## Michigan Mirror

Streamlining Michigan government with the power centered in the governor is the general pattern of the Michigan Little Hoover Commission. The governor would appoint administrators who would be responsible for good government. Leading Republicans are skeptical of putting so much power in the hands of the governor which office is subject to much political change. Gov. William J. E. Van Dusen favors it and says it would reduce cost of government. Former Governors Harry Kelly and Kim Sigler had the same view.

State Treas. Bracke has a different idea. He says the Michigan legislature has done a fine job of cutting expenses and any further economy must come from eliminating public services a very unpopular thing to do. Transfer of public service to local government, merely puts the tax burden elsewhere. Moreover the state government is already returning 78 percent of the sales tax to local governments. To be tabbed an enemy of the Little Hoover Commission is to be called an enemy of governmental economy.

The heart is on over the cent and a half gas tax as the check of the petitions starts. Robert Poe, C.I.O. lobbyist and Gus Scholl, C. I. O. president, say they will demand a grand jury investigation of the Good Roads Federation which got the gas tax bill passed.

Michigan farmers still pack a punch. Notice the action of the special legislative session in passing a law banning deer hunting by rifles in southern Michigan.

A new boom in copper for Michigan's upper peninsula may be on the way.

1,115 men may be called up for army induction in December.

The Michigan legislature over Democratic objections has invited Gen. MacArthur to address the next session of the legislature.

## Characters

### THE RESURRECTIONIST

I have been asked to write of the old time body snatchers who were also called resurrectionists. Back in the seventies and eighties medical schools had trouble getting enough human bodies to dissect. They had to have them so were forced to get them illegally by patronizing the body snatchers. These men went to cemeteries at night and dug up bodies which they sold to medical schools for \$25. This industry flourished for a number of years until the state passed a law giving colleges unclaimed bodies from the prison, asylum and poor house.

I used to ride around with the late Dr. H. F. Sigler and most of this information I got from him. There were a number in the business according to Dr. Sigler but the most successful was a doctor in the western part of the county. He was a class mate of Dr. Sigler who graduated at University of Michigan in 1871.

This doctor worked alone and by means of the county papers, kept track of the deaths. He worked nights and got most of his bodies from isolated country cemeteries. He did not use a light. His method was to dig a hole at the head of the grave, break the glass in the coffin, tie a rope around the neck of the body and pull it out. This only took about 20 minutes. Then he filled in the grave and as it was usually a new one, the theft was not discovered.

There was an amusing story told about this doctor. Sigler was going home at noon one day as the doctor drove into town. Dr. Sigler invited him home to dinner and when they reached there he asked Sigler to get the tie strap in the back of the buggy. As he lifted up the flap to do so he put his hand on a dead man whom the doctor was taking to the medical school to sell. He recognized the body of that Billy Blake Michael Kelly told me that Billy Blake was found dead in a barn south of Pinckney and the funeral instead of calling the sheriff and coroner as would be done to day, called the body snatcher and saved the county \$100 expense money.

After a number of years of success the doctor overreached. A woman died near Howell and her husband refused to have her buried until forced to do so by He visited her grave daily and discovered her body had been stolen. It was found at the medical school. The doctor left the country and never came back. A number of years afterwards Dr. Sigler had some correspondence with a railroad in Arizona and he found this doctor was surgeon for the railroad.

## Deaths

Milton M. Matteson was killed in an auto accident Sunday evening about 8:00 p. m. on the Dexter Rd., a mile south of the North Territorial Rd., at the old McComb farm. About 7:30 he had left Pinckney with four local boys to attend the Dexter Theatre. They went in the White car, driven by Brandon White Jr. Others in the car were Charles Leach, 18, Petysville, Charles Hewlett, 19, and Dick Darrow, 15, of Pinckney. As they came to the curve at the McComb farm, they were crowded off the road. Their car ran along the shoulder of the road 300 ft. and rolled over according to the Ann Arbor News. Matteson had his neck broken and died instantly. Leach had a broken arm, injured leg. White had leg injuries. Hewlett and Darrow had cuts and bruises. First aid was given at St. Joe hospital, Ann Arbor. The scene of the accident is the same place where a Hindu student was killed April 28, last and 4 others injured. Several years ago a university doctor and four nurses were killed there.

Milton Matteson was born on June 4, 1932, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Matteson of Cunningham Lake Rd. He graduated from Pinckney high school in June of 1951. He was a 3 letter man in athletics. Since graduation he has been employed by the Standard Building Products, Detroit.

## Current Comment

The Detroit News Friday carried pictures of 3 ladies who are celebrating their 102nd birthdays. There was a time when a person 100 years ago was a novelty. Not so now. In our boyhood we knew a number of people past 90 but none who were 100. The first person in Washtenaw county we knew who reached the 100 mark was Gus Peters who ran a mill at Scio during the civil war. He died about World War 1. The second was John Roberts who had a farm on the Huron River between Rose and Portage Lake. Dexter closed up shop and gave him a reception the day he was 100 years old and he got a telegram of congratulations from President Herbert Hoover. Now centenarians have become so common they cause little comment. This is attributed to better living and housing conditions and advanced medical skill.

The debate being staged because President Truman appointed Gen. Mark Clark ambassador to the Vatican in Rome, is more or less a tempest in a teapot. At the present time 39 countries have representatives there including Great Britain. From 1797 to 1867 our nation was served at the Vatican by some 13 different consuls. At that time the Vatican can govern 16,000 square miles of territory. The Italian government later took this land except where the buildings stand. In 1861 President Lincoln appointed Gen. Rufus King, minister to the Vatican. The civil war broke out and he served 2 years in the army before going to the Vatican. Through King's influence the Vatican refused to recognize the Confederacy and even turned John Surratt, Lincoln conspirator over to King for deportation when he was found in the papal army. In 1867 congress abolished the office by cutting off the appropriation. Theodore Roosevelt wanted to appoint Wm. H. Taft minister to the Vatican during the Philippine trouble but bowed to a protest floods Franklin Roosevelt appointed Myron Taylor there in World War II and he served 19 years. There must be an advantage in having a representative there or the other 39 countries would not have them.

In Detroit Mrs. Jane Lavejoy of the schoolboard claims the use of fluorescent lights of the cold cathode type in the schools is ruining the eyes of the pupils. In our day the school house was not lighted. The annual meeting was held there but kerosene lamps were brought in for the occasion. The teachers took their work home and there was no night activity at the school in those days which had no gym or auditorium. All public functions such as plays, dances and commencement were held in the old opera house. Occasionally it became too dark to study. Then the pupils marched around the room and sang until it became light again. Schools operated on a small budget in those days and had to count their pennies.

Dr. Alton Ochsner of the medical dept. of Tulane University who is here to address the Cancer Research meeting being conducted by the Rackham Foundation in Detroit made the front pages when he said in a speech that 98 percent of the cases of lung cancer are caused by excessive cigarette smoking and the victims have been persons who smoked a package of cigarettes a day for 10 years. Health Commissioner of Detroit said that cases of lung cancer in Detroit have increased from 27 in 1925 to 333 in 1949 and 84 percent of the victims have been cigarette smokers. Dr. Ochsner said cigarette smokers should have chest examinations every three months. It is the tobacco which causes the trouble but the paper it is rolled in. Some who developed a cough and quit cigarettes and turned to pipes or cigars claim their cough disappeared. A local man had lung trouble and was attacked by pneumonia. Doctors told him to go to a different climate. He quit smoking and has been trouble since.

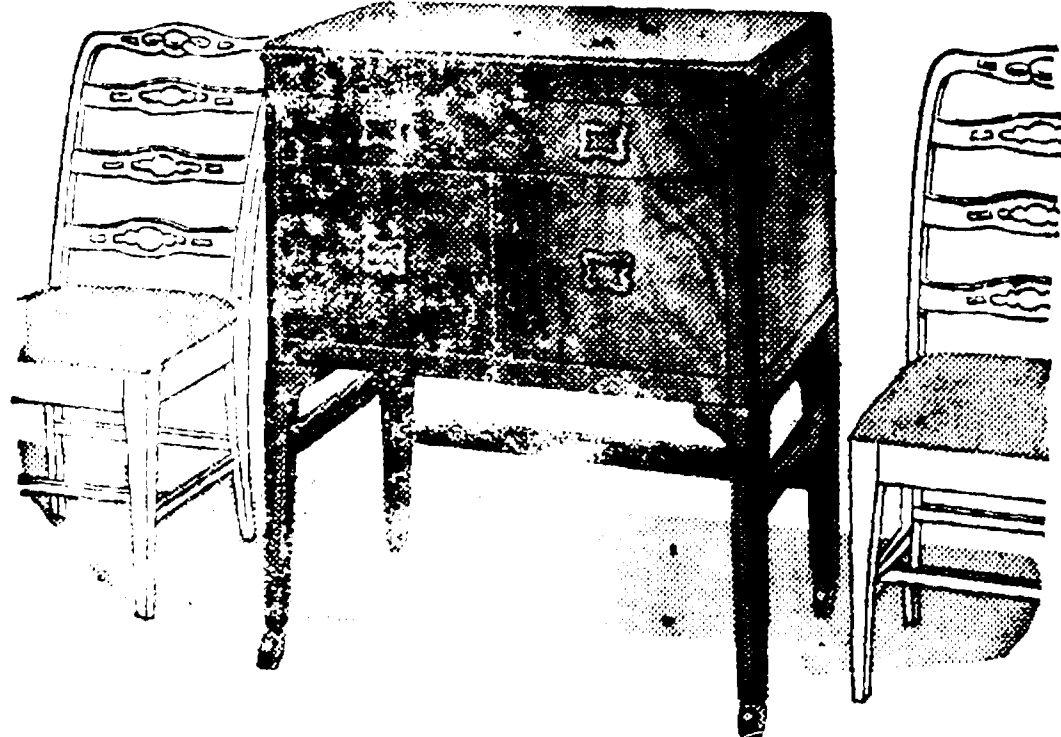

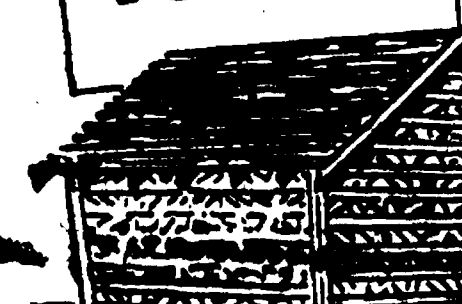
