Garret Heyns, warden of Ionia prison in testimony in the Jackson prison inquiry urged a return to the 5 man corrections commission whereby control of prisons was taken out of the hands of the governor and vested in the commission. This was inaugurated by Gov. Frank Murphy but abolished by Kim Sigler who wanted all depts. responsible to the governor, Gov. Williams followed Sigler's plan.

Michigan civil defense is a thing of the past almost. Last year the legislature appropriated \$1,973,000. A million of this was used in blood typing. The legislature only appropriated \$271,575 this year so the program will be abandoned. Local communities are urged to carry on.

The budget is still \$60,000,000 out of balance. The legislature refused to accept the governor's corporation profits tax and the governor vetoed all legislative taxes which would fall on the common man. The governor's championship of the underdog is his strongest trump card. The legislature knows it but can do little about it.

Senate committees have killed 2 bills favored by the governor. One would add 160 more prison guards. They cut the number to 25. The other would erect a new building for mentally defective prisoners.

The governor is receiving congratulations on the fortunate outcome of his auto accident. He said, "I was alone in the backseat of the car which the state police provide for use of the governor. I was dictating letters on my portable dictating machine which I often do while travelling. My aid State Police Sergeant Gene Dinkel of Pinckney was driving at a moderate rate of speed. One minute we were rolling along with a clear road ahead and the next minute we were in a 3 car smash up. Another driver had made a left turn in front of Sgt. Dinkel. I am particularly happy that no one suffered more than a mere scratch. I am sure Sgt. Dinkel was not to blame."

CONSERVATION DEPT. NOTES

The conservation dept. is moving bull dozers and other tools in the Pine River Project, near Tustin to start a 5 year project modelled after the Rifle River one.

All of Michigan's 59 state parks opened Memorial Day, except Stirling Park, Monroe, damaged by floods.

The caterpillar menace in the upper peninsula has abated due to reached its peak. Natural causes such as starvation and inroads of birds have abated it.

Shining for deer has reached its height especially on back roads where auto headlights are used. Two men were arrested in Schoolcraft county last week for shooting a deer with 2 fawns.

The mushroom season is now on and there would be more hunters except for the poisonous varieties. The four safe varieties most commonly eaten are morels, puff balls, sulphur shelves and shaggy manes. Mushrooms with a ring around the stem or a cup like formation at the base are poisonous.

Characters

COL. TIMOTHY ALLISON

Back in the early pioneer days the Indians outnumbered the white settlers and were always in state of unrest. In the French and Indian War they sold their services to the French and in the war of the revolution and 1812 to the British and ravaged settlements. The War of 1812 seems to have broken their spirit as there was no serious trouble with them in this state after that but they were always a threat. So companies of militia were organized in most communities who met once a year. The meetings were called muster days. Col. Timothy Allison commanded the Pinckney company. They drilled on the public square here and dressed in homespun and carried their own rifles. The muster days were serious enough at first but later degenerated into drinking bouts and carousing. As far as can be found out they were only alerted twice. Once was at the time of the Blackhawk War when a chief by that name organized the Indians and prepared to take over the country. Michigan Indians were supposed to join him and the local militia drilled furiously but Blackhawk was beaten before he crossed the Mississippi and the movement collapsed.

The other time was the Toledo War. Ohio claimed the City of Toledo within the boundary of Mich. The militia was called out equipped, provisioned and started to march to Toledo. Some got there. Others to Monroe where the affair was settled by giving Michigan the upper peninsula in place of Toledo. The militia died out there apparently being no need for it.

Col. Allison married Angelina Carr, a sister of Mrs. George Reeves and a great aunt of Roger Carr. He was associated with Mr. Reeves in the industries at Hell and in charge when Mr. Reeves went to California during the gold rush. On Mr. Reeves return they split up. Col. Allison buying farm at Chubb's Corners now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Dinkel. He had 2 sons. William and Freeman. William was the grandfather of Mrs. Albert Dinkel. Timothy died his widow married his brother, Gabriel. 2 children of this marriage were Clara who married Carey VanWinkle and Mark who moved to Fowlerville. The John Speers farm was the Gabriel Allison farm.

Masonic Lodge News

MASONIC GRAND LODGE

The Michigan Masonic Grand Lodge was held last week Tuesday and Wednesday in the Detroit Masonic temple. Guy C. Powell, grand master presiding.

The Livingston Lodge delegation of Winston Baughn, Elmer Miller, Lawrence Baughn, Larry Camburn, Orland Winslow, Olin Robinson and ye editor went in Monday night and attended some of the social festivities held at the Sheraton Cadillac Hotel. The grand masters dinner was then night.

Grand Lodge opened at high noon Tuesday. After reception of distinguished visitors, the included representatives of the higher orders of Masonry and those of Canada, Wisconsin, Ohio and Illinois the address of welcome was given by James Garlick 33° councilman, pinch hitting for May or Cobb.

The chief item of interest the first day was the effort to repeal the 20 year law that all grand lodge funds must be invested in government bonds. It lost by 20 votes. Next day it was reconsidered and compromise adopted that only 35 percent of Masonic Home Endowment Funds could be invested in class "A" bonds which have paid interest the last 10 years. Other funds must be still invested in government bonds.

The proposals to raise the salary of the grand lecturer and to establish a Masonic blood bank were sent back to the finance and educational committees respectively. The lecturer finally got \$500.

\$5,000 was voted to aid Korean war veterans and 2 new lodges were chartered.

The ban on Masonic emblems on athletic uniforms was upheld. It was also the one banning plural members from becoming charter members of new lodges. The Oakland county jurisdictional plan was approved. Also the grand masters edict that all Masonic Building Associations be incorporated under the laws of the state of Michigan.

The grand lodge banquet for delegates and Masons was Tuesday night. Speaker, Rev. Clyde Donald, Jr. of Milwaukee. Prudence Butterfield and the Briggs Choir entertained.

The effort of Palestine Lodge to repeal the ban on lodge certificates of membership and the one abolishing dual reports were defeated.

French C. Shell, Kalaska insurance broker was elected grand master. This is a formality as after C. Mason has been elected to the office of grand marshal, the bottom round of the ladder, the advances step by step and in six years time becomes grand master. Unopposed nominees are elected by acclamation. Wayne county sprang a surprise by nominating Hugh McLeckie of Waverly Lodge to oppose Dr. Morgan Smead for grand lecturer but Dr. Smead won 845 to 415.

There were 5 candidates for grand marshal: Dr. Charles Manby, Battle Creek; Willard Sauer, Sparta; Richard Koepke, former mayor of Saginaw; Vivian Richards, Milan and Louis Perrin, Detroit. Dr. Manby won on the first ballot. Livingston Lodge was honored by having its master, Winston Baughn appointed to the election commission. Installation of officers followed immediately.

In his address French C. Shell, grand master said he would require all lodges to observe the ritual and blue book to the letter.

Current Comment

The Detroit Free Press remarks "That if the Republican Old Guard keeps on hating General Eisenhower they may end up by voting for Truman." There may be more truth than poetry in this statement. The Republican Old Guard think they see victory in sight and are unwilling to share the fruits of it with anyone but a 100 percent Republican who has supported the party the past 20 years. They say the only persons in favor of Eisenhower are independents and ex. Democrats. Now these 7,000,000 independents hold the balance of power and it is by their votes the Democrats have been in power the past 20 years. Senator Taft is not acceptable to them but they might support Gen. Eisenhower. The Republican party needs to placate them as with out them their chances for victory are small. Even the Old Guard jumps the fence occasionally for it was their votes that elected Gov. Williams in 1948 over Kim Sigler, an ex Democrat for whom the Old Guard had no use.

The primary contests so far seem to be all in the Republican ranks as Governor Williams and Senator Moody have no opposition. On the other hand Republican enters for governor and senator are numerous. At Fenton last week Sec. of State Fred Alger, a candidate for governor again, labored his chief opponent Lt. Gov. Vandenberg who he called a McKay candidate. He said that Frank McKay got State Police Com. Leonard to enter the race to split the Wayne county vote and assure the nomination of Vandenberg. He also charged that Vandenberg is the candidate of the Michigan Temperance Foundation which seeks to bring prohibition back to Michigan. At Flint Vandenberg shot back at him. He said Alger was born with a silver spoon in his mouth and a stable of thoroughbreds in his back yard. Alger owns racehorses.

The house of the legislature has passed a capitol punishment bill and opinions are divided as to whether it has merit or is only a gesture. The law provides that a person in custody convicted of a felony, shall be electrocuted. This is in answer to the recent Jackson prison riots where guards were held as hostages and threatened with death. Those opposed say there have been prison outbreaks in states having capitol punishment, that the percentage of murders in states having capitol punishment is as high as that in state without it. The bill, before it becomes a law must pass the senate and be signed by the governor. It will encounter stiff opposition in the senate and may face a governors veto.

Another graduating class passed out through the portals of Pinckney high Friday night and became part of the schools history. At the graduating ceremonies they were told the world was their oyster and theirs for the plucking but they will find it has a mighty tough shell. High school courses are arranged to prepare pupils for college and much that is learned is of little value unless the graduate enters college. Ye editor graduated 43 years ago. In the course taken were German and Latin, Geometry, Algebra, Chemistry, Physics. As to practical value can't say that any of above subjects have proved so although they may have developed the mind. The subjects that have helped are English, Literature, History and Arithmetic. We think these are the most important subjects taught and should be stressed more than they are. The dept. of education has recognized this and is asking the schools to put in shop, agriculture, business courses and home economics. These are practical as only a small percentage of high school graduates enter college.

We read that Racing Commissioner Harris has barred the use of race on Michigan tracks. We did not know the meaning of the word but find it is tube inserted in the throat of a horse to enable them to breathe better. The practice is hundreds of years old and is mentioned in old English novels. Many horses raced in Michigan last year with snorkels and some won. The danger is that the opening which is covered with fine screen. This opening might be plugged and the horse suffocate. Diptheria, pneumonia sometimes have been placed in their throat to kill them.

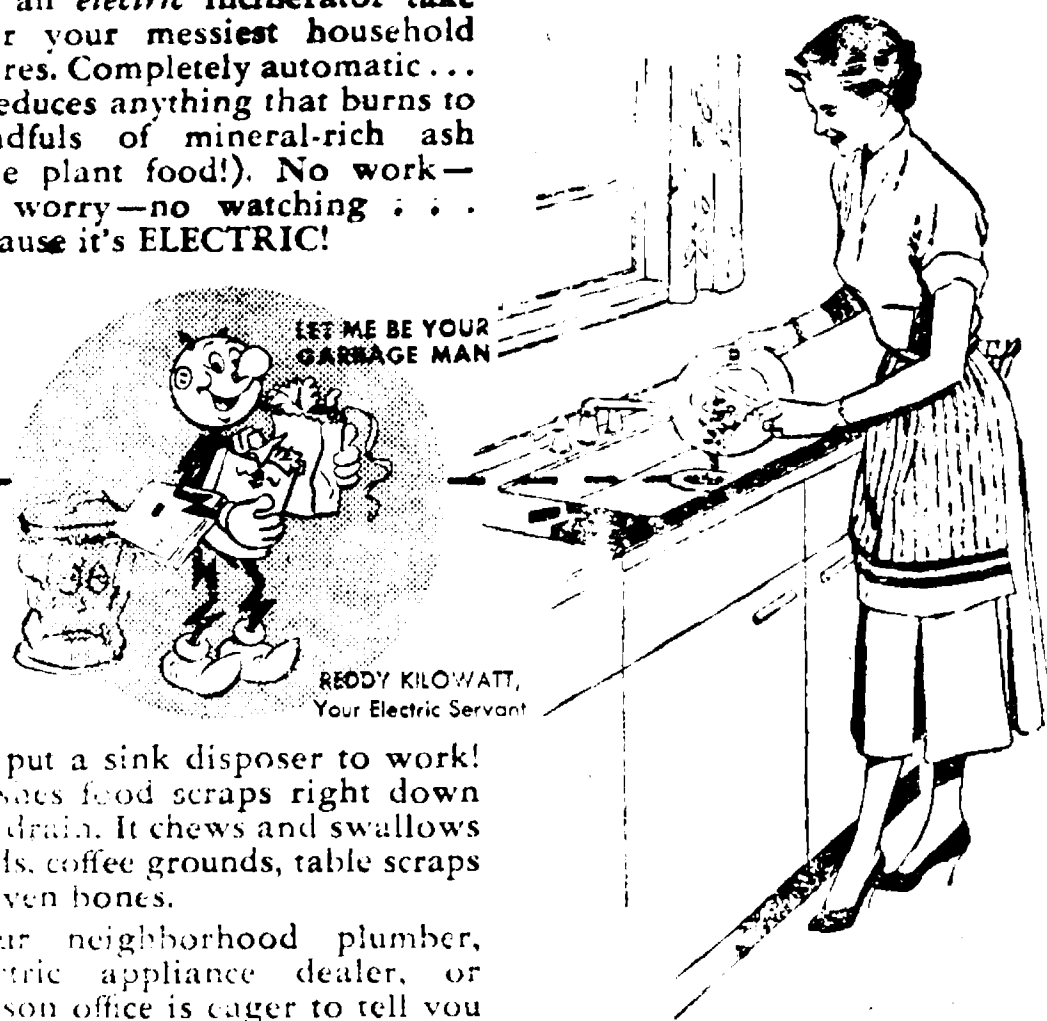

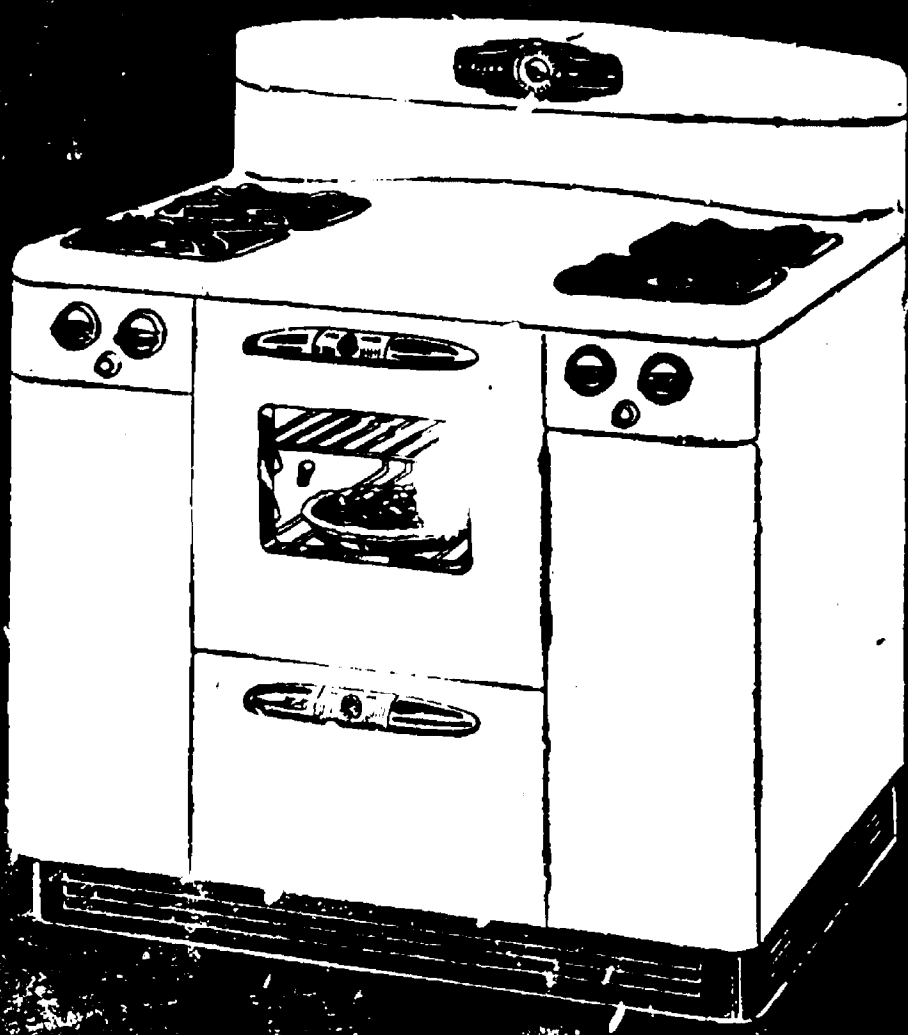

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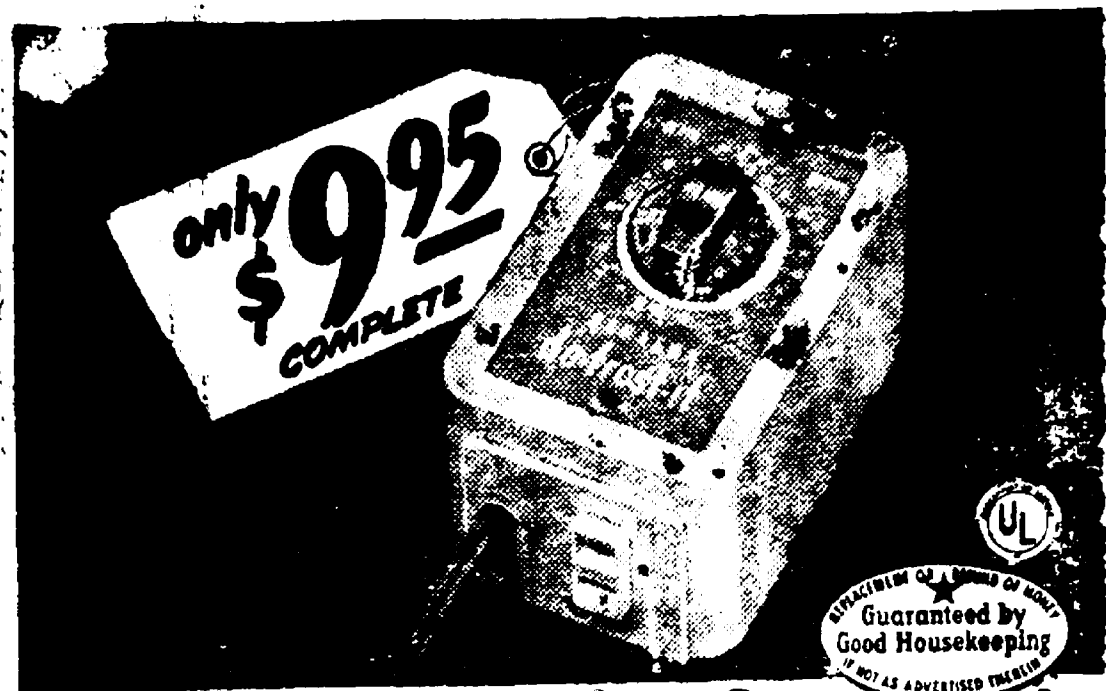
