## Michigan Mirror

Election time is here and gubernatorial candidates are squaring it out. Harry Kelly continues to harp on socialism and communism and Governor Williams predicts a lobbyist government and more consumer taxes if his opponent wins.

Both are profiting from Tom Dewey's mistake in 1948 and are campaigning up to the last minute. The odds at present are even. Williams has the best chance of any governor in a decade to win a second term. The reasons are apparent. Population trends favor city industrial areas where labor unions are strong. This was demonstrated in the primary by the huge vote Williams got in the primary despite the fact that he had no opposition.

Harry Kelly's theme is that organized labor is a threat to Michigan government and that the Democrat party is the labor party. Williams retort is that the Republican party is for big business only.

Everyone predicts a big vote and it will take a lot of out state votes to overcome the big Democrat vote in Detroit.

One commentator says it would be refreshing if some candidate one day would campaign on what he believes he could accomplish instead of dwelling on the sad state of affairs that will exist if his opponent wins.

The four amendments to be voted upon are as follows:

No. 1: Requires registration in days before election instead of 20 days.  
No. 2: Would bond the state for \$65,000,000 to expand mental hospitals.  
No. 3: Define subversion and fix a penalty for it. This is the Communist curb amendment.  
No. 4: Would repeal the tax on colored oleo.

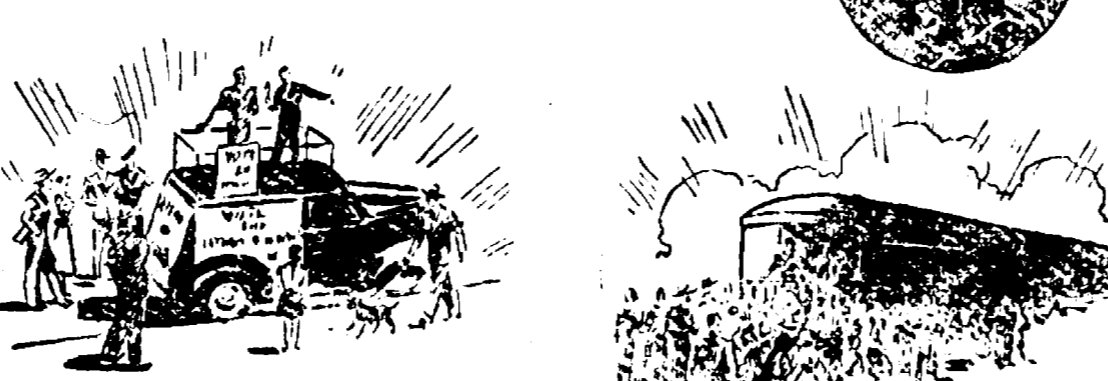
## BOND ISSUE CARRIED

## Conservation

Of the 55,000 applicants for the special deer season, starting on Dec. 1, 21,800 have been accepted.

The first printing of the 83 county maps offered by the conservation dept. have been exhausted. Another allotment will be ready Nov. 3.

34 forest fires damaged 414 acres last week.  
1,042 foxes, 565 coyotes, 163 beavets and 6 wolves were bountied in Michigan in September.

While hunting partridge Jack Munk of Detroit shot a silver fox near Harrison. He saw 2 foxes chasing a partridge, got one but missed the partridge and the other fox.

Bow and Arrow hunters are doing better this year. So far they have shot 19 on Drummond Island this year compared to 8 last year.

Andrew Robinson, 10, of Brighton shot a rabbit last week with a bow and arrow. A rabbit is a pretty small target for an arrow.

The conservation dept. says there are very few cases of tularemia recorded among rabbits and hunters need not be alarmed. White spots on the animals liver do not indicate it has the disease.

Persons who shoot hen pheasants are paying fines as high as \$107.

Five crews are working on the \$200,000 program to develop the Rifle River near Rose City as a trout stream. 7 flood control dams are about finished. 125,000 pine trees have been set west of the watershed. The program will be finished next July. It will stabilize water flow and form trout ponds. The area embraces 150 square miles.

A dam is being built near Davisburg to form a trout pond on the Shiawassee river.

It was not enough. Friday they had both and went places. One local player had so much pep was put out for slugging.

Pinckney plays Stockbridge today. This team has had a so-so season but got many points. Still if Pinckney keeps up the pace they set Friday they will give them a real argument.

## BLEACHERS COLLAPSE

## COLORED BOY FREED

A couple of weeks ago James Robertson, credit mgr. for the Detroit Free Press and his wife were both killed near Howell when their car hit a tank truck and trailer. The tank truck was trying to pass another truck when it hit the car driven by the colored boy in the middle lane. Then the truck hit the Robertson car. 2 other cars were involved in the crash. James Bibbs, the negro boy from Indiana was arrested for reckless driving and tied before Judge Yelland Friday. A jury found him not guilty. Stanley Bertman defended him and Prosecutor Edwin prosecuted the case. There were 2 colored people on the jury.

## Current Comment

We read that the Salvation Army has abolished the tambourine as a method of collecting money. I wonder if it will use a container labeled with the name of the Salvation Army. The reason is that too many impostors were using the tambourine to collect money. The tambourine has been the trademark of the Salvation Army for many years and the Army has not hesitated to enter the toughest saloons and exorcise the tambourine to the patrons for contributions. We never knew just why the Army adopted the tambourine. It is an ancient instrument much favored by dancers who do not wear any more clothes than the law requires. Some say it originated in Spain but it probably is older than Spain itself. It is mentioned in various chapters in the Bible and Salome who danced for the head of John the Baptist, is shown carrying one.

Many rackets are carried out under the name of sweet charity. In New York the Cancer Welfare Fund has been put out of business. It flooded the country with one dollar bills and a letter asking the recipient to send the dollar back and whatever he wished to give. The returns were enormous. However investigation showed only five cents out of every dollar collected was spent for cancer research. The rest the solicitors took for expenses.

We doubt that the attempt of Gov. Dewey of New York to get himself out of the Hanley affair by citing an incident in the life of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt will convince anyone except those who wish to be convinced. Dewey got Hanley to withdraw from the race for governor in his favor by promising to see that his debts of \$100,000 were paid. The Roosevelt story is in 1928 Al Smith of New York candidate for president and his mgr. John Raskob wanted Roosevelt to run for governor of New York to add strength to their ticket. He refused saying he had just started a campaign to raise \$200,000 for the Warm Spring, Georgia hospital for polio. They would not be denied and promised to raise this amount among their friends. This they did and all the money went into the Warm Spring Foundation where thousands of children have been treated for polio. So Franklin Roosevelt did not benefit to the extent of a single penny in this affair.

No profession is under heavier fire in these days of Communist hunts than the teaching profession which the hunters claim is heavily infiltrated. They claim that most colleges have Communists on their staffs. Another argument used is the absence of American history from high school courses which they claim is communist inspired. Now we do not know why this subject was dropped. In our school days it was heavily stressed and we took all the history we could get and enjoyed it. It cannot be denied that most people are ignorant of history. If you do not believe listen in on one of the radio give away program that ask questions in history. Some of the simple questions go for days unanswered.

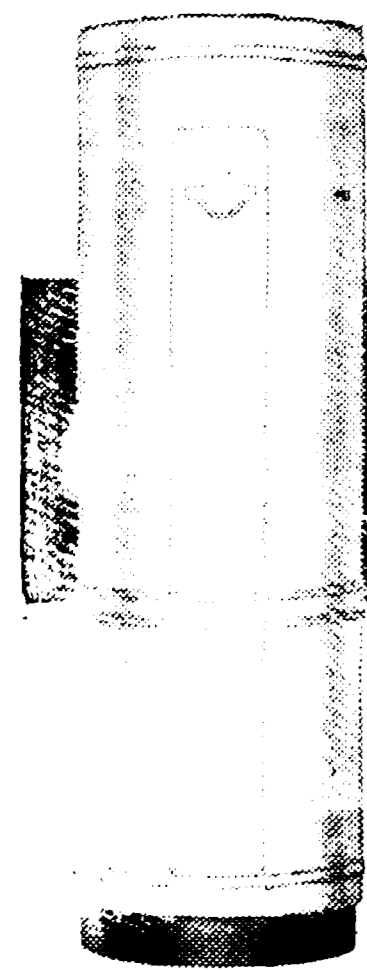

Under the present law you can only be guilty of treason if you perform an overt act. Under the amendment you would be guilty if you said it or put it in writing. It violates the Bill of Rights relating to freedom of speech.
