Now we are told this burning practise was all wrong, Burning destroys the top dressing of the soil and hundreds of dollars worth of fertiliser, Also the earthworms which keep the ground moist and help fertilize it, In addition many nesting birds and young rabbits are destroyed. The birds destroy insects which damage the crops, The conservation dept. has been trying for years to stop marsh burning practise but many farm ers still burn their marshes. The fires have a tendency to get be yond control and make rural fire depts, much unnecessary


