

The Agricultural Experiment Station at Michigan State College, along with the United States Department of Agriculture, has developed a mechanical device which helps workers dump fruit carefully and easily, reducing both damage and labor. Rigid tests show that this mechanical dumper helps control the flow of fruit, has a capacity of several hundred bushels per hour, and is thoroughly dependable.
