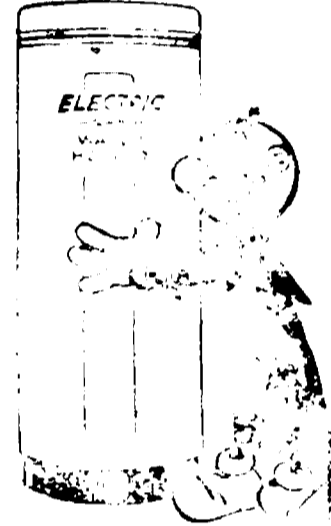

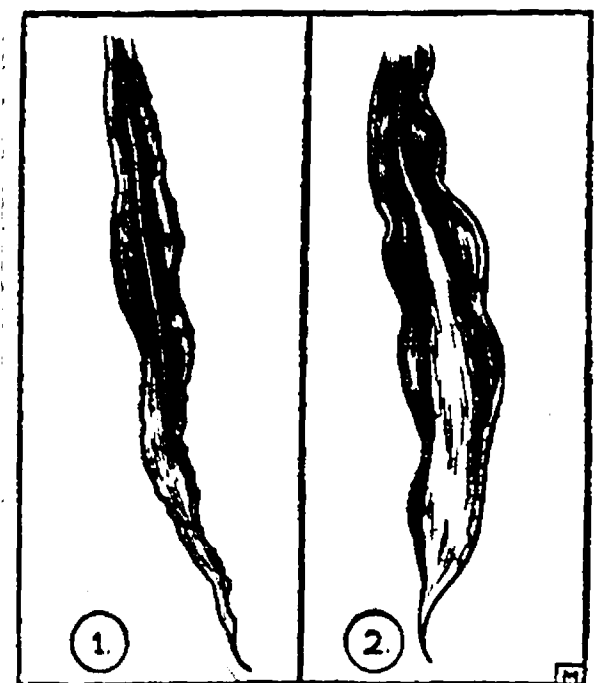

Watch Corn Plants For Hunger Signs From Now to Harvest

WATCH your corn fields for plant food hunger signs from now to harvest, advise Midwestern agronomists. Color and rate of growth are the principal clues. If the leaves are deep, dark, healthy green, you have nothing to worry about. But any other color means trouble.

Leaf No. 1 in the accompanying chart is starved for potash. The tip and edges look scorched. They lose potash first when there isn't enough for healthy growth. Potash-hungry corn has weak roots and stalks. It lodges easily.

The crinkly, "fired" tip and midrib of Leaf No. 2 are signs of nitrogen hunger. Notice the inverted "V" running from the leaf tip along the midrib. This is yellowish and later will begin to dry and brown. "Firing" of corn leaves and stalks is usually blamed on drought. But actually it is due to a lack of enough nitrogen. Drought-thirsty corn leaves roll,



with and dry, but they still hold their green color.

When corn is starved for phosphate, the leaves have purple edges and tips. In severe cases, leaves may show signs of nitrogen hunger, too, because phosphate-starved corn cannot use the nitrogen it takes up.

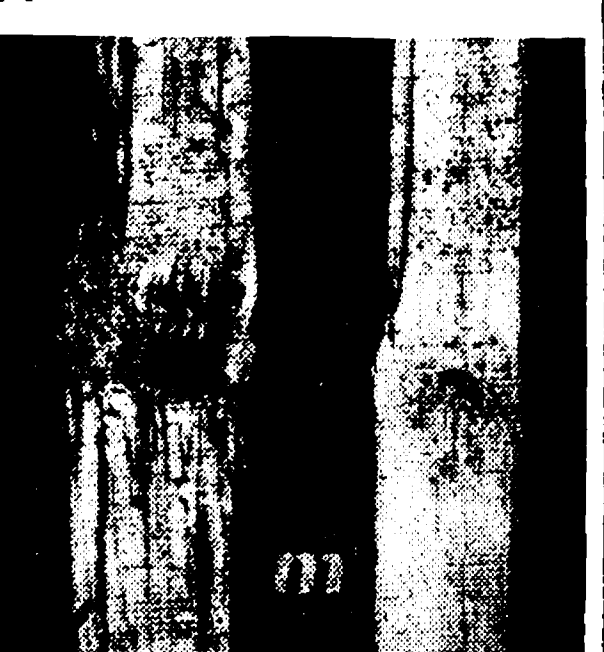
Hunger signs in your corn fields mean that the soil is seriously low in plant nutrients. That, in turn, means low yields and poor quality. Best insurance against such yield-cutting hunger signs is a well-balanced supply of the three major plant nutrients—nitrogen, phosphate and potash. This can be supplied by commercial fertilizer carrying sufficient amounts of each element. Good till is another essential. Tillage can be built by including well-fertilized deep-rooted legumes regularly in the rotation. The legumes mellow the soil, improve its structure and add nitrogen and organic matter.

KEEP the corn plant's pipe line system open, if you want to get high yields per acre this year.

You can do this by making sure the soil furnishes the crop with a well-balanced supply of the three major plant nutrients—nitrogen, phosphate and potash.

Each corn plant has from 1 to 1 1/2 miles of interior tubes or pipe lines, according to Dr. George N. Hoffer, Midwest manager of the American Potash Institute. These tubes carry nitrogen, phosphate, potash, calcium and magnesium from the root tips up to the leaves. Here the nutrients are manufactured into starches, sugars and proteins. Other tubes carry these foods back to the roots and through the ear shanks for developing kernels.

The joints or nodes in a corn plant are distribution centers where all the pipe lines are intertwined into a

mesh work of smaller tubes. Surrounding this mesh work are special tissues which regulate the workings of the pipe lines.

When the soil's plant nutrient supply is out of balance—particularly if potash is lacking—the tubes in the joint tissues in the base of the corn plant get clogged. Then the roots starve, the stalks become weakened and infected and the plants lodge. When tubes in the ear nodes fail to work, kernels cannot be formed. Ears do not mature.

Tissue tests on many Midwestern farms last summer showed that corn plants with defective pipe lines were starving for potash. Joint tissues were swollen, discolored and disorganized due to accumulations of iron and other metals.

Healthy plants with efficiently operating pipe lines had plenty of potash. Potash keeps the joint tissues active in producing protective enzymes that protect the inner health of the corn plants.

When all the plant nutrients are in well balanced supply you will get thrifty, high producing corn crops.

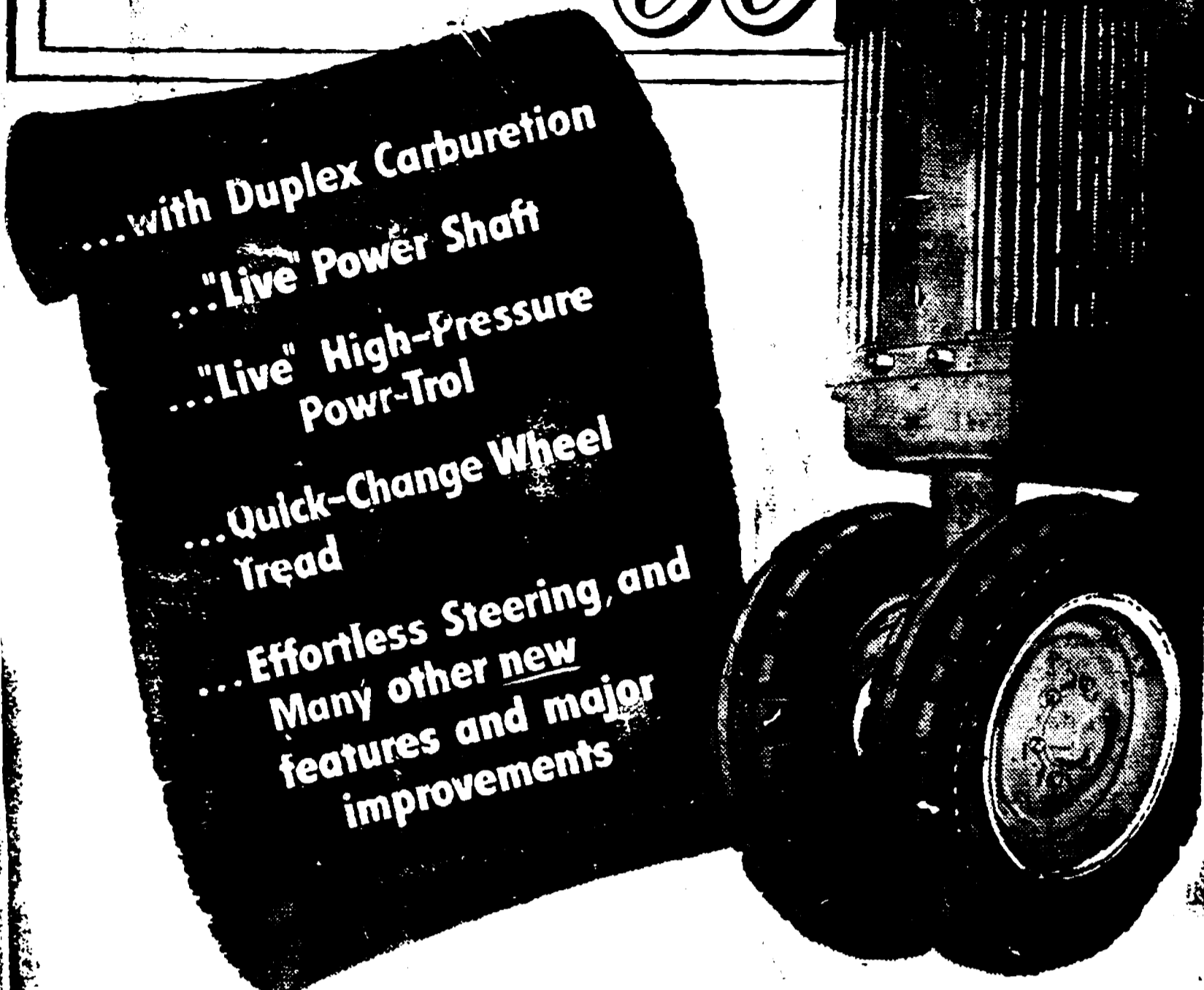
