Michigan civil defense is a thing of the past almost. Last year the legislature approprated \$1,973.000. A million of this was used in blood typing. The legislature only appropriated \$271.575 this year so the program will be abandoned. Local communities are urged to carry on

The budget is still \$60,000,000 out of balance. The legislature refused to accept the governors' corporation profits tax and the governor vetoed all legislative taxes which would fall on the common man. The governor's chamonship of the underdoa is his strongest trump cord. The leg islature knows it but can do little about it.

Senate committees have killed 2 bills favored by the governor. One would add 160 more prison guards. They cut the number to 25. The other would erect a new building for mentally defective prisoners.




