Michigan Mirror

The legislature just can't keep its hands off the state liquor industry. The state liquor setup is complicated but not so much that it could not do without experimenting. George Burke jr., the chairman, is a capable man and is recognized. He won a skirmish with the Republicans last year. They tried to get a bill through to put a ceiling on the inventory but could not manage it. Then they went to Burke and asked him to keep the liquor inventory down to \$12 million. He agreed. Then the legislature passed a bill ordering the S. D. D. to increase their liquor stock & the inventory went up again. They allowed Burke to increase his inventory to \$15 million. Sales have jumped recently 25 percent and the inventory has been raised again to \$18 million.

The legislature is going to build a \$2 million liquor warehouse in Detroit to save \$200,000 a year as they now rent 2 warehouses and a retail warehouse. They are holding off on a site selection as they are considering building it on the state fair grounds which would save another \$100,000.

There is also a proposal to enlarge the liquor commission from 3 to 5 man group. All liquor applications are heard by 2 examiners but their decision may be appealed to the state liquor commission. The examiners would be dropped if the commission was made a 5 man one.

There are now 400 SDD licenses open in the state but there are 460 applications.

The legislature is expected to get into the act. They always do.

CONSERVATION DEPT.

It is estimated 174,000 ducks, geese and swan are wintering in Michigan.

So far 79,000 deer hunters have sent in hunting report cards 13,000 small game cards have been received.

At the conservation meeting Feb. 12 and 13, purchase of 355 acres of hunting land, fishing sites in Dickinson and Ingham counties and adding 450 more acres to five state projects will be discussed.

Huge catches of smelt are reported in the Green Bay district. Two million lbs. taken in Michigan in 1951. Smelt are not native to Michigan. They were first planted here in 1906 but the attempt failed. In 1912 they were successfully planted in Great Lakes waters.

A deer that became mired in the muck at the Huron River at Milford last week was pulled out and saved.

Pheasant banding has been canceled this year due to lack of snow.

The largest large tooth aspen is located near Sumner in Grand Traverse county. It is 29 ft. in diameter, 29 ft. tall and has a spread of 38 ft.

Deer live trapping has started. Last year 120 deer were live trapped, tagged and released at the Cuisino game reserve, near Shingleton. Convict labor was used.

Smelt and perch fishing is the best in years at Charlevoix but only fair at Saginaw where there has not been much ice.

Deaths

MAN FATALLY SHOT WED.

Wednesday shortly after 10:00 p. m. Under Sheriff Frank Ziegler and Deputies Bob Egelar and Lawrence Camburn were called to Patterson Lake by the report that Yaeger Sortor, 55, of Detroit had died there of gunshot wounds. Coroner Dibble was also called. They found Sortor lying dead in the kitchen of the Emmett Carpenter cottage with a gaping gunshot wound below the shoulder. The gun, a 12 gauge was lying on the floor and both the walls and floor were blood spattered. The Carpenters told conflicting stories. Carpenter said he was outside the cottage and Mrs. Carpenter was in another room when they heard the gunshot and going in the kitchen found Sortor dead. Previous to the shooting there had been a gathering at the Carpenter cottage where liquor was served. Present besides the Carpenters and Sortor were John Fausser and wife of Half Moon Lake and Marshall Atkins, Hilland Lake contractor. Mrs. Fausser is related to Carpenters. In the afternoon Mrs. Carpenter fell from an auto and broke her leg. She still has a cast on it. Mrs. Fausser has been taking care of her.

Carpenter, 67, who retired from the Ford Motor Co. after working there 38 years, got into a fight with Atkins and they went outdoors to settle it. The Faussers had gone home before this. From there the stories varied. The Carpenters were taken to Howell Thursday and given the paraffin test for gunpowder stains and the East Lansing state Friday and given the lie detector test. Finally the story came out. After losing the decision to Atkins Carpenter went in the cottage to get his gun to shoot Atkins. The latter left hastily. Mrs. Carpenter and her brother tried to take the gun away from Carpenter and in the struggle it went off killing Sortor. The coroner ruled the death accidental.

Sortor has a wife in Detroit, a son in the army in Germany and another married son in Detroit. Don Swarthout, local mortician, took the body to the Warwick Funeral Home, Detroit, Friday.

ANOTHER BREAKIN HERE

The second breakin took in a week took place here Saturday night when persons unknown broke in the back door of the town hall and rifled the filing cabinet there. Various papers were taken in notes, some that day but had taken the papers home with him except \$12 in silver he left in the cabinet. This was all the thieves got. No clues were found. State police found a pocket book in the public pay station outside containing pictures of 3 girls and a boy but they proved to be high school students.

Current Comment

President Ike Eisenhower was captured and made member of the Presbyterian church at Washington D. C. Up to this time he had been affiliated with no church. He said that he had never had time. This is his wife's church. His grandfather was a member of the Mennonite church and his mother of the Jehovah's Witnesses. With Ike hitting the sawjust trail this leaves out 2 presidents of the United States who were not church members. They are Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln. Both were religious men but never affiliated with any church. We believe most of the presidents were Episcopalians due to the fact that the early presidents were from Virginia where that church flourished.

The address to congress by Gen. Eisenhower outlining his policies last week was awaited with interest. The highlights of it was his lifting of the Chinese blockade, allow China Nationalists on Formosa to raid the Chinese mainland. Boiled down however this seems more of a gesture than an all out effort to end the conflict. The Chinese Nationalists have no planes, landing crafts and are short of guns and equipment. They would be supplied with all these and taught the use of them or aided by American boats and planes. The president did not promise this. Consequently their attacks at present would not be anything more than pin pricks. This of course removes the possibility that Nationalist troops will be used to relieve American troops in Korea. As their efforts will be centered against the Chinese mainland.

Congress has reversed itself and given President Eisenhower the same power to reorganize the government enjoyed by presidents Roosevelt & Truman. That is making it impossible to block reorganizations except by a majority of elected members instead of a majority of those present on the floor. The week before they stripped him of his power. It is said they heard from the people back home. Cong. Clare Hoffman of Michigan and 5 others fought the measure to the bitter end saying it would make congress a rubber stamp.

Most of President Eisenhower's appointments have been confirmed. The one still up in the air is that of President Conant of Harvard college to be high commissioner of Germany, most of the fact stems from the fact that he has gone on record as being against the subsidizing of schools conducted by religious organizations out of public funds. The German people are said to be willing to accept him.

Washenaws county's ban on raffles, numbers and bingo is providing repercussions and numerous letters are appearing in the papers mostly from organizations protesting against it. Gov. Williams called a conference of all law enforcing officers of Michigan which seems to be chiefly aimed at blocking out the numbers racket which flourishes in the cities. Raffles and bingo seem to have become casualties in this drive because they were in the way, and the law enforcement officers believed that major form of gambling could not be suppressed unless all forms were. This ban seems to be affecting most of the counties of the state.

Grade Teams Win

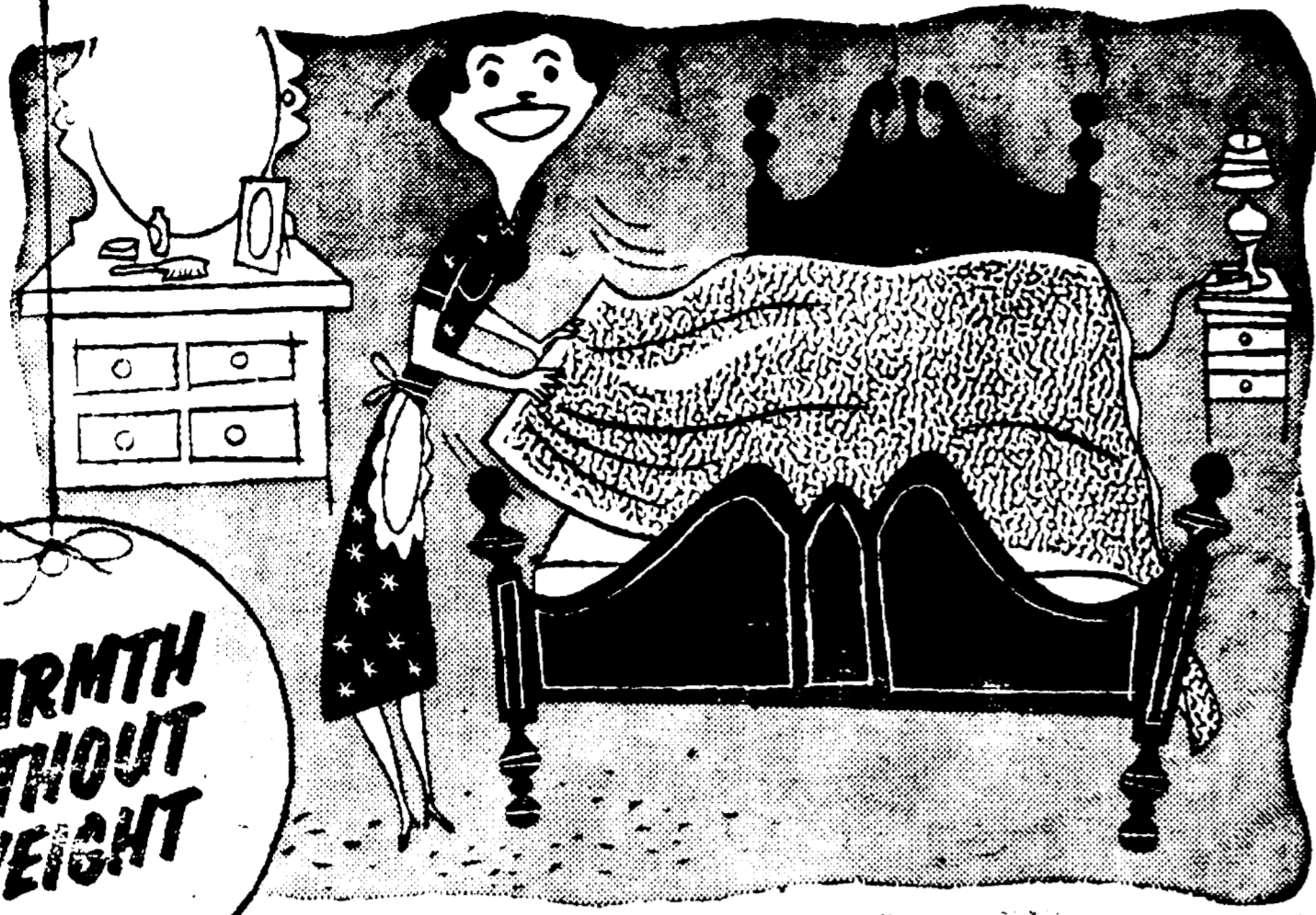

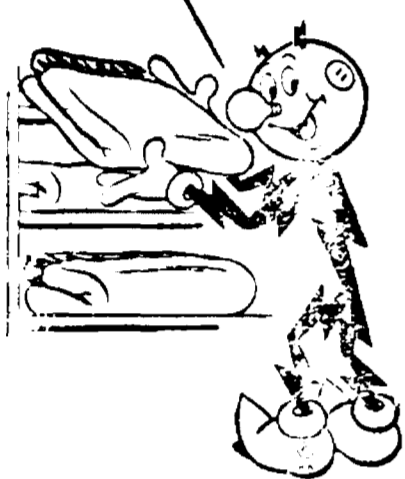

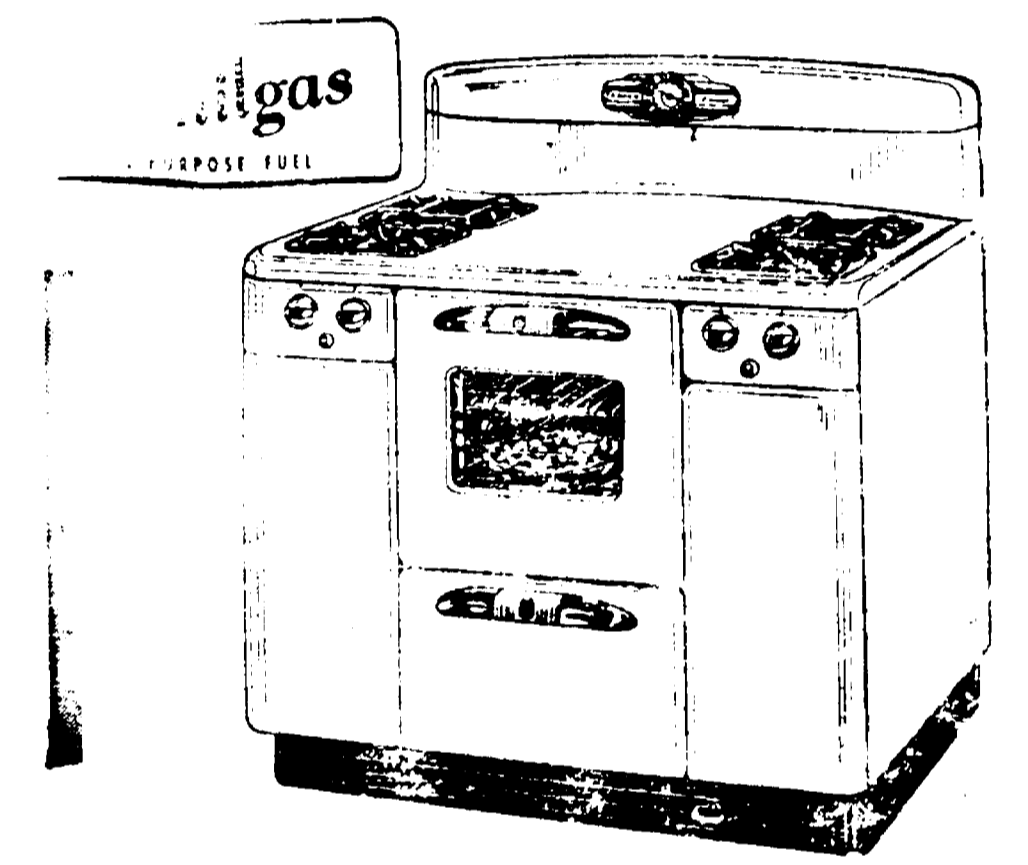

LINCOLN and UNITY

That "A house divided against itself cannot stand" is as true of our nation today as it was almost 95 years ago, when Lincoln told it. Later, as President, his chief concern was to preserve a unified nation. May we always remember the value of national unity.
