## MIRROR MICHIGAN

Lower prices for gasoline are predicted by Rep. Bloomfield of Royal Oak. His reasons are: 1. The federal investigation of gasoline prices; 2. The large petroleum stock on hand; 3. Tendency of present day motorists to forego pleasure driving on account of high operating expense.

Oil production was expanded as a national defense measure and this sum continues. The investigation will delve into the fact there have been 13 gasoline price increases since 1946. Gasoline is higher priced in Michigan than in other states while the gas tax is lower. Michigan also has pipeline, tanker, truck and natural production facilities.

The investigating committee also wants to know why all competing companies increase their prices at the same time and why fringe companies who do not sell name brands are expanding.

The Michigan committee has been to Washington to check prices with a federal investigating committee. 80 percent of the gas business is involved in interstate commerce and the justice dept. is using 30 percent of its staff in the investigation.

It is charged pressure has been put on dealers who cut prices. N.E. Greeson, a Dearborn gas dealer who cut the price from 30c a gallon to 26.9c had his supply cut off and had to haul it 100 miles. The city also passed an ordinance prohibiting oil stations from being open 24 hours a day.

Standard Oil which once did 80 percent of the business in this area now only does 20.

Tankwagon prices will have come down says the secretary of the Retail Gasoline Dealers Ass'n. before there is a price cut. Dealers pay 16.8c a gallon plus a 5.8c gas tax. Profits are between 5c and 7c a gallon. The Michigan investigation will cost \$1,400.
