herb Lehman for U. S. who is considered unbeatable. In letter Hanley wrote Macy, he stated Dewey promised to see that Hanley's debts amounting to \$100,000 were paid and appoint him to a good job when he Dewey was elected governor.

The Democrats got the letter and are using it in the campaign. They claim it violates the law against barter of public office and demand a grand jury investigation. W. K. Kelsey in the Detroit News compares the letter to the Mulligan letters which ruined James G. Blaine politically. Blaine like Hanley had been in politics most of his life and was a comparatively poor man. The letters Blaine wrote were to certain railroads thanking them for favors. One named Mulligan got them and made them public. On account of them Blaine lost the presidential nomination to Rutherford Hayes in 1876. He was nominated in 1884 but was defeated by Grover Cleveland. Democrat.

All the world loves a winner. That holds true in football. We note that the University of Michigan was not sold out for the Wisconsin game Saturday. As late as Thursday and Friday the papers stated seats were available. Of course Wisconsin has never been one of the big games and as long as we can remember Wisconsin has never beaten Michigan. Could the two Michigan defeats have contributed to the lack of demand for tickets? Maybe football could stand a little de-emphasizing. Back in the old days football squads were small and many players played the entire game. In the first Rose Bowl game Michigan had but 18 players. As crowds increased and million dollar stadiums sprang up football became a big business and the players specialists. Notre Dame was probably the first exponent of this but other colleges were quick to follow. Now all use the platoon system where one team is train on offense only, another on defense, another players does nothing but punt or kick goals and some teams are said to carry a man who does nothing but call coin tosses. In the game with army recently this aggregation had four complete teams and then by sending in a fresh team the last quarter overwhelmed Michigan. This specialization is expensive and many small colleges have had to drop football. The answer may be a player limit such as the big league base ball teams have.

We read many articles in the daily press urging return to the good old days when individual responsibility reigned supreme, social security and unemployment benefits were unheard of, and everyone assumed personal responsibility for their own old age and unemployment. This is a lot of bunk. We lived back in those good old days and they were not as rosy as present day writers would have us believe. Back in those old days there was very little organization among workers. Industry was supreme. They hired and fired at will. Their favorite procedure was to run full blast for six months or so until the market was glutted and then lay off the workers. The latter threw no compensation and had to shift for themselves until production started again. When the worker reached the age of 65 or so he was told they couldn't use him anymore and he went out in the world without a pension to aid him in his old age. Back in those days railroads and a few other enterprises paid pensions but the practise was not general. Old age pensions and social security were granted in response to a nationwide demand and are here to stay. The good old days when everyone had to shift for himself and the devil take the hindmost are gone forever.

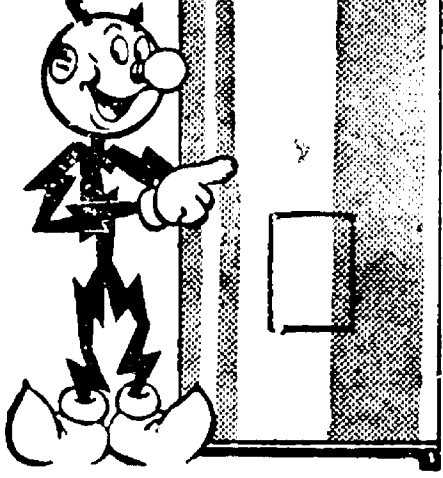
