## ★ MIRROR ★ MICHIGAN

The cry of politics is heard in every corner of the state capital these days, more often than during the days of the campaign or legislative session.

Politics is blamed for the ouster of Charles Figy, 10 years commissioner of agriculture, for lack of improved prison conditions, the conservation commission where one member is serving beyond his limit because the legislature won't confirm a new one and also the reason why a special session has not been called.

The Figy case has caused the most comment. The board of agriculture has stood 3 to 2 Democrat for some time and he could have been fired long ago if it had been desired. Commissioner Clarence Smith, Williams, auctioneer and a Democrat supported Figy. Now he has switched. He gives as his reason the recent race horse doping cases. He said in cases of suspected doping the saliva and urine of the horse is sent to the state agriculture office at Lansing for tests. In all cases a negative report or no dope was received. Becoming suspicious some was sent to Chicago where a positive or dope present report was reported and the horse owners suspended.

The heralded gasoline price investigation is dead unless new evidence is found. The committee suspects price fixing but can find no proof. Dearborn passed an ordinance closing all gas stations from 12 p. m. to 6 a. m. A station owner has taken the matter into court.

141 different communities were represented at the district convention of the Kiwanis Clubs at Ann Arbor last week. The "We Build" motto of the Kiwanis Club is known in every locality of the nation. Charles P. Tait, brother of the late Senator Tait was the principal speaker at Ann Arbor.

## CONSERVATION NOTES

Vandalism in state parks is costing Michigan tax payers a lot of money. Smashed tables, benches, pumps and windows are commonplace. 3 Detroit boys smashed windows at the Island Lake State Park, last week. One cut himself so badly he nearly died. All were arrested. 14 million seedling pine trees are now available for fall planting.

5500 legal sized trout are being planted in the lower peninsula. All are tagged or fin clipped.

25 forest fires burned over 30 acres last week.

Ducks shot in Mexico or Canada must have the head, plumage and feet attached or they cannot be brought into this country.

Wild duck protection is slightly below last year but above the five year average.

85 high school teachers were enrolled in the last conservation course at Higgins Lake. This makes 200 in all enrolled this year there.

Fall tree planting at Kingston Plains near Shingleton, will start this fall. 12 square miles were denuded of trees by lumbermen and never recovered.

The bear kill is expected to hold up this year. Hunters took 1150 bear last year.

Rural mail carriers have completed their pheasant census and report 32 percent more birds than last year. The Thumb had the biggest increase 36 percent and Southwestern Michigan had the least birds.

## THE NATIONAL GUARD

The Michigan National Guard, 9000 strong have been encamped at Grayling. Many people still remember when the annual encampment was at Island Lake near Brighton and they used to drive over with their horse and buggy to watch the maneuvers. Those were exciting days there as they had to double their police to cope with the drinking and undisciplined who flocked there from all over the state. The camp was moved to Ludington and then to Grayling to get rid of the undisciplined and also because they needed more room.

## OBITUARY

Mrs. Nettie Vaughn, 92, died August 25 after a long illness at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Norma Merrill in Webster. She was born May 20, 1861, the daughter of Jacob and Sarah Sigler of Putnam township. On July 9, 1879 she was married to Dr. John W. Vaughn of Dexter. Her entire life was spent in this community with the exception of 8 years she lived in Mt. Pleasant. Her husband died there November 9, 1890. The past three years she has lived with her daughter in Webster.

Mrs. Vaughn led an active life. From 1903 to 1936 she was matron of the Pinckney Sanitarium owned and operated by her late brother, Dr. H. F. Sigler and her nephew, Dr. C. L. Sigler. She was prominent in fraternal organizations, serving as worthy matron of Pinckney Chapter O.E.S. No. 145 and president of the County O.E.S. Association.

The mother of six children only one, Mrs. Merrill survives. Mrs. Edith Teeple, Dr. Mosley Vaughn, Mrs. Hazel Kisby and Paul and Edna who died in early childhood preceded her in death. There are 9 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. The funeral was at the Swarthout Funeral Home Thursday afternoon. Rev. Asa Compton of the Whitmore Lake Methodist Church officiating. Burial in the Pinckney Cemetery.

## ... Current Comment ... by The Editor

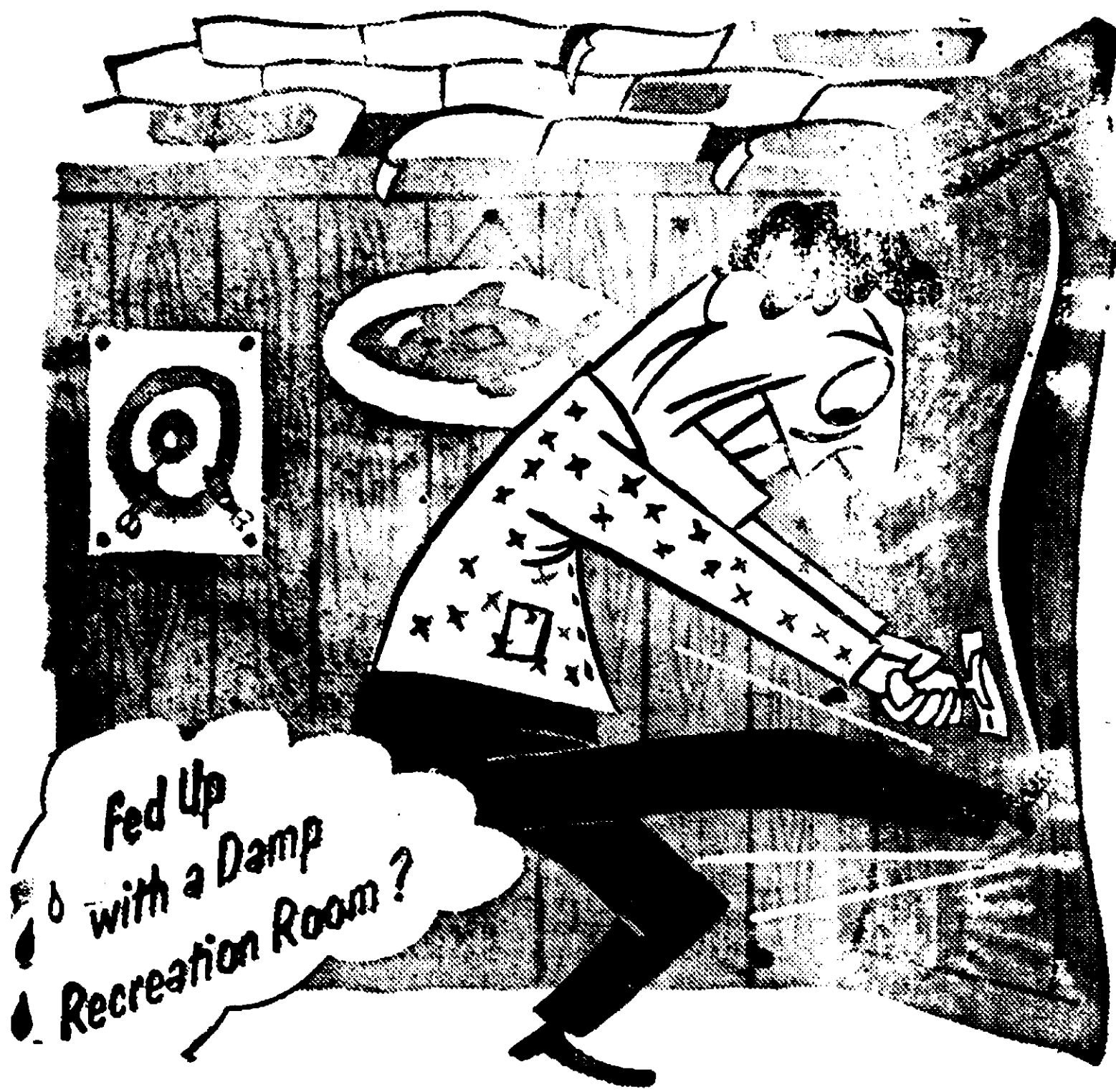
We have received from the county school commissioner a list of the district schools which will start Sept. 8. There are 45 in the county but in 4 of these districts annexation elections are soon to take place, Putnam, Tyone and Handy each have but 1 district school left in operation. Hamburg has 2, Brighton 3, Co-hoctah and Onaway 4, Deerfield 2, Howell and Coocola each 4, Genoa and Marion have been little affected by annexation. Marion has 10 district schools in operation and Genoa 8. However Howell has just started her annexation program. Of the 45 teachers 35 are married women. Years ago there were few married teachers. Jobs were scarce then and single girls were given first chance. Many a hot battle was fought in school meetings over employment of married teachers. Of the Pinckney teachers, Mrs. Audrey Lee teaches the Beaurmont, Mrs. Barbara Burns McDonald, June Bobon, Winans, Mrs. Norine Carr, Thayer, Mrs. Alta Meyer Harger, Janet White, Howe, C. McRorie, Marion Center, Vivian Ledwidge, Hicks, Mrs. McRorie, Younglove, Norma Evers, Green, Don Burns, Gregory.

The Detroit Skid Row problem continues to get the front page although so far there has been nothing but talk and passing the buck. The police blamed the liquor commission for licensing so many skid row saloons and the commission came right back with the statement the police had approved all of them but that if the police so desired the liquor commission would refuse to renew the license of any skid row saloon. This request is not likely to be made. So many saloons have been advanced that there is likelihood nothing may be done. The last idea is to raise all the buildings, make a parking lot and sell building lots. This would mean condemnation proceedings and take years. A committee made a tour of skid row last week and found deplorable conditions. Many of the flop houses were without toilets and many more had no water. Mean while nearby cities such as Ann Arbor are complaining the agitation is driving the bums to their cities. In Detroit the bums are fighting back. 15 of them arrested for drunkenness pled not guilty, demanded a trial and a lawyer furnished each of them. If this continues the judges will not have time for anything else. Police have made 3700 arrests in Skid Row so far this year.

In the election last year Pres. Eisenhower came out for states rights in the matter of the Tideland oil deposits and by so doing got the votes of a number of southern states. Now the south with Gov. Shivers of Texas and Gov. Battle of Virginia are demanding that Eisenhower affirm his states rights stand in the matter of the FBI. It seems the FBI have been going to southern states investigating violations of the civil rights laws. Gov. Shivers says the FBI has no right to go into a state and make an investigation unless requested to do so by the state. FBI Director Hoover does not agree with him. He says FBI makes investigations only on the order of the Dept. of Justice. We think that these two governors are ignoring history. According to our recollections this states rights matter was settled way back in 1865 when Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered to Gen. U. S. Grant at Appomattox court house in Virginia.

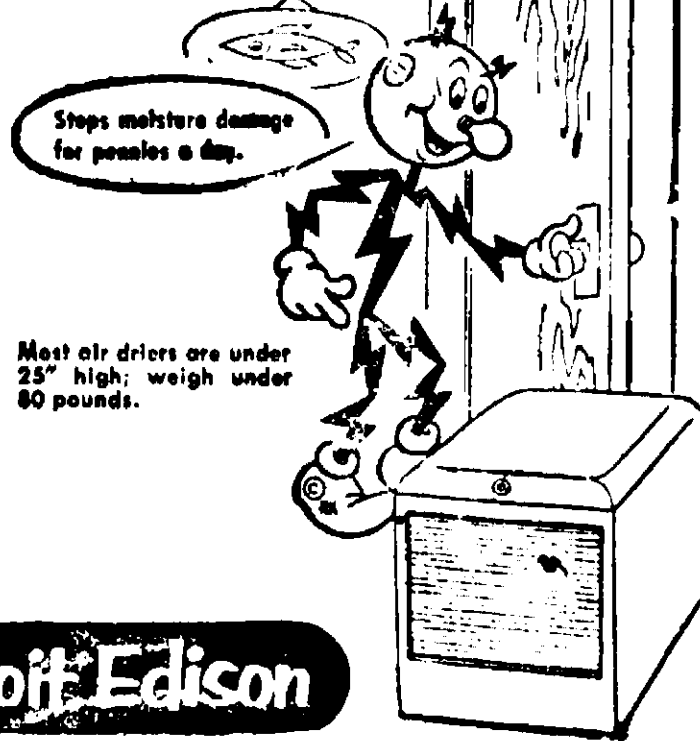
An effort to put the bingo question on the ballot at the Detroit City election this month was cancelled due to protests by the Detroit Citizens League and the National Council of Churches. The three Detroit papers also opposed it on the grounds it would be meaningless as only the legislature can change the gambling laws. Apparently the only way is to put it on the ballot in 1954 and it would have to be well drawn as a similar amendment approved in Indiana exempting churches and veterans and Mrs. George Farrow of Saginaw was ruled unconstitutional.

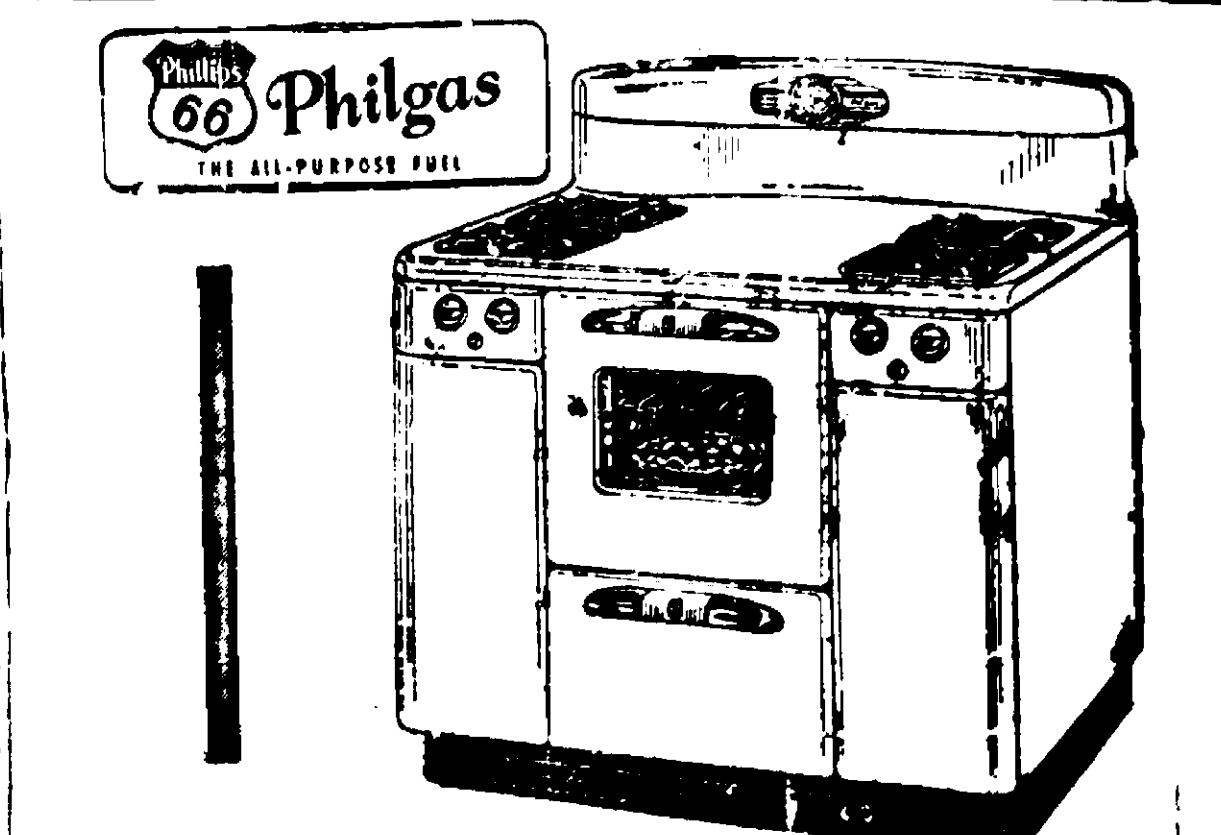
