## MICHIGAN MIRROR

The Winter Dairy Festival is at the Center, East Lansing Feb. 20-19.

President Eisenhower has designated Dec. 15 as safe driving day.

Fire was used in the early days to clear land for agriculture. The Indians often set a circle of fire around buffalo herds to force them off cliffs so they could be easily butchered. It is still used in the south to clear land.

G. Donald Kennedy, former state highway commissioner, a native of South Lyon has been named head of the Michigan Portland Cement Co.

Three new ski centers will go into operation in December. This makes 41 in all in the state located from Kalamazoo and Pontiac in the south to Ishpeming and the copper country in the upper peninsula.

The person who has been drinking 10 to 15 times more liable to have a traffic accident than the one who has not.

There is an amazing ignorance about the Soo Canal which will celebrate its centennial this year. Did you know that more ships pass through it each year than any other canal in the world including the Suez and Panama canals?

That the present canal is the fourth one that was built there. The first one was built by back in the French and Indian days and was only big enough for pirogues and batteaux of the fur traders. These were pulled around the falls through the canal by an ox team. The first canal operated by locks was built by private capital, the state and government having no money. The builders got their pay out of the tolls charged at the canal.

This proved too small and another was built. This was also outgrown and still another had to be built to take larger boats. The canal was built by an army engineer.

Up to Sunday, Nov. 21, 6,394 deer and 103 bear had been carried across the Straits of Mackinac last year at a cost of \$192 deer and 153 bear. The toll in the lower peninsula was less this year than last.

Numerous dead muskrat have been found but this is nothing to worry about as many die of disease each year. Trappers took 327,000 muskrat in Michigan last year.

This year 36 deer, 163 ruffed grouse, 20 woodcock, 5 snipe, 695 quail, 11 snowshoe hares were taken on Drummond island last year only 27 deer were taken.

36 fires burned 143 acres last week. A trout tagged and released in the Black River Oct. 26, 1953 was captured in Lake Erie Oct. 13, 1954 500 miles away.

Sixteen wolf have been killed in the state this year. All in the upper peninsula.

15,000 acres of state land will be offered for mineral lease December 1. Rural mail carriers started their pheasant count Nov. 29. The post card poll of hunters has also started.

The injunction secured against the dept to permit taking of chubs in Lake Michigan will be dissolved by Judge Smith at and Haven.

Spots on the liver and worms do not make rabbits unfit to eat. Cooking kills the germs, 1 1/2 million fishing licenses and digests will be available from dealers after Dec. 1.

The Michigan Farm Bureau has gone on record in favor of the conservation dept's discretionary management of the Michigan deer herd.

The same number of hunters operated in the upper peninsula this year as last but the number in the lower peninsula declined 10 percent.

## CURRENT COMMENT

Segregation is, evidently, not all in the south as it seems to have cropped up in the south and southwest. The Camelback Inn is a very popular hotel at Phoenix, Arizona for those who go south and west for the winter and as such was selected for the meeting of the annual convention of the National Association of Attorney Generals. However the hotel has a rule barring members of the Jewish race and as there are a number of attorney generals of that faith, this proved to be a snag. The hotel stated that this was their policy and refused to change it even to admit the attorney generals of the Jewish faith. After a lengthy dispute the convention was transferred to White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, where such restrictions do not exist.

Attorney General Goldstein of New York, Flanigan of Massachusetts, and Brown of California are Jews. Jack Stewart, manager of the hotel in refusing a final plea to change the hotels policy said the association had the right to run their own business, and also the hotel had a similar right to run theirs. We remember years ago when the Michigan Central tunnel was built over the Pinckney-Detroit road just west of that village. The chief engineer was named Hawks and his assistant was a negro, named Polham. The hotel refused the negro a room whereupon Hawks said, "I don't sleep in my room. He sleeps with me. The negro for a room."

Attorney General Latham of Illinois has ruled that television bingo is illegal. A grocery chain store which sponsored the event was giving away free bingo boards, bearing 50 numbers 5 rows of 5 numbers. When a row of 5 numbers is covered the winner takes his board to a bingo store and gets the prize. The attorney general said the Illinois supreme court had ruled bingo a lottery, and there was no exception for television bingo.

Free speech prevails in this country but it is unknown in many others. In Argentina, Rev. Rudolph Carboni, a Catholic priest, has just been sentenced to 30 days in jail for comparing President Peron of that country to Adolf Hitler and the Nazi persecution of German Catholics to the conditions now prevailing in Argentina. Several other priests have also been arrested and charged with interfering with state affairs.

In this country free speech is the heritage of the people and no person is immune to it. All of our presidents have to withstand immense criticism which offer verges on slander. They have no defense against it. It has endured from the time of Washington on down. Most of them, so called republicans with presidents like Argentina are Republics in name only. The president reserves most of the powers to himself and can always suspend the constitution or invade martial law.

Gov. Williams and the state highway dept. under Charles Ziegler are still going after each other hammer and tongs. The governor has criticized Ziegler for letting road construction contracts without getting bids. Ziegler quotes a decision of Attorney General Meritt to the effect that the highway dept. does not have to get bids on construction jobs. Ziegler says he wants less than these construction jobs to contractors who have equipment near the jobs and can do it cheapest. We wonder just why the taking of bids was thrown out the window. Of course it would not be to reward deserving members of the party in order to get their support in election year.

We think Gov. G. Mennen Williams is the getting the best of governor Michigan ever had. Governor Bricker did a lot of travelling and was well served but it was money at

## THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Those who have notice that a special meeting and election of the qualified electors of said School District will be held in the Putnam Township Hall, to the Village of Pinckney, Michigan, on the 7th day of December, 1954, at 12:00 o'clock noon.

THE POLLS OF ELECTION WILL OPEN AT 12:00 O'CLOCK NOON, AND CLOSE AT 6:00 O'CLOCK, P. M., EASTERN STANDARD TIME.

The following propositions will be submitted to the vote of the electors qualified to vote thereon at said special meeting and election:

1. Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be levied against all property in Pinckney Community Schools District, Livingston and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, for all purposes, except levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased, as provided by Section 21, Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, by one percent (1.0%) of the assessed valuations, as equalized, of all property in the School District for a period of twenty (20) years, from 1954 to 1974, both inclusive, for the purpose of providing a debt retirement fund to pay the principal and interest on bonds of the School District in the principal amount of not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) to be issued for the purpose of erecting and furnishing additions to the high school building and to the elementary schoolhouse and remodeling the high school building?

2. Shall Pinckney Community Schools District, Livingston and Washtenaw Counties, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) and issue its bonds for the purpose of erecting and furnishing additions to the high school building and to the elementary schoolhouse and remodeling the high school building?

Each person voting on the proposition to increase the total tax limitation must be a citizen of the United States, above the age of 21 years, and have resided in the State of Michigan six months, and in the School District 30 days next preceding the election.

Stockbridge which voted down a bond issue for a new school several weeks ago will vote again on the proposition Nov. 8.
