## Michigan Mirror

The legislature returns to Lansing this week with the assumption that the business receipts tax will become law. The governor says he will let it become law without signing it but says he doubts its constitutionality. It is to go in effect July 1 but a supreme court appeal would hold it up.

The Republicans claim this bill was the fairest one presented to them.

The 3 Detroit dailies were all against it. They charged it was drawn by the Ford Motor Co. and General Motors and jammed through the legislature without debate. If the supreme court rules it unconstitutional the governor will have another feather in his cap.

There is one group in Michigan who believe economy and not more taxes is what is needed. They point to the fact that the Michigan state payroll now numbers 403,307, second highest in 9 midwestern states. They say there is no job 100 people can do that 90 cannot.

The strong point of the new tax is it only hits 75,000 people. The income tax would have hit all the people and has been rejected 4 times by the voters. The legislators know this.

Senator Higgins strategy of waiting until the 11th hour and jamming his bill through proved effective as the legislators were spit on all other tax bills could not go home without balancing the budget. It was this or nothing.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

The post card poll shows the hunters killed 162,000 deer during the last hunting season. 52,000 during the regular season and 110,000 during the regular season. 465,000 purchased hunting licenses but only 456,000 used them. 35 percent of the hunters got deer. 19,000 were taken in the upper peninsula and 142,000 in the lower. The most were shot in Roscommon, 14,000. Luce was second with 13,000. During the special season 55,000 coes, 23,000 fawns, 25,000 buck fawns and 7,000 adult bucks were taken.

## ATOMIC ENERGY

Atomic energy has caught and held the peoples interest more than any other topic today. The result is they have built up expectations which how ever justifiable may materialize slowly. The Detroit Edison Co. with a group of 27 small companies is conducting experiments with a view to using atomic energy for heat to generate electric power. Experts tell us the supplies of coal, oil and gas will last 100 years. However the tests and experiments will take years. There are 2 groups of atomic research, governmental and industrial.

Governmental experiments are chiefly applied to atomic use in warfare. At the present time but 7 percent of uranium ore is used. Industry is trying to use the rest of it to produce electric energy.

## Current Comment

Robert Taft was the leader of the isolationists and American firsters in congress whose efforts to keep all defense appropriations out of a state of unpreparedness which was responsible for Pearl Harbor and our defeat the next year of the war.

After Pearl Harbor he claimed to have seen light, renounced his isolationist views but every so often he bursts out in speech which leads one to think that the conversion was more apparent than real. Last week when the American people seemed to be getting somewhere he threw a monkey wrench in the machinery by a speech in which he said we should pull out of the United Nations and the Korean peace as any peace under present conditions would be unsatisfactory. This caused a hubbub in congress as only a part of the body is isolationist. The rest of the body is not.

His Wednesday speech came late in the session. That he had seen or talked with no one who did not want peace in favor of withdrawing from the peace conference, entering our own and going to a state of Sen. Taft would have to do. He said that Taft failed to win the presidential nomination.

In a school reader we read the story of an English ship which collected funds from a group of people on a ship at a dangerous sea to warn ships of impending disaster.

During the storm, it functioned admirably for years and the ship was the good bishop.

It struck the bottom of the sea. The ship was not a bishop. It was a warning.

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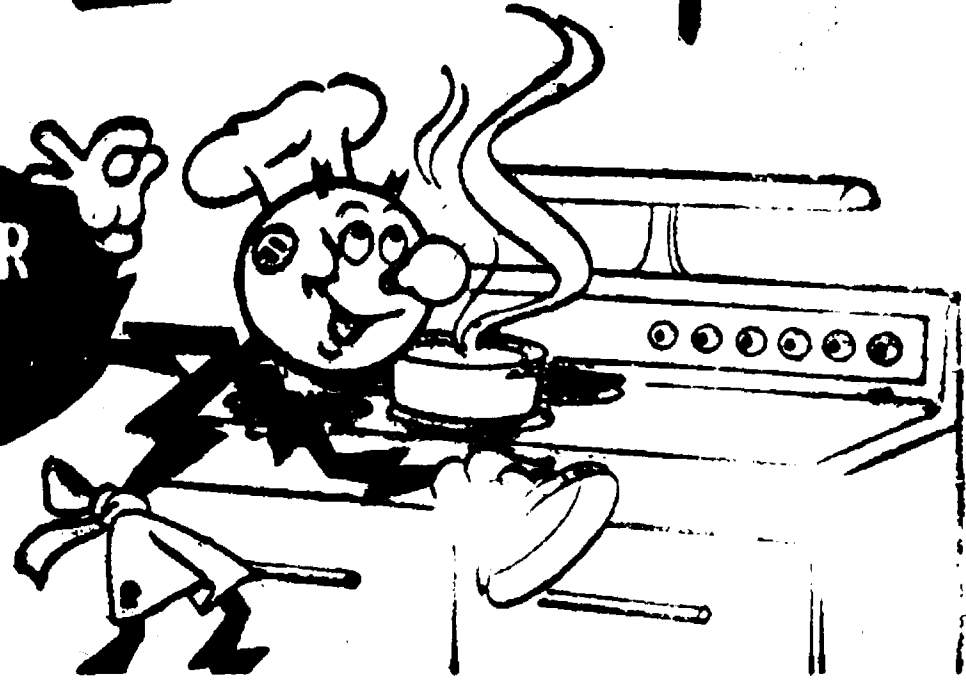
