While Communists use the U. S. as a bloody intervention in Korea, Michigan men are in the midst of their own annual intervention. 400,000 hunters storm the north woods next week and bringing back 115,000 deer. About casualties no one is saying anything but hope springs eternal.

Some 3,250 young men of which 1,000 will be inducted into the army in November. The draft for the Korean war is not over.

Since 1940 the cost of living has gone up 75 percent and the cost of government 274 percent. The government got one return. The Kaiser Steel Corp. gave the state a check for \$91,185,990.80 in full payment of a wartime loan 20 years ahead of time.

Detroit, Flint, Pontiac and Lansing are suffering a labor shortage. Harry Markle MUCC director suggests implant training to increase the number of skilled workers.

Employers in order to hold the men are talking Christmas bonuses and others are paying their mens social security tax.

The college boom is over and colleges are preparing for seven lean years. Enrollment may decrease 50 percent.

The dire results predicted for credit curbs have not come to pass. Even the used car market, usually the first to be hit is holding up well.

The fluctuating stock market is caused by fear of war taxes. This is a better barometer than anything else.

One of every six war veterans used the G. I. Home Loan Insurance. In the last six years \$6,136 have insured loans up to \$323,681,840.

The rent control situation in Michigan is crazy. Pontiac has taken its problem to the supreme court.

Dr. Lee M. Thurston, supt. of public instruction is pushing a plan to improve the amount and quality of citizenship education in Michigan.

The Michigan Mirror said on Nov. 2, Gov. Williams has the best chance of any Democrat in the last decade to win a second term. It will take a lot of out-state votes to offset the heavy majorities he will receive in Wayne county.

That was 5 days before election.

Gov. William Wines

The governor's race in Michigan is close, although at the present time Gov. Williams has a lead of over 1400 votes. This vote count has changed six times. At one time Kelly had a lead of 7,000. Then numerous errors turned up in the canvass. The great rural precincts made errors too. One in Livingston county gave Gov. Williams 300 more votes, one in Kent county 100 more, Oakland county 540 more, Genesee 540 more, Macomb 700 more etc. In Wayne many precincts did not add the straight vote to the totals. This gave Williams 8,000 more. Macomb certified the also vote in the governor's vote column. Election officials say these mistakes occur every election but in case of a 40,000 majority or so would mean nothing.

There will undoubtedly be a recount. It costs \$21,000 to recount the state. The losing candidate has to pay it. It takes two months so no governor may be inaugurated Jan. 1 next.

The final vote canvass gives Gov. Williams a majority of 1152.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Preliminary reports this year show a greater pheasant, a good grouse bag and a smaller woodcock bag, the number of squirrels down and rabbits plentiful.

There are deer in Wayne county. Lloyd Curry found one shot in the Trenton city limits. It had been dead several days.

The influx of ducks reached its peak over the Nov. 11 week end. There was a 38 percent increase in ducks this year. Saginaw Bay reports 3 times as many Lake St. Clair 22 percent more while Lake Erie is down 22 percent. In Allegan county 38% geese were bagged.

The trapping season starts Nov. 15 in the upper peninsula and Dec. 1 in the lower. 18,141 trapping permits were issued in Michigan last year. The take was 60 muskrats, 23,000 mink, 87,000 raccoons and 27,000 weasels.

The state parks and forests in the deer county are open as camp sites to deer hunters.

The Michigan mussel industry has about vanished. Their shell was used in button making. In 1930 the state issued 2460 permits. This dropped to 312 in 1946. The season is July 1 to Sept. 30. Plastic is now used in button making extensively.

The state has the best forest fire record in history. 839 fires and 5,155 acres burned over. In 1871 2,000,000 acres were burned over.

The Lake Huron herring run is on. This is the biggest Michigan fish crop.

Arctic owls are back in Michigan but not so many as last year.

Fishing license sales are one percent less than last year.

29 sharp tailed grouse were planted on Beaver Island ten years ago. There are now 200 of them there.

Notes of the Game : Current Comment

LOSE LAST GAME

Pinckney high school lost their 7th straight game of the season to Hartland here Friday night on a snow covered field and ended the most disastrous season in the history of the school. They lost every game on the schedule and only scored 12 points all against Dexter.

The game against Hartland was played in freezing weather and drew a small crowd. The snow nullified the forward pass and they never threatened to score. Hartland has a good team this year and went through the Pinckney line at will and around end. In their 7 to 0 victory over Brighton they scored in the first minutes and turned back every Brighton scoring attempt.

The Pinckney team this year was a puzzle. They showed promise in the first game at Brighton for although beaten 26 to 0 were inside the Brighton 20 yd. line 3 times. In the rest of the games they failed to click at all except in the last half of the Dexter game. Their big weakness was blocking and tackling and lack of a man who could get anywhere carrying the ball. The passing of the Mrosticka brothers was their only offense and they made most of their first downs. They were just as big as most of the teams they played but lacked the vital spark necessary.

The prospects for next year are not very bright. After they put a team on the field they usually have only 3 or 4 men left on the bench and they are small freshmen. Pinckney who for years was noted for good teams has apparently hit bottom. It may be a couple of years before they hit a winning stride as most of the promising material is in the 7th and 8th grades.

WEDDING POSTPONED

The commentators have been busy dopping out the results of the election and no 2 of them agree. Some say it means the triumph of organized labor, others that the people are tired of high prices and high taxes and others to the foreign policy. We doubt that any of the above reasons were the sole cause. In our year elections the entire vote is never cast and the party in power usually takes a beating. This year it was not nearly so pronounced as in 1946 when the Republicans won control of both houses by good margins. This they failed to do this year. They got 52 percent of the vote cast this year. We think the most important cause of the Republican gain was the change in the Korean situation the last few weeks. If the election had been held two weeks earlier the result we think would have been different. The entrance of the Chinese Communists changed all, convincing the people we were in for a long war with unpleasant wartime curbs and that many of their sons would soon be going overseas and that the slogan "Bring the boys home by Christmas" was only a fond dream.

Now we make no claims to being a diplomat but we think the China situation was badly handled. Communists control nearly all of China and have four million men under arms. Heretofore they have not been antagonistic to the United States and we think they could have been handled and their neutrality assured. They made two demands, both of which were turned down. They wanted recognition as the dominant power in China and the seat of the Kaing Chai Check government in the United States. However so great is the hatred of Communism in this county that although France and Great Britain were willing this country blocked the Chinese demands and so laid themselves liable to a Chinese attack. We may be in for a long Asiatic war. Japan fought China for ten years or more and got nowhere.

The two most important Republican victories were those of Senator Taft in Ohio and Gov. Dewey in New York. These two men are as far apart as the north and south poles. Taft is the leading conservative, isolationist and American Firster. Dewey is a leading liberal and in some way more so even than President Truman. In neither case did the Democrats put up a strong candidate against them. Joe Ferguson, an auditor, little known, posed Taft in Ohio. The Democrats wanted Gov. Lauck twice governor, but he refused and instead was elected governor for a third term. Joe Lynch, a little known Tammany man ran against Dewey and lost although Herbert Lehman, Democrat candidate for senator won. The other big victory, that of Gov. Warren in California reflects no trend. He is a leading liberal and usually runs on both Democrat and Republican tickets.

There was a lot of dumb voting indulged in Ann Arbor where the fire dept has trouble keeping men the voters approved a wage boost for them and then defeated the mill amendment to provide money for it. Shiawasse county voters approved a new jail and then defeated the mill increase to provide funds for it.

The amendment to stop the sale of colored oleo was snowed under about 2 to 1. We never could understand this proposal. No farmer of our acquaintance was in favor of it. Only one quarter of the milk produced goes into butters. The Michigan Milk Producers Ass'n., inventor of the base & surplus plan got this amendment on the ballot. As 32 states now have colored oleo it was almost certain Michigan would follow their example. The result was so sure that colored oleo appeared in stores the day after election. The sale is not legal until 30 day after election. The agriculture dept. at first said no action would be taken and then said the law would be enforced. This caused oleo to disappear from Michigan store shelves including those in this section.
