## Michigan Mirror

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson, the most controversial figure on the American scene who is under violent fire. Clark Brody of the Michigan Farm Bureau says Benson is doing all right and is meeting the farm situation problem head on. He adds that 90% farm price supports created a false prosperity. This dam broke in 1953 and we are reaping the results of it. Senator Ferguson says Benson has halted the downward trend of farm prices. Gov. Williams disagrees with him and says Michigan farmers are no different from those of Wisconsin.

Michigan State Dept. of Agriculture will try a new plan. They have appointed a new administrative assistant who will spot crop surpluses and prepare for extra large harvests and prevent market glutting, which causes prices to drop. Joe Wallis, Benton Harbor fruit marketer, has been named to do the job. He will work out a plan to dispose of all crop surpluses.

The Civil defense dept. has set up a task force to function in cases like the Flint disaster. It has also named target areas for enemy attack. They include Detroit, Flint, Bay City, Kalamazoo, Jackson and Saginaw.

More cars are on the highways in Michigan than ever before. On Oct. 15 license sales reached an all time high, going to 2,977,665. In 1952 the figures were 2,833,876. 1954 plates go on sale Dec. 1.

## TOWNSHIP ROADS

The board of supervisors and the county editors toured the county roads Thursday to see the progress that has been made this year. This year 9.7 miles of primary roads have been blacktopped. 16.2 miles of gravel road built and 1.7 miles of base for primary roads is under construction.

20 years ago when the people voted to adopt the county road system they envisioned an improved road or even a blacktop road running before their door, as the county was getting millions of dollars in gasoline tax and license plates tax. It has not yet come to pass and they wonder why.

Act 51 of 1951 established 2 systems of county roads, primary roads which are usually blacktop and local which are gravel. The county gets \$800 a mile for primary roads and \$170 a mile for secondary. An additional money spent must be supplied by the township. This comes out of the sales tax returned to the townships. The average amount of sales tax returned to the townships is from \$4,000 to \$11,000.

The townships have been slow to cooperate in this road building. In Livingston only 10 of the 16 townships are participating. Their contribution is less than half of the sales tax money received. That is why only 16 miles were built this year when 25 should be. The trouble is the townships find it difficult to agree to spend \$5,000 on a mile of road when it will take from 30 to 40 years to complete all roads in their township. Most secondary roads lack drainage and are filled with brush and trees. Gravel has been drawn on for a long time without improvement. Some townships have hired truckers to patch the roads. The following are the county road improvements this year:

## ... Current Comment ...

An Italian sweeper at the Ford factory at Windsor, Ontario, won the English Sweepstakes prize last week amounting to \$137,000. He is 62 years old. He bet on a horse named Jupiter. The horse was a long shot and paid off big in winning. This is a government sponsored lottery and most of the tickets are sold in the United States. We know a number of people who buy them each year in hopes lightning will strike them. A neighbor of ours bought them for 40 years straight but never won. The chances are about one in a million. The last American we remember winning was a washerwoman in New York City. The tickets cost about \$3.00.

The Greenlease kidnapping case in St. Louis, Mo., seems to be ending on a sour note. The FBI is not satisfied with the story told by Lt. Shoulters and Patrolman Doan, the arresting officers or Hager, the taxi driver and has grilled them extensively. Only \$293,000 of the \$600,000 ransom money has been accounted for. Shoulters has resigned from the police force. The entire ransom money was supposed to have been in Hall's hotel room when he was arrested but somewhere somehow half of it disappeared.

We see that the state has put \$20,000 into the new hospital for alcoholics opened near Brighton. Foundation. Medical men have long contended that alcoholism is a disease but one who ever paid them much heed. The usual method is for the judge to mete out fines, jail and prison sentences which were never a cure. The legislature passed a law providing prison terms for 4th offender drunks. This has been a failure. The Brighton project is endeavoring to find the cause of alcoholism by medical research.

There was another flareup in Israel or the Holy Land last week between Jews and Arabs in which a number of Arabs were killed. The United States withdrew their loan to Israel but later reinstated it so say commentators because there is an election coming up in New York City which has a large Jewish population. The cause of the trouble was that Jews were building a dam on the Jordan River to develop power which the Arabs claim was depriving them of water. Similar disputes have developed before in various forms. A few years ago New York and Texas during a drought hired rainmakers to make rain by spraying the clouds with chemicals from planes. Neighboring states went into court to stop them, claiming they were taking rain destined for them. We do not remember just how it came out.

The march of the cattlemen on Washington last week had no direct results for although Sec. of Agriculture Benson saw them he turned down their request for price supports saying he was working on another plan. The cattlemen held a meeting of their own and plan a larger march on Washington. This march was sponsored by the Farmers Union. This was organized during the depression of 1929-32 and had a large number of members in Michigan and this vicinity. When the war started it died out but now has been revived and is getting many members. Their descent on Washington is likened to that of Coxey's army in 1891 and the bonus army marchers of 1932. Coxey's army numbered 950 the bonus army 2000. Coxey wanted the government to issue currency to the unemployed backed by the nation. He failed. The bonus army wanted a bonus for war veterans and not it.
