MICHIGAN MIRROR

State politicians act like they are walking on eggs. There are live issues to fight out but right now they are getting the soft shoe treatment as the politicians are afraid of upsetting the party applecart. Key to the delay is the race for governor. The Republicans don't know whether Governor Williams will run again or not and so have been unable to make their plans. All efforts to smoke him out have failed. The Republicans have plenty of candidates and their big difficulty is preventing them from needing each other. They blame disunity for their last 2 defeats.

The Fair Employment Practice bill aroused much interest in the legislature. President Eisenhower endorsed but the legislature has shown little enthusiasm for it. Gov. Williams came out for it and threatened to get the aid of President Eisenhower to get it passed but the legislature tabled it which is usually equivalent to killing it.

Those who argued last year that new taxes would drive industry out of Michigan are ducking for cover. The General Motors has announced an expansion plan to cost three quarters of a million dollars.

The state highway dept. is feuding with the governor. The governor charges all available federal money has not been used in the highway program. Com. Ziegler says it has. The legislature wants an investigation. Michigan has to match federal funds dollar for dollar. The 1954-55 appropriation is \$19 million. The counties get \$3 million. Of the remainder about \$6 million has been programmed. This leaves \$10 million to be programmed.

Current Comment

Gov. Williams got a break when the federal government authorized 5 new federal judges for Michigan. The governor would not make the appointments. This would be done by the president. But the 2 men most prominently mentioned for the judgeships are State Treasurer D. Eda Drake and Attorney General Millard in order to accept the judgeships they would have to resign their present positions and the governor would appoint Democrats. The new judgeships are lucrative. They are for life and have a pension on retirement. A bill now in congress would raise the salary to \$27,000 a year. However, Drake says he is in the race for governor to stay and Millard says he will not resign unless the governor promises to appoint a Republican to succeed him. Others being mentioned are Former Governor Wilbur Brucker and Roscoe Bonsteel of Ann Arbor.

Great Britain imports most of her meat. We read an item last week to the effect that Argentina where she gets most of it had curtailed her meat shipments to Great Britain, owing to a local meat shortage. This might have implications. Great Britain will be forced to go elsewhere for meat and would most likely come here. Such action might mean a meat scarcity here.

The fight over the Bricker amendment in the United States senate is really a party struggle between President Eisenhower and the old isolationist branch of the Republican party of whom Senator Bricker is the leading light. Bricker fought the nomination of Eisenhower in the Republican convention last year and has never been whole hearted in his support of him. False explanations of the Bricker amendment have been numerous. The constitution adopted 150 years ago put the power to make treaties in the hands of the president and here it has been ever since. Senator Bricker would take this power away from the president and give it to congress. If the bill passes congress it must be ratified by two thirds of the state legislatures. President Eisenhower is 100 percent against the bill and has refused to accept any compromise. He says it would reduce the treaty making powers of the nation dangerously. His strong opposition has caused many of the supporters of the amendment to waiver and some have deserted Bricker. If voted upon today it would undoubtedly lose. To clear the air and prevent a party split all action on the bill has been postponed for a week.

The legislature has shown a disinclination to do much to curb the mounting traffic deaths in the state. The Republican policy committee adopted a hands off policy. They endorsed the central state filing system of drivers records, raising the minimum age for drivers, making it reckless driving to pass a car on a hill, and requiring a yearly physical examination for school bus drivers. They turned down chemical tests of drivers accused of intoxication and left the speed limit of vehicles up to the cities and townships. The bill adding 105 state police was left to the good judgement of the legislature.

What seems to have been lost sight of when the Bricker amendment got personal is that congress has the power to change any treaty by passing a law and so does not need any protection against them. For instance we once had a treaty with China admitting Chinese immigrants of a large scale. These Chinese built many of the early railroads and helped settle California. Congress killed this treaty by passing the Chinese Exclusion Act which barred the bulk of Chinese immigrants from entering this country. The supreme court upheld the legality of it.

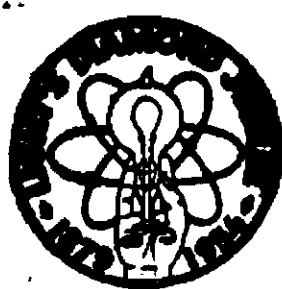

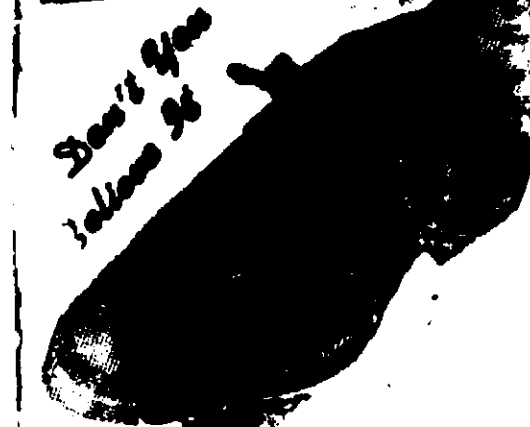

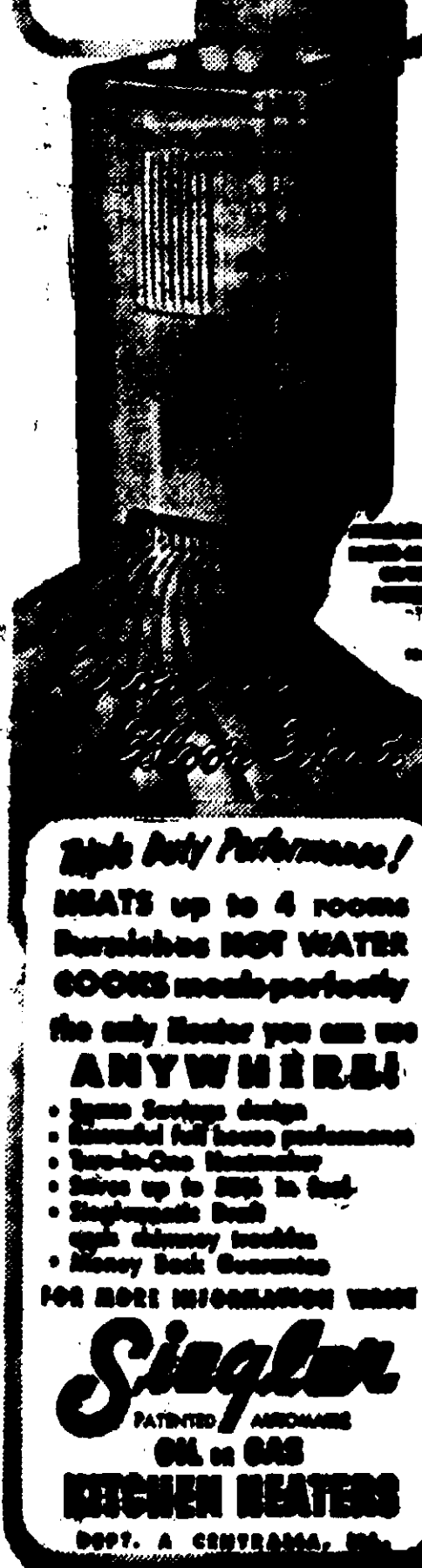
