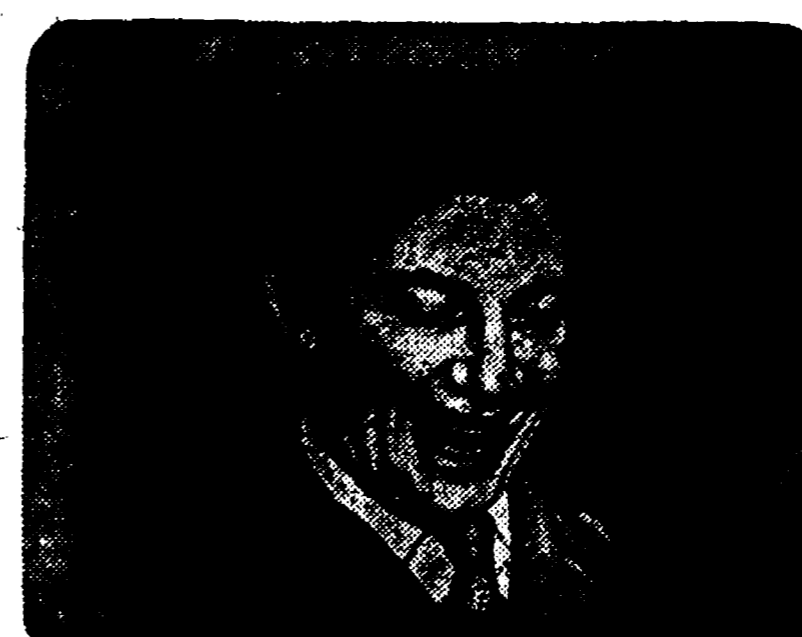

Their leader, a young Captain in the Venezuelan Merchant Marine, agreed to accompany them if the voyage could be arranged. The Scouts decided to try. They went to officials of the Grancolombiana Line which operates freighters between United States ports and Venezuela, Colombia and Ecuador. Line officials were enthusiastic about helping the Scouts in their training and offered to transport the group free of charge on a round trip between New York and Maracaibo.

One of the line's most modern freighters, the "Ciudad De Maracaibo," was chosen so that the Scouts could inspect the newest equipment. Under the guidance of their own leader, Capt. Melean, and ship's officers they learned how the equipment worked, and many shipboard duties landlubbers never learn. Their biggest thrill was locating another vessel by radar.

American Sea Scouts and Boy Scouts. The Scouts covered a list of ground. They attended a baseball game, placed a wreath at the statue of South America's Liberator, Simon Bolivar; attended a party in their honor, and even broadcast to South America over the Voice of America.

They had some trouble, because most of them spoke only Spanish. However, the Venezuelan consulate furnished each boy with an identification card. The plan worked, too. None of the Scouts were returned to their hotel in police cars.

Highlight of the stay was a party given by the Girl Scout Council of Greater New York. There the boys learned American dances. Then they showed the Americans some Venezuelan cowboy dances and taught them South American songs—even their own version of Boogie-Woogie.

The Scouts made a big hit with everyone and their visit accomplished a double purpose. It was a valuable experience in Scout training and the Scouts had served as ambassadors of good will between their country and ours.

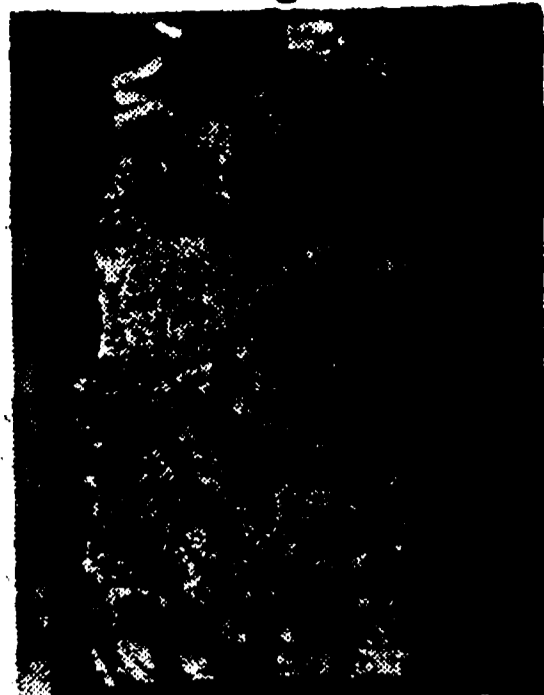

Balanced Soil Plan Gives Top Yields at Low Production Cost

COLUMBIA, MO.—A five-point program to "balance the soil's needs" and obtain maximum crop yields per acre at low production costs, was outlined by O. T. Coleman, Missouri University extension soils specialist.

- Here are the steps Coleman suggests:
1. Provide plenty of plant food in available form for the crops you are growing. Crops cannot grow without nutrients.
 2. Have your soil tested to determine whether the plant food supply is in balance. Growing crops need a balanced ration the same as do people and livestock.
 3. Get the soil in condition so that crops can use the plant foods. This means a turnover of organic matter. You can add organic matter and improve soil tilth, drainage and aeration by growing well-fertilized deep-rooted legumes.
 4. Keep water, plant nutrients and topsoil at home by conservation methods. Where needed, these may include terracing and contouring to reduce runoff and erosion losses.
 5. Follow a well-balanced cropping system. Deep-rooted legumes for pasture and green manure crops need to be rotated regularly with grains. Livestock is a "must" to properly handle pasture and roughage crops in such a crop-balancing program. Tests have shown that where a crop is pastured off, about 75 per cent of the organic matter is returned to the soil. This is true of both legume and non-legume crops.

VILLAGE OF PINCKNEY COUNTY OF LIVINGSTON

THE VILLAGE OF PINCKNEY ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.—Permission is hereby granted to THE DETROIT EDISON COMPANY, a New York Corporation, its successors and assigns, to construct, maintain and operate in the public streets, highways, alleys and other public places in the VILLAGE OF PINCKNEY, Livingston County, Michigan, all needful and proper poles, towers, mains, wires, pipes, conduits and other apparatus requisite for the transmission, transforming and distribution of electricity for public and private use, subject, however, to all conditions and restrictions hereinafter contained.

SECTION 2.—The conditions of the foregoing grant are as follows:

A—The grantee shall do no injury to any street, highway, alley or other public place, or to any sewage uses, or in any manner disturb or interfere with any water or gas pipes, or with any public or private sewer, now or hereafter laid or constructed by any authorized person or corporation.

B—The Village Council may, in its discretion, grant permission for the trimming of trees when necessary to make the lines safe and accessible, such trimming to be done under its supervision.

C—The construction work of the said lines shall be under the supervision of the Village Council, and the grantee shall pay to the village, upon presentation of an itemized bill, the cost of such supervision at the legal rate of charge for the same.

D—The said grantee before entering upon any street, highway, alley or other public place for the purpose of erecting and constructing any poles, mains, wires, pipes, conduits or other apparatus, shall, in writing, notify the Village Council or its representatives of the proposed construction and obtain its approval thereof, and shall, if the Village Council so requires, the with it a sufficient plan and specification, showing the nature and extent of the proposed erection and construction. The cost of inspection shall be held to be part of the cost of supervision.

E—No street, highway, alley or public place shall be allowed to remain open or encumbered by the construction work of the said grantee for a longer period than shall be necessary to execute the said work and the Village Council shall determine the question of such necessity, and the grantee shall at all times conform to all ordinances of the village, now or hereafter in force, relative to the fencing and lighting of obstructions and excavations.

F—The grantee shall save the Village harmless from any judgment that may be recovered against the Village by reason of the wrongdoing or negligence of said grantee in the erection and maintenance of said poles, mains, wires and other apparatus or construction.

G—Said grantee shall make due provision upon forty-eight hours notice in writing by raising its wires or otherwise, for the passage of any barn, building or other structure on or over any street, highway or public place occupied by the mains, wires, poles and apparatus of said grantee.

SECTION 3.—In consideration of the granting of this franchise, grantee agrees that its rates and charges for electric service in the village of Pinckney shall not exceed its rates and charges for like service elsewhere in its service area, evidenced by its uniform rate schedule at the time on the writ and approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 4.—This grant shall take effect if said grantee shall, within fifteen days from the date of the passage of this ordinance, the Village Clerk its written acceptance of the terms of the ordinance. The termination of this grant by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the electors of said village, voting thereon at a special election to be held on Monday, the 29th day of January, 1951, as provided for by the statutes and the State Constitution.

If not confirmed by the electors voting at said election, this ordinance shall be null and void.

SECTION 5.—This Franchise and Ordinance shall be and remain in force for thirty (30) years from and after the date of its confirmation by the electors of the VILLAGE OF PINCKNEY, Livingston County, Michigan.

SECTION 6.—Nothing in this grant shall be construed to alienate the title of the public in and to any street, highway, alley or public place, or any portion thereof, neither shall anything herein be construed in any manner as a surrender by the VILLAGE OF PINCKNEY of its legislative power with respect to the subject matter hereof, or with respect to any other matter whatsoever; nor as in any manner limiting the right of the said VILLAGE OF PINCKNEY to regulate the use of any street, avenue, highway or public place within its jurisdiction.

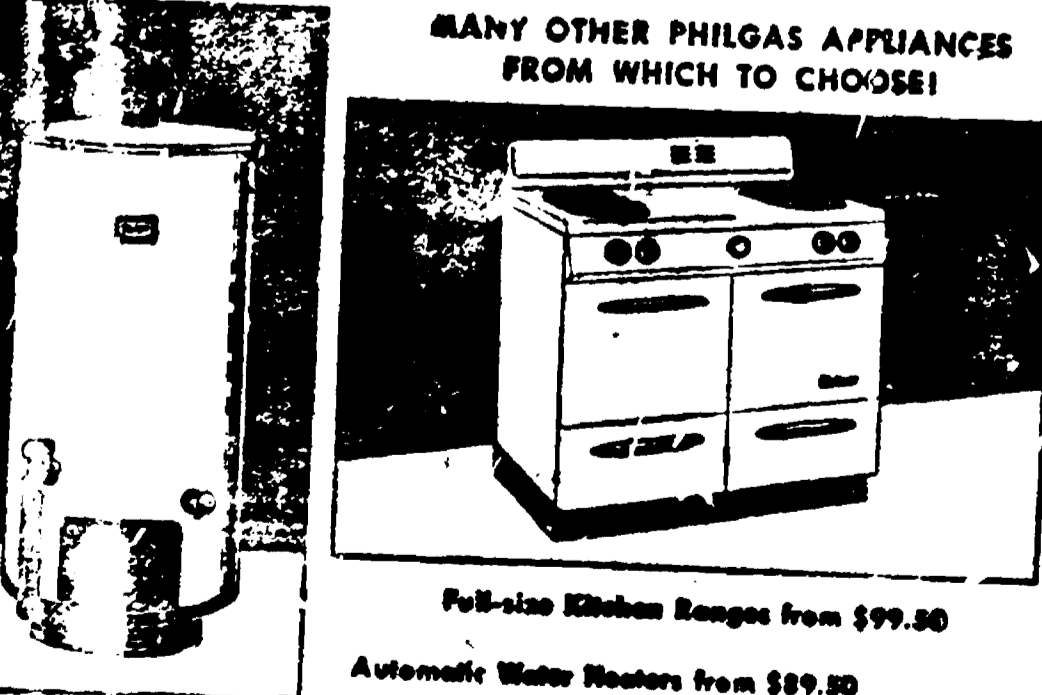

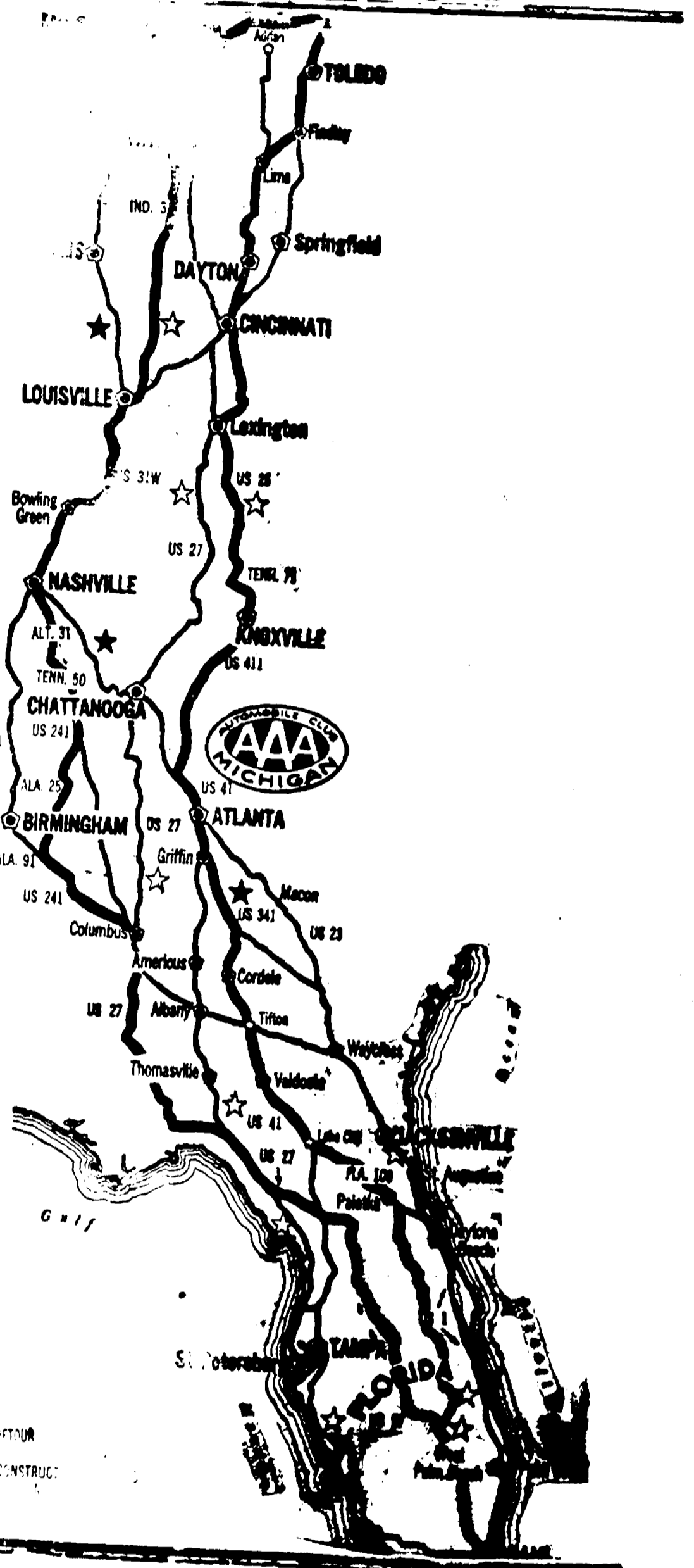
