Peach Palmer and wife leave today for Roscommon to hunt deer.

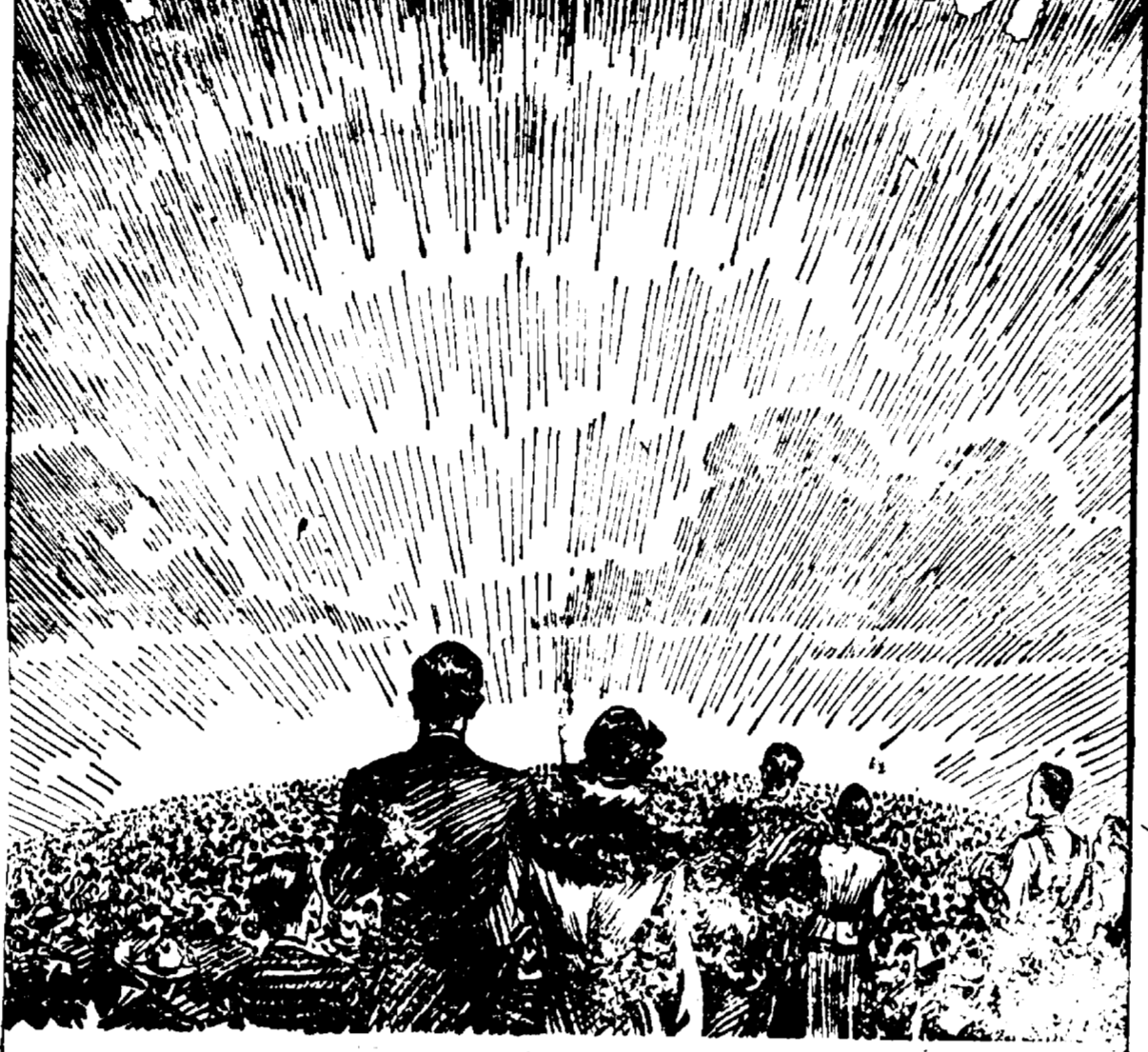

Current Comment

Two persons were killed and one injured in the deer season and nine injured. The day was rainy and the kill was light. In Livingston county 4 deer were killed in the Oak Grove area and 4 in the Pinckney area. Most of the hunters were from Detroit and did not stay long as they were not dressed for hunting in the wet swamps, Ken Kimball sports writer, says there were not enough hunters to keep the deer moving.

Seven state parks are now closed for the winter. Nearly 1000 deer were shot by hunters last year in southern Michigan.

344 acres have been added to the Pinckney recreation area. 100 to the Cannonsburg area, 132 to the Manistee river valley, 40 to Vassar, 141 to Roe Lake and hundreds of feet of lake frontage in Kent, Mackinac, Antrim, St. Clair, Manistique and Lake counties.

The conservation dept. has filed as intervening defendant in 2 law suits: Livingston county's Whitmore Lake and Oakland county's Pleasant Lake. In both cases property owners seek damages because fishermen anchored on the lake bottom.

Hunters need not lose venison by spoiling as it may be taken to the nearest locker plant, cut up and packaged and a permit secured for transporting it.

13 forest fires burned over 275 acres last week.

The dept. released over 9000 cock pheasants before the hunting season but so far has received but 424 bands back. Any one shooting one is asked to send in the band.

121 archers got 27 deer on Drummond Island this year.

Although Governor G. Mennen Williams will be officially certified as governor elect of Michigan he will probably not take office next Jan. 1 as Harry Kelly the loser has indicated he will ask for a recount. This cannot be done until after the canvass has been completed. The estimated cost is \$21,000 but it will no doubt cost more. The law provides the defeated candidate who asks the recount must pay for it. The three Detroit papers, intense supporters of Kelly were strong for this law when Williams was behind and it was thought he would want a recount. Now with Kelly trailing they have changed face and now want the state to pay the cost of the recount. Some amusing incidents have resulted from the election dispute. The Detroit News interviewed 15 people last week and published their opinions, names and addresses. City Clerk Lebetter looked them up and says 7 of them were not registered and did not vote last Nov. 7. Their reactions were various. Some said that the errors must be a Kelly plot to steal the election from Williams and other vice versa, a Williams plot. Some desired a new election with neither Williams or Kelly running. City Clerk Lebetter points out there are 1419 precincts in Detroit and over 9,000 election workers. Mistakes were only found in 37 precincts. Also that election workers worked 17 hours straight election day. The recount cost will exceed \$21,000. Republicans are collecting \$75,000 to meet the cost.

MICH BELL RAISE WAGES
The Michigan Bell Telephone strike has been settled and the will receive wages ranging from \$3 to \$5 a week. This will add \$3,400,000 to their wage bill and it will be necessary for the company to ask for another rate increase.

Circuit Court News

The Big and Little Portage Lake Association is having hard sledding in its effort to get a flood control system installed there to prevent thousands of dollars worth of damage to their lake property every spring by floods. After several years of effort and considerable expenditure of money they got Judge Breakey of Ann Arbor to set a water level for the lake of 82.5 ft. above sea level. Plans were drawn to dredge the Huron river and put in a flood control dam, a \$48,000 project. Bids were to be opened last week for the dredging project but not a single one was received. Freeman Webber, Northfield supervisor, is chairman of the drain committee and said a meeting will be held at the Gallacher school on Nov. 29, to study the project and see if it can be established on a smaller scale. The lake property owners will pay the cost.

We cannot help but notice the number and growing prominence of negro boys on college football teams. There was a time not so many years ago that a colored boy could not get on a college team in any way of rising. It is now and his point a minute teams Michigan had no negro players. This year Michigan has used four negro football stars. They are Bralora who starred in the macama game, Perry, their best pass catcher, Howell and Hull. The last two are from Ypsilanti. Other college lineups are also dotted with negro stars. The fact is it is no longer possible to draw the color line in college athletics. The demand and scramble for star players is so great there are not enough white players to go around and the colleges who must have winning teams have had to give the negro boys a chance.

One thing which makes little sense is the constant firing of college football coaches and big league baseball managers who have losing seasons. Bernie Bierman of Minnesota who had fine teams for years and won national championships has been forced out there because his team did not win a game this year. The same is true in baseball. The Chicago White Sox who have finished in the second division since the Black Sox scandal of World War I, bob up with a new manager every year but do not seem to better their position any. The manager or coach is only as good as the material he has to work with. If the material is no good his team is like.

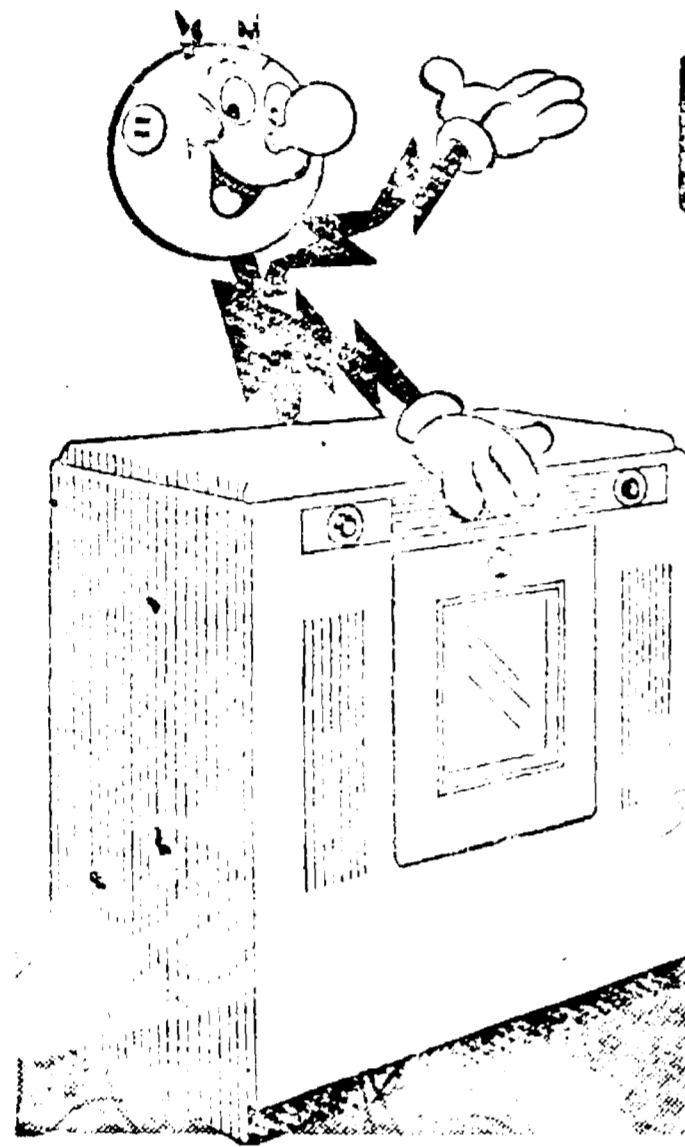

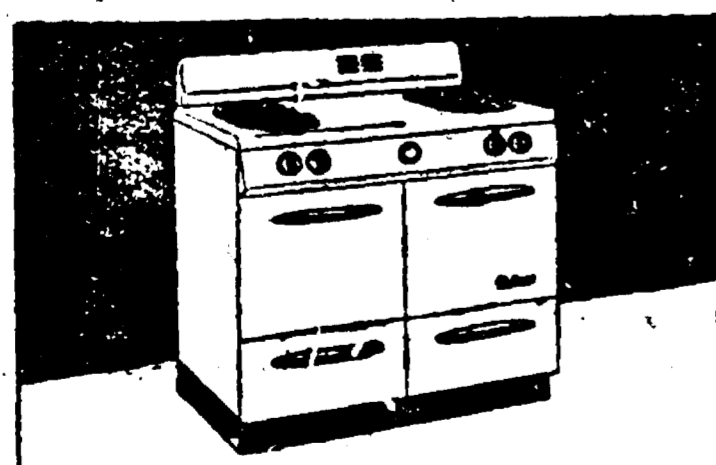
