According to Attorney General Frank Millard, the present grand jury law is weak and ineffective and hence a wide open invitation to graft and corruption. He cites two principal weaknesses. 1. The lack of power to grant immunity to key witnesses. 2. The lack of power to subpoena witnesses and require their appearance. While Millard did not come out in favor of restoring the old one man grand jury law, he wants teeth put in the present law to make it stronger. The present is useless and has never been used since it went into effect.

The tang of spring has effected the legislators and they are whipping appropriation bills into shape. However adjournment is not expected until mid-June, the usual time as tax bills have yet been passed.

Gov. Williams has tried to join the defense efforts, both state and federal. He says they must awaken to the necessities of establishing priorities for materials and manufacture of items needed in defense. Gen. Maitland, state defense head wished to consign 10 state owned fire trucks to South Korea, the most vital target.

Michigan's April draft quota has been reduced to 2,124. The original was 4,229. Thins are looking up in Korea.

Peak defense production will not be reached in Michigan until next year. Aside from a small amount of trucks, passenger cars and other items needing no reticling, defense production is still in the paper store. From 1941 to 1945, the auto industry built \$23,000,000, 000 worth of firearms.

Michigan's apple surplus problem may be solved. It is planned to make frozen concentrated apple juice.

The state TB problem looks better. Howell is sending 100 patients to the new Genesee county hospital. This will give 100 of the 600 patients on the county waiting list a place to go.

The Little Hoover Commission says that 90 percent of civil service employees got their jobs with out competitive examination is disputed. The civil service commission says the only ones put on without examinations were temporary employees such as state fair help.

The Hoover Commission gave the prisons a bouquet. It said they were clean, adequate and well financed but that Jackson prison was too big.

There are more federal employees in Michigan than state employees. Federal employees number 40,838. This is 3,091 more than the state has. However federal employees include all of the postoffice employees and all those connected with it.

Election Result

In Putnam Township the first 3 offices were not contested. As a result only 276 votes were cast, the smallest in township history. Last November 533 people voted and in November 1948 there were 748. There were only 29 absent voters ballots. There have been 200.

There were 53 Democrat straight and 38 Republican. The vote was as follows: Sup., Stanley Dinkel, R. 193; Lynn Hendee got 6 votes and Ed Parker 2 on writes; Clerk, Murray Kennedy 204; Treasurer, Lorenzo Murphy 195; Justice, Asher Wylie, D. 151; Howard Read, R. 93; Justice, Otto Paulson, D. 125; Gene Mann, R. 135; Bd. of Rev., Wm. Shehan, D. 157; Wayne Shettleroe, R. 91; Constable, John Eisele, D. 147.

The amendments for yearly sessions of the legislature and \$500 payments to survivors of Korean war casualties won but the one to raise salaries of supreme court justices lost.

In Unadilla 275 voted. The Republican was the only ticket up. The following were elected: Sup., Ralph Glenn; Clerk, Arthur Bullis; Treas., Byron Rockwell; High. Com., Douglas MacKim; Justices, Duane Jacobs, Clair Barnum; Bd. of Rev., Burr Jackson.

Hamburg cast 231 votes and elected a 50-50 ticket. Sup., Arthur Shehan, D; Clerk, Mary Bennett, D; Treas., Bert Hooker, R; the Justices, Clifford Van Horn and Clayton Carpenter, R; Bd. of Rev., Lawrence Queal, R.

Current Comment

When a boy we used to spend considerable time with a farmer in Webster township. Every spring he burned over his pasture field and marsh. He did this so the grass would come early in the spring and afford early pasture for his stock. It was a universal custom. All the farmers did the same thing. Of course there were drawbacks. His fence posts usually caught fire and kept him busy carrying water from a nearby creek. Some times the fire jumped the creek and got in his hay field. Now we are told this burning practise was all wrong. Burning destroys the top dressing of the soil and hundreds of dollars worth of fertilizer. Also the earthworms which keep the ground moist and help fertilize it. In addition many nesting birds and young rabbits are destroyed. The birds destroy insects which damage the crops. The conservation dept. has been trying for years to stop marsh burning practise but many farmers still burn their marshes. The fires have a tendency to get beyond control and make rural fire depts. much unnecessary work.

Hal Boyle in the Detroit News says borrowing is the great American pastime and that one week one half the people borrow from the other half and vice versa the next week the other half do the borrowing. We admit when a small boy that this custom prevailed but we thought it had gone out with the horse and buggy, the high wheeled bicycle and other things of fond memory. Back in our distant childhood neighbors frequently came to our home to borrow a cup of sugar, lard, flour, coffee, a quart of kerosene oil for the lamp and even the lawn mower or a few chunks of wood. Occasionally we were sent to neighbors to do a little borrowing ourselves. We never remember our folks refusing a borrower and don't don't recall being refused ourselves. We are glad this good old American custom still flourishes. It is co-operation 100 percent.

The University of Michigan is protesting because the army has taken 40 doctors away from their 100 army hospitals. It says the efficiency of the university is seriously impaired. For some years now the supply of doctors has been steadily decreasing. When we were a boy in Dexter you could take your pick as there were then five physicians practicing in that village. Now there is but one. This village then turned out a full fledged doctor in four years. Now it takes seven. In addition most doctors are continually attending clinics and taking special medical courses. These things have undoubtedly tended to reduce the number of practitioners.

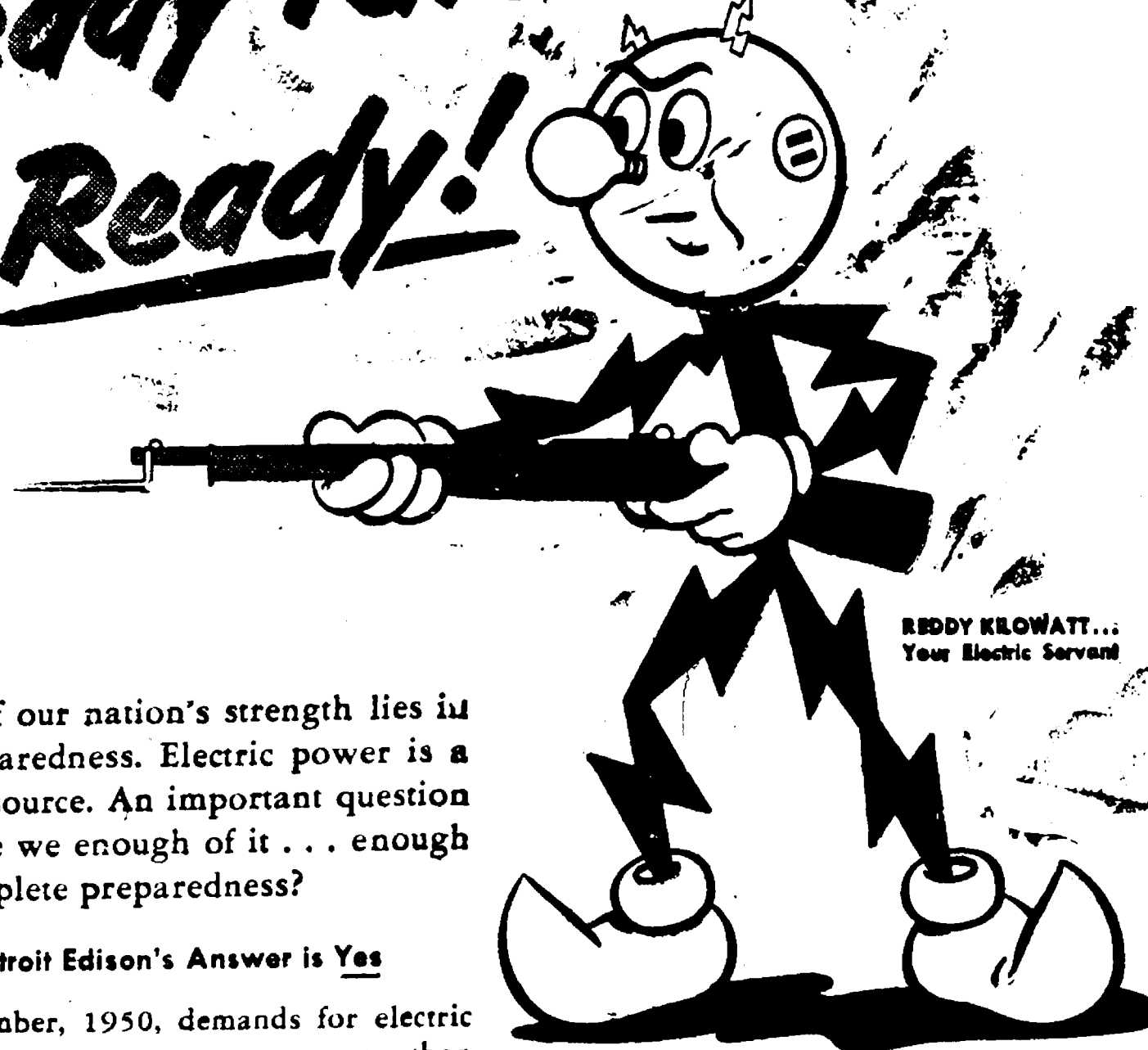

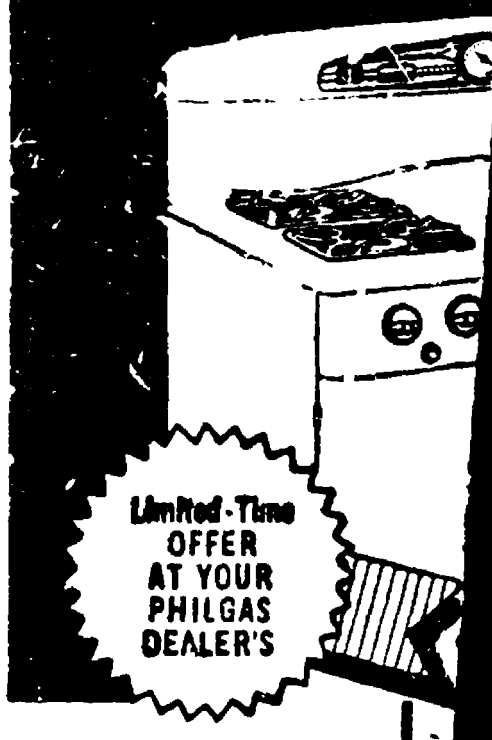
