## CONSERVATION NOTES ★ MIRROR ★ MICHIGAN

The farm or agriculture issue, such as price supports and conservation seems to be uppermost in Michigan. There are three great farm organizations who have taken stands on the subject. The Farm Bureau has 60,000 members, the Grange 30,000 and the Farmers Union 5,000.

The hottest political stand is that supporting Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson, who has been under heavy fire due to the drop in farm prices. The Farm Bureau supports him 100 percent and says he is not to blame for price drops. It also supports his curtailed soil conservation program, and says his opponents do not favor soil conservation but job conservation.

The Michigan Grange deplores the firing of Charles Figy, Commissioner of Agriculture by Gov. Williams and says he has replaced men regardless of their ability. It also fears the control of the State Fair Board may become political. In place of farm price supports it calls for a study to find new uses for farm crops and increased markets. It does not think the government should buy surplus crops. They also want a state speed limit of 60 mph in the daytime and 50 mph after dark. They also want sales tax money distributed on a yearly basis instead of a 2 year one. Both groups go on record as favoring continuing the present township government and blast the drive to abolish it.

The Farm Bureau opposed giving 18 year olds the voting right, lifetime license plates and fortification of milk. They approved state grading, uniform Sunday hunting regulations. They were against change in the sales tax distribution, taxation on state equalization plan and compulsory social security for farmers.

## ... Current Comment ... by The Editor

A number from here attended a meeting last week which had for its object "To Put Christ Back into Christmas". In recent years the tendency to commercialize Christmas has prevailed and the story of Christ the Three wise men has been superseded by Santa Claus and the Christmas Tree. The original pioneers of this nation had no Santa Claus. They frowned on these pagan customs. Santa Claus is an adaptation of St. Kringle and St. Nicholas of Germany. The Christmas tree and mistletoe were used by the Ancient Druids of England in the practice of their pagan religion in which trees were worshipped. They also used holly. At the present time the North Pole is the abode of Santa Claus. Bethlehem, Holly in the window, the Star in the East, the Christmas Tree, the Christ Child, and the January clearance Sales, the Christmas Story, Rudolph, the Red Nosed Reindeer and All I Want for Christmas are heard more often over the radio than the Christmas carols.

The horse is a fast vanishing animal and if it were not for horse racing and riding stables, serum laboratories this animal might disappear entirely. At the start of the year 1953 the number of horses in the United States were 75,000,000 which was a million less than the year before. This decrease is likely to continue through the years for more and more farms are being operated without horses. The light touring car drove the carriage horse off the highways. The motor truck did the same for the heavy draft horses, and the tractor gradually took the place of the farm horse. The fine drafts became mechanized and the U. S. Army abolished the cavalry and horse drawn guns and trucks. Even the wild horses of the western states are disappearing and they are being hunted and made into dog food.

The city election commission began recounting last week the votes in the recent Detroit City election. Here Arthur C. Diggs Jr., who finished 10th, about 5,000 votes behind Mrs. Blanche Wise, the 9th successful candidate for the council has demanded a recount. Diggs is a negro undertaker and a state senator in the legislature as was his father before him. If he wins a seat on the city council he will be the first negro ever to hold such a seat. As time passes the negro is more and more forging to the top. Such in the time of Elvin Hulse at the Pinckney school his independent team played a colored team from Ann Arbor called the Dunbars. One of their players was a man named Williams. Since then he has been elected twice to the Ann Arbor school board.

The battle over whether a man was a Communist or not still rages with no holds barred. Nothing will ever be proved as a jury once acquitted him of this charge. A Detroit News cartoon showed former President Truman and Attorney General Brownell belaboring each other with microphones in a prize ring. Brownell's expose in the first place was entirely political. He was the major strategist for Gov. Dewey of New York for years and unable to get the Roubini program going and alarmed by the public defeats in Wisconsin, New Jersey and New York and with an election coming up in California a new issue was needed. Brownell sprung the charge that the former Democrat administration knowingly harbored Communists, in the person of the dead Dexter White. This could only mean an attack on Truman who was given free radio and television time to answer it. Mr. Truman said when he facts on White were called to his attention he transferred him to a less important post in the government so he could be watched and other communists found out through him. F. B. I. Director Hoover corroborated Truman's statement but said he advised against it, but was overruled by cabinet members.

## DANCE CLUB

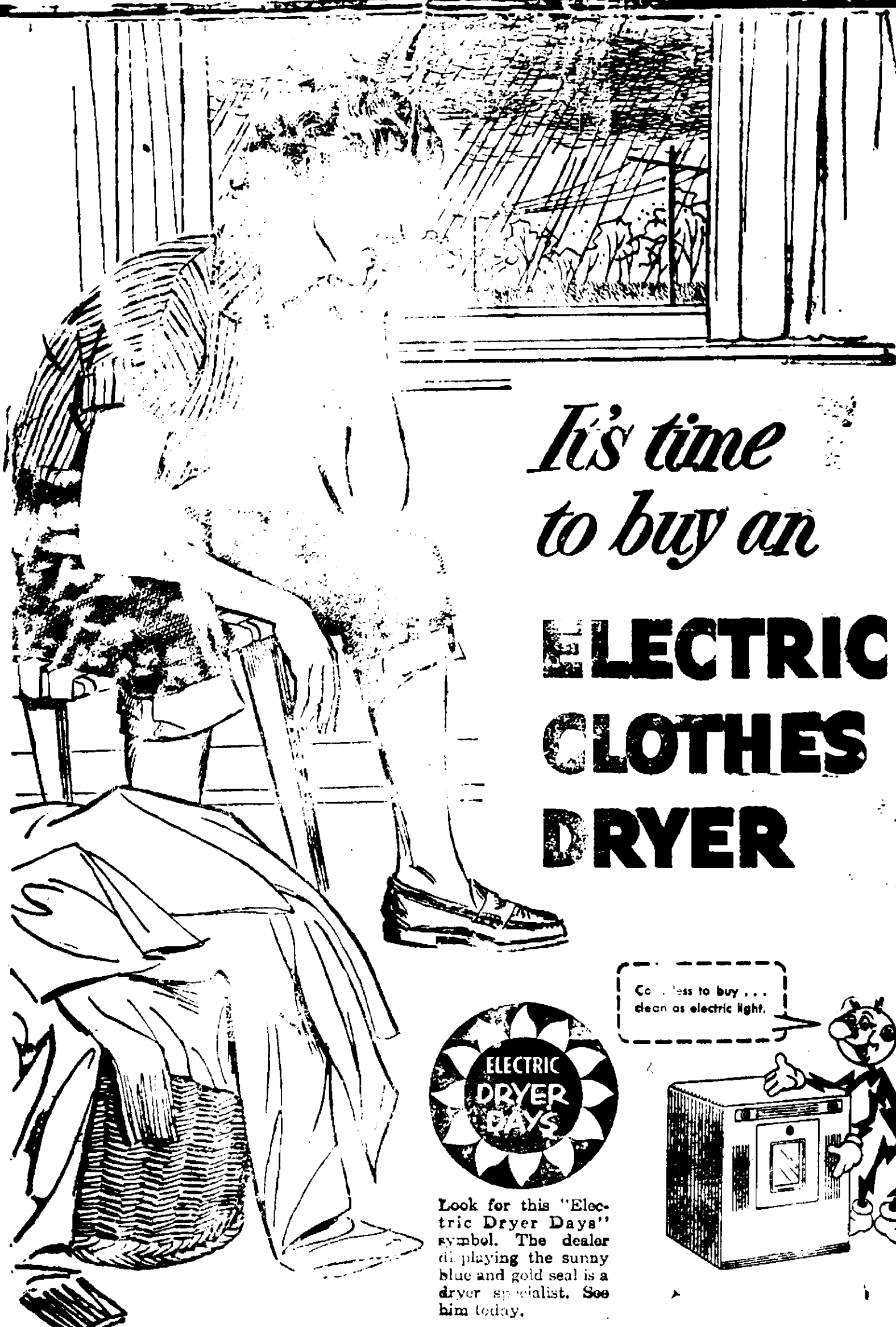

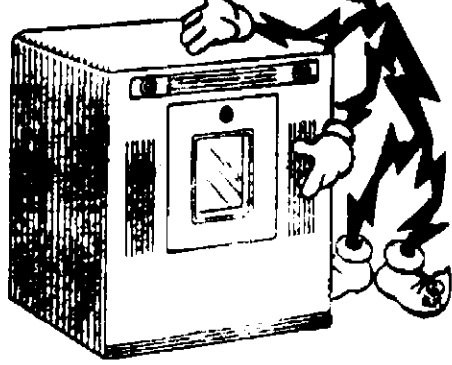
