How would you like to have 4 metropolitan counties in Michigan control the state legislature? This could happen under the reappor toinmtent plan advocated by the A. F. of L. and C.I.O, who are cir culating petitions to get such a measure on the ballot, asking re apportionment along the lines of the 1950 census. It approved it would go to the legislature in 1953. The Detroit-Flint metropolit an area composed of Wayne, Octdand, Genessee and Washtenaw counties now has 51 percent of the states population.

Another plan has been proposed by Senator 'Coleman of Creig hton. He would reapportion the house according to population, give the Detroit Flint area two more senators and then freeze the rest of the senatorial districts. This would prevent domination by the Detroit Flint area.

He denies the present legisla ture is rurally dominated. That of the 32 seaators, 16 come from districts having in excess of 50,000 population.

His idea is to give the best re portionment possible so that the tishing, mining trucking, railroads industry, townships and cities can be most effectively represented. However he ignores the Michiigan constitution which reads the legislature must be apportion

wool at the outlet of Walker Lake. In 1849 he added a run of stone and ground grain. In 1864 he added a second run of stone and discontinued wool processing. He is said to have built the mill and installed all machinery in 2 months and 6 days. The mill was 3 sstories high with α basement He also operated a sawmill and a cider mill He began to ship flour and needing an address marked the barrels Pettysville







To HARTLAND, BRIGHTON and PINCKNEY TELEPHONE CUSTOMERS:

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company will make application to the Michigan Public Service Commission in Lansing on the 24th day of January, 1952, for authority to discontinue Hartland as a Locality Rate Area of the Brighton exchange and to establish a new Hartland tele-phone exchange separate from the Brighton exchange to serve the com-

nunity of Hartland and certain surrounding territory. The application also will request authority to provide "Extended Area" telephone service between Hartland and Brighton and Howell whereby calls between those exchanges would continue to be on a local basis. Authority to discontinue "Extended Area" service between the

Hartland area and Pinckney also will be requested.

The application will further request that the Commission set a date for a public hearing of these matters. The proposals generally would result in better grades of service being

made available at lower rates, for customers located in the proposed Hartland "Base Rate Area." However, business users of rural line service in the "Base Rate Area" would pay somewhat higher charges, receiving in return one or two-party service in lieu of their present rural multiparty service. The proposal would not affect rural service customers located outside of the "Base Rate Area."

HARTLAND **EXCHANGE AREA** AND **BASE RATE AREA**

An exchange area would be established to include the greater portion of Hartland Township and a small por-tion of Brighton Township, Livingston County, as shown on the accompany-ing map. Within the exchange area a "Base Rate Area" would be estab-lished, centering around Hartland, also shown on the map, with the same boundaries as those of the present locality area.

PARSHALLVILLE

Within the base rate area, as described above, one-, two- and four-party line services would be offered at the same flat monthly rates as are now applicable in Brighton. Outside the base rate area, but within the Hartland exchange area, mileage charges would apply in addition to the base rates for one, two- and four-party line services. Rural line service would continue to be available outside the base rate area at the existing rates without mileage charges.

Column 1 (right) shows the present Hartland locality area service offerings and rates. Column 2 shows the exchange rates which would apply in the Hartland exchange under the proposal. In May of 1951 the Company applied to the Commission for permission to increase ex-change rates throughout its territory. Column 3 shows the exchange rates the Company applied for in May, 1951.

EXTENDED AREA SERVICE

"Extended Area" telephone service would be continued between the Hartland exchange and the Brighton and Howell exchanges so that calls between those areas would continue to be on a local basis without payment of a toll charge, as at present. "Extended Area" service between the Hartland and Pinckney exchanges would be discontinued.

TOLL RATES

Presently, rates for calls from customers in the proposed Hartland exchange to all points outside the Brighton, Howell and Pinckney ex-changes are computed on the basis of measurements from Brighton. If the proposed Hartland exchange is established, charges for calls from Hartland would be measured from Hartland. This would result in toll rates being either slightly higher, the same, or slightly lower, depending upon locations of points called. For examples, see table at right:




