Michigan Mirror

The legislature meets Jan. 9 and the question is can the legislature transact its business and adjourn by April 15 as planned. Ordinarily the session lasts to June 1, about 150 bills have already been drafted to be considered. There will be more but it is not likely to reach the 1000 bill average.

The state expects to reap a profit from the \$1,000,000 it invested in a state health deplaboratory to research a new anti-biotic for the treatment of the intestinal and genito-urinary ailments. Gov. Williams has promised a hands off attitude toward the conservation dept. The dept. wishes to regulate bag limits and open seasons in areas where game is abundant. So far the legislature has turned them down.

A shortage of labor is delaying construction of ore carriers for the Great Lakes. Nearly a dozen are expected to be launched in 1952.

Detroit's expressway is under way, an \$80,000,000 bond issue having been approved.

Some 22,000 civil service employees will receive pay boosts totaling \$5,000,000 in Dec.

The state will need 12,000 more class rooms for 357,000 additional pupils in the next 5 years.

University of Michigan's big \$35,000,000 expansion program is two-thirds completed. 14 new buildings are now in use. Construction has started on 4 others and 3 are in planning stage.

Unemployment has increased in Michigan from 56,000 a year ago to 135,000. Gov. Williams lays the blame for this from failure to get defense contracts started.

The Public Service Commission has denied the Mich. Bell Telephone Company's request for a \$22,500,000 rate increase. They will appeal.

State police handle more breaking and entering cases than any other major crime. They are starting school in winter printing.

1,000,000 Christmas trees are expected to be sold in Michigan this year.

Current Comment

Several weeks ago on commenting on the appointment of President Truman of an ambassador to the Vatican we stated that there was a military or world political advantage in having one there we were for it. That seems to be the position of the 3 Detroit dailies and the Scripps-Booth papers. Since then we have been deluged with literature from organizations opposed to it. All of these argue against it from a religious standpoint and none take up the military or political world side. We doubt that the 39 countries who now have envoys there would maintain them unless there was an advantage derived from it. Until we have proof there is no military advantage derived from it we maintain our stand.

Recently the draft boards announced they were making childless fathers under the age of 26 years subject to the draft. Their induction is not expected to start until Jan. 1 next. The result has been the work has worked overtime and that these childless fathers have been rushing to the draft boards with notes from their doctors predicting a whooping increase in the birth rate. There is now doubt that this class will yield over 5000 men instead of the 20,000 anticipated.

5000 Japanese wives of U. S. soldiers are expected to shortly arrive in the United States as soon as passports can be arranged for them. A plane arrived at Seattle last week with 12 wives of American soldiers aboard, 1 Korean and 1 Chinese. Many of them had children. Marrying an American makes them eligible to enter country. The Asiatic war is sure putting a lot of new blood in the American blood stream. We asked L. D. Haines who has just returned from four months in Iran about the situation there. L. D. says that he has no steady there. That the girls all go veiled there and you can't know what you are getting. There are sure blind and he did not care much for them.

Correction Commissioner Estet Brooks will ask the 1952 legislature for \$5,000,000 to build a limited social reformatory for youthful offenders near Ann Arbor. The plans call for a dormitory and cottage type of prison to house from 500-600 youthful offenders from 14 to 21 years old, which now make up one fourth Michigan prison populations. He says the prison at Jackson built to house 4800 now has 6381, the one at Marquette 1000 which is very over capacity. Michigan has always been without a plan for handling youthful delinquents.

Sears Roebuck stores in 17 cities are shortly going in the auto business. The Kaiser-Frazer Company will now make a low priced car for them to be called the "All State." As it is not in production just what kind of a car it is is not known. Previous to this the mail order houses sold everything but autos. We always figured that if Henry Ford had lived he might have gotten his cars in the 10c to \$1.00 stores. He had the price below \$400 when World War II and inflation hit him.

The gamblers who bribed the college basket ball players to throw games last winter were given prison sentences in New York last week. In sentencing the gamblers the judge paid his respects to the college heads and their subsidizing of star athletes in their frenzy for winning teams. He singled out University Michigan in particular and said the eligibility standards were lowered there so Topor, the quarterback could become eligible. Michigan officials deny this although they admit Topor's course was mostly physical culture subjects.

It looks now as if the United Nations and the Chinese Red might get together on a peace treaty in Korea. Nothing is certain yet as the dividing line has not been decided on and it will take 30 days to work out the details and there will be no ceasefire until then. That's why it doesn't ring true. On Nov. 11, 1918 in World War I, the declaration of the Armistice caused a cease fire at once and the details were worked out later.

We've just had a political campaign with everything from a torch-light parade to a neck-and-neck ball box race.


