Michigan Mirror

The war effort has caused a boom in Michigan copper mines and a new process by which copper may be extracted from low grade ore has reopened a number of abandoned mines.

At the White Pine mine in Ontonagon county 19,000,000 lbs of red metal were produced between 1914 and 1921. The mine was sold in 1929 for \$119,000, just enough to pay the debts. The Copper Range Co. who bought the mine got a \$57 million loan from the RFC and are confident they can make it pay. A railroad is being built and the highway rerouted. About 1000 men will be employed.

The butter industry is encountering vigorous opposition from oleo. 2 years ago Michigan used 23 billion lbs. of butter. In 1951 it dropped to 14 billion. Oleo consumption per person jumped from 2.5 lbs. per person to 7 lbs.

Michigan pay more federal taxes than all other states in the union except New York and Illinois. It is 6th in tax returns and 7th in population. There fore there is opposition to coming Michigan with Ohio and making Cleveland headquarters. Michigan stand third in nation with more than \$5 billion in war contracts. There are 5000 more industries in Michigan now than in 1949. 17 new industries came in last year with an investment of \$36 million. The federal government has granted a billion dollars to build new Michigan factories. The numbers of employees has increased over 100,000.

The 1952 grape crop in Michigan is 4 times as large as that of 1951.

CONSERVATION NOTES

There will be a work bee Saturday, Sept. 27, to clean up the Ludington State Park which suffered severe flood damage. The Low Chemical Company road commission will supply 400 men and the Mason county road commission will supply equipment. The parks division will supply paint etc.

More than 2 million trout have been planted in Michigan this year. Most are legal size trout. The target range at Pontiac Lake in the state park is open for hunters. It closes Nov. 14.

The lakes levels of Lake Erie and Ontario are receding and Lakes St. Clair, Michigan and Huron are expected to do likewise.

The rural mail carriers census showed a decrease from last year. 254 carriers took part, 55 from the upper peninsula.

The dept. has purchased 200 ft. footage on Fletcher pond in Alpena county, giving public access to one of the best trout streams in the state.

Osego county has been granted a special bear season, Oct. 15 to Nov. 7.

The state dept. expects soon to lease its first parcel of state land for copper exploration. It is 1,080 acres in Baraga state forest.

Ducks, does and fawns are legal game on Drummond Is. during the bow and arrow season.

So far 11,910,000 visitors have registered at Michigan's 57 state parks this year.

Local Notes

SPIRITUALISM IN PINCKNEY

In 1848 the Fox Sisters, Rose and Mary of Wayne N.Y., began to claim strange powers by which they were able to communicate with the dead. It was not however until they moved to Rochester, N. Y. that the fame of the sisters became national wide. The encyclopedia Britannica states that in space of 10 years one fourth of the people of the nation were attending spiritualist meetings. Herndon's Life of Abraham Lincoln gives an account of one that Lincoln attended while president.

There were several ways by which communication with the dead was established, the most common was through a medium. These persons possessed certain powers and when they went in to a trance or coma, the departed entered her or his body and spoke through them. Then there were rappings, 2 meant no, 3 yes. By this means a conversation could be carried on with the dead. Other methods were by means of a trumpet suspended above a table and manifestations where the ghostly form of departed appeared. Spiritualism spread to Europe and established itself in most of the countries there.

Pinckney had its spiritualist seances. Eva Voorhees, daughter of George Voorhees, the miller was a medium and held meetings in the mill house. My mother attended a meeting here as did Mrs. Dora Swarhout, Gene Mann and many others out of curiosity. Then there were big conventions held at Island Lake every year attended by believers from all over the state. As far as we know early spiritualists claimed no healing powers. This was a later development. There are many such healers now. Then there were table tipplings. In this a group sits around a table with their fingers tips touching the top and their neighbors. In time the table will move around the room. I saw this.

Some stories were told of the old time spiritualists. Charles Plympton, a local believer told his friend, Casper Sykes, an unbeliever that if he died first he would come back and visit him. He preceeded Casper in death but never came back.

At Dexter Tom Curtis, a medium persuaded Mrs. Dan Dudley to come to a meeting by promising to materialize her departed husband. After the seance he asked her "well you saw Dan." She said "that was not Dan. It looked like him and talk like him but if it had been Dan he would have spoken to me first."

Spiritualism began to wane in the nineties. Probably because the departed never seemed to have any worthwhile messages any many mediums were exposed as fakers.

Current Comment

The biggest difficulty in the battle against polio is the fact that the cause has not yet been isolated. In Frederickburg, Tex. as some progress has been made. The virus which caused the children of Max Fell to be stricken with the disease was definitely traced to raw milk, according to State Health Officer George Cox. The 6 well children are in a San Antonio hospital. Dr. Cox said one of the 6 well boys got the disease from a friend and transmitted the disease to the other children by making the family cows. Had the milk been pasteurized the other children would not have been stricken. Dr. Cox said the disease is often transmitted by contaminated milk or food.

Mrs. Maki Sawada of Japan is flying here to get aid for 10,000 Japanese American war babies whose fathers were American soldiers and are now destitute in Japan, their fathers having been sent back to America. She will try to get American people to adopt some of these children and also get the immigration laws fixed so some of these Japanese mothers may be reunited with their husbands. The same charge was recently levied by Rev. L. H. Tidener who recently went to Japan and made a survey for the national Catholic Committee. This always happens where there are large numbers of occupation soldiers. During the late war with Japan 6000 Japanese children were on one South Sea island whose fathers were American soldiers. This was carried in a Saturday Evening Post article.

Just how big a part will the old age pensioners play in the coming election? Roughly speaking there are 100,000,000 voters in the United States but only 48,000,000 voted in 1948. This year perhaps 50,000,000 may vote. With life expectancy increasing there are 45,000,000 people in the nation between the age of 45 year and death and 13,000,000 between the age of 65 and death. Thus it will be seen that the center of power is between the ages of 50 and 70, in other words the old age pensioners. Today with high taxes and living the care of aged papa and mama has become a burden and the children join with their parents in the demand for increased pensions. Industry in most cases refuses to hire men over 60 thus increasing the old age pension rolls. It can readily be seen there are enough people on the pension lists to control the election if they see fit. The Democrat party is the old age pension party. The last Republican congress cut 500,000 persons from the pension rolls. Gen. Eisenhower has yet to make a statement on his old pension views.

Gen. Eisenhower is finding himself in bed with some strange bed fellows such as Senator McCarthy of Wisconsin and Jenner of Indiana, both of whom he recently castigated for calling his friend Gen. Marshall a traitor. He has gotten by this difficulty for the moment by saying he will support all Republican senators and congress men nominated. He and Senator Taft met Friday in an effort to reconcile their isolationist and international views. Taft is said to have submitted a list of demands to Eisenhower chief of staff that if Eisenhower is elected Taft's friends will be taken care of and that Gov. Dewey of New York shall have no part in the cabinet or government. Taft hates Dewey who 3 times deprived him of the presidential nomination and masterminded the Eisenhower drive in the Republican convention which overwhelmed the Taft forces.
