The legislature just can't keep its hands off the states pizo .mi hion a year liquor industry. The state liquor setup is complicated but not so much that it could not do without expermenting, George Burke jr., the chairman, is a capi able man and is recognized. He won a skirmish with the Repub loans last year. They tried to get a bill through to put a ceiling on the inventory but could not man! age it. Then they went to Burke and asked him to keep me liqu or inventory down to \$12 million He agreea. Then the legislature passed a bill ordering the S. D. D. to increase their liquor stock & the inventory went up again. They allowed Burk to increase his inventory to \$15 million. Sal 'es have jumped recently 25 per cent and the inventory has been raised again to \$18 million.

The legislature is going to build a \$2 million liquor ware house in Detroit to save \$200,000 a year as they now rent 2 ware houses and a retail warehouse. They are holding off on a site se lection as they are considering building it on the state fair groun ds which would save another 103,000

There is alsoo a proposal to en large the liquor commission from 3 to 5 man group. All liquor ap plications are heard by 2 exam iners but their decision may be appealed to the state liquor com ission. The examiners would be dropped if the commission was made a 5 man one.

There are now 400 SDD licen | les open in the state but there are 460 applications.






