Michigan Mirror

Sidney Phillips, mgr. of board of directors of Michigan State Fair has resigned. He is charged with accepting a \$300 bribe from a concessionaire.

The bill taxing used car sales is up again in this session of the legislature. It was twice beaten in previous sessions. It is changed this time only levying a 3 percent specific tax on dealers and exempting sales by individual.

Gov. Williams is still said to be receptive to the vile pres. nomination.

National Committeeman Arthur Summerfield is said to have ironed out a revolt by Republican legislators, caused it is said by his hostile attitude toward the candidacy of Auditor General John Martin for United States Senator, State Treas. Brake has once again blasted the Little Hoover Commission which would take power away from the legislature and give it to the governor.

Prof. Hoglund of Michigan State says it is possible to increase milk production 10 percent, Meat 8 and poultry and turkey production 15 by better crop practices.

Ford Motor Co. war contracts total \$1,800,000. They will employ 40,000 and use 11,000,000 feet of floor space.

Oil and gas operators will drill 711 wells in 1952 compared to 745 in 1951. 347 will be wildcat and 366 undeveloped fields. Last year 223 were successful. 20 hit gas and 447 were dry holes.

The Michigan Inter-Highway Commission has given Michigan State College \$10,000 to start a driver course. This is the first college to have such a course.

The Michigan state senate has killed a bill which would require Michigan State College and University of Michigan to televise all home sport contests.

There is little likelihood of legalizing bingo in Michigan. The attorney general has ruled it unconstitutional in that it violates the state lottery law and is class legislation, only permitting certain groups to sponsor bingo. The senate has already killed it and the house is expected to do the same. There is some talk of putting it on the November ballot as a constitutional amendment.

ANTI-GAMBLING CRUSADE

At a meeting of all the police heads of the county, Howell, Fowerville, Brighton and Pinckney chiefs being present as well as the sheriff's dept. and representatives from the liquor control commission at Howell Friday it was agreed to suppress all gambling in the county, including bingo, car raffles, bank nights etc.
Prosecutor Erwin pointed out that the charters under which most churches, lodges, veterans organizations operate do not authorize lotteries which leaves them liable to prosecution for violating the gambling act and padlocking and confiscation of their property.
Saturday the first casualty took place when Chief of Police LaMoria of Brighton stopped the American Legion bingo game at Brighton which has been operating there weekly for some time. It was due to complaints against this by the County Ministerial Association and the Howell Civic League that the cleanup of gambling started.

Current Comment

We do not question the sincerity of prosecutor Winford Erwin, who is a personal friend of ours but if he succeeds in stamping out every vestige of gambling in Livingston county including bingo and car raffles he will have accomplished a miracle. Raffles have flourished since time immemorial. In the old days they were shot at live turkeys and the man who shot the birds head off got the turkey. The humane society stopped this and they shot at target with turkeys as prizes. Later they played a card game in the saloons called keno with poultry as prizes. This was usually during the holidays. An old German blacksmith neighbor of ours was lucky at this and usually got his holiday poultry by this method. As to raffles about everything under the sun has been raffled including autos, horses, cattle, pigs, homes farms etc. and all are familiar with the Irish and English sweepstakes lotteries as most of the tickets are sold in this country. We understand the cleanup started because a commercial game started up in the county. In these games an outside concern furnishes the prizes for a cut of the proceeds. The prosecutor was asked to close it and his shutdown of all games of chance was his answer.

The legislature has already killed 53 bills in its haste to clear the decks for the Feb. 21 deadline. Many of these bills are repeaters introduced each session and killed. Among them was a bill calling a constitutional convention, to repeal the property lien on old age assistance, abolish straight ticket voting, have minor parties nominate candidates at conventions, abolish the office of coroner, fix a minimum wage of 75c an hour and to legalize bingo. Now many of these bills were not introduced with the expectation that they would pass but because some legislator promised a person or group of persons to introduce them in order to get their votes. Having introduced them they considered their part of the bargain performed and made little effort to get them enacted.

Since negro ball players became the vogue in the big leagues there has been much speculation as to why the Detroit Tigers never signed any in view of large negro population it would have seemed to be good business to do so. This failure has caused the late Walter Briggs to be classed as a lily white owner and condemned by the labor federation. Mr. Rolfe in a press interview condemns this rumor. He said Mr. Briggs told him last year to sign negro players if he found any good enough. He lays the lowly standings of the Tigers last year to the breakup of the farm systems in World War II. He says Cleveland, Brooklyn and the New York Giants managed to finish high by raiding the negro leagues. This source is now closed as the negro leagues folded after they lost their stars. He admitted Mr. Briggs did not take part in the bidding for negro stars.

Ex-President Hoovers nationwide hook up speech last week did not do very much to clear the foreign situation. In fact it muddled it worse than ever. It was full with contradictions and unproved statements. The commentators tore it to pieces. Hoover would bring all G. I.'s home at once from Europe and Korea. Then he would adopt MacArthur's plan of bombing in Manchuria and helping the Chinese Nationalists invade China and defeat the Communists. Just how he would do this after taking all the G. I.'s home he does not say. He would cut down on all war spending and the only forger he would send to Europe or Asia would be planes and battle ships. This is silly. No war can be won by planes and ships alone. They do their part but it takes the foot soldiers to take ashore, mop up and then over the country as they did in France in World War II. The remarks of Hoover are those of a senile old man who does not know his text. Whoever prepared his broadcast got away.

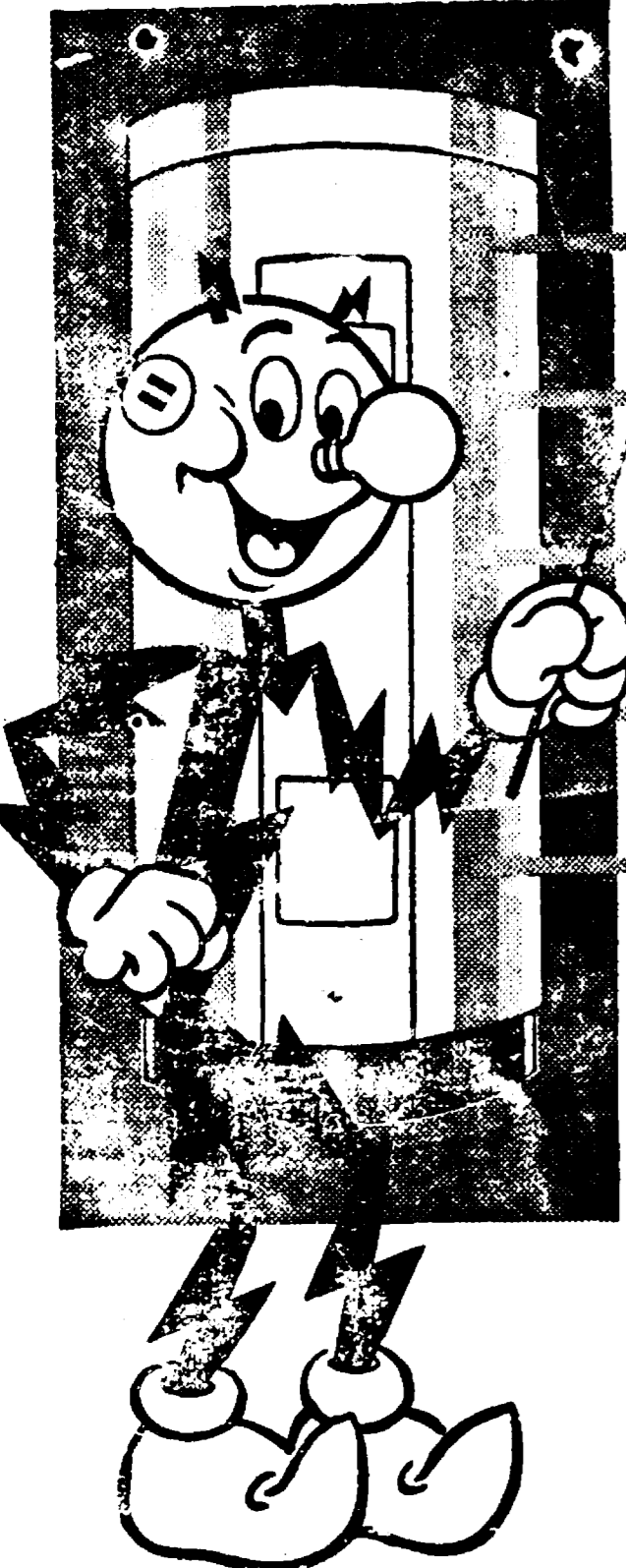

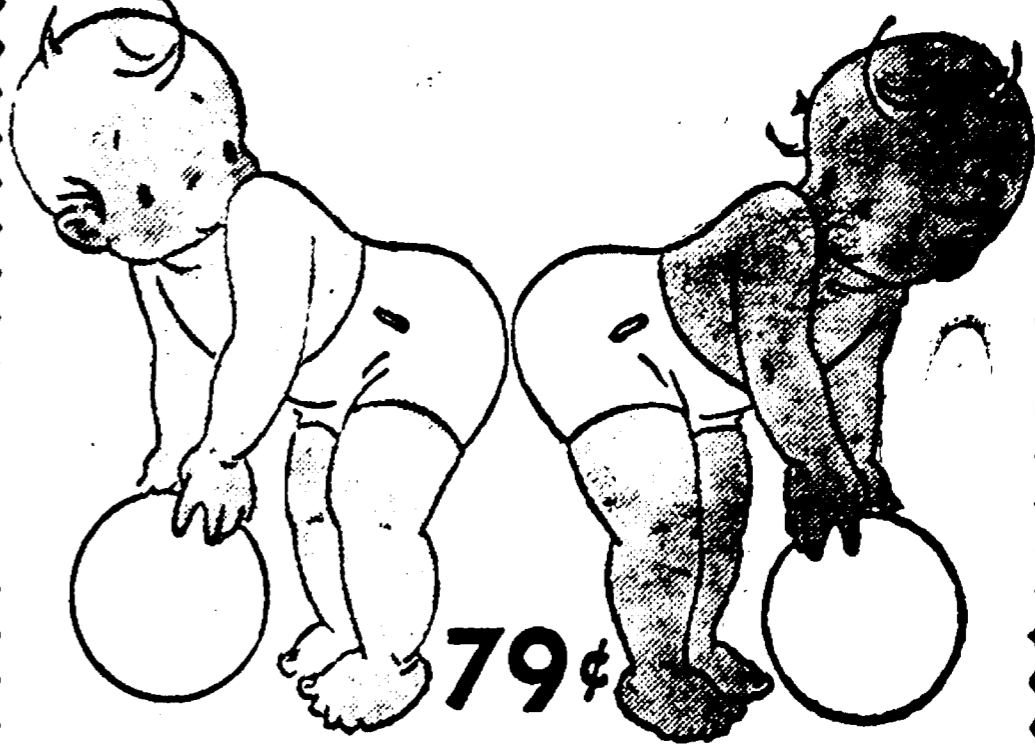

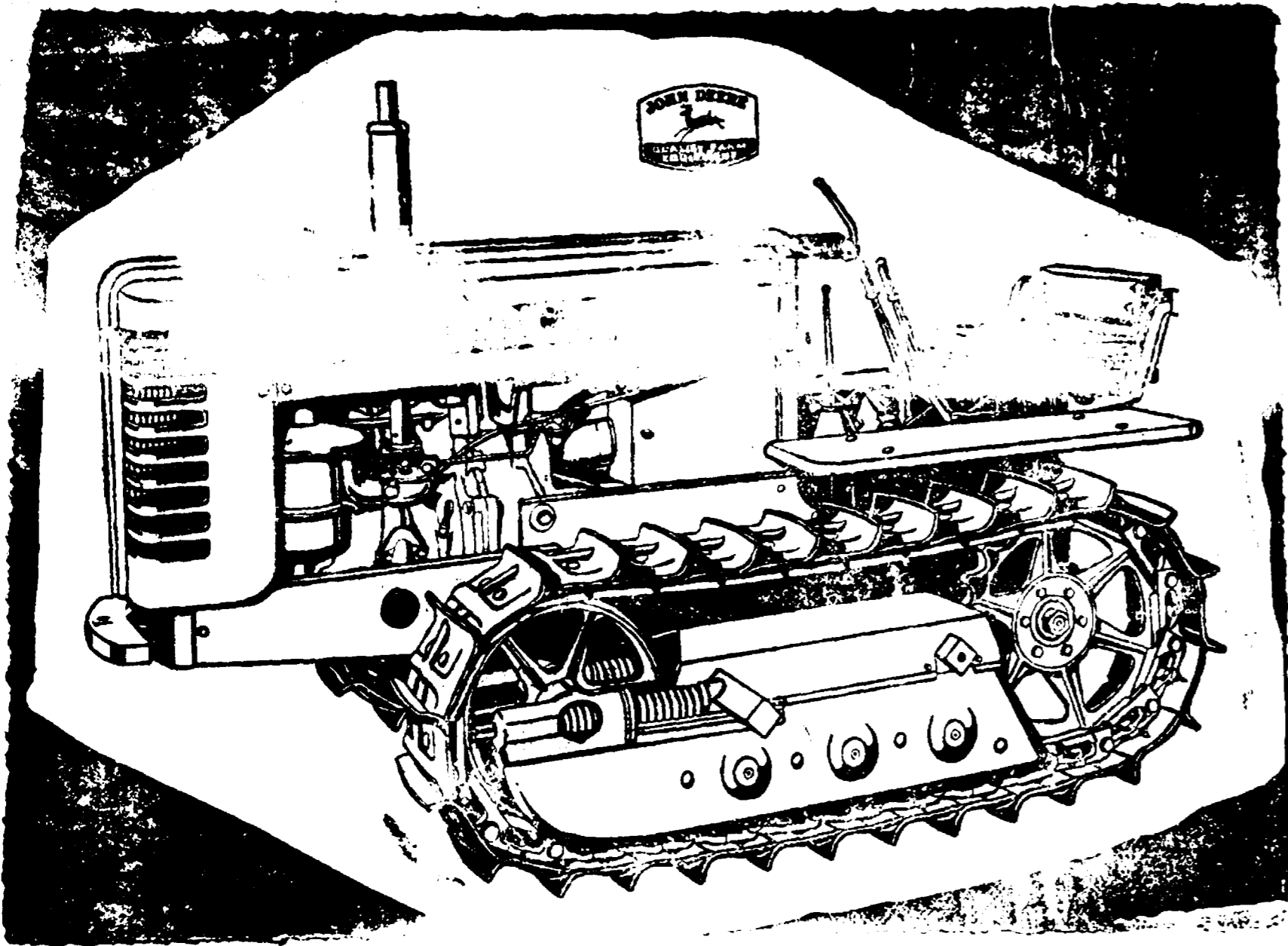
