## ★ MIRROR ★ MICHIGAN

"No one likes paying taxes, including me," said Louis Nims, Mich. State Tax Commissioner. He has held the office since 1942 and has the reputation of being agreeable, fair and efficient. He is now setting up machinery to collect the new business receipts tax it will take 10 more auditors and 5 extra office workers. By early Sept. he expects to get going. This is the first tax of its kind in the United States. The new tax is expected to yield \$36 million a year. The first payment is due October 1 on operations from July 1 to Sept. 30.

The penny sales tax is the biggest account on the book. It yielded \$269 million last yr. That is \$23 million more than the year before.

The intangible tax brought in 16 million, the utilities tax \$15 million and the cigarettes \$25 million.

The total tax collections are \$342,000,000. This million is cut every three months with the state schools getting 62 percent. The rest goes to other state institutions.

Biggest problem are cigarette bootleggers. They bring untaxed cigarettes across the state line. While a lot of them are caught, a lot are not.

It costs 82 cents to collect \$100 but it cost \$1.77 before Nims took over. He has 600 people in his dept. Only \$2 million less than 2 percent year unpaid. Much of it is in litigation or coming in installment payments.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

Fishing license sales picked up last month and are now at the 600,000 mark. Last year 621,000 had been sold.

82 school teachers are taking the summer course at Higgins Lakes Aug. 23-30.

14 pheasants, a turtle and numerous sparrows were found dead in a new piece of tar road near Posters last week. Conservation men released 6 pheasants, still living & washed their feet with gasoline.

The state now owns a total of 49,000 acres on 389 lakes.

15 deer were recently counted in a square mile in Lake County. 14 were counted there last year.

15 ruffed grouse nests were found in 100 acres in Benzie county last week. The average nest contains 10 eggs.

Farmers can start working now on individual wild life projects. Herdwood and evergreen seedlings are furnished for free.

23 species of fish were found in the Pine Lake drainage in county during a survey.

More than 30,000 archers will take the field this year. This is double the number of archers who hunted with firearms in 1932.

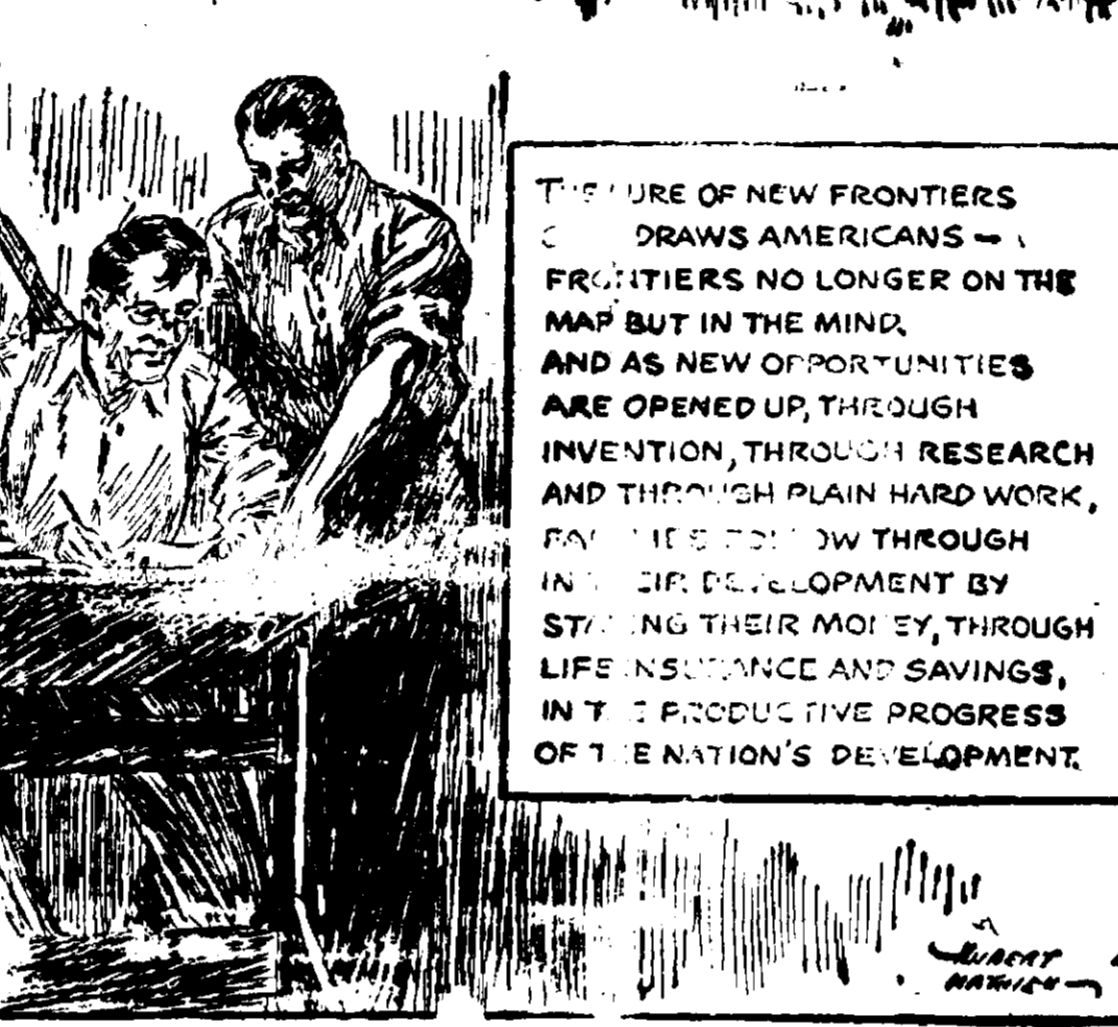

## Current Comment

Assistant Prosecutor Ralph Garber of Detroit has handed down another bingo opinion that does not please anybody. It is that bingo is legal if no admission is charged and there is no charge for bingo cards. A box may be placed near the door and the players may drop in contributions at the end of the nights play as they march out. It is pointed out that a person who played all night and did not win anything would not make much of a contribution and even the winners would not put in more than their prizes were worth. No the only way to settle the bingo question is to put it on the ballot in 1954.

Bingo is a comparatively recent game in this country. It is said to have originated in Italy in 1870 and called lotto. It was later banned as menace. Prevalent to this the saloons held raffles around the holidays with poultry as prizes but they played a game with cards called keno. A blacksmith neighbor of ours was proficient at it and usually had barn full of poultry at Christmas time. About 1910 the saloons put in bingo tables. The police clamped down on the games and they went underground. Their career has been checkered since then. Sometimes they were allowed to operate and sometimes they were not.

Last week Arizona authorities raided a Mormon polygamy colony which had existed there for 20 years. Although a small one scene of the men had 7 wives there were 263 children. Joseph Smith established Mormonism and introduced polygamy. After his murder Brigham Young who succeeded him moved the colony from Illinois to Salt Lake City. Young practiced polygamy. He had 47 children. Later Mormon church abolished polygamy. Small groups broke away and continued the practice of polygamy. The only wonder was they were allowed to flourish for 20 years.

President Eisenhower has vetoed the bill to take the tax off theatre and amusement tickets on the grounds the government needs the money to balance the budget. This tax amounts to \$100 million a year. The big daily papers mostly favored the bill. They claim that movie houses have been had hit by TV and that one closed every 8 hours the first 3 months this year and one every 3 hours the next 60 days. The tax cut would be a welcome relief to them but the president did not see it that way his veto will be greeted with mixed emotions.

The word comes from Washington that there will be no notable reduction in the draft or defense spending the next 12 months. Secretary of Defense Wilson announced a 15000 reduction in the draft in 90 days but encountered widespread opposition in congress and from members of his own staff. There are a number of reasons for this. The navy is undermanned and is building craft submarines and will need men by the thousands. The air force maintains 89 overseas bases and dozens in the United States. We also maintain armed forces in 49 different nations. Then we need men for troop rotation. The armed forces will be in Korea for years to come and we have pledged \$200 million to rehabilitate that country.

Did you know that there are 4 big companies actively engaged in rainmaking. The most famous is Dr. W.E. Howell who was paid \$100 a day for making rain in New York City a few years ago. He made so much the city was sued for flood damage. There is the Weather Modification Co. of California. The North American Weather Consultant of Denver and the Grand River Weather Improvement Ass'n. The most common method is to spray clouds with silver iodide which form ice crystals and cause rain.
